

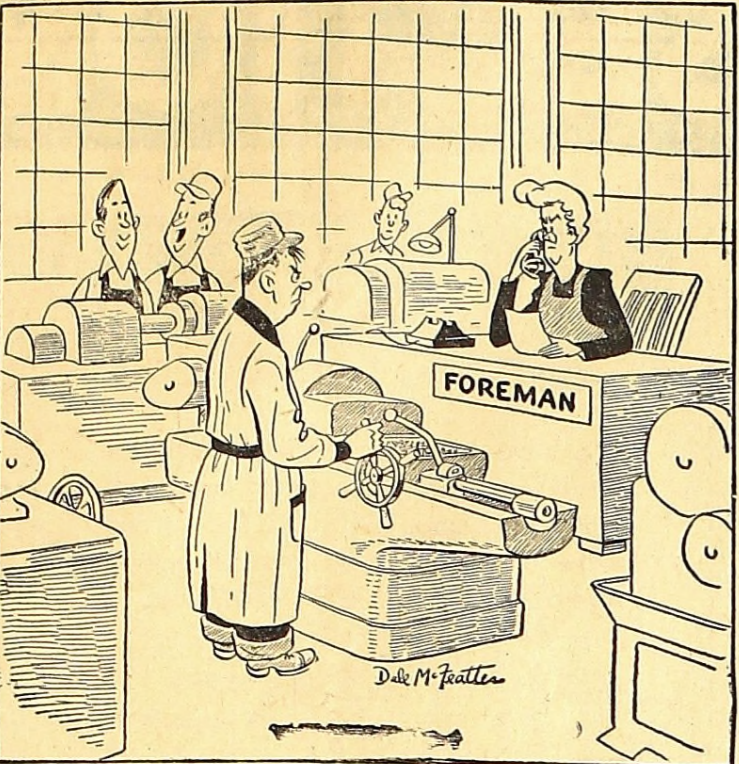

**God and Life**

Lesson for May 25, 1952

**IF THERE IS** any one commandment which Jesus not only did not abolish but made far clearer and sharper, it is the commandment, Thou shalt not kill.

By word and act, the Master, showed that life is sacred. It is sacred because we are God's children; and whatever injures life, whatever makes it less worth living, whatever tempts men to do way with their own lives, whatever shortens life and makes it wretched and unbearable, this violates the will of God, this is a form of killing.

Jesus' attitude to disease is a case in point. We do not read of a single case where he came in contact with a sick person and urged the patient just to be patient. He always restored the sick to health; sickness in his eyes, is a thing that ought not to be.

**Blunt Instruments**  
MURDER MYSTERIES are always solved in the detective stories. In real life we are not always so fortunate. Many a murder mystery remains a mystery after long years. All the police could ever be sure of was that "some person or persons unknown" hit the victim with a "blunt instrument."

Now you would think that a murderer would pick out something more efficient. Why not a sharp instrument? However, the blunt instrument, whatever it was—a sash-weight, a brick or whatever—did the work. A man can be just as dead from being hit with a sandbag as from being shot with a rifle.

As Simeon Stylites pointed out some time ago in the "Christian Century," there are all kinds of blunt instruments besides crowbars, sash-weights and bricks. Whatever tends to shorten life is a kind of blunt instrument; it may take a long time to have its effect but if it is deadly in the long run, then it is deadly, period.

Any sort of habit that cuts down one's good health; any carelessness or neglect; any stupidity or foolishness such as driving too fast on a wet night; giving way to worries and getting indigestion from them; these are not un-heard-of ways of shortening life. They are, in plain language, murderous.

**Alcohol the Killer**  
AS THIS IS the temperance lesson, this is a good place to recall the fact that alcoholic liquor is a too popular deadly weapon.

You have heard of the so-called antibodies or phagocytes which are in a healthy blood-stream. These are the little fighting cells which gather around invading germs and kill them. Without these in our blood we could scarcely survive a single day, the air is so full of germs which we cannot help taking into our throats and lungs.

But alcohol taken internally will paralyze these phagocytes to such an extent that they are no use. This is not to say that a single bottle or drink of liquor kills all a man's phagocytes at once.

But still, as David Starr Jordan, president of Leland Stanford University, once said, if a man were telling the whole truth he would not say, Let us have a drink together. He would say, Come, let us paralyze our phagocytes together!

Insurance companies which insure only ministers and religious workers, that is to say, which insure mostly non-drinkers, can and do offer insurance for much lower premiums than companies that have to insure all sorts of people including "moderate" drinkers.

**Hit by the Bottle**  
A DRINKER is said to be hitting the bottle. Not at all. The bottle is hitting him. Liquor kills, in more ways than by paralyzing the health-pells in the blood. Time is the stuff life is made of; and how much time liquor kills, how many "lost weekends" it is causing this very week, only God and the devil know.

Liquor also creates poverty and poverty helps to shorten life. Liquor also makes a man reckless. The trade of prostitution would not be quite so flourishing without liquor. Many a serious disease is contracted under the effects of liquor.

As for violent and sudden deaths, read carefully next Monday's papers for the lists of the people killed on our American highways this beautiful May week-end. Read again after Decoration Day. Read carefully: how many of these dead people, if sober, might have lived? 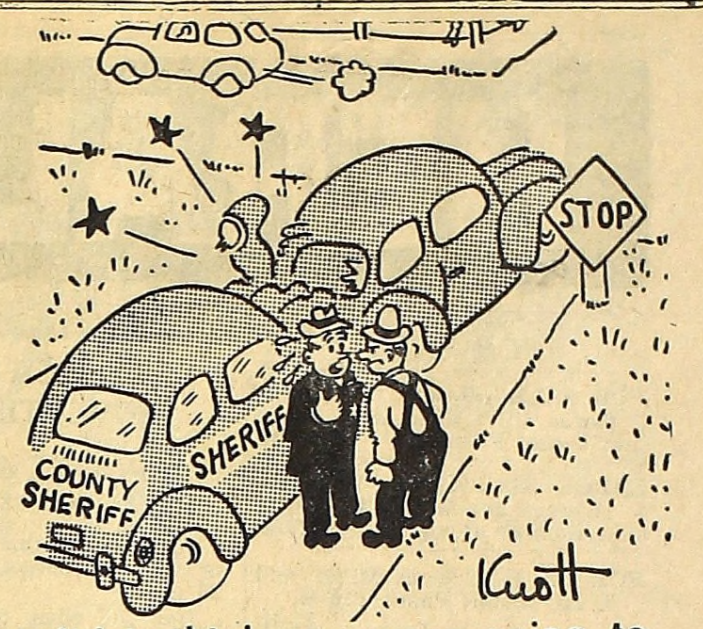

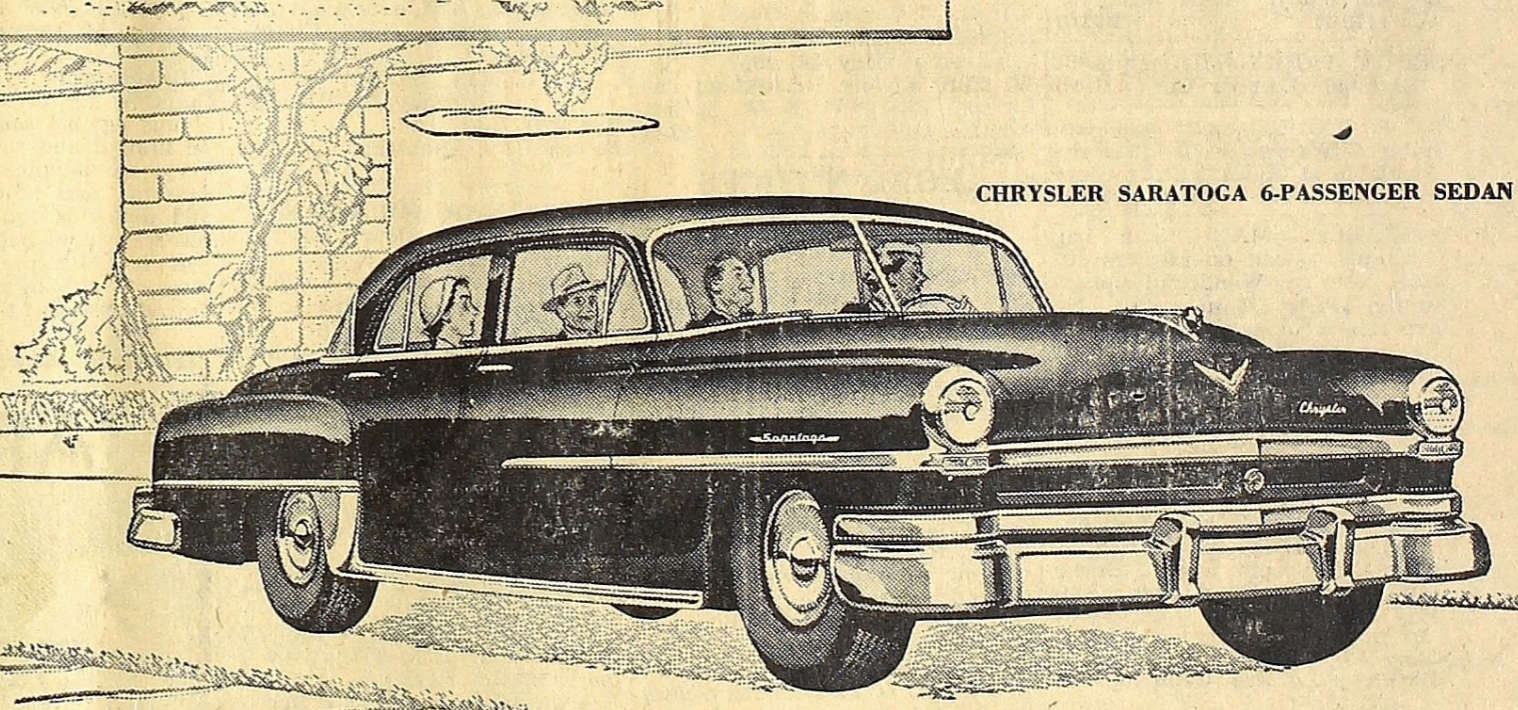

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as read. It was moved by Alderman Boomer and seconded by Alderman Tuttle that we tentatively approve the Plat of "Riverview."

Full approval will be given when necessary legal documents are filed with the city council regarding the improvements of streets, drainage, sewer and water.

A petition of Case, Burr and Carey for a 8-months Class C Resort License, Tavern License and SDM license was read by the clerk. It was moved by Alderman Ziehl and seconded by Alderman Boomer that the application be referred to the licensing and purchasing committee and that they give a report at the next meeting. The motion carried.

The building permit of Peter Beckett was presented for approval. It was moved by Alderman Ziehl and seconded by Alderman Boomer that the permit of Peter Beckett be approved to erect a building in Case's Subdivision. The report of the Water Board was read by the Supt. of Public Works. Disbursements: Water Dept., \$526.71; Sewer Dept., \$152.94. It was moved by Alderman Boomer and seconded by Alderman Evril that the report be adopted as read. Roll Call—Yeas: Alderman Boomer, Cholger, Evril, Ruckle, Tuttle and Ziehl. Nays: None. The motion carried.

The purchase of a new police car was discussed. It was moved by Alderman Ruckle and seconded by Alderman Cholger that the City trade in the Police car for a new one at the price quoted. Roll Call—Yeas: Alderman Boomer, Cholger, Evril, Ruckle, Tuttle and Ziehl. Nays: None. The motion carried.

Roll Call—Yeas: Aldermen Boomer, Cholger, Evril, Ruckle, Tuttle and Ziehl. Nays: None. The motion carried.

Regular meeting of the common council held on April 7, 1952. The meeting was called to order by the Mayor Geo. W. Myles. The following Aldermen were present: Boomer, Cholger, Evril, Ruckle, Tuttle and Ziehl.

The minutes of the previous meeting was approved as read. Mr. Peter C. Young presented an application for Class C Tavern license, 8-months. Expires Jan. 1, 1953. It was moved by Alderman Ruckle and seconded by Alderman Evril that the application of Peter Young for Class C license, 8-months, be approved. It was moved by Alderman Cholger and seconded by Alderman Tuttle that the Michigan State Highway Dept. make a speed re-survey on US-23 through Tawas City. The motion carried.
