NOT NECESSITY VOTES DRAIN COMMISSION

Tawas Drain Turned Down In 5 to 4 Vote by Special Commissioners

The special commissioners appointed by the probate judges of Arenac, Iosco and Ogemaw counties voted that the proposed Tawas drain would be inadequate and was not a necessity. The meeting was held Saturday at the Community hall at Tupper. Under the law no further action can be taken on this drain for one year.

The commissioners who were appointed to determine the necessity of the project were: Ogemaw county—W. A. Crandell, West Branch, Supervisor Gibbs, Mills township, Supervisor Hodgins, Churchill township; Arenac county—Archie Knight Sterling, Jay Selleck, Lincoln township, David Mudge, Arenac township; Iosco county—John Myles, Tawas City, A. R. Weir, Oscoda, John Sullivan, East Tawas.

The proposed Tawas drain would have commenced at the D. & M. railroad bridge where the road crosses the AuGres river and runs 11 miles in a south and east direction to Saginaw Bay. It was proposed to divert the water from the west branch of the AuGres river which it is thought would prevent flood conditions farther down the stream.

The objections by people living in the vicinity of the proposed project were that the location was impractical, that the diverting of the water would greatly menace stock raising along the lower west branch and that the project was not a necessity inasmuch as it would not give adequate relief.

It was estimated that the total cost would amount to \$220,000.00. It was talked by many in attendance that a drain constructed east and west near the line between the Iosco and Arenac counties would be more practical and give more relief. It is understood that such a project will be proposed in the near future.

The teams were very well matched, both at bat and in the field. Although the East Tawas nine had a slightly better fielding record than Alabaster, the White City boys were able to secure two hits more than the East Tawas team. Home runs by C. Tate and Case were the feature hits of the game. H. Lixey and M. Lixey also secured long drives, both triples.

S. Urban started in the box for Alabaster, but was relieved in the first inning by C. Tate. From then on, Tate and M. Lixey fought a brilliant pitchers' duel. During the 12 innings, Lixey retired 15 men via the strike-out route. In the 11th innings Tate was in the box he retired eight men by the same route.

The play-off of this game will take place next Sunday at the Tawas Beach diamond. The teams are planning on having the same batteries they had last Sunday, which assures the fans of another interesting and exciting game.

3-MAN BATTLE IS WAGED IN TRI-COUNTIES

Holbeck, Klump and Little Contest For State Job at Primary Polls

One of the most hotly contested primary election campaigns, that has been staged in recent years in Iosco county is the three man race for the Republican nomination for State Representative from the Iosco, Arenac, Ogemaw district. The contestants are, Dr. Chas. F. Klump of East Tawas, Fred C. Holbeck of Long Lake and Lloyd Little of Sand Lake. Each aims to succeed Representative Douglas Black of Arenac, who is not a candidate. Mr. Black was taken to the hospital in Ann Arbor on Monday of this week, said to be critically ill.

Each of the three candidates is bending every effort to put his candidacy in a favorable light before the voters of the three counties. One of the surprise developments of the past week is the manner in which Dr. Klump has come from behind at the half post and drawn up smartly among the other two candidates. There are those who predict that this means a snappy "stretch drive" to the wire, one that may bring the grandstand crowd to its feet.

In roadside advertising and the beating of tom-toms some have claimed that the Sand Lake man was more active. Friends of Holbeck have argued that this was being offset by the personal influence of their man. This week publicity for Klump has begun to appear everywhere. The dentist candidate is reported to have been busy "seeing the folks" even in remote parts of the three counties.

Anyway, the contest has reached a stage where admittedly it is anything but a one-man affair. With ten days and eleven nights yet to go, it's common talk that there's no telling what results may be until the ballot counting ends.

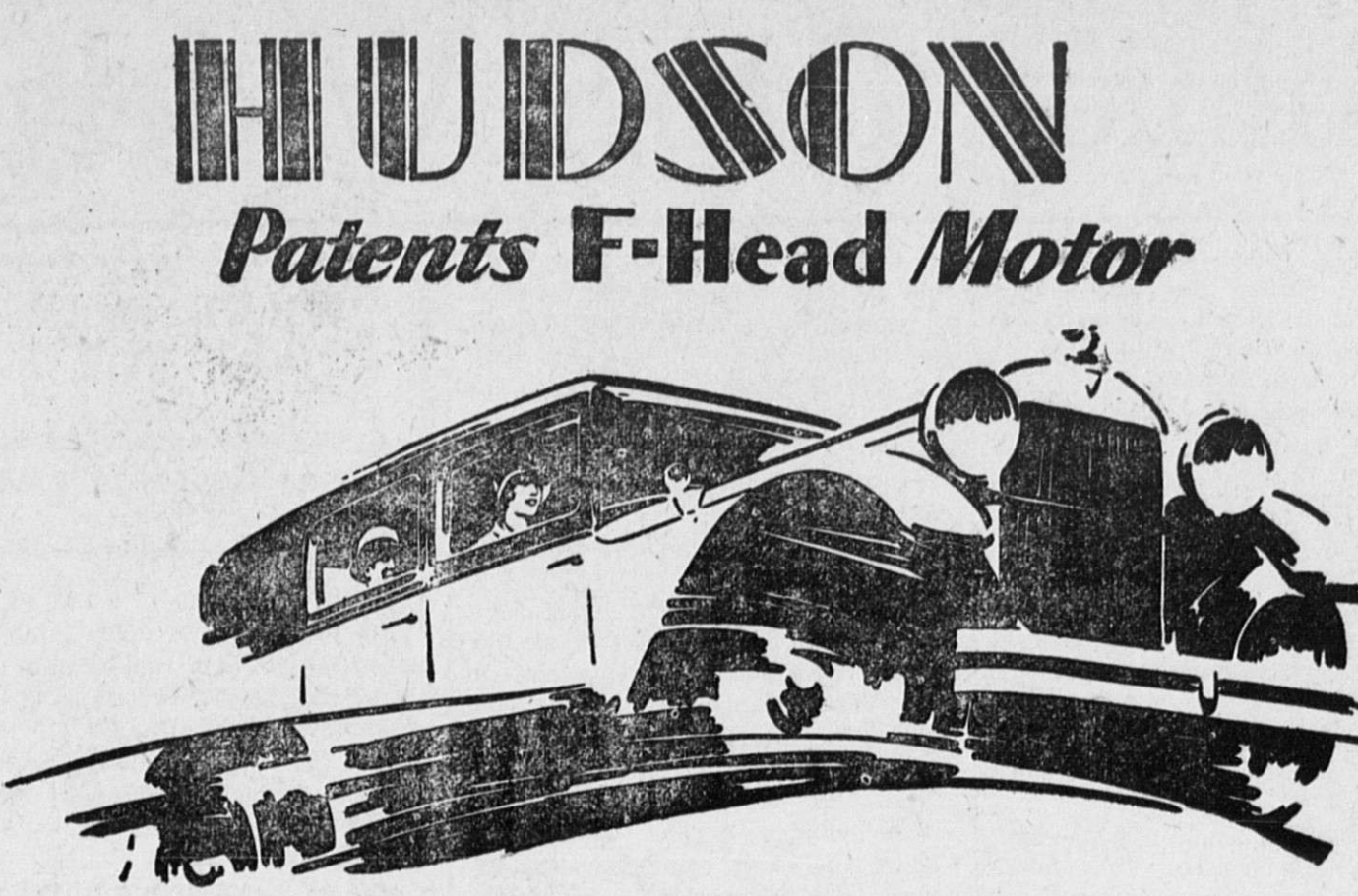



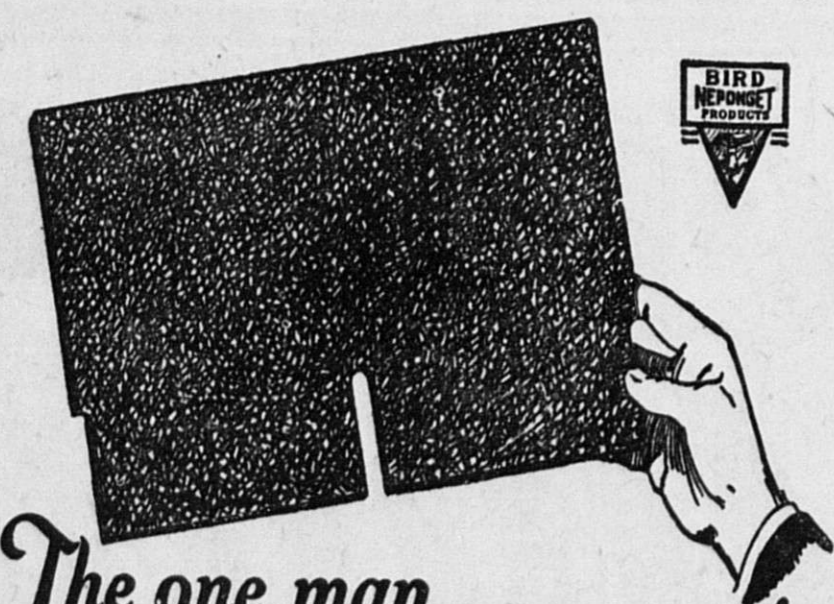
