

DOGS GIVEN TO SHERIFF 900 Complying with the present dog law, lists have just been completed by the county treasurer of all delinquent dog licenses in the county and copies given to the sheriff, proment of agriculture.

There were 681 dogs listed by the supervisors and 91 paid licenses that were not listed, making a total of 772 dogs in the county, of which there is a record. 550 licenses have been paid, leaving 222 that are not paid.

The present law provides that on licenses paid before March 1 the fee is \$2.00 for male and unsexed dogs and \$4.00 for female dogs over four months old. After March 1, the fee is \$4.00 and \$6.00. Dogs July 1 pay one-half year's license.
