MUST DISPLAY NEW LICENSE PLATES JAN. 1

The local branch office is now open for the sale of 1926 auto license. Several important changes have been made in their sale and use. County Treasurer W. H. Price says:

"Auto licenses for 1926 are now on sale at the county treasurer's office and the secretary of state has issued a statement that no time will be given for the purchase of plates after January 1, as plenty of time is being given for every one to get their licenses.

"Applicants should have all papers made out before they apply for license. The branch office has no time to make out applications and has instructions not to make them out. Blanks can be had at any garage.

"There are two kinds of plates this year, one for passenger cars and one for commercial cars. Commercial cars include all trucks and cars used to carry passengers for hire. This slows down the work of the treasurer's office as a separate set of stamps and blanks must be used for each so do not wait until the last day or you may have to wait longer.

"Weigh bills must be attached for all commercial cars."

TROLLING FROM MOTOR BOATS PROHIBITED

An order prohibiting the trolling for fish from motor boats on the inland lakes of Michigan was issued by the Department of Conservation this week. This order covers a period of five years and goes into effect January 1, 1926.

The following is the text of the order sent out by John Baird, director of the Department of Conservation.

"The Director of Conservation having made a thorough investigation of conditions relative to fishing in the inland lakes of the state, recommends that trolling from motor boats be prohibited.

Therefore, the Conservation Commission by authority of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925, hereby orders that for a period of five years from the 1st day of January, 1926, it shall be unlawful for any person to troll for any kind of fish in the inland lakes of the state, from a boat propelled by gas, naphtha, or any other motive power, excepting sail, under penalties provided by Section 5 of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925.

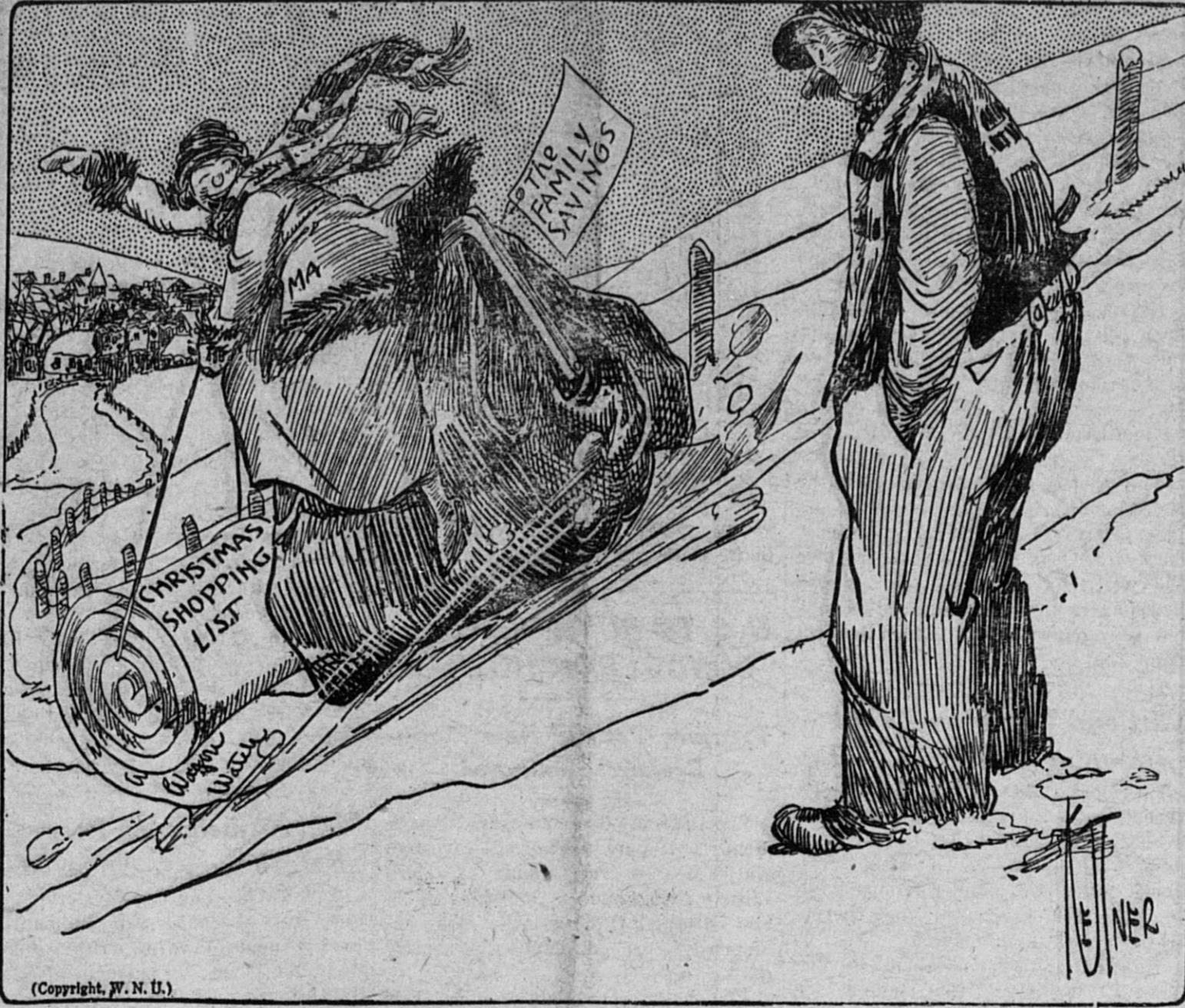

MUST PAY 1926 DOG TAX BEFORE JANUARY 10th

A new dog law was passed by the last legislature which provides that if the 1926 dog tax is paid before January 10 the tax is \$2.00 on a male and \$4.00 on a female dog. If, however, the tax is not paid by January 10, a penalty of \$2.00 is added making the tax \$4.00 for male and \$6.00 for female dogs. The county treasurer has had notices posted through the county explaining the law so that dog owners may avoid paying the penalty.

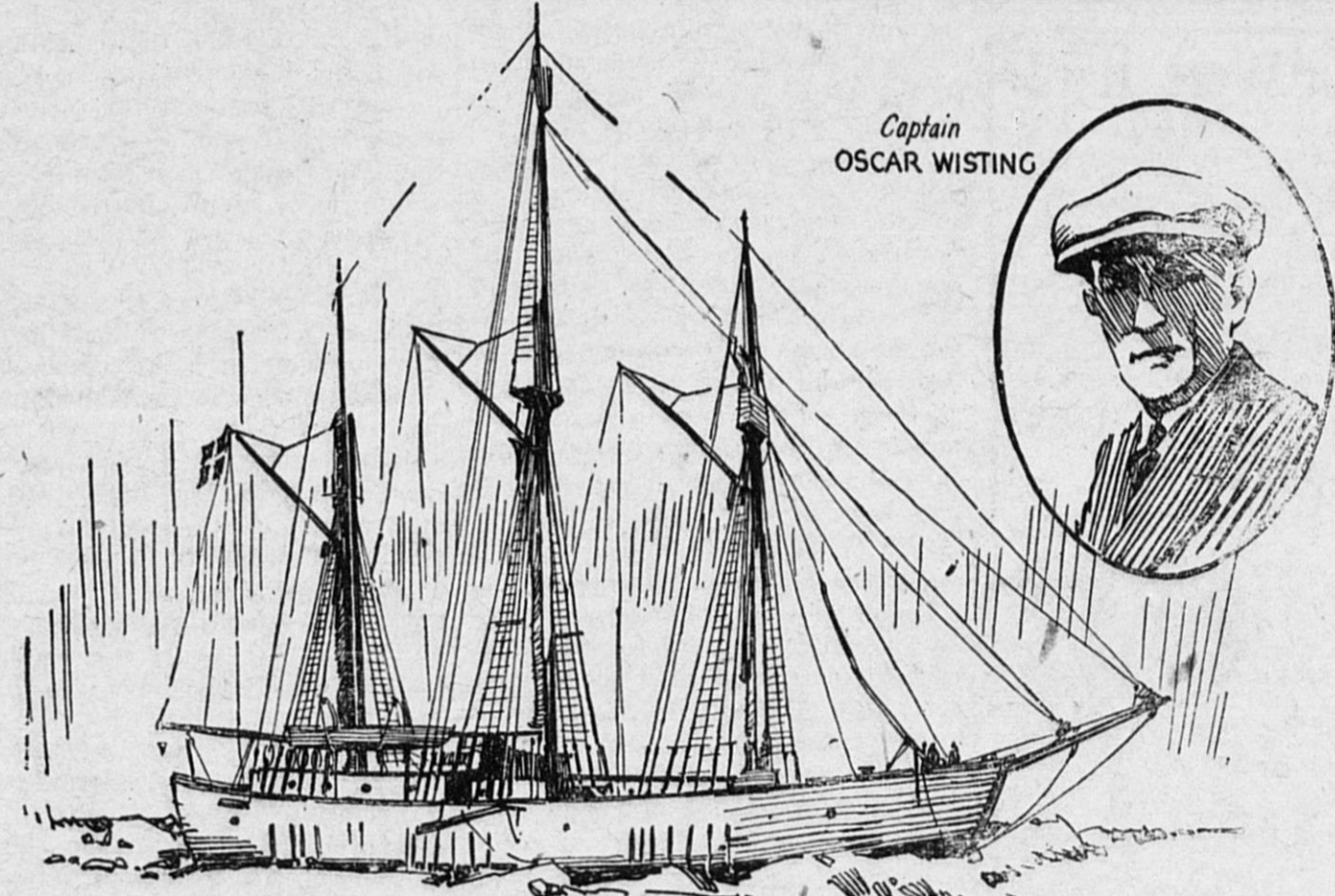
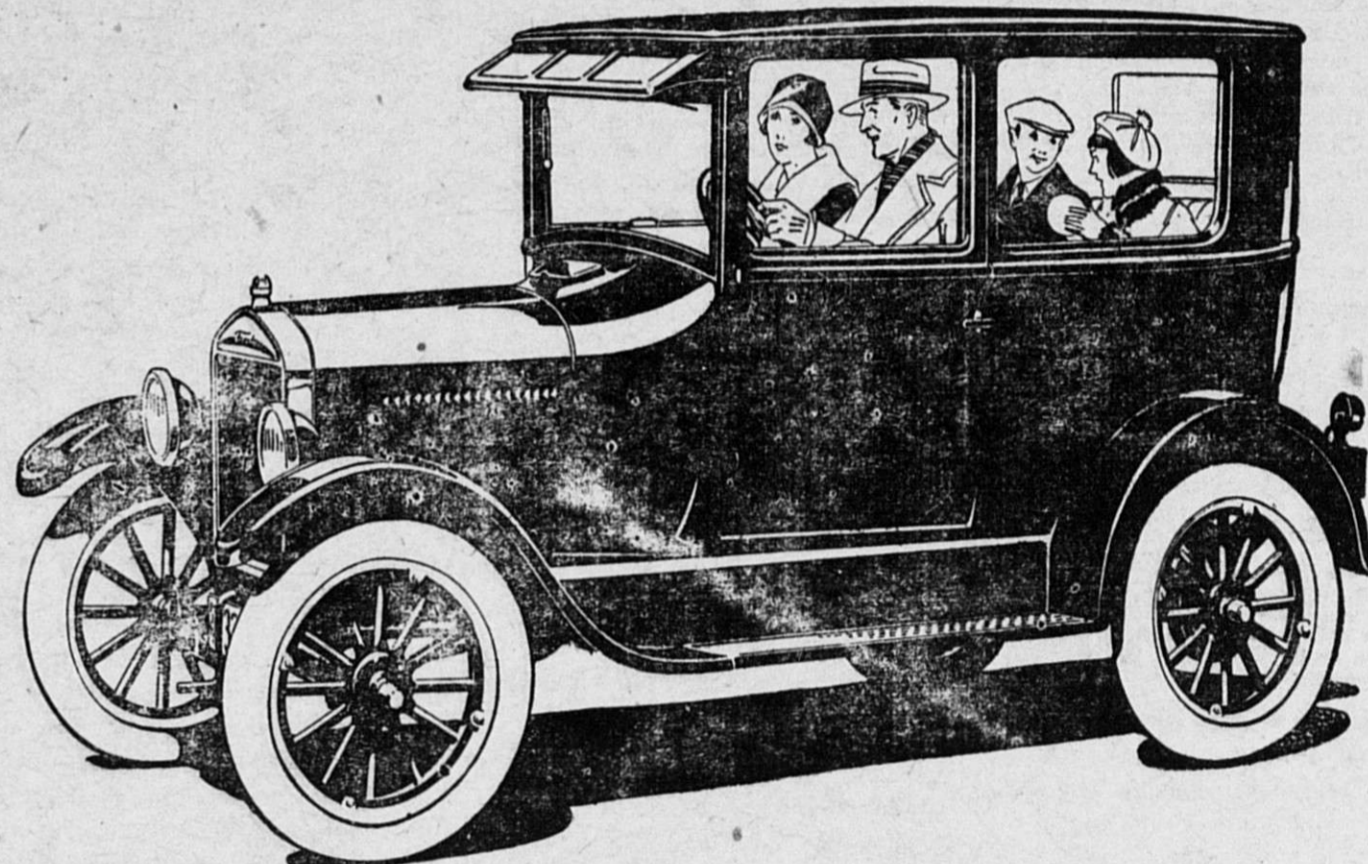

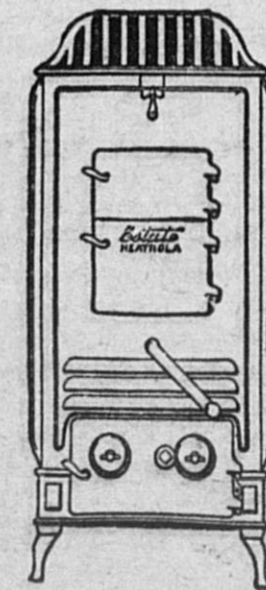
