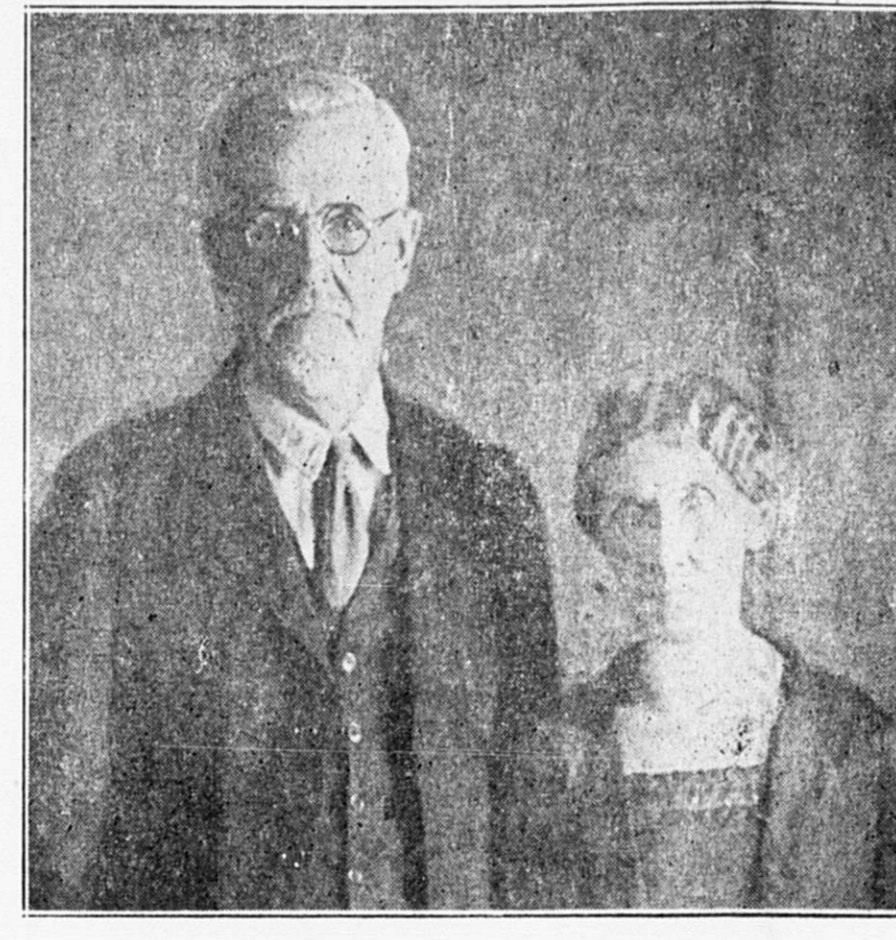

Julius Bucholz, Sr., died at his home in this city, Tuesday morning, February 21, after an illness of five weeks. Death was due to pneumonia.

Julius Bucholz was born November 3, 1857, in Germany and was 71 years, three months and 20 days old at the time of death. He came to this country at the age of 25 years and since that time has resided in this city. His first 20 years were spent as an engineer in the mills of C. H. Prescott & Sons. Following the fire which destroyed the mills, he spent a few years at Caro and Grayling, installing machinery. Since that time he has been employed at the United States Gypsum company plant at Alabaster.

He was united in marriage in 1884 to Miss Augusta Broskie. To this union eleven children were born, two died in infancy and one son, Dan, at the age of 20 years.

## NEW CODE REVISES MANY SCHOOL LAWS

The new School Code contains a revision of many of the school laws, each revision being accompanied by a repealing clause repealing the old law. In the case of the Teachers' Retirement Fund Law the revision of the law was left out of the Code and the repealing clause left in. This clerical error inadvertently and unintentionally seems to repeal the Retirement Fund Law but there is grave question as to the constitutionality of this repeal inasmuch as no machinery is set up by the repeal for administering the present Retirement Funds. It is the intention of the Retirement Fund Board to try the matter in the courts at the very earliest possible moment and attorneys are being engaged for that purpose.

In the meantime school boards must use their own judgment as to their action in regard to their contributions to the Retirement Fund. If the repeal is held invalid by the Supreme Court their contributions will be due and collectable and the Retirement Fund Board suggests to both teachers and school boards that these funds be collected and held in trust by the school boards until Supreme Court action on the repeal is obtained. 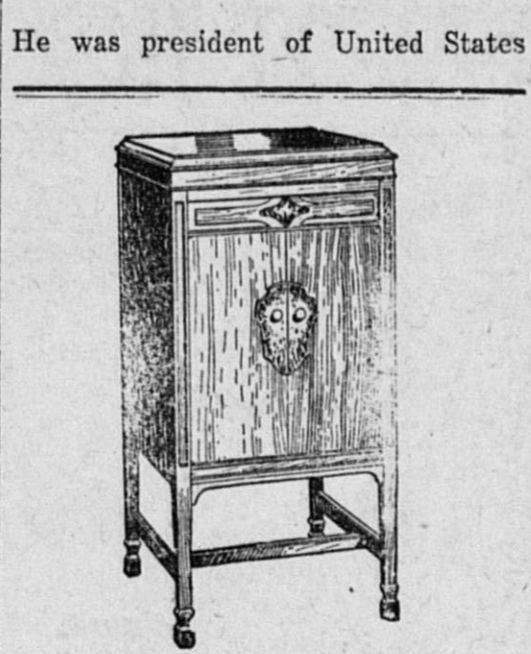
