## Grant Resident Dies in Trailer House Fire

### Funeral for Joseph D. Bamberger This Friday Afternoon

Joseph D. Bamberger, well known Grant township resident, was burned to death early Tuesday morning in his house trailer.

Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, Cpl. James McDonald of the Michigan State Police and Coroner E. John Moffatt discovered the charred remains in the ashes and twisted iron of the burned trailer home. A previous search by Mr. and Mrs. Howard Auttonson, sister and brother-in-law of the victim, failed to uncover them.

The trailer house was located in an orchard about 150 feet from the house in which his sister and her husband resided. They arose late that morning and Mr. Auttonson started to shovel a path in the snow toward the trailer when he noticed that it had disappeared. Approaching the place where it had stood he discovered that it had burned. The sheriff's department was notified. It was the opinion of the officers that the fire had occurred at about 5:00 that morning.

Coroner Moffatt after a consultation with Prosecuting Attorney Reginald Barnett, who was also at the scene of the accident, declared that the death was due to an accident and that no inquest would be necessary.

Joseph David Bamberger was born December 26, 1902, in Grant township. He had been a lifelong resident of the county and was an employee of the United States Gypsum Company at Alabaster. Unmarried, he had resided for many years with his sister. He is survived by three brothers, George Bamberger of Grant Township, Charles Bamberger of Saginaw and William of Davison, and two sisters, Mrs. Auttonson and Mrs. Mable Allen of Grant.

Funeral services will be held at 2:00 o'clock this afternoon (Friday) from the Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas. Rev. L. Wayne Smith will officiate. Burial will be in the Tawas City Cemetery.

## New D&M Passenger Service Starts Monday

### Connects With Grand Trunk Western Lines

NEM Civic Leaders Invited to Accompany Inaugural Train

New through train passenger service between Alpena and Detroit was announced here today by Charles A. Pinkerton, Jr., President and General Manager, Detroit & Mackinac Railroad, and C. A. Skog, vice President and General Manager, Grand Trunk Western Railroad.

The new service, which will be operated over the lines of the D. & M. and G. T. W., will speed schedules between cities in northeastern Michigan and Detroit and Chicago. With direct connections also afforded to Flint, Port Huron, Toronto, Montreal and other eastern cities.

Mayors of cities along the route and other civic and business leaders will accompany railway officials in the inaugural train Monday, February 6, and special ceremonies will be observed at various points.

Beginning that day, through air-conditioned coach service will be operated daily, except Sundays, leaving Detroit at 1:40 P. M. and Tawas City-East Tawas at 3:10 P. M. and arriving in Alpena at 10:00 P. M. Southbound, the train will leave Alpena at 9:30 A. M. and Tawas at 11:20 A. M., arriving in Detroit at 5:55 P. M.

In addition to providing better passenger service the new schedule will improve mail and express service to Northeastern Michigan.

The though train will be operated for a six-month trial period, the rail officials said. Under authorization of the Michigan Public Service Commission, the trial can be extended for a second six-month period, and establishment of a permanent schedule will be dependent on public acceptance of the new service.

Additional service to its patrons is being provided by the Detroit & Mackinac Railway. Starting with the new passenger train schedule and new connections with the Grand Trunk Western next Monday, two trucks will speed mail, express and less than carload lot shipments to ports on its line between Bay City and Alpena.

The trucking service will be provided by the Mackinac Truck Lines, Inc., a subsidiary of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

East Branch to be Made the Rainbow Fishermen's Paradise

In the future the East Branch of the Augres river should be a paradise for rainbow trout fishermen.

A weir is now under construction in the river a short distance from McIvor to hold rainbow trout upstream. This project is being built by the fish division of the Department of Conservation and was proposed by the Saginaw Field and Stream Club and endorsed by the Isoco County Sportsmens Club.

Four miles upstream from the weir now under construction is the site of Rainbow Paradise, proposed by Eddie Parker. Here a dam would be constructed to impound the rainbow upstream for summer fishing. Parker is enlisting sportsmen throughout Michigan to aid building the proposed dam. The former owner of Guiley Pond, Parker has spent the most of his life as a student of fish life in the streams of Michigan. He is considered an authority on rainbow trout.

Grant Thompson of Bayport is superintending the construction of the weir being built at McIvor by the state. A five man crew and dragline have been on the project and without interference by bad weather or high water the project will be completed within a short time.

Punch and wafers were served the guests and the chaperones were Jack Cummins, class sponsor and Mrs. Florence E. Perry.

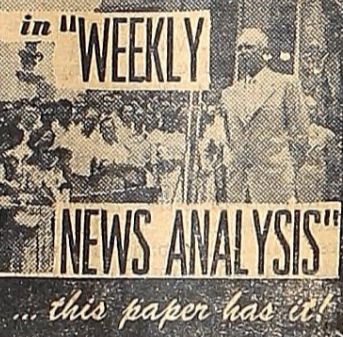

## TO DISCUSS CO-OPS AT FEBRUARY 7 MEET

"Cooperative sounds to many folks like the magic key to solving a host of pressing farm problems. But, how many problems actually are, or can be solved by organizing a co-op?"

Harold Clark, county agricultural agent in Iosco county, reports that plans are now being made for discussion meeting on "Will Co-ops Solve the Farmer's Problem?" A meeting has been scheduled at the Federal Building, East Tawas, February 7, at 8:00 p. m. for leaders of local discussion groups, the agent announced. At this meeting discussion leaders will review the topic of the latest in a series of discussion pamphlets from the Michigan State College extension service. Pro and con arguments on timely questions of agricultural policy are prepared for these pamphlets by MSC extension specialists in agricultural economics. Supplies of the pamphlets will be available to leaders at the meeting.

The question of cooperatives is an especially timely one, agent Clark says, because of the financial "squeeze" farmers are experiencing. Prices paid to farmers have dropped more rapidly than prices of goods they buy. One of the solutions often suggested to this problem is to create more organized farmer marketing agencies. Any discussion group can obtain copies of the discussion pamphlets, Civic, social, and industrial, as well as farm groups, have made effective use of previous issues in many Michigan communities.

## Receives \$1,656.33 in Weight Tax Money

Vouchers for returning to the counties, cities and incorporated villages of Michigan the \$547,762.85 collected in weight tax by the state during the fourth quarter of 1949 have been prepared by the State Highway Department and sent to the Auditor General's department for payment. Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announced. Iosco county's share is \$1,656.33.

All weight tax money is returned to the counties, cities and villages for expenditure on local roads and streets, under provisions of Act 302, Public Acts of 1915. The fourth quarter payment makes a total of \$34,356,231.93 collected in weight tax during 1949 and returned to the counties, cities and villages as provided for by the law. This is an increase of \$2,337,143.41, over the \$32,019,088.52 in weight taxes collected the previous year.

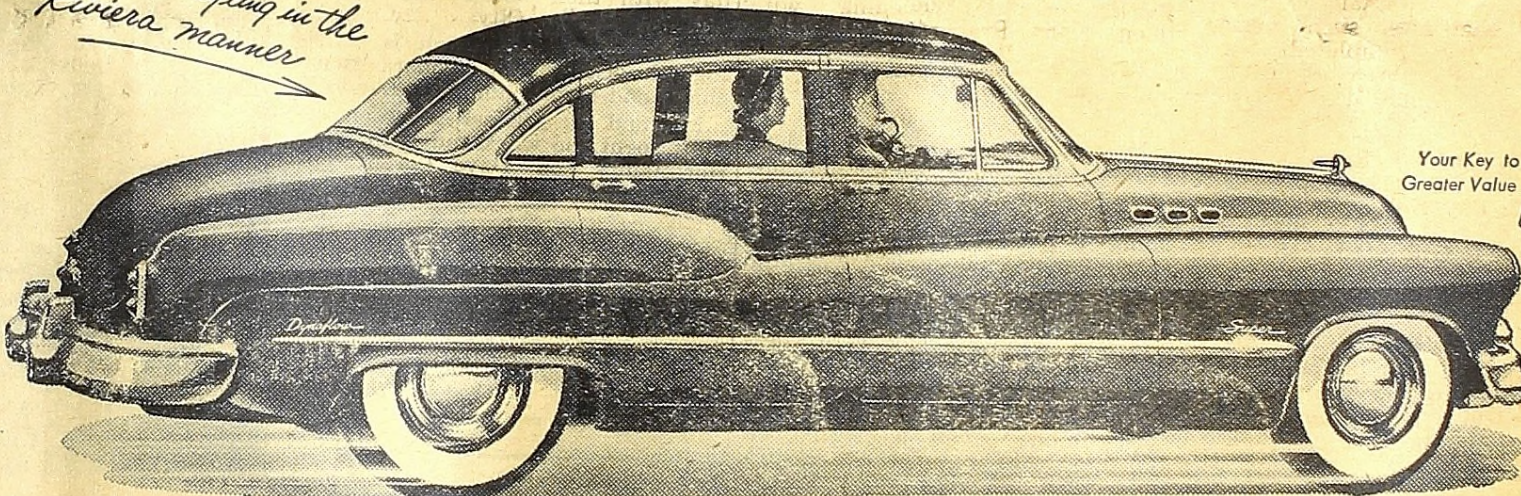

Supervisor Welcome addressed the Board suggesting a trip to observe the operation of the Rock Crusher, to be made this afternoon.

The Committees were ordered to their respective duties by the Chairman, the balance of the Board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair. Upon call to order at 12:00 noon, the Board recessed until 1:30 P. M. same day, upon motion supported and prevailing.

### Afternoon Session

The Board was called to order at 1:30 P. M. by the Chairman and Roll Call ordered. All Supervisors were present and answered to their names.

Register of Deeds Albert Buch read his Annual Report and made request for additional Clerk hire, also for an adding machine for his office. Supervisor Kobs read a report of the Building, Grounds and Purchasing Committee recommending that with regard to the purchase of an addressograph machine that the county is financially unable to purchase such machine at this time and that this matter be laid on the table until such time as suitable means of financing same can be worked out. Upon motion by Kobs, supported by Burgess the report was unanimously accepted and adopted.

And whereas the Prosecuting Attorney has completed his research into the laws applicable to the question at hand.

NOW THEREFORE in conformity with the laws of the State of Michigan and the statutes in such case made and provided, it is hereby resolved that the office of the Chairman of the Isosco County Board of Road Commissioners, an appointive office now held by Elmer Britt, be declared vacant, and that an immediate temporary appointment to said office be made by the Isosco County Board of Supervisors in an effort to relieve the existing conditions involving the roads of the County of Isosco.

And be it further resolved that the Roads and Bridges Committee of the Isosco County Board of Supervisors be empowered and authorized at any and all times to attend the meetings of the Isosco County Board of Road Commissioners and to investigate the financial status and expenditures of said Board of Road Commissioners, and to suggest, promulgate and investigate the policies and operations of said Isosco County Board

of Road Commissioners, and that said Roads and Bridges Committee shall file a written report at each session of the County Board of Supervisors covering the operations and expenditures of the Isosco County Board of Road Commissioners.

Consequently more stress will have to be put on efficiency on production marketing. Reports from elevators indicate increased demand for fertilizer. To meet this situation soil testing clinics, soils and crops, dairy and beef production and marketing, meetings and pasture and barn tours will be held during the year. Soil conservation and improved crops management will be emphasized. Farmers will be urged to produce for the most favorable markets for livestock and dairy and poultry products.  
**Tourist and Resort Service**  
 The second Tourist and Resort workshop will be held in the Tawas again this year. An attempt to serve more resort owners will be made.  
**Community Projects**  
 The telephone service in Iosco County is recognized as unsatisfactory especially in Sherman and Grant Township. A concerted effort will be made to improve telephone communications in the county.  
 The agent will continue interest in the school surveys and offer any assistance required.

**Home Economics**

The activities of the home economics groups will be mainly conducted by the county council but assistance will be offered in the promotion of their activities.

**4-H Activities**

The importance of the 4-H program in Iosco County is recognized. The agent will plan to spend a third of his time in organizing and promoting the 4-H activities. The goal is to organize more community clubs and interest the older members in advanced projects and activities. The 4-H Council will be of great help in developing the program. With more young men graduating in agriculture, there is good prospect of obtaining a club agent this year.

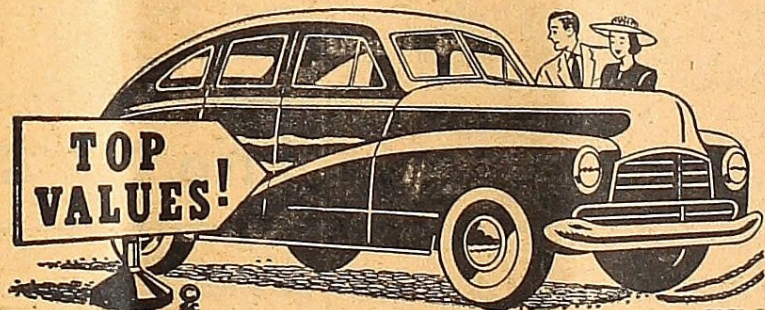
