Note—If this acknowledgment is taken outside of the state, the Certificate of the Court that the person taking the acknowledgment is a notary must be attached.
Registration of Absentee by Oath
If any person whose name is not registered shall offer and claim the right to vote at any election, or primary election, and shall UNDER OATH, state that he or she is a resident of such precinct and has resided in the WARD TWENTY DAYS next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his or her residence and that he or she possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution; and that, owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself or herself, or some member of his or her family or owing to his or her absence from the City on public business or his or her own business, and without intent to avoid or delay his or her registration, he or she was unable to make application for registration on the last day provided by law for the registering of electors preceding such election, then the name of such person shall be registered, and he or she shall then be permitted to vote at such election. If such applicant shall in said matter, wilfully make any false statement, he or she shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and upon conviction, be subjected to the pains and penalties thereof.
Provided, That any city may provide by its charter or by resolution approved by a majority of the members of its legislative body for the registration of such sick and absent voters on the last Saturday preceding any election or primary election at the places of voting in the several voting districts of such city, instead of on election or primary election day.
Provision in Case of Removal to Another Precinct
Any registered and qualified voter who has REMOVED from ONE ELECTION PRECINCT of a Ward to another precinct of the same Ward shall have the right on any day previous to election day, on application to the City Clerk, to have his or her name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he or she HAS REMOVED to the registration book of the precinct in which he or she THEN RESIDES. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made ON ELECTION DAY, or

Primary election day, by obtaining from the board of inspectors of election of the precinct from which he or she HAS REMOVED a CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER, and presenting the said certificate to the BOARD OF ELECTION INSPECTORS OF THE PRECINCT IN WHICH HE OR SHE THEN RESIDES.

Order issued by authority of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925, making a closed season on partridge (ruffed grouse) and prairie chicken (pinnated grouse) in the state for a period of one year from October 25, 1928.
County of Ingham
The Director of Conservation, having made a thorough investigation of conditions relative to partridge (ruffed grouse) and prairie chicken (pinnated grouse) in the State, recommends a closed season.
THEREFORE, the Conservation Commission by authority of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925, hereby orders that for a period of one year from the twenty-fifth day of October, 1928, it shall be unlawful for any person to hunt, take or kill, or attempt to hunt, take or kill any partridge (ruffed grouse) and prairie chicken (pinnated grouse) in the State of Michigan under penalties provided by Section 5 of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925.

Order issued by authority of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925, prohibiting hunting in a certain described section of Iosco County, Michigan, for a period of five years.
County of Ingham
The Director of Conservation, having made a thorough investigation of conditions pertaining to hunting in certain areas in the county of Iosco, recommends further regulations.
THEREFORE, the Conservation Commission by authority of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925, hereby orders that for a period of five years from the 15th day of November, 1928, it shall be unlawful to hunt, take or kill any wild animals or birds in the following described area:
Township 24 North, Range 8 East: The South half, and the South half of the North half of Section eleven (11); the South half and the South half of the North half of Section twelve (12); all of sections thirteen (13); fourteen (14); twenty-three (23); twenty-four (24); twenty-five (25); twenty-six (26); and those portions of sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) lying north of the AuSable river, a total of 5,720 acres, more or less, and in
Township 24 North, Range 9 East, those portions of sections seven (7) and eighteen (18) lying west of M-10; and those portions of sections eighteen (18), nineteen (19) and thirty (30) lying west of the north and south center lines of said sections, and that portion of Section thirty-one (31) north of the AuSable river and west of a posted line connecting the north quarter corner with the river bank, a total of 1280 acres, more or less, and all about 7,000 acres, under penalties provided by Section 5 of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925.

THEREFORE, the Conservation Commission by authority of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925, hereby orders that for a period of five years from the 15th day of May, 1927, it shall be unlawful to hunt, take or kill, or attempt to hunt, take or kill any wild animals or birds in the following described area:

Township 23 North, Range 7 West, within the boundaries of the Michigan National Forest, as defined by posted section lines, roads, trails, and firelines, and including parts or all of Sections 3, 4, 8, 9, 10, 11, 14, 15, 16, 17, 21, 22, 23, 26, 27 and 28; an area of 7,200 acres, more or less, in the County of Iosco, under penalties provided by Section 5 of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925.
