EAST TAWAS TEAM WINS CHAMPIONSHIP

One of the largest gatherings of fans ever had at the Tawas Beach diamond saw East Tawas take the league championship last Sunday by defeating the Alabaster nine in a twelve inning game by a score of 3 to 2. The game was the play-off of another twelve inning contest played the Sunday preceding, which resulted in an 8 to 8 tie and was called on account of darkness.

The Alabaster boys were the first to score, in the fifth inning when J. Tate was safe on first when the catcher threw wild to first after dropping Tate's third strike. Benson forced Tate at second. Curtis singled. Curtis and Benson advanced a base on a wild pitch. E. Killmaster bunted, scoring Benson, and stole second. H. Killmaster bunted and Curtis was out at the plate.

E. Killmaster scored while H. Killmaster was being caught stealing second. The score stood 2 to 0 in Alabaster's favor until the ninth inning, when the East Tawas boys staged a rally as a final effort. J. Mueller struck out. Dillon singled and stole second. Cunningham popped to the catcher. S. Noel doubled to right, scoring Dillon. H. Lixey singled, scoring Noel, and took second on a wild throw to first. Case grounded to first. The score then stood 2 all until the last of the twelfth inning, when H. Lixey singled. Case sacrificed. J. Noel was safe on Benson's error, and Spring grounded to Bell, who threw wild to first, scoring Lixey. To clinch the game for East Tawas.

With the exception of two bad innings for Alabaster and one for East Tawas, both teams played an exceptionally good game. Monroe's catch of Case's long drive to right-center was the feature catch of the game.

For the second time in two weeks C. Tate and M. Lixey fought a pitchers' battle that lasted 12 innings. Tate was in fine form and pitched a very steady game, allowing but eight hits and striking out seven men. M. Lixey, youthful southpaw pitcher who was the outstanding figure in Alabaster's championship series with Alpena and Gladwin last year, struck out 19 batters and allowed but five hits.

This game marked the close of a very successful season for East Tawas. Alabaster and East Tawas had staged a close race throughout the whole year.

Next Sunday, September 2, Tawas City will play an exhibition game with the Griswold First State Bank team of Detroit. On Labor Day, September 3, East Tawas will play this team at East Tawas. The Griswold bank team has the reputation of being one of the best teams in the bank league in Detroit. Fans are assured of fast games.

With the Candidates

TONY ACHARD

Tony Achard, candidate for Senator in the 28th district, of which Iosco County is a part, has always been an untiring worker in the interest of the Republican party. As chairman of the Clare County Republican Committee, a member of the State Central Committee and also the Tenth Congressional District Committee, he has a keen knowledge of party affairs not only in his district but in the entire state.

Achard has never sought public office before but the demands of friends in the ten counties composing the district was such that he consented to be a candidate.

In a recent interview he stated that he had made his home in Clare County for the past ten years because he was fond of the great out-of-doors, the hunting and fishing, woods and wild flowers which drew the tourists by the thousands to Northern Michigan. Always a real conservationist, he realizes if the boys and girls of today have the fishing and hunting that their fathers and mothers enjoyed, it will be through a definite plan of conservation.

The tourist business must be encouraged, as many of our smaller towns derive considerable income from these people. In order to do this our lakes and streams must be open to fishing and well stocked with fish. Our roads must be good and not entirely in one part of the district. The townships should have financial assistance for the improvement of rural roads that will encourage the farmers to haul their produce to the main trunk lines. The children of the rural communities have the same right to an education as their city neighbors. The rural schools of the country need aid and they should have it. The primary school fund is inadequate in the rural districts. The problems of agriculture are serious and need careful consideration if our farming operations are continued. The coming Legislature has many important matters to consider.

WILLARD J. ROBINSON

Willard J. Robinson, of East Tawas, candidate for sheriff on the Republican ticket, served two terms in that office. He was succeeded by Chas. W. Curry in 1924. Mr. Robinson seeks the nomination on his record of past performance in that office.

SIMON GOUPL

Simon Goupil, candidate for sheriff of Iosco county on the Republican ticket, has been a resident of Iosco county for 35 years. Mr. Goupil has been deputy state conservation officer and special police for the city of East Tawas for the past four years. "The record which I have made will show for itself," said Mr. Goupil. "Any support that I receive will be appreciated."

FRANK E. DEASE

"Iosco county is a large business corporation in which you are vitally interested, as one of the Stockholders and Directors. As such the privilege and responsibility will be yours of choosing by ballot the man you consider to be best fitted to manage the office of County Clerk," said Mr. Dease.

"This important office is one which calls for constant attention and application. It is comparable to that of a bank cashier, frequent changes in which office are not conducive to highest efficiency.

"Through the County Clerk's office the New Uniform Accounting System and other new plans have been inaugurated. This calls especially at this time for the services of a man as County Clerk who is now most familiar with the affairs of the office.

"If the affairs of this office have been honestly and successfully conducted and eventually form of the two scenic loops a triangle with Oscoda and the Tawas marking the base; and the apex up-river Mio region.

The new boulevard highway is being built by Oscoda township, under the direction of William J. Grant, County Road Commissioner, and has been cited by local and out state experts as an exceptional quality of highway for condition and cost. The completed section carries a twenty-four foot grade with a twelve foot gravel center, heavily shouldered with clay in its first ten miles.

As soon as a bridge site is determined near the Five Channels dam, the road will be extended by the township of Oscoda to that point and eventually to the county line, states Mr. Grant. The county has taken over the road from Hale to the Five Channels dam and this undoubtedly will be gravelled in the future.—The Oscoda Press.

"The collection and distribution of delinquent taxes is the big job in the treasurer's office. A duplicate set of records of all delinquent taxes is kept in the Auditor General's office and the County Treasurer's office, and reports of collections, corrections, cancellations and rejections are continually passing between these two offices.
