COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES HELD LAST THURSDAY

The annual Commencement of the Tawas City high school was held at the State Theatre Thursday evening, June 14th.

The stage was prettily decorated with lilacs and ferns, and the motto, "Not for School but for Life We Learn," was attractively set.

The class march was composed of seniors, faculty, Reverends Sommerfeld and Metcalf, J. A. Myles, and Professor H. C. Lott.

Following the march, invocation was delivered by Rev. M. A. Sommerfeld, who opened the program in a most fitting manner.

Mrs. Leon M. Abbey, sister of a senior (Louis Braddock), rendered a vocal solo, "Enchanted River," words and music of which were in keeping with the occasion. This number was much enjoyed.

The Salutatory was given by Pearl E. Brown, with a hearty welcome to all on behalf of the senior class.

Miss Clara J. Zollweg made a pleasing prophecy for the members of her class and teachers. The future proved indeed interesting as well as entertaining.

The high school quartette sang a selection entitled "Welcome Sweet Springtime," words of which were appropriate to the season.

The Valedictorian, Arthur A. Bigelow, gave an earnest farewell in a very effective manner.

Mrs. Abbey rendered a second solo, "Romaika," appreciation of which was shown in the rounds of applause. Mrs. Abbey's pleasing interpretations won for her hearty approval.

Supt. Giddings, with a few remarks, introduced the speaker, H. C. Lott, A. M., M. Ed., of the Michigan State Normal College, who had for his subject, "Machines and Brains." The theme of the address, as the title indicates, was the possibilities of the human brain.

He gave the class some sound advice in regard to life, reminding them that an education is not secured through books alone, but that it is a continual process coming through contact in the social life as well. He brought forth the idea that an individual is never educated, as the past tense would indicate that there is nothing more to learn. Professor Lott speaks from the broad experience of years of public school, college, and institute work. As a result, his addresses always furnish much food for thought.

Following the address, the audience was delighted in listening to the Tawas City M. E. quartette.

On behalf of the Board of Education, J. A. Myles with well-chosen words presented to the Tawas City Seniors of 1928 their diplomas of graduation.
