



County Joins in Drive Against Unsafe Vehicles


Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell today announced that the County of Iosco joined with the State Safety Commission in conducting an all-out drive against unsafe vehicles dur-ing the month of May.







where it is located. This information sheet on Site Requirements, together with other tourist buisiness will want to read, "Site Requirements." It has been prepared by C. A. Gun, extension specialist in tourist and resort structures for the agricultural engineering department of Michigan State College, and is available at the agent's office.

Since most investments in tourist accomodaions are made only once or twice in a lifetime, is is important to make a thorough study of the site requirements be-

fore building. Those who are interested in learning more about the kind of site that is best adapted to the guides and literature on planning better tourist accomodations can be obtained from the county extension office, located in the Federal Building at East Tawas or from the Agricultural Engineering Department, Michigan State College, East Lansing, Michigan.
