





prohibiting hunting in a certain described section of Iosco County, Michigan, for a period of five

County of Ingham
The Director of Conservation, having made a thorough investigation of conditions pertaining to hunting in a certain area in Iosco county, recommends further regulations.

THEREFORE, the Conservation Commission by authority of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925, hereby orders that for a period of five years from the 15th day of May, 1927, it shall be unlawful to hunt, take or kill, or attempt to hunt, take or kill any wild animals or birds in the following described ar-

Township 23 North, Range 7 West, within the boundaries of the Michigan National Forest, as defined by posted section lines, roads, trails, and firelines, and including parts or all of Sections 3, 4, 8, 9; 10, 11, 14, 15, 16, 17, 21, 22, 23, 26, 27 and 28; an area of 7,200 acres, more or less, in the County of Iosco, under penalties provided by Section 5 of Act 230 of the Public Acts of 1925. 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
