Tawas won our games over the week end, three of them being ragged games and the fourth a real battle. Saturday morning at Hale, the Midland Cubs gave our boys a real tussle, the game ending in a four to one score. Rahl held the down state boys to three hits and their one run was put over via a passed ball.

In the afternoon the Tawas Association of Detroit fell a victim to their hosts in a five inning game with a score of eleven to seven. The Midland Cubs then attempted to reverse the morning verdict but were so far outclassed that the game was called in the sixth with a score of twelve to three. The only outstanding feature of the game was Moeller's home run through the left field gate with three on. In none of the three games was the regular lineup used.

Sunday afternoon the regular lineup took on Harrisville and Oxel Johnson for the second Sunday in succession missed a shut-out by one unearned run, Tawas winning by a sixteen to one score. Three pitchers were used by the Alcona boys to stop Tawas but were greeted with a rain of hits, nineteen hits for twenty-three bases being garnered by the home boys. Roach and J. Johnson each received four safe ones. Rahl hit in hard luck. In the first and sixth innings his hits over second base were so hard that Ed Killmaster was able to force runners at second. Had no one been on first they would have been safe hits and Otto would have been in the four hit class.

Next Sunday will test the desire of the fans in this vicinity for baseball games that cost money to show. The Schust Company Baseball team of Saginaw, city champions for 1924 will come to Tawas Beach on that date and cross bats with the Tawas team. If the fans turn out well enough to show the local management that they want outside teams here, the practice will be continued. The admission will be fifty cents for adults and twenty-five cents for children.
