All of the above chicks were of equal health, weight and number when three days old. The group at the left was put under plain glass. The group at the right was under Flex-O-Glass, as you see above, and all were fed and cared for the same. These photos were taken when the chicks were eight weeks old, and all but three chicks had died under plain glass. It had actually killed them. The chicks un-
