JURY BRINGS IN VERDICT OF NOT GUILTY

A verdict of not guilty was brought in by the jury after one hour in the jury room, in the criminal case against Edward Fletcher, charged with manslaughter, which came before Circuit Judge Herman Dehnke in a two day session of court held Monday and Tuesday of this week.

The criminal charges were brought against Fletcher after an investigation by the Department of Public Safety following a fight between Fletcher and John Smith on April 20th in which the latter was fatally wounded when he accidentally fell on an open knife which was in Fletcher's pocket. Fletcher and Smith were employed by the Oscoda Fish company and were at the fish house when the fight and accident occurred.

At the inquest held before Coroner Louis N. Gagnier on the day of the accident, the jury brought in a verdict of accidental death. An investigation was then made by the Department of Public Safety.

DETROIT BOYS WERE ALL RIGHT BUT IN JAIL

"We are all right, dad, but in jail," was the reassuring telephone message received Monday noon from Sheriff Chas. W. Curry's office by a much worried Detroit father, Guy Haslip.

Mr. Haslip's son, Joseph, and his cousin, Robert Haslip, ages 14 and 16, disappeared Sunday and when no trace of them was found by the police by Monday morning, the parents became very much distracted. They could not eat or sleep. After receiving the message the relieved parents immediately drove to Tawas City, paid the damage charges which had been made against the boys, and had them released.

Mr. Haslip is a garage owner in Detroit. Sunday, Joseph took a second hand car and without the parents' knowledge, the two boys started for Hawks to visit relatives. At about six o'clock Monday morning when near Whittemore the boys fell asleep and the car crashed into a Buick owned by S. P. Nicholas of M'and. They were brought before Justice W. C. Davidson.

ORVILLE YOUNGS IS SERIOUSLY INJURED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Orville Youngs, 16 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edw. Youngs of Tawas township, sustained a fractured skull and other injuries last Saturday evening, when the car which he was driving hit and broke down a telephone pole near the D. & M. railroad shops. The boy was following two other cars and attempted to pass them. At the same time the car ahead turned out to pass the leading car. Youngs swung his car back to avoid a collision and crashed into the telephone pole, breaking it off near the ground. A water hydrant was also broken off. In the crash the side of the boy's head hit a wing bolt which held the windshield, fracturing the skull, and he broke through the windshield.

Although very seriously injured, the boy did not lose consciousness. He was taken to Dr. J. W. Weed's office for first aid and then taken to the hospital at Bay City. Favorable reports have been received this week and it is thought he will rapidly recover.

Sunday afternoon, near the same place and under similar conditions, Howard Hutton hit a telephone pole with his car, but with less serious results. His car was badly damaged but he, luckily, was uninjured.
