Tawas City was defeated by East Tawas last Sunday at the beach diamond by a score of 9 to 6. Both teams played good ball throughout the game. It was the first game this season in which Tawas City received no errors.

In the first half of the first inning Tawas City went down in order, and East Tawas finished the inning with four runs. Tawas City came back in the first half of the second inning with four runs, but in the last half of the inning East Tawas secured a lead of three runs. Neither team scored in the third, but in the fourth East Tawas scored twice and Tawas City once. Tawas City again scored one run in the ninth.

TONY ACHARD IN RACE FOR STATE SENATE

Although late in starting, friends of Tony Achard, of Clare, are pressing a vigorous campaign in all of the 10 counties of the 28th District for his nomination for State Senator at the September 4th primaries.

They are asking support for him on the grounds that the present incumbent of office, Horatio S. Karcher of Rose City, who is running again, has had the office for three terms and that a change would be a courtesy to another part of the District and also lend new vigor to the representation at Lansing.

Achard is known state wide as a Conservationist, and his friends declare his natural sympathy with the activities of that Department will offset to a considerable extent the fact that the District no longer has a member on the State Conservation Commission. A few years ago it had one, as was logical, inasmuch as its area is largely inclusive of the so-called "playground" of our State.

For many years Achard has been a member of the Clare City Republican Committee, and Chairman of its County Republican Committee. He is a member of the 10th Congressional District Republican Committee and a member of the Republican State Central Committee. At the Republican National Convention at Kansas City in June he was a leader in the movement to bring about the re-election of James E. Davidson, of Bay City, as National Republican Committeeman from Michigan.

Trudell Fishery Plant Destroyed by Lightning

Lightning destroyed the Trudell Fishery plant during the heavy storm yesterday afternoon. A total loss was sustained in the equipment, nets, and supplies which were in the building. The building was completely destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$22,000.00.

The lightning entered the front end of the building and hit an electric motor. The building was instantly filled with flames and smoke. Louis Trudell, who was near the pier, saw the flames and ran into the building to the office at the rear, where he called the fire department. His way back to the entrance was blocked with flames and he was forced to jump through a side door into the bay. Joseph Trudell, working in the building at the time, was forced out of the building by the flames.

In fighting the fire, the fire department was handicapped with a disabled engine. The American-Lafayette Co., makers, had been notified several weeks ago to send a service man here, but they neglected to do so.

PETER GRISE SUDDENLY DIES

Peter Grise, highly esteemed resident of this city, suddenly passed away at about three o'clock last Friday morning. Acute indigestion was the cause of death.

Peter Grise was born July 25, 1866, in Canada. The Grise family came to Tawas City in 1868 and were among the early pioneer families of the city. Until the end of the lumbering period here, the deceased was a cooper by trade. Later he became a machinist. For a number of years he was an employe of the late Henry Kane in the Ford garage. During the past two years he has operated a machine shop and garage of his own.

Mr. Grise was unmarried. He is survived by one sister, Miss Elizabeth Grise of this city, six brothers, Philip Grise of Chicago, Wilfred Grise of Detroit, Eli Grise of Minneapolis, Edward Grise of East Tawas and Adolph and Charles of Detroit. The funeral services were held Monday morning from St. Joseph's church. Rev. Fr. E. A. Brogger officiated.

STATE WILL REVIEW HURON SHORE ROAD

We have been reliably informed that Frank F. Rogers, state highway commissioner, and G. C. Dillman, deputy commissioner, will be in this city August 16th for the purpose of reviewing the proposed Huron Shore road route with the road commissioners of Arenac, Iosco, Alcona and Alpena counties.

While here the state highway commissioner will inspect the bridge at the mouth of the river with the idea in view of having a new bridge built. They have also assured Mayor Edward Trudell and the council that the light truss bridge for pedestrian traffic will be completed at the Matthew Street bridge before school starts in September.

COUNTY TO AID IN KEYSTONE ROAD CONSTRUCTION

At a meeting of the Board of County Road commissioners held here Saturday, it was decided to co-operate with the township of Burleigh in the construction of the Keystone road. Fifty per cent of the grading will be done by the township. This road will consist of one and one-fourth miles of gravel construction and will be completed this fall.

A new Chevrolet gravel truck was purchased by the commissioners at this meeting.

The board will inspect next Saturday the improvements made and the proposed improvements to the Old State road in Reno township. One mile of this road has been completed. The contemplated improvements will extend to the county line. Ogemaw county has included in its road program an extension of this work to M-55. Webber Bros., ranch owners, are giving \$1000.00 toward the work in Iosco county.

The Kokosing hotel road is being completed.

The grade for the gravel road east of Hale has been completed. Graveling will be completed at once.

HOTEL IOSCO NOW BEING REMODELED

Work began this week on an extensive remodeling of the Hotel Iosco, recently purchased by E. J. Martin. The plans include a large new dining room, new lobby, and additional rooms. The new dining room will be facing the street. The hotel will be redecored inside and out this season. Rudolph and Arthur Stark have the contract for remodeling the building. MRS. MATTHEWS, SUPERVISOR AT AUSABLE, DIES

Mrs. Anna Mathews, of AuSable, died last Friday at Mercy hospital, Bay City. Mrs. Matthews had been a member of the board of supervisors for several years. She was the first and only woman to serve on the board in that capacity in this county.

Mrs. Matthews had been in ill health for some time. She was operated on for a cancerous growth about a month previous, and was apparently regaining her health but she became ill again and was again taken to the hospital, where she died at midnight Friday.

The deceased was born at Port Hope in 1870 and came to AuSable when she was a child. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Herbert Hardy of Midland and Mrs. Clyde Roberts of Oscoda, and two sons, Edward Matthews of AuSable and Milton Matthews of Oscoda.

Mrs. Matthews was an able business woman and had been bookkeeper and purchasing agent for Betz & Lockhart, commercial fishermen at AuSable, for the past 21 years. She took an active interest in the affairs of the community and will be greatly missed.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon. Rev. Fr. H. E. Delehanty of Harrisville officiated. Many from here, including Mr. and Mrs. J. B. King, Mrs. David Laing, Mrs. R. M. Baguley and the various county officials, attended the funeral.

DETROIT PLAYERS FROM BONSTELLE PLAYHOUSE COMING TO EAST TAWAS

The Detroit Players are members of the Bonstelle Playhouse Company, a resident stock company that has been producing plays in Detroit for over twenty years. The reputation of the Playhouse for fine, clean plays is well known throughout the country.

The Detroit Players intend to present three worthwhile plays under canvas in about 18 towns and cities of northern Michigan and the "Thumb." This summer they have chosen three of the most popular of the plays presented at the Playhouse last winter.

"The Wasp's Nest" is a modern comedy mystery melodrama. The scene is laid in an old deserted southern mansion on Halloween night. There are train robbers, bandits, strange noises and lights, a mysterious woman in gray, spooks, and an unusually interesting and reasonable plot. It was written by Adelaide Matthews and Martha Stanford, authors of many stage successes including "Just Married," "Scrambled Wives," "Nightly Night," etc.

"The Best People" is a society drama by David Gray and the late Avery Hopwood. This play proved so successful at the Playhouse that it was continued for two weeks longer than the usual run, and the following year was revived for two weeks. It deals with the problems of the younger generation of the successful blending of some of the funniest situations and the finest emotional drama ever seen on the stage.

The equipment is by far the most elaborate of all the Michigan tent shows. It consists of a large show tent made by the J. C. Goss Co. of Detroit. Instead of the usual canvas benches and creak "benches" there is 300 comfortable wooden chairs, 300 on a raised grandstand and the rest on a heavy waterproof groundcloth.

Complete electrical equipment is carried, including three gasoline-driven generators, footlights, border lights, spots, etc. The mechanical equipment also includes a centrifugal water pump, air compressors, water tanks, and two power switches. This equipment is carried on eight trucks and seven trailers ranging from a small high-speed two-ton Federal to a ten-ton forty foot Republic heavy duty.

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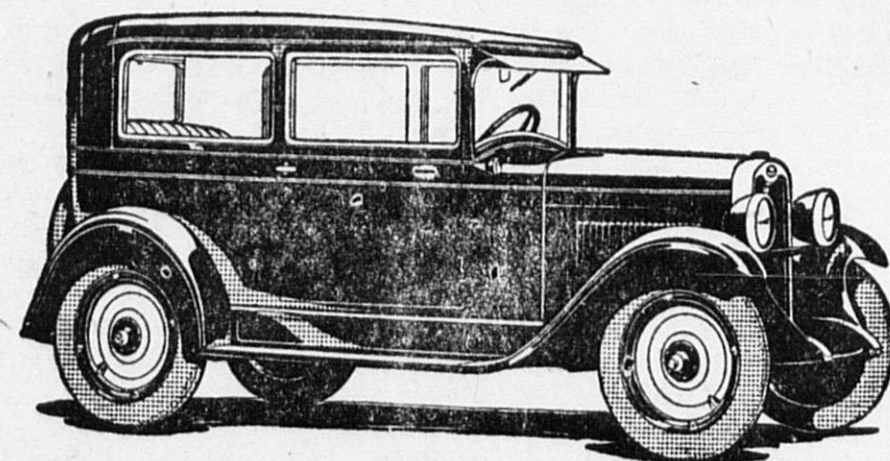
