Agricultural Agent Selected By Supervisors

Adopt Assessment Roll for Van Ettan Lake Dam Project

The Board of Supervisors Wednesday afternoon voted to employ Harold Clark of Sandusky as county Agricultural agent. Clark is to succeed Wilton L. Finley who resigned and is now with the Extension Department of Michigan State College.

The Board of Supervisors met Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday of this week during which time the special assessment roll of the Van Ettan Lake Dam project was prepared by a special committee and adopted by the board. The dam, now completed, cost \$54,000, which amount will be spread on the tax roll of the special assessment district this year. A public hearing will be held before the Board of Supervisors on Monday, November 3.

The dam, petitioned for by residents and landowners at Van Ettan Lake, was built to maintain the water level of that lake.

The board appropriated \$300.00 for the Silver Valley winter sports program.

Tester Koha reported 24 herds with 253 cows on Test for the month of August in the Iosco County Dairy Herd Improvement Association. The average production of all cows tested was 27.1 pounds of butterfat from 725 pounds of milk.

High herd honors for butterfat production goes to the Iosco County Farm, with a herd of 20 registered and grade holsteins which produced an average of 1044 pounds of milk and 35.9 pounds of butterfat.

Second grade honors go to Waldo Curry, with a herd of 12 grade Guernseys which produced an average of 972 pounds of milk and 35.2 pounds of butterfat.

Overseas Christmas Gift Mailing

The Department of the Army today urged early mailing of Christmas parcels for soldiers overseas.

In order to assure timely deliveries recommendation is made that all gift parcels be mailed between October 15 and November 15.

Gift parcels should be securely packed in boxes of metal, wood, or strong fiberboard. It is advised that addressee be written directly on the box or wrappings and not on gummed labels, which may become moist and loosen. The weight limitation is 70 pounds, and maximum measurements, 100 inches length and girth combined.

Four other fires in Michigan Wednesday were burning in Fife Lake State Forest near Traverse City.

Governor Sigler has banned smoking and open fires outside of cars, homes and authorized camping grounds north of the Saginaw-Muskegon line.

Change Made in Real Estate Registering

Register of Deeds Albert Buch calls attention to a new change in Michigan laws relative to registering the conveyance of real estate by survivor under a joint deed.

The new law is as follows: "No Deed or other instrument in writing, purporting to convey an interest in land by the survivor under a joint Deed, shall be recorded by the Register of Deeds of any County unless the same shall be accompanied by a certified copy of the Death Certificate, or other proof of Death. If a copy of Death Certificate has been recorded in the Register's Office, reference can be made to same by giving Liber and Page where recorded."

Trapshoot at Airport Sunday Afternoon

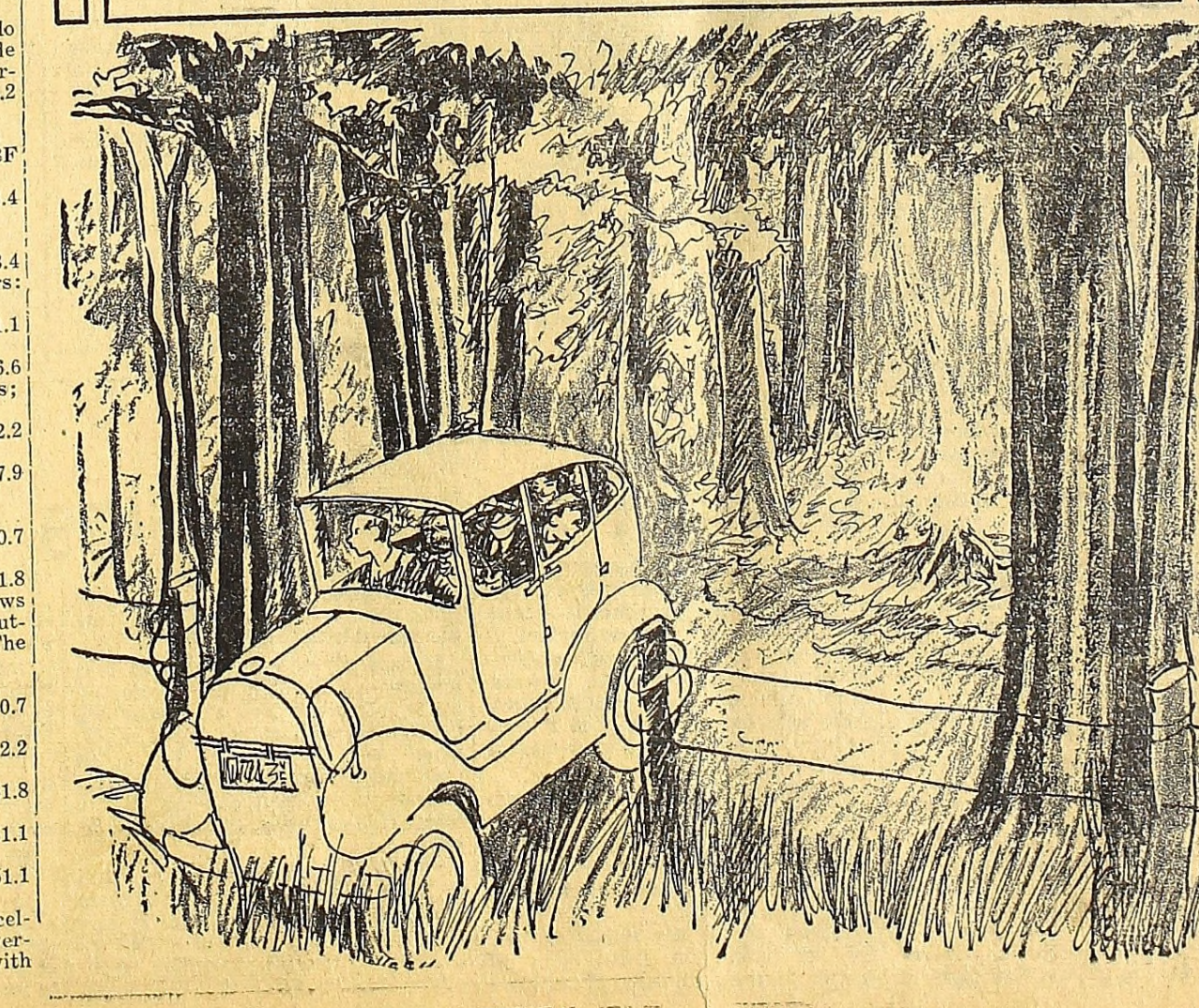

The Controversy on Tax Reduction

IF A special session is called in December will the GOP leadership be content with passing enabling legislation to provide for stop-gap relief for Europe or will they insist on taking up other legislation? Taxes, for instance. Everyone believes in tax reduction, Democrats as well as Republicans, but here's the argument at this time:

Republicans say there is no justification for wartime taxes in peacetime and that present taxes are an unreasonable burden; that present revenue is high enough that taxes can be cut and leave enough over to pay some on the national debt; that present level of taxes is inflationary encouraging farmers and business to hold goods off the market in anticipation of tax cuts to allow them to retain a bigger margin of profits.

Democrats argue it is more important now to create a surplus to apply on the national debt; that unpredictable foreign obligations may require a substantial increase in governmental expenditures and that a tax reduction would be inflationary in that it would increase spending power and add to the demand for scarce goods by leaving more money in people's pockets.

Whether or not the issue comes before a special session, tax reduction definitely will be one of the major controversial issues before the second session of the 80th congress when it reconvenes in January.

Unions Control Labor Board

THE UNIONS are railing the new National Labor Relations board as a tyrannical oppressor, designing to enslave them—but actually they have control of the board.

A fair summation of the setup there would list three of the five members likely to be very pro-labor on a showdown. Union margin would be three to two. Leaning on the labor side in basic background are Paul Herzog, the old chairman; John Houston of the old board, and Abe Murdock. Another holdover, James J. Reynolds, and a new man, J. Copeland Gray, are classified as likely to be the minority of two.

The Republicans are suspicious of the kind of enforcement into which their new reform law might trend. They are saying little or nothing about this, being quite satisfied with initial steps taken, but their fear is well grounded and real. It is merely in abeyance to ascertain if it is justified.

Yet if anything is done to enslave any unions, it will be done by a fairly apparent pro-union board.

A tighter question, however, is how well the legally well-endowed new general counsel, Robert Denham, performs. He has enough law behind him apparently, has supervision directly over district offices of the board, and will initiate and follow through on all the prosecuting of cases.

Aspirants Hint for G.O.P. Bid in '48

Ike Reluctant; Taft Works Hard for Party Nomination

WASHINGTON.—Back before World War II started, I attended a party given by Mark Woods, (my present boss). One of the guests, with whom I had been associated on the Farm and Home Hour came to me and said: "I want you to meet my brother. He's a lieutenant colonel in the army, and I think he's going places."

So we went back and I shook hands with a pink-cheeked, personable soldier, exchanged a few words and drifted on. Shortly afterward (1939), I went to Europe, the war broke and the party was long forgotten.

Somewhat later, and often since, I have had occasion to remember the lieutenant colonel vividly.

I have just been looking at a graph drawn in 1945 by that same lieutenant colonel (after he was needed into it by a biographer). It shows his promotions from the time he was graduated from West Point in 1915.

In World War I, he reached a lieutenant colonel rank after the armistice reverted to his "permanent" rank of captain. He soon was promoted to a major (boosts were slow in those days) and remained a major until 1936. From then until the time I met him at that party, he was a lieutenant colonel.

Two years passed and then things began to happen: Colonel in '41; upped to brigadier general the same year; major general in 1942; commanding general of the European theater of operation; then, in 1945, lieutenant general and commanding general, Allied forces in the European theater—now, president of Columbia university (or maybe something bigger) to be.

Milton Eisenhower was right when he said his brother was "going places." It is in the voluminous volume "My Three Years With Eisenhower" by Harry Butcher, his naval aide, that the chart appears. The graph shows at its peak the rank of four-star general. Butcher jokingly plotted the curve (down) after that point, to zero. Eisenhower immediately drew a fishing pole at the nadir, thus expressing his hopes.

Both were wrong. The government pinned a fifth star on him, and the fishing pole has been transmuted into a cap and gown, as symbol of his new rank when he switches bosses from Mars to Minerva.

But if certain boosters have their way, the line on the chart may move upward again.

I haven't heard what the general's deep-down plans are, but from what I hear, the fishing pole is still the final objective, and he doesn't necessarily mean fishing from a presidential yacht.

Meanwhile, brother Milton Eisenhower has "gone places," too. He's also a "president"—president of Kansas State college, and very happy there. It was rumored that if he should "choose" to take a post which had been suggested for him—back in the department of agriculture (as secretary this time), when and if Clinton Anderson moved elsewhere, and thus became a member of the Truman cabinet, it would mean that his brother was not considering a new job.

Senator Taft Personifies GOP

Of course, it is more fun generalizing about generals than it is to particularize about the prime contenders in the candidates' elephant race to come. But, no matter how much political dust some dark or even chestnut roan stir up later, there are just two people the politicians have to consider now. They are Senator Taft of Ohio and Governor Dewey of New York.

I was standing with a group outside the executive offices of the White House, waiting for the presidential press and radio conference when a genial human cloud, much bigger than a man's hand, in fact almost twice as big as most men's bodies, appeared on the horizon. It was the politically astute and ardent Taftite, Rep. Clarence Brown of Ohio.

The boys ragged Brown a little about the Taft trip, but he wasn't a bit down-hearted. Said he: "We didn't expect to bring back a bunch of delegates. Taft made votes for the Republican party, and that means votes for Taft." (Despite Brown's optimism, some observers have felt that although Taft did make new friends, they weren't new votes, for they were already solid Republicans.)

Frankly, I don't understand Taft very well. There is no question about his intellect or his intellectual judgments. Nobody could ask for a greater demonstration of political skill on the legislative side than his

record in the last congress reveals. But that isn't all.

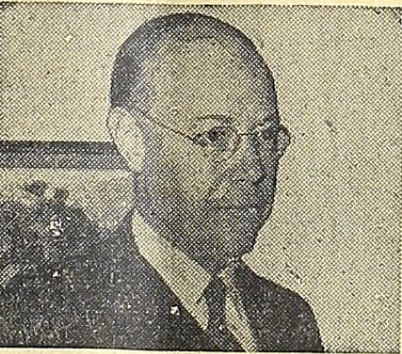
One of Taft's critics, fully cognizant of the Republican policy leader's achievements, said that his intellectual judgments "ran ahead of his practical application" of them. I suppose the critic meant that for all Taft's powers of reasoning, scholarship and tremendous ability to acquire knowledge and weigh facts, he sometimes appears to allow his hereditary viewpoint rather than his acquired conclusions to guide his course. Taft is naturally conservative—and sometimes, I am sure, he has been intellectually persuaded as to the validity of certain measures, but has been unable to support those measures fully because of this inborn conservatism.

To those who know Taft even more than casually, he is cool, rarely unbending, legalistic. He can prove himself, however, as even the least sympathetic newsmen on his recent trip admit, affable and approachable. Also, he has that on many occasions so useful acquisition, (especially when chaperoning a bob-tailed flush), the poker face. Even his smile, which if overworked, becomes a bit rubbery, doesn't always dispel this impression. Although he inherited from his father, William Howard Taft, a tremendous capacity for hard work and a conservative point of view, he lacks the robust geniality conveyed by the Elder Taft's smile and laugh.

Unfortunately, Robert Taft hasn't that risible faculty to relieve a certain aloof remoteness of manner and expression. He is by no means a glamour-boy, and he knows it. One time when Republicans and Democrats were gathered at some clam bake in New England, and the railway became a little personal, Taft challenged the Democrats to a beauty contest. Senator Pepper, who knows he has no claim to pulchritude himself, immediately jumped up to say: "I'm paired with the senator from Ohio."

Taft has some sense of humor, even if he isn't famous for it. Perhaps he absorbed it from his witty wife. He stands six feet tall and he isn't stout, although somehow or other you seem to think of him that way. He is still young—only 58. (I'm sure that's young because it's exactly my age.)

As Representative Brown intimated, Taft's speeches on his western tour, almost entirely devoted to the glorification of the Republican party's record in the first session of the 80th congress, helped strengthen the party. In fact, Taft generally is



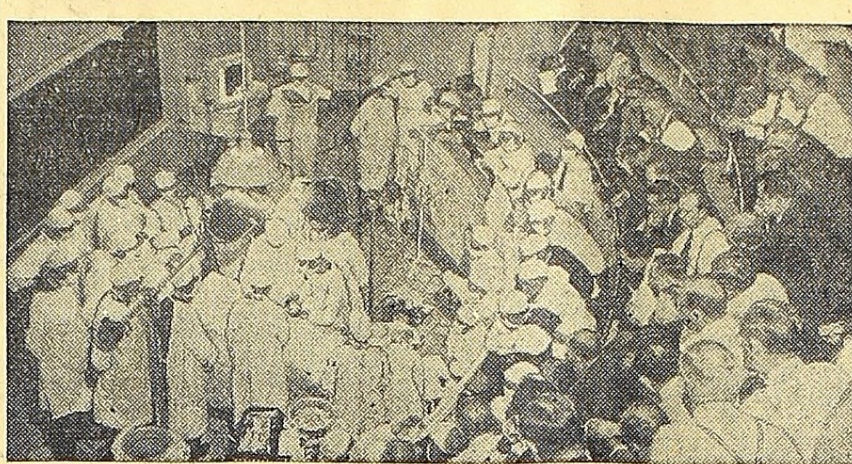
SENATOR TAFT

accepted as the personification of the Republican party—and well he might be—considering the manner in which he dominated the last session, maintaining the respect of the Democratic leaders which he always has had—if not their love and admiration, which he never has had.

Food Plan Opens Shakily; Comintern Brings Jitters

SIX MONTHS
How Long No Meat?

Amid a certain amount of weeping and wailing and less gnashing of teeth than usual, President Truman's program involving meatless Tuesdays and eggless Thursdays lumbered tentatively through its first week.

Even the most ardent optimist could not call this phase of the food conservation drive to help Europe an instantaneous success; however, it might improve with time.

And it was in the handwriting on the wall that there would be considerable time, for administration experts predicted that the days of voluntary self-denial would last for at least six months.

President Truman himself has set the dates for the interim emergency aid to Europe campaign—from December 1 to March 31—although that time limit was imposed specifically for the raising of 580 million dollars in cash. Regarding the food conservation aspect, Charles Luckman, head of the citizens food committee, said "Our only idea is to do the job until it is done. No time schedule has been set."

Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson was a little more definite. He pointed out that conservation to save grain might be necessary until the winter wheat crop, now being planted, begins to come in next June and July. Then he offered a faint hope with a hollow ring: "Meatless days are not in the picture indefinitely," he said.

The Eating Public

Public opinion, it developed, was far from united on a solid front behind the food conservation plan. Restaurant operators said their customers were groaning about meatless and eggless days.

Millions of Americans resented the suggestion of a voluntary meatless Tuesday since they already are going without meat four or five days a week because they can't afford to buy it oftener than that.

The poultry industry pointed out that if every one of the 140 million residents of the U. S. were to eat one less egg a week, the government would have to buy 600 million dozen eggs under the law requiring government support of parity prices; and the government already holds in storage several million cases of surplus eggs purchased to support farm prices.

SECURITY RISKS:
No Peace of Mind

Communism, particularly since the revival of the Comintern in nine European countries, is taking its toll in the U. S. by undermining the American peace of mind.

That obvious fact has been given added significance by the state department's disclosure that summary dismissal faces state department employees who are "habitual or close" associates of persons even "believed to be" Communists.

In plain language, that is a reversal of a fundamental principle of Anglo-American law—that a man is

judged innocent until he is proved guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.

In fact, the state department, in a "security principles" document recently made public, says specifically that if there is a "reasonable doubt" about a worker's loyalty the "department will be given the benefit of the doubt and the person will be deemed a security risk."

While idealists could quibble at length about abridgment of "constitutional rights," few would deny that the state department simply was playing it safe in the face of a manifest danger.

SOLD GOLD:
Second Time

Badly bent economically, although not yet quite broke, Great Britain, in the latest phase of her desperate quest for dollars, has sold 120 million dollars worth of gold to the U. S. in exchange for an equal amount of ironmen.

It was the second such sale from Britain's now dwindling gold reserve. Early in September 80 million dollars worth of gold was sold to the U. S.

The September gold sale came after the 400-million-dollar balance of Britain's dollar loan from America was frozen by British-American agreement when Britain declared she no longer could honor the loan's convertibility clause requiring her to provide dollars in exchange for pounds sterling on demand to any nation she traded with.

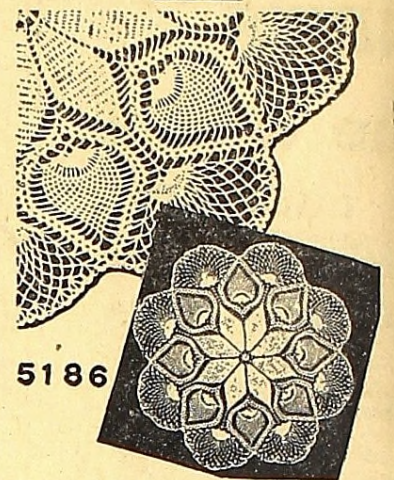

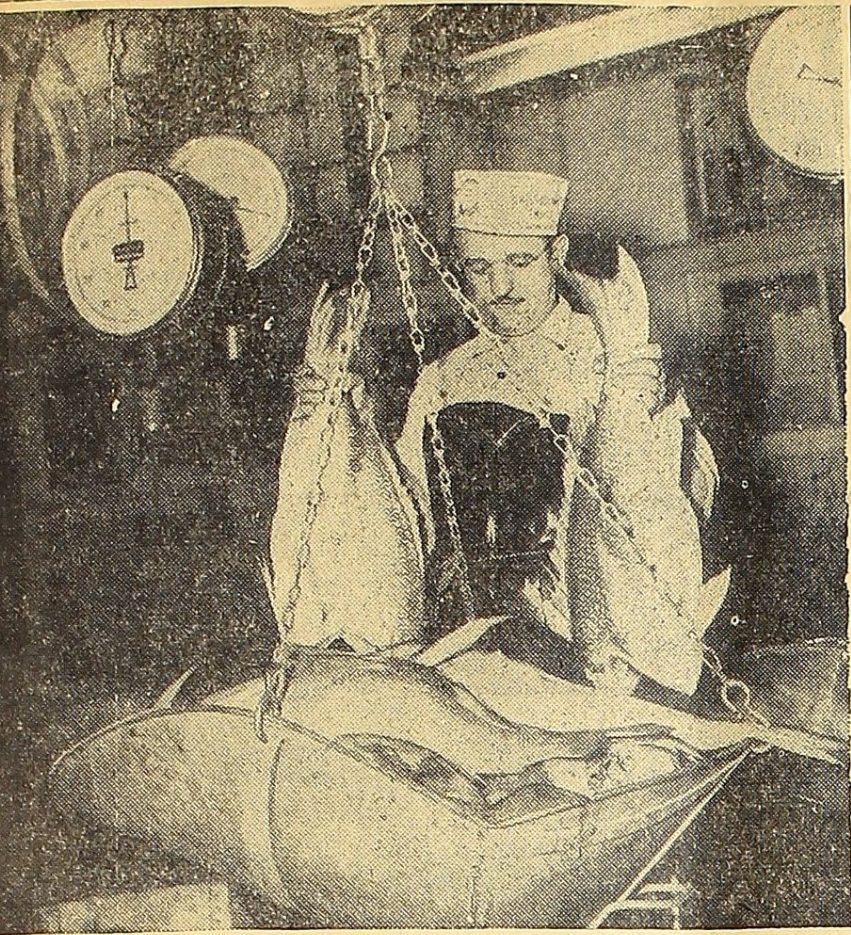

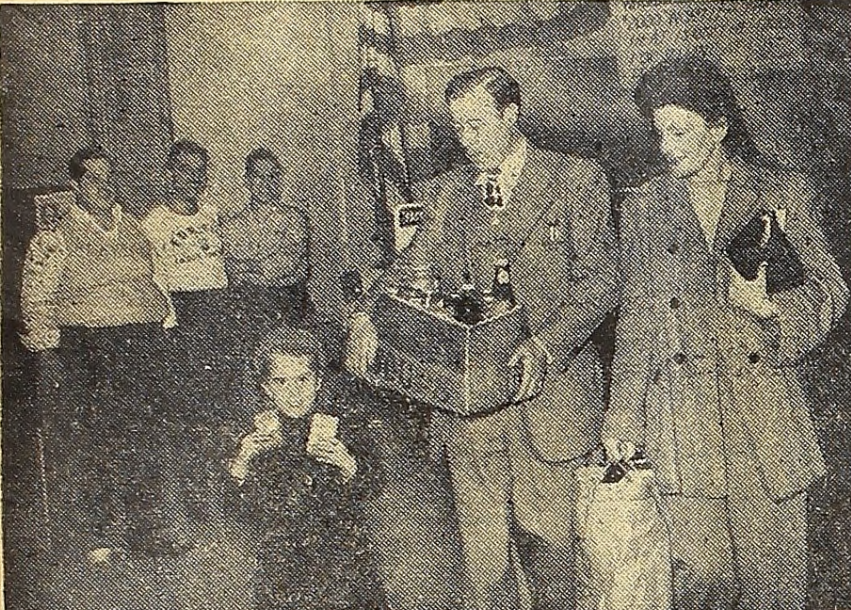

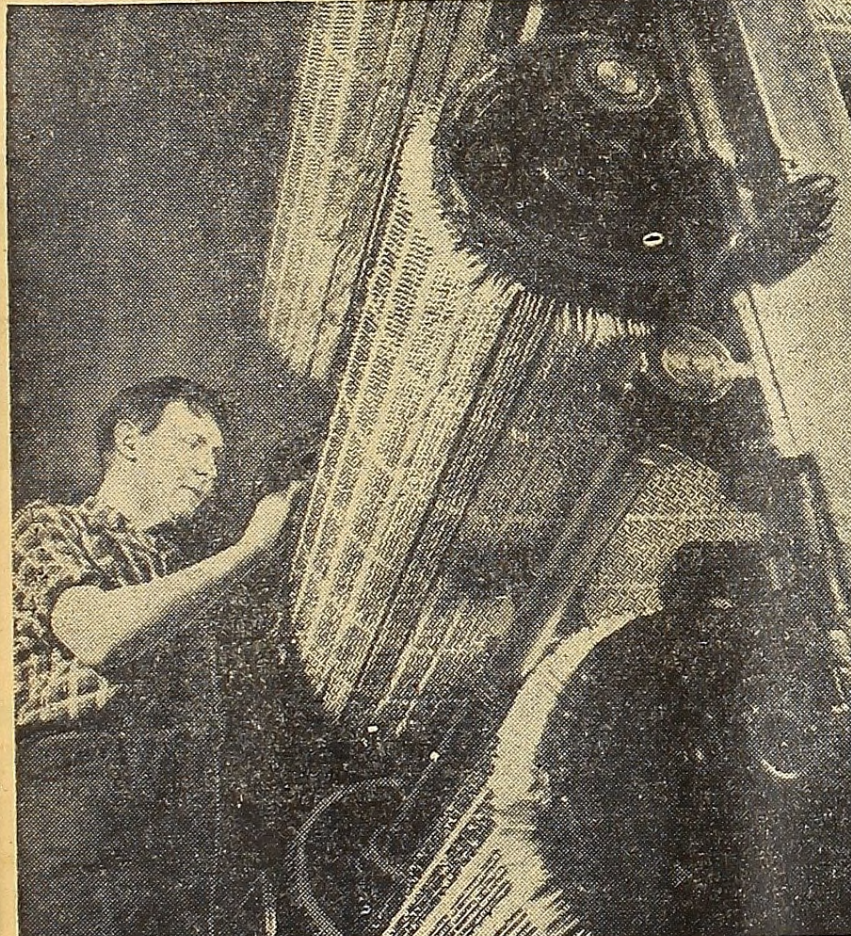

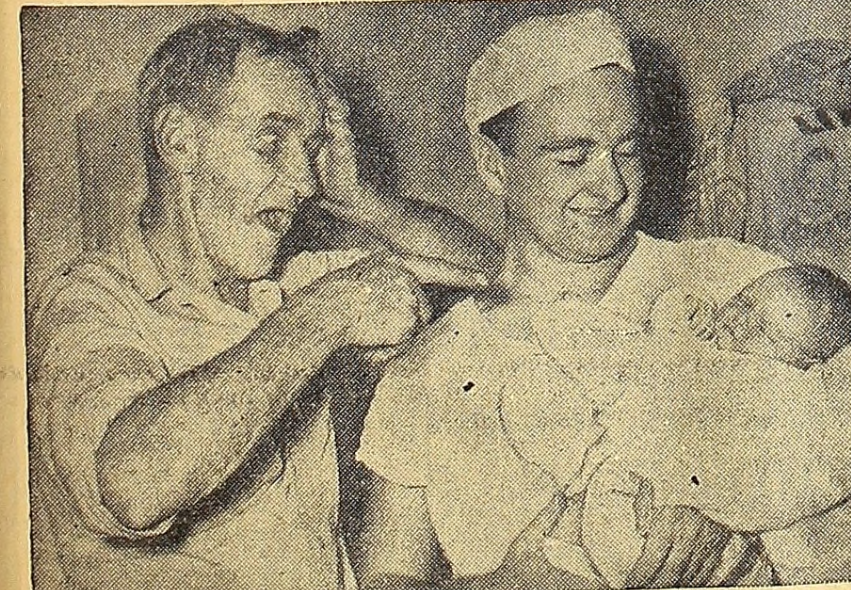

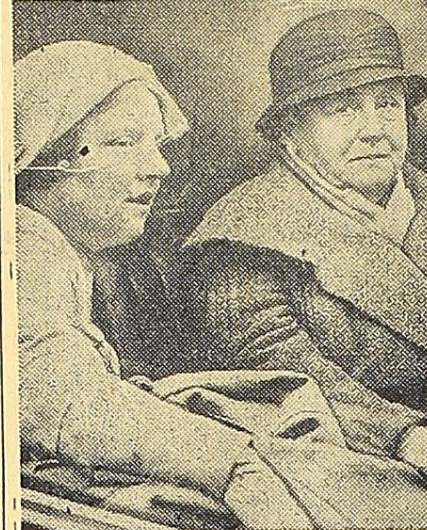

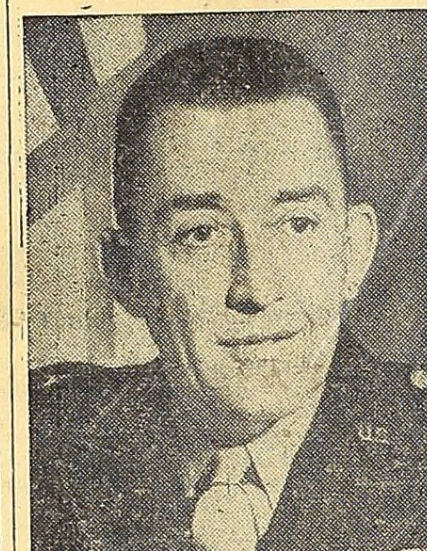

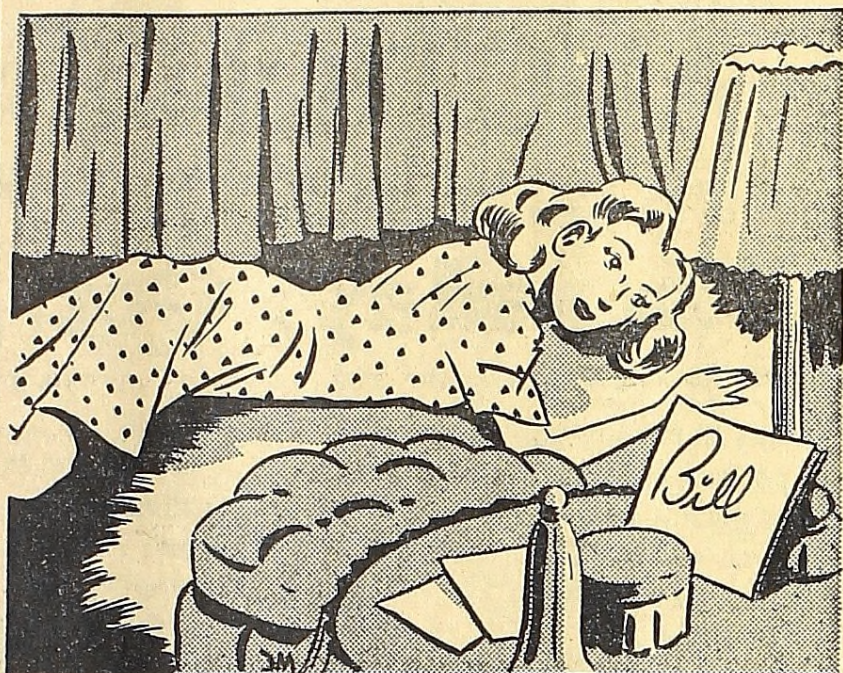
In fact, there were quite a number of things he might do, and Stella began to think she'd been led back to the flat by some Fate which had a personal interest in the destiny of young couples.

Stepping out to discuss the problem with a friend, thought Stella, or

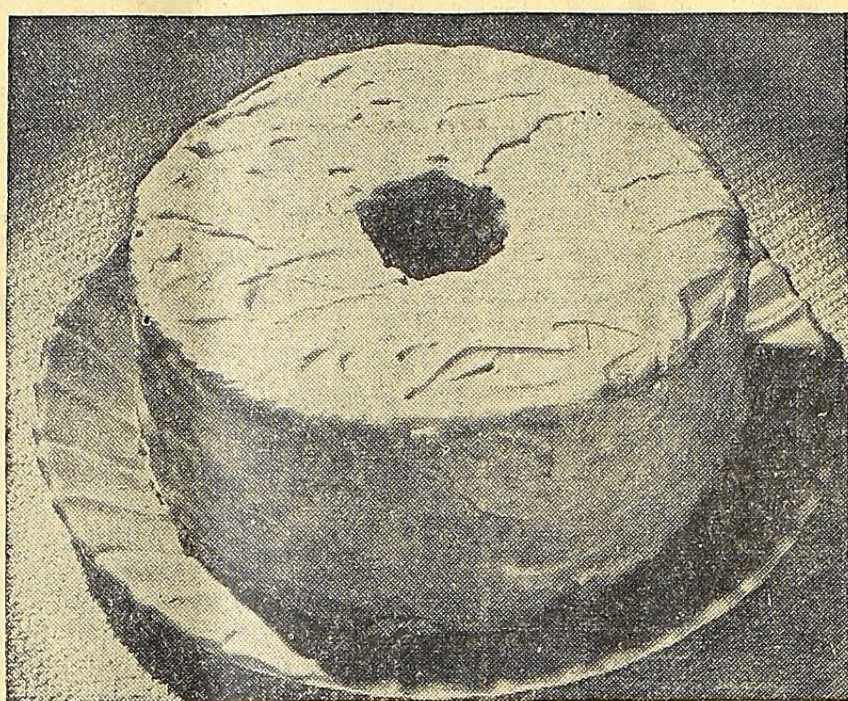
maybe . . . maybe he'd make a date with a pre-marriage sweetheart! She hadn't thought of dames before.

Parade of Cakes

Now that the weather is cooler and we're spending less time out-of-doors, there's more call for mother's delicious cakes. A cake somehow seems to top off evenings at home perfectly when the youngsters have their school chums in for an evening or if guests drop in unexpectedly.

Week-ends, too, probably are full of light entertaining if the week is a busy one, and it's time the old custom of baking a cake on Saturday afternoon were reinstated. Then, no matter who comes in that evening or

stops for dinner or tea on Sunday, we have a cook's treat to set before them.

There are loads of cakes to please every palate, from feathery-textured spice cakes to delectable combinations of banana and pineapple cake, as well as spiced dark devil's food and light-as-down, delicate whipped cream cake.

First, let's start off with a hot milk cake, easy on the budget and easy to mix. Top it with a broiled icing.

Hot Milk Cake.

2 eggs, well beaten
1 cup sugar
1 cup sifted cake flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup hot milk
1 tablespoon butter

Beat eggs until light and thick. Slowly add sugar and continue beating until very light and thick. Sift flour, baking powder and salt. Fold into egg and sugar mixture all at one time. Melt butter in hot milk and fold into cake. The addition of the flour and milk should take no longer than one minute. Pour into a well greased pan and bake in a preheated, moderate (350°F.) oven for 30 minutes.

Broiled Icing.

3/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup butter, melted
1/4 cup cream
1 cup coconut

Combine ingredients, blending well. Frost cake and return to hot oven or broiler just long enough to brown.

Banana Cake.

1/2 cup butter
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 cup banana, mashed
1/2 cup dates, chopped
1 cup crushed pineapple, drained
2 cups cake flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 cup nutmeats
1/2 cup sour milk

Cream sugar and butter thoroughly. Add bananas, dates, pineapple, and blend thoroughly. Sift dry ingredients three times and mix in nuts; add alternately with sour milk. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven for 35 to 40 minutes. Frost with caramel icing:

1 1/2 cups dark brown sugar
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
1 1/2 cups milk
2 tablespoons butter

Combine sugars and bring to a

When you buy lamb chops for broiling, select some that are two-third to two inches thick. If they are any thinner, they dry out too readily before they are entirely cooked.

boil with the milk, stirring gently. Boil without stirring until 232°F. or the soft ball stage. Add butter, remove from the heat and cool to lukewarm. Beat until thick and creamy and of a consistency to spread.

Chocolate Potato Cake.

- 1/2 cup butter or substitute
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 egg yolks, beaten
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup hot mashed potatoes
- 2 squares chocolate, grated
- 1 cup walnuts, chopped
- 4 egg whites
- Rind of 1 lemon, grated

Cream sugar and butter; add egg yolks. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Then add lukewarm potatoes to which the chocolate has been added and allowed to melt, and the walnuts.

Fold in beaten egg white and lemon rind. Bake in layers or in a flat loaf tin in a moderate oven for 35 to 45 minutes.

Spiced Devil's Food.

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 square chocolate, melted
- 1 1/2 cups cake flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1 cup milk

Cream butter and sugar thoroughly, add eggs and chocolate. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Bake in buttered pans in a moderate oven for 30 to 40 minutes. Frost with mocha icing:

- 2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
- 1/4 cup butter or substitute
- 4 tablespoons cold coffee
- 1 square chocolate, melted

Cream together butter and sugar; add melted chocolate and coffee. Beat until smooth and of a spreading consistency. Spread in between layers, on top and sides of cake. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

*Whipped Cream Cake.

1 cup whipping cream
2 eggs, well beaten
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt

Whip cream until it holds shape, then fold in eggs and sugar, mixing lightly. Add lemon extract and vanilla. Add sifted dry ingredients. Bake in two buttered layers in a moderate (375°F.) oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Put together layers with additional whipped cream.

Ham 'n cornbread go a long way toward making any meal a success. Add finely diced ham to cornbread batter before baking. Serve with salads, soups and souffles for a flavor-bright combination.

A never-to-be-forgotten rule when baking cakes, is to allow all the ingredients, especially the fat, eggs and liquid to come to room temperature before mixing. Their "combinability" is increased tremendously and the texture of the cake improved.

Boy Helped Solve Problem Of Bridging Niagara Falls

When the first bridge over Niagara Falls was planned in 1848, the problem of getting a cable from the American to the Canadian side was solved by offering \$5 to the first person who could make a kite carry a string across the 800-foot chasm.

After this had been accomplished by a boy, the string was used to pull over a small steel cable which, for several years, enabled persons to go back and forth, two at a time, in a little wire basket. The original steel suspension bridge thrown across the river just below the American falls had a span of 820 feet, and was long considered to be a feat of engineering.
