## FIRST STREET PAVEMENT NOW OPEN TO TRAFFIC

Wednesday morning the newly paved portion of First street was opened to traffic. The pavement consists of a 20 foot strip from Lake street to the D. & M. station which was the original plan. The paving was then extended to the curb and the long cross walk between the Prescott property and the station by C. H. Prescott & Sons, the D. & M. Railway company and the city. The railway company also constructed a new cement platform in front of the station.

The construction work of the paving was done by the city under the supervision of Street Commissioner B. C. Bowen and undoubtedly a considerable saving was made in this way instead of by contract. About 182 yards of gravel and 240 barrels of cement were used. The cost of the 20 foot pavement was \$648.60.

## MANY WILL VISIT MILITARY CAMP NEXT SUNDAY

The 119th Field Artillery of the Michigan National Guard are departing this year from their usual routine of training at the state military reservation at Grayling, and including in their summer program a cross country march of over 100 miles, lasting nearly one week. The detachment will detrain at Sterling, Mich., August 7 and march to Grayling via Alger, West Branch, St. Helen and Roscommon.

The management of this military organization have several things in mind in the initiation of such a program, but the one thing that will interest our readers most will be the opportunity of seeing a portion of our national army in actual war formation and organization.

It will be made up of 600 or 700 men and as many horses, field guns, ammunition wagons, camping outfits, military band, etc.

During the summer many people visit the military grounds at Grayling. This year they will be given the opportunity of seeing the artillery enroute and camp at West Branch, Sunday, August 9.

## WHITTEMORE SCHOOL BUILDING NEARLY BUILT

About eighteen years ago, Burleigh District No. 2 Frl., built a two story brick building in Whittemore. Today found the building inadequate for the present needs and dangerous beyond repair. Immediately the loyal people of Whittemore voted to demolish the old building and to bond for \$15000. As the old building was dismantled, every piece of material of value was saved to be used in the new building.

The ground for the new building was broken and supplies were being brought to the grounds with all diligence and speed when all operations were suspended by an injunction. The complaint of the injunction was "not sufficient funds" to complete the proposed building. Again the school board called upon the loyal people of Burleigh Dist. No. 2 Frl., and being true blue to their colors, voted \$10,000 more.

The new edifice is composed of one story 53 feet by 83 feet with a full size basement. The outer walls consist of two tier of brick and braced by large steel girders and beams, which will accommodate another story if it ever be needed.

The partitions are of soundproof and fireproof construction, being composed of three tier of brick or tile. The chimneys are also tile and brick.

The first floor consists of four rooms, 25 ft. by 30 ft. with an 18 ft. hallway running entirely through the building. At each end of the hall are elevated library or recitation rooms over the stairway of the main entrances. The class rooms are lighted by a bank of windows on one side. Either east or west light accomodates every room.

The basement, which extends only three feet into the ground, has three available rooms for school. Each room is 25ft. by 30 ft. These rooms are to be finished with lath plaster and flooring also exceptionally well lighted. The furnace room, pumping room, fuel room and toilets are also located in the basement. Separate stairways lead to each toilet room, which will be furnished with flush toilets and lavatories supplied with hot and cold water.

Fred T. Luedtke of Tawas City has contracted to supply the heating plant. A pressure water system and an electric lighting system. Mr. Luedtke praises the manner and method in which the school is being erected.

S. Barns of Whittemore will do the finishing and interior decorating. The construction of this splendid building is under full control of the school board. Chas. McKenzie, the superintending architect, manages the erection of the building.

Mr. McKenzie, a former resident of Whittemore, has been in the building business for the past 30 years. The most of his building has been in the city of Detroit. During the period of his clerical work Mr. McKenzie spent his spare time in architectural designing. At this time most of his drawings were for churches, which now dot the country throughout eastern Michigan. Although Mr. McKenzie has had several offers from Detroit he intends to keep on with the designing and building of schools. The State Department of Public Instruction realizes the wonderful ability of Mr. McKenzie and promises to keep him busy.

Through the influence of Mr. McKenzie, the school board purchased and American Woodworker, which utilizes practically all the material of the old building. Also a two ton derrick and cement mixer that have saved considerable labor and will be sold at the completion of the building. Only about \$5,000 of the estimated \$13,000 for labor has thus far been spent.

A crew of about twenty men are working hard to complete the building in time for school.

As the building mounts into the air and the roof begins to adorn its golden walls, the hope and distant dream of the people of Whittemore nears fulfillment and they who have been among the least will soon be among the leaders in education in Isoco county.
