Be it resolved that the city council of the city of Tawas City, feel that the commercial rates charged by the Consumers Power company in Tawas City are exorbitant and unreasonable. Be it resolved that the rate known as Commercial Rates No. 7 and 8 are such that the small commercial users of light are unable to secure electrical services at a rate equal to power and domestic rates throughout the district. And it is further resolved that the percentage used in determining the connected load of commercial accounts are unfair, unjust and unreasonable; that the arbitrary percentage as fixed in said rates on users of less than two kilowatt loads should be reduced from 95% to at least 50%.

And the council of the said of Tawas City hereby petition the Michigan Public Utilities Commission to investigate the said rates and do all in their power to correct the injustice here set forth. Carried.

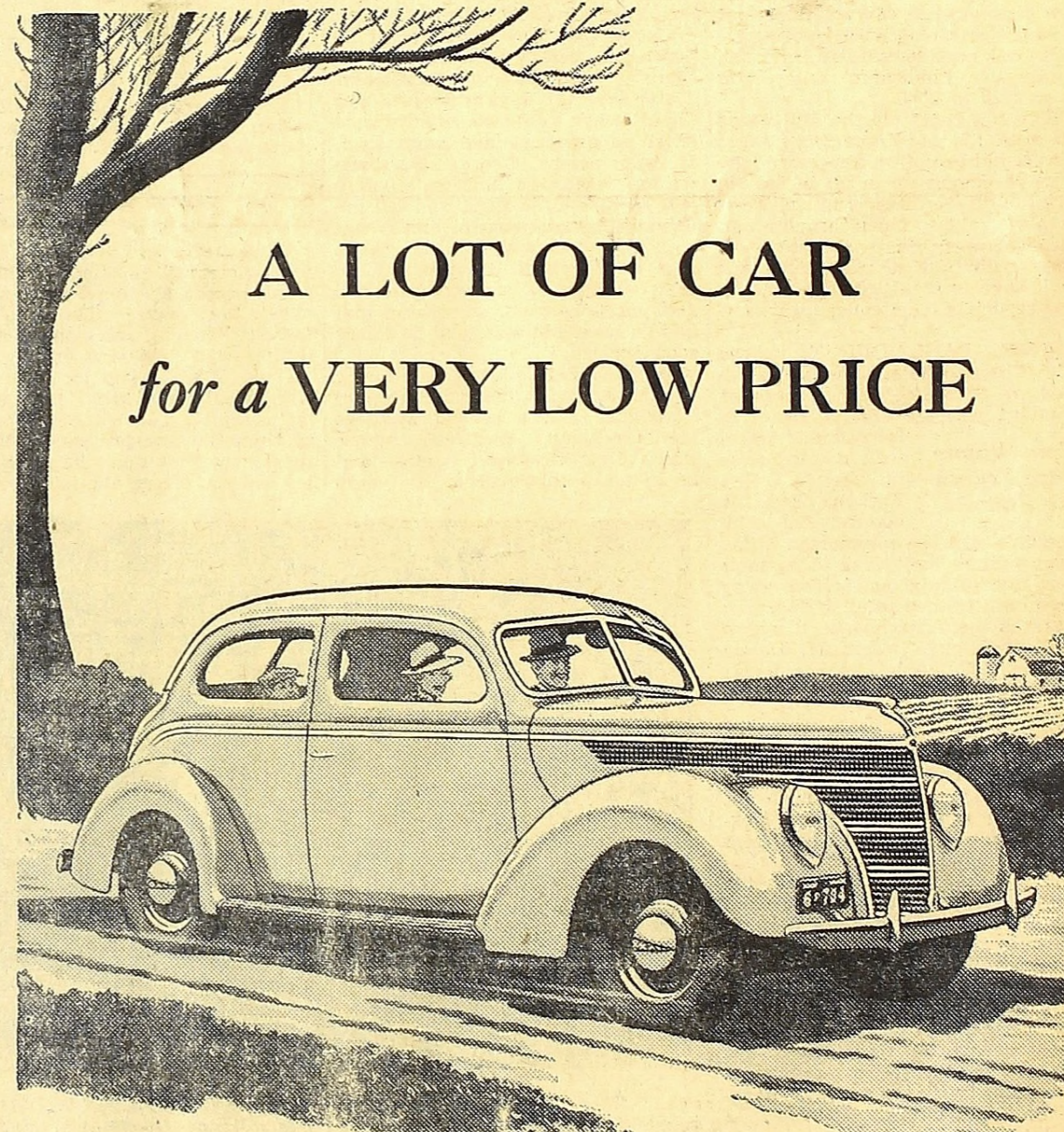
