# Fair Program Now Arranged

## 1945 Premium Lists Ready Next Monday

### Department Heads Named for Fair

Mrs. G. S. Klinkhamer, president of the Iosco County Agricultural Fair Association, announced this week that the 1945 Fair to be held at Hale, September 26, 27 and 28, is rapidly rounding into shape.

The premium list has been increased this year until some \$1,200.00 will be offered exhibitors in premiums that are distributed among 15 different departments.

The new department superintendents who will assist in managing the fair this fall include: Robert Buck, Hale; sheep; G. E. Olson, Wilber; poultry; Clarence E. Earl, Tawas; cattle; Tom Scarlett, Tawas; horses; Dornace Bellville, Whittemore, farm produce and fruit; Herbert Londo, Hale, vegetables; Mrs. Mary Pfahl, Grant, baking and canned goods; Mrs. Mary Webb, Hale, needlework; Mrs. Ferne Streeter, Hale, educational program; Harry Van Patten, Grant, antiques; N. O. Sibley, Taft, handicraft; 4-H and Smith Hughes; Mrs. Leona Townsend, Hale, art and youth department. Those already planning exhibits should contact these department superintendents for additional information.

Eligibility to exhibit and compete for premiums this fall will be confined to adults living in Iosco county and youngsters from this or adjoining counties who are attending school in this country.

The horse pulling contest that always attracts both town and rural people will also be confined to teams owned in Iosco county. The light weight teams will display their training and ability Thursday afternoon, while the heavy weight teams, those weighing over 3,000 pounds, will compete for high money and honor at the Friday afternoon premium.

### Greyhound Takes Over Huron Shore Bus Line

The Great Lakes Greyhound lines has purchased the Huron Shore Bus line operating between East Tawas and Cheboygan, and will take over immediate operation it was announced by Manfred Burleigh, president of the Greyhound Company. Acquisition of the Huron Shore bus line will make possible through service from Bay City to Mackinaw City via Alpena.

The Huron Shore bus line, owned by Al Rivet of Alpena, held the permit between East Tawas and Cheboygan, both junction points on Great Lakes Greyhound divisions.

Bus patrons will be able to travel from Rogers City, Alpena, Greenbush, Harrisville and Oscoda directly to Bay City without change of bus. P. L. Radcliffe, general traffic manager of Great Lakes Greyhound lines, announces there will be three round trips daily over this newly acquired route.

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




