LOSE TRAIL OF PINCONNING BANDITS NEAR HERE

The two bandits who robbed the Pinconning State Savings Bank on Saturday apparently vanished in thin air that evening near Tawas City. An abandoned Chrysler car answering to the description of the one used by the bandits was located Sunday morning by Sheriff Chas. W. Curry.

Upon further investigation by Sheriff Curry it was found that two men filling the description of the bandits had Saturday evening entered the old Trainor house which is located in a field near the Detroit & Mackinac railroad and a short distance from the Tawas-Alabaster road. Barney Trainor, who had been away, on returning home found them and they asked to stay over night with him. He refused to keep them and from there the men left no definite trail.

The Pinconning State Bank was robbed of \$9,110 and the Whyte Motor Sales Ford Garage of Pinconning and one of its proprietors, J. B. Harris, were relieved of \$200 and \$40 dollars respectively and the garage of a Model A Ford sedan between 8:00 and 8:30 Saturday morning. The bandits, two young men, made a clean getaway by driving the Ford car west to a point near the Lutheran church of Pinconning, where they abandoned the Ford and transferred to a Chrysler roadster which had been secreted there by the robbers.

The bandits were about 26 years of age, one tall and of medium stature, while the other was shorter and heavier. Both were dark complexioned, wore gray caps and overcoats and were armed with revolvers.

YOUTH RECEIVES THIRTY DAY SENTENCE

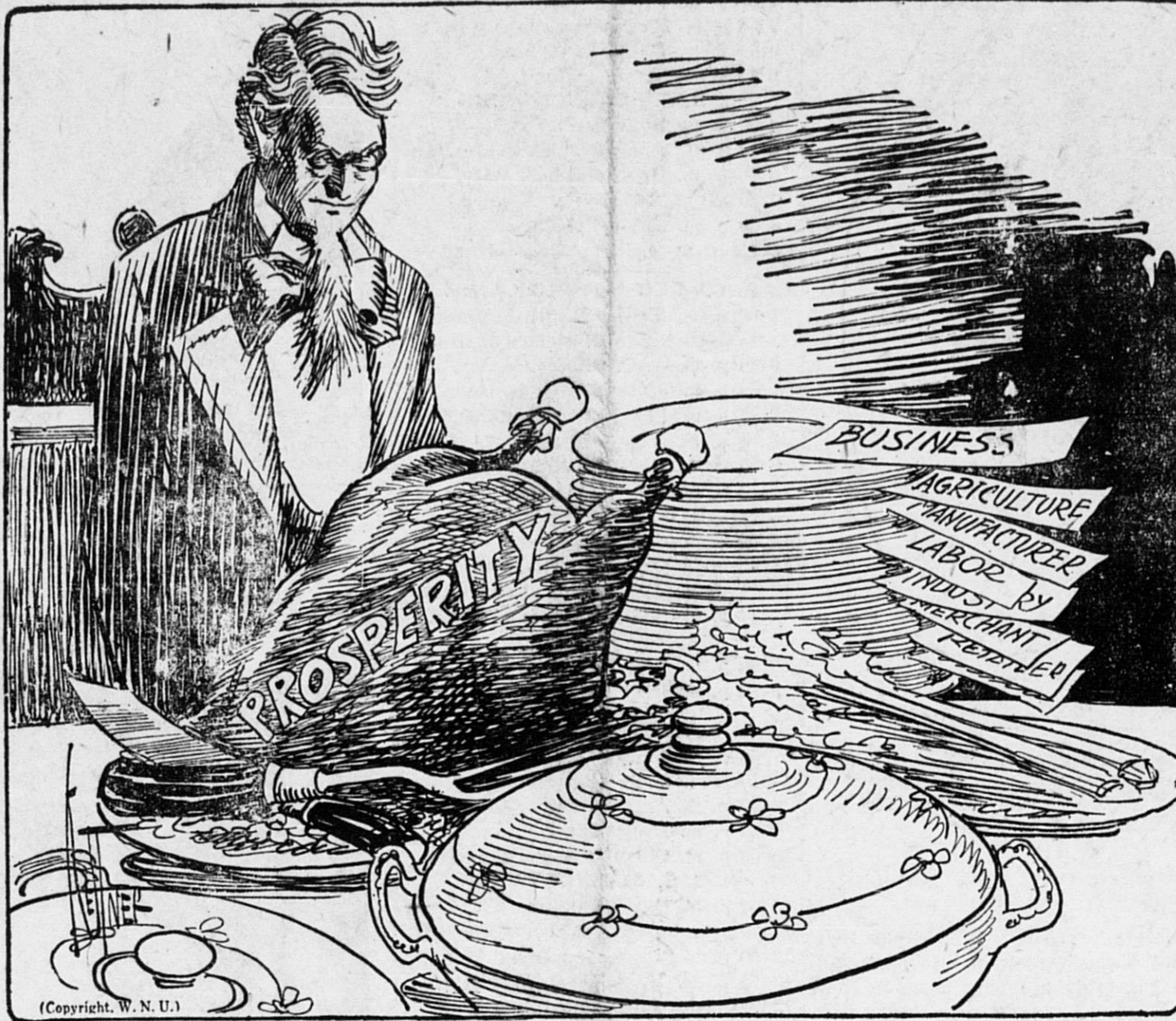

800 DEER LICENSES ISSUED IN COUNTY

Up to Wednesday afternoon, about 800 deer hunting licenses had been issued in the county, states County Clerk Frank E. Dease. One non-resident license had been issued in his office.

Many have made application to the Department of Conservation for trappers' licenses.

Conservation Officer John Martindale stated Wednesday that the deer hunters, so far, had given very little trouble in violating the hunting laws. He said that only a few arrests had been made.

It was also voted to hold the association the first Monday evening of each month. This brings the next meeting on December 3.

It is hoped that a large representation of teachers and parents will be present, as this is one of the requisites for a successful association.

HURON SCOUT CAMP POPULAR WITH BOYS

At the invitation of J. E. Lubway, the Boy Scout organizations of this district have established their winter headquarters at the Huron Scout Camp, located about seven miles from East Tawas on the Huron Shore. Scoutmaster Metcalf and the Tawas City troupe have taken week-end hikes to the camp several times this fall.

The Huron Scout Camp is ideally located on a tract of 173 acres of forest and bathing beach with facilities for practical work in the various phases of scoutcraft. The forest contains nearly all of the trees and shrubs indigenous to northern Michigan and is especially fortunate in having plenty of deer and other wild life.

Years ago it was the Sanderson Hunting lodge. In 1922 it was taken over by Mr. Lubway. He conceived the idea of making it a Scout camp and in 1924 the main buildings were rebuilt, conforming as much as possible to the original lines, with mess hall, sleeping quarters and assembly rooms. A lawn tennis court was built and facilities were furnished for bathing and boating.

Hundreds of scouts from Detroit have spent their summer outings at the Huron Scout camp during the past four years and it has become one of the largest and most popular camps in Michigan.

The city boys especially have much to be thankful for to Mr. Lubway in providing this fine camp.

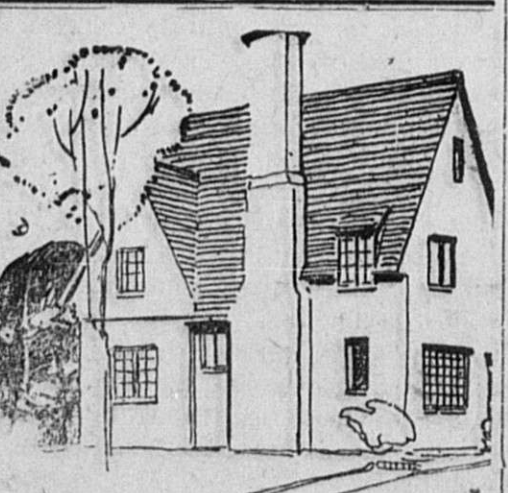

VETERAN RELIEF IS BIG RED CROSS TASK

Service to Disabled in Ten Years Since Armistice Has Cost \$63,300,000.

In this year of the tenth anniversary of the Armistice, which ended the world war, the American Red Cross still finds a great army of disabled and sick veterans requiring assistance, and whose families also must be aided, according to a statement by James L. Fieser, vice chairman in charge of domestic operations of the Red Cross at Washington. In the ten years since November 11, 1918, the Red Cross has expended approximately \$63,300,000 in veteran relief work, Mr. Fieser said. There is a daily average of 25,500 disabled and sick world war veterans enrolled in Veterans' Bureau and other government hospitals which care for these men and women, and about the same annual average of veterans succumbing to wounds and illness, for whose dependents the Red Cross is pledged to give required assistance, Mr. Fieser pointed out.

In addition, the Red Cross, under its charter granted by Congress, has a definite duty towards service men of the regular establishment of Army, Navy and Marine Corps, and follows them to all foreign ports or duty. The expenditure in this work for the year ending June 30, 1928, was \$307,458, the annual report states.
