During the summer months these stores will be open every evening.

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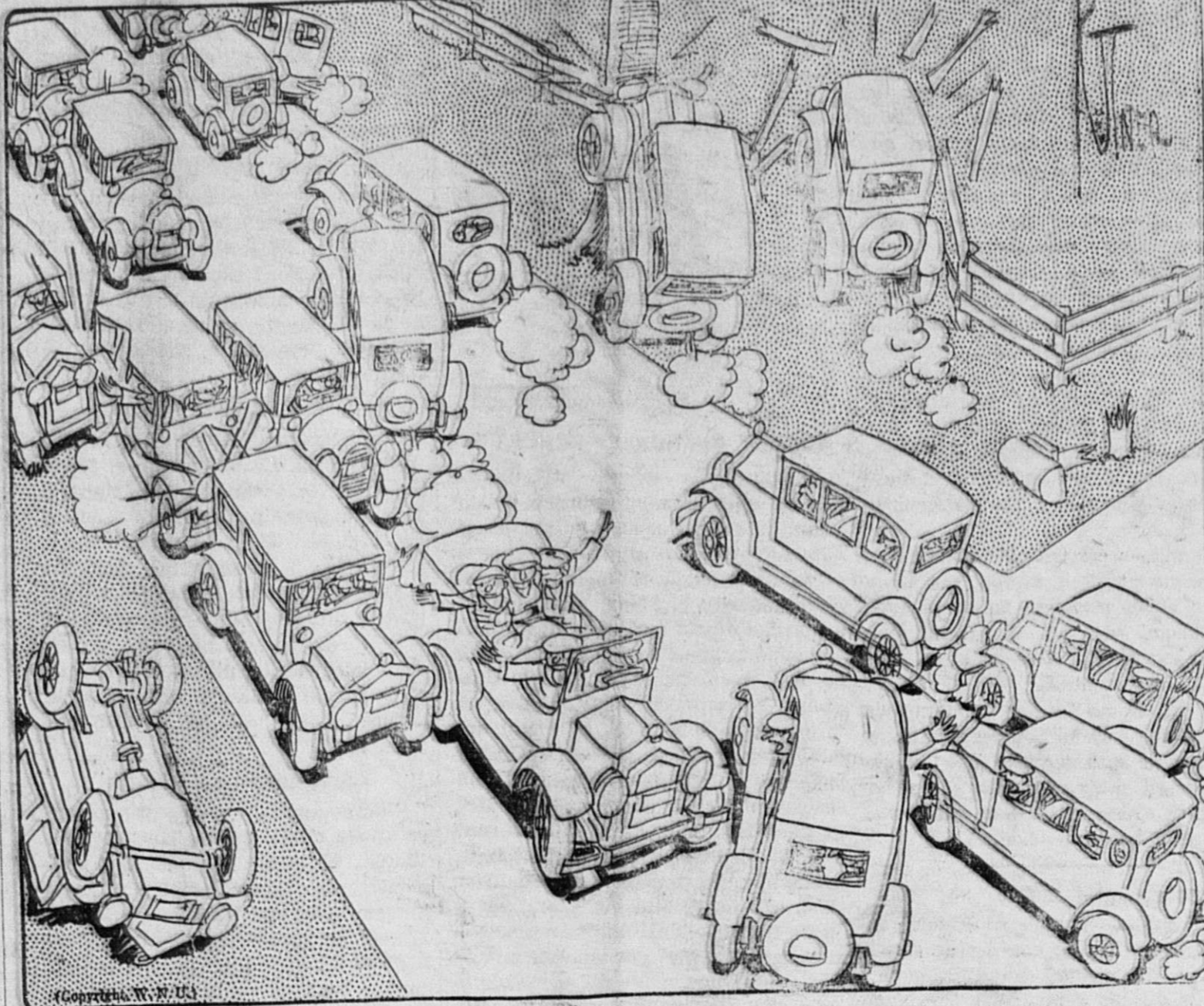

SUPERVISORS MEET IN 3-DAY SESSION

The board of supervisors for the county of Iosco met Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.

Along with the routine work which came before the board, the bids of the several newspaper publishers of the county for publishing the proceedings of the board for the coming year, were considered. The publisher of the Iosco County Gazette was awarded publishing of the proceedings.

The committee in charge of putting in the new heating system in the court house and county jail reported and it was decided by the board that bids should be received on the work and that the committee in charge should push the work forward as rapidly as possible.

A proposal was made by Alcona county that Iosco county care for the indigents of that county in our county infirmary. The proposition was turned down as it would have required extra help at the infirmary.

The principal work of this session was the equalization of the assessments of the several townships and cities of the county. The following are the assessments as equalized by the board:

COMING FOURTH WILL NOT BE SILENT

"The coming Fourth will not be noiseless," states H. J. Keiser of the Red Cross Pharmacy. "At this time it is interesting to note the extent to which fireworks may be used in celebrating Independence day. Last year, Commissioner Harry E. Jackson of the department of public safety took steps to curtail the sale of fireworks and named July 4, 1924, as the last day on which fireworks could be sold and used in Michigan. The last session of the legislature, however, passed an act which allows the sale and use of fireworks, with certain limitations as to size and kind of material from which they are made.

The following is an excerpt from the law regulating the sale of fireworks:

The People of the State of Michigan enact.
Section 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm, copartnership, or corporation, to offer for sale, expose for sale, or sell at retail, or use or explode any fire-crackers over two inches in length by one-half inch in diameter, or any fire-crackers containing dynamite, picric acid or any explosive of like nature, any blank cartridges, blank cartridge pistols, sky rockets of any size, Roman candles containing more than ten

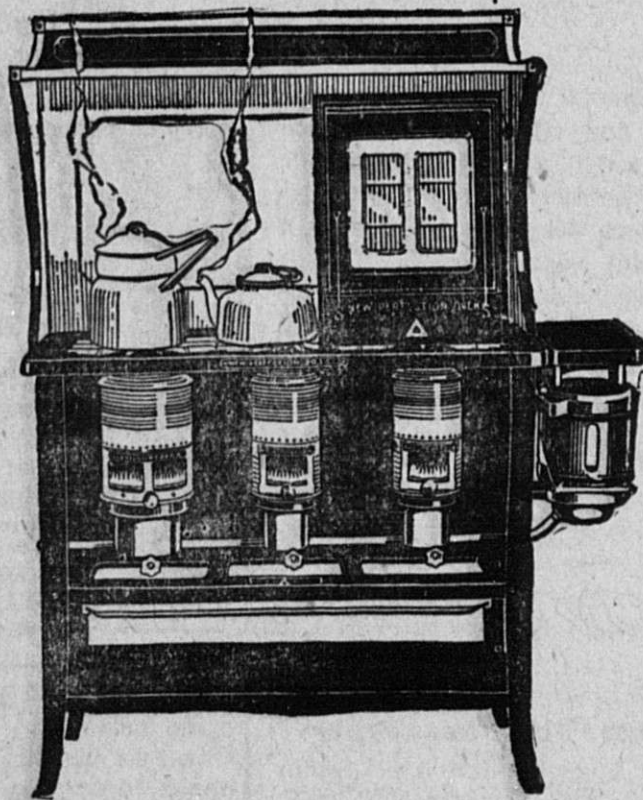
East Tawas Stores Close Afternoon of July 4th

balls, cannons, balloons made of tissue paper or any inflammable material inflated by hot air or otherwise, Daygo bombs, or other fireworks of like construction, or canes made in part of iron and used to fire composition ammunition: Provided, however, that sky rockets and Roman candles containing more than ten balls may be sold for use in any public or private exhibition: Provided, however, that any public exhibition shall be in charge of a competent operator.

Section 2. It shall hereafter be lawful from the twenty-first day of June to the fifth day of July, inclusive, of each year, for any person or persons, firm, copartnership, or corporation, to sell, offer, or expose for sale at retail, such fireworks as are not rendered illegal to sell by section one hereof: Provided, however, that it shall be lawful hereafter for a wholesale resident dealer or jobber to sell at wholesale such fireworks as are not prohibited by section one at any time during each year.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to discharge, set off, ignite, or explode any fireworks in public excepting on the third fourth or fifth days of July of each year, and no fireworks shall at any time be discharged, ignited, or exploded within one block or square of any hospital, asylum or infirmary.

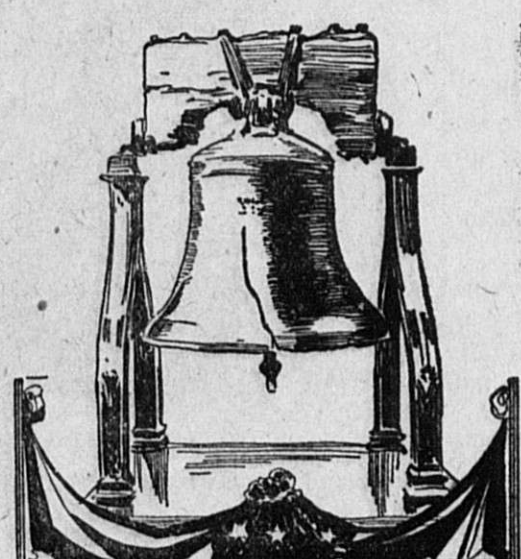
