Moved by Colvin, supported by Putnam, that McAuliff be given a seat on the Board and to act on all committees on which Mr. Richards was appointed. Motion prevailed and Mr. McAuliff took a seat on the Board.
The first order of business was the election of temporary chairman. Moved by Schroeder, supported by Putnam, that Supervisor Butler be elected temporary chairman. Motion prevailed and Mr. Butler took the chair. The Board then proceeded to the election of a permanent chairman.

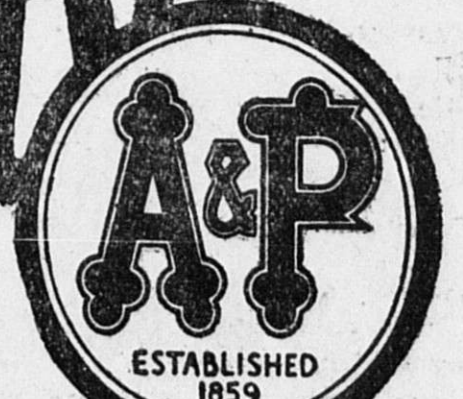

Clerk read a communication from Clare county Board of Supervisors in regard to opening roads to inland lakes. Moved by Schroeder, supported by Putnam, that the communication be referred to committee on roads and bridges and for them to report at this session of the Board. Motion prevailed.

Moved by Putnam, supported by Brown, that the proposition of bringing in cattle into this county that have not been tested, be referred to the Judiciary committee for consideration and to report at this meeting. Motion prevailed.

The several committees ordered to their respective duties, balance of Board to be at ease, subject to call of chair.

Board called to order at 4:00 o'clock.

Tawas City, Mich. April 23, 1928

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Iosco County:

Whereas, the land surrounding many of the inland lakes of Michigan has been purchased by corporations or individuals for the purpose of forming private outing,

fishing or hunting clubs to the exclusion of the general public.

And whereas, most of these lakes are meandered waters having inlets and outlets which make them public waters and entitle the residents of the state to fishing privileges, it is a fact that because there is no open and established highway leading to the shore of the lake and in many instances the outlet or inlet is not navigable for the ordinary boat, the public cannot enjoy these privileges to which they are entitled unless they unlawfully trespass upon private property.

Therefore be it resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Iosco county, in regular session, that this board goes on record requesting the state legislature to vest such authority and power in the Board of Supervisors or Board of County Road Commissioners of the respective counties of this state, to open and lay out as public highway all section lines leading to and from the meandered lakes of this state, thereby affording the public ingress and egress to the inland waters of the state.

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to Governor, to State Highway Commissioner and member of the state legislature and state senator from this district.

Whereas, the county of Iosco has had one complete test made for bovine tuberculosis and the percentage of the infection of the county has been found to be 1.52%, thereby making it necessary that a second test be made of the infected herds and also a complete retest of the townships in which the percentage was more than 1%.

And whereas previous to the time when Iosco county applied for the Bovoid Tuberculin test a representative of the department of agriculture appeared before the Board of Supervisors and stated if the county had a population of 9000 cattle the cost of the first test and a second retest would be approximately \$2500.00 or \$3000.00 at the greatest and that this money would only go to pay for the expenses of the men employed by the state to do testing.

And whereas, the Board of Supervisors has appropriated \$2500.00 for the purpose of testing the county for bovine tuberculosis and the first test has been made and the amount practically used.

And whereas, the Department of Agriculture has asked the county to appropriate an additional \$1500.00 to \$2000.00 to complete the second test.
