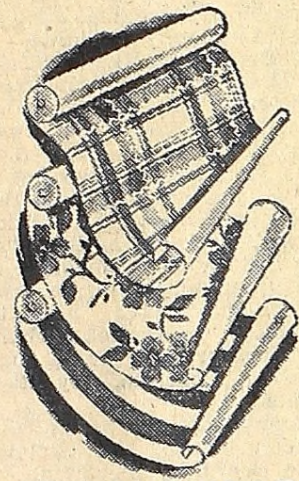

TRAFFIC TOLL STARTS UPWARD MEMORIAL DAY

An average of between 20 and 25 fatalities will occur in Michigan highways every week-end between Memorial Day and Labor Day unless more care is exercised by motorists, State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs predicts.
Last year, during June, July and August, an average of 21 persons were killed in traffic accidents throughout the state each week-end. In 1950 the average was 18.
"Traffic hazards will be potentially worse this summer," Childs said. "It is anticipated there will be more than two billion miles of travel each month, or an all-time high of about seven billion miles for the summer period as compared with six and a half billion in the same period last year."
"Actions of motorists will largely determine whether or not the traffic toll will be big or small. From now on, throughout the summer, extra care and caution are a necessity. A special effort should be made to control driving speeds. Nearly half of all violations reported in fatal accidents last summer were for speeding."

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THE WASHINGTON Merry-Go-Round

Dodd's Career

THE future Army career of Brig. Gen. Francis Dodd is not bright. He may be shipped to Okinawa.

What made the Pentagon furious was that carelessness by him resulted in his capture just at a time when Washington had carefully

worked up an international plan to break the truce deadlock.

President Truman had announced to the Communists and the world that not a single further prisoner concession would be given. By prearrangement,

the top leaders of France and England made the same ultimatum. These statements had been carefully timed to hit the front pages of every paper in the world, including newspapers behind the iron curtain.

But just at the climax, General Dodd's capture swept the truce ultimatum off the front pages. It also made us the laughing stock of the Asiatic world, where "face" counts for everything.

What burns up Secretary of Defense Lovett is that General Dodd and every other American general in Korea knew that this was an extremely important moment in the truce talks and had been warned to be ultra careful.

Capturing New York

To the Wall Street commuter New York may be a humdrum, blue town. To the taxi driver it may be jaded; to the salesman it may be dreary; to the subway straphanger, heartless. But to a group of youngsters who came to New York from Colorado and Kansas, from Florida and West Virginia to broadcast over the Voice of America last week, New York was the most glamorous, exciting city in the world.

They were among those who had written the best of thousands of letters to youth behind the iron curtain. And although many, many more of these letters are being broadcast every day textually, this group came to talk in person, via the Voice, to the generation behind the iron curtain which can be our friends or our future enemies.

New York, and later Washington, took one look at them, and succumbed to the freshness of youth. They captivated the diplomats, melted the hearts of hard-boiled newsmen, even inspired taxi-drivers to give sight-seeing lectures on the wonders of Manhattan.

Everyone rolled out the red carpet, from the Hotel New Yorker which entertained them in New York, to Moe Lerner of Airport Transport, Inc., who gave them two limousines in which to see the sights of Washington. And they trod the red carpet so surely that you scarcely would have guessed some of them were only 11 years old and never had been on an airplane before.

Cattle Ranch to Subway

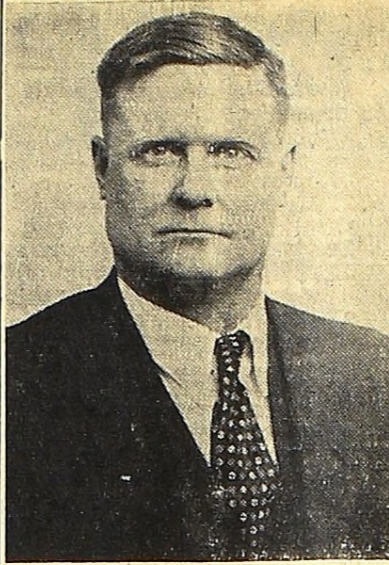
When Margaret Fowler of Burlington, Colo., got to New York the first thing she did was to ride the subway and eat lamb. Living on a cattle ranch, where sheep and cattle don't mix, this was the first lamb Margaret had ever tasted.

What thrilled Bobby Hightower most was the Lincoln memorial. Bobby is a Negro boy from Orlando, Fla., and the people of Orlando believed the propaganda lies of Moscow by sending Bobby on his long trip. He told the youth behind the iron curtain that he was studying to be a doctor—a future probably denied the great majority of young Communists.

Booker T. Washington of Planeview high school, Kansas, also got a thrill out of the Lincoln memorial, but possibly he had more fun at a game between the New York Yankees and the Boston Red Sox. Back in Kansas, Booker's aged grandmother took a bus trip up from Muskogee, Okla., to see her grandson off on his pilgrim age to Washington, while his classmates gave him two sport shirts, and a friend of his mother's drove 15 miles to give him two dollars to buy soda pop in New York.

Booker told the youth behind the iron curtain how he, a Negro boy, was vice president of the junior hi-y and a drummer in the high-school band.

Mary Marlin, aged 13, told her iron curtain audience about her town, Bellaire, Ohio—its people and its industries. Sharon Ann Adams of McMechen, W. Va., told about the great U.S.-Canadian border, unguarded and unfortified, a symbol of peace and friendship. A bit bashful, she did not tell them how, going up to the 43rd floor and the roof of the Hotel New Yorker she had looked down at the tiny autos and streetcars on Broadway and felt a little dizzy. It would have been interesting if she had, for, in Moscow, buildings don't go much higher than 10 floors.

Bids for Seat In Legislature

It is now our turn to have Grass Day in our county. There will be only six Grass Days in all of lower Michigan and Iosco County is to have one of them.

These field day events are highlights of the entire year. Attendance of other years have ranged from 1000 to 4500 at a single event. Farmers see demonstrations of improved management in which grass plays an important part. Machinery dealers put on a big exhibition of the latest models of forage crop equipment. It beats a fair because it shows ways to higher profits for the farmer.

It takes a tremendous amount of work and planning to make a grass day move off smoothly. By complete cooperation between the host farmer—the state Grass Day committee—the local committee, machinery dealers and other organizations have these events been such outstanding events.

Next Monday all committees will meet at Jim Mielock's farm to make the final plans for the Grass Day which will be held at his farm June 20. The problems confronting the committees are parking, feeding, furnishing drinking water, lining up the tours and instructing tour guides, assigning area for machinery exhibit, locating first aid tent, etc. Mrs. Grace Hanna, the county nurse will be constantly available for emergencies. John Franson, Forest Ranger, will have a fire truck on the grounds all day, and the state police and sheriff will be on deck to preserve order.

County agents from eight counties will serve as tour guides and specialists of Michigan State College will explain the demonstration. One stop of the Grass Day tour will show Jim's Hereford's and "Bill" Finley will give some figures to show the economy of forage crops in producing a feeder calf and meat. Donald L. Mur-

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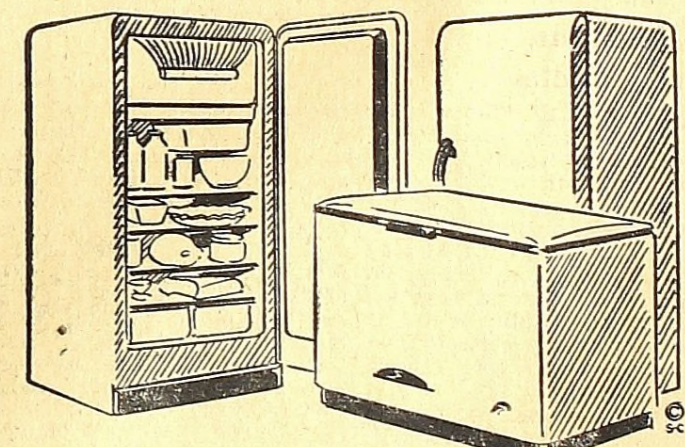
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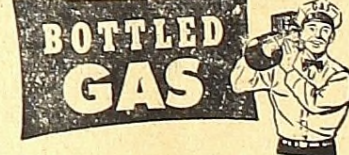
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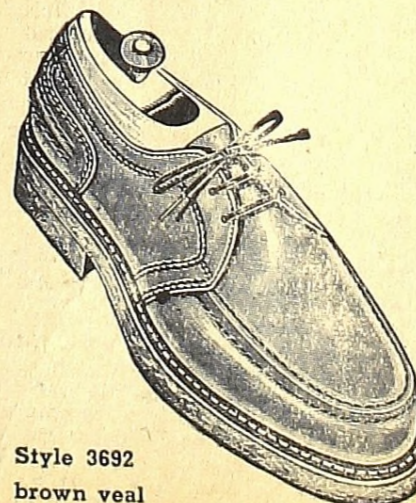
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4-H CLUB NOTES

International Union Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH FOREMAN

SCRIPTURE: Exodus 20:1-17; Matthew 5:8, 13-16, 27-32; Mark 10:2-12; Luke 2:40.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Ephesians 5:1-10.

Why Purity?

Lesson for June 1, 1952

AMONG THE NEW IDEAS that come into the world with the Christian religio. is the ideal of purity, as we understand it. We acknowledge our debt here to Judaism, but Judaism never pushed into all the world as Christianity did.

Christianity took over from the Old Testament and renewed with fresh emphasis an idea of which the entire ancient world knew nothing, the ideal for purity as God's will for all of us.

The Greeks and Romans admired vestal virgins and the like; but they looked on them as a small and special class, not like ordinary mortals. All peoples even the most primitive have some kind of sex taboos; even those that permit adultery impose some limitations on it.

What Purity Means
THE TRUE CHRISTIAN idea, the New Testament idea, Christ's idea, of purity means something far deeper and higher than merely not committing adultery. It means chastity in its full sense.

It is not the same thing as celibacy or not marrying. It is not the same thing as perpetual virginity, otherwise we could never speak of a chaste wife. Put as simply as possible, purity in the Christian sense of the word means that sex is always to be thought of in the closest connection with love and the home.

It is not true New Testament teaching to say that sex is bad in itself. It is even farther from the New Testament to say that sex is good in itself.

Pursued for its own sake, it destroys the happiness of the pursuer; taken into the atmosphere of true love, bound in the solemn vows of genuine marriage, it can belong in a life of real happiness and goodness.

Forsaking All Others

CHRIST QUITE CLEARLY taught as the ideal of marriage a lifetime unbroken union of one man and one woman. Since the times in which he lived were, like ours, a time of easy divorce, his disciples, good men though they were, felt puzzled about this.

Today on all sides the Christian ideal of marriage is still under attack as too rigid, as beyond the capacity of normal human beings, as being a sort of cage invented by priests and preachers. Love should be free, we are told.

You do not need to go to the Bible to see how wrong this is. Just fall in love and you will understand the truth. When a man and woman are in love, really in love, enough to dare marriage together, they do not need a priest or a preacher or a Bible to tell them what God who made them has already put into their hearts: that true love means just each for the other, for always.

What young man would care to marry a girl who would say to him on their wedding day, "Darling, you are the only man I love—with maybe half a dozen exceptions." What girl would feel like going on with the ceremony if at the altar the young man said, "I take thee for my wedded wife, from this day forward, for better not for worse, for richer not for poorer, in health but not in sickness, till discontent do us part."

The flower-to-flower notion of love is something every couple truly in love can see is nonsense, and worse.

Heart of the Home

PREACHERS HAVE BEEN saying for a long time, but now they don't need to say it any more for a while, because scientific investigators, sociologists, psychiatrists, probation officers, juvenile court judges, all are saying the same thing: It is the home that makes, or unmakes, the boy and girl.

Juvenile delinquents, we are told by those who know, come from all sorts of homes, but not from homes where the parents live in harmony.

So it is not only for one's own sake that purity is an ideal to be cherished and lived out. It is for the sake of the rising generation, it is for the whole community's sake.

Do you want to know whether the next generation will be strong and good or weak and bad? Look into the homes where they are now growing up. The homes of today tell the story of the characters of tomorrow. And nothing eats out the heart of a home so quickly, no other serpent has so potent a poison, as impurity.

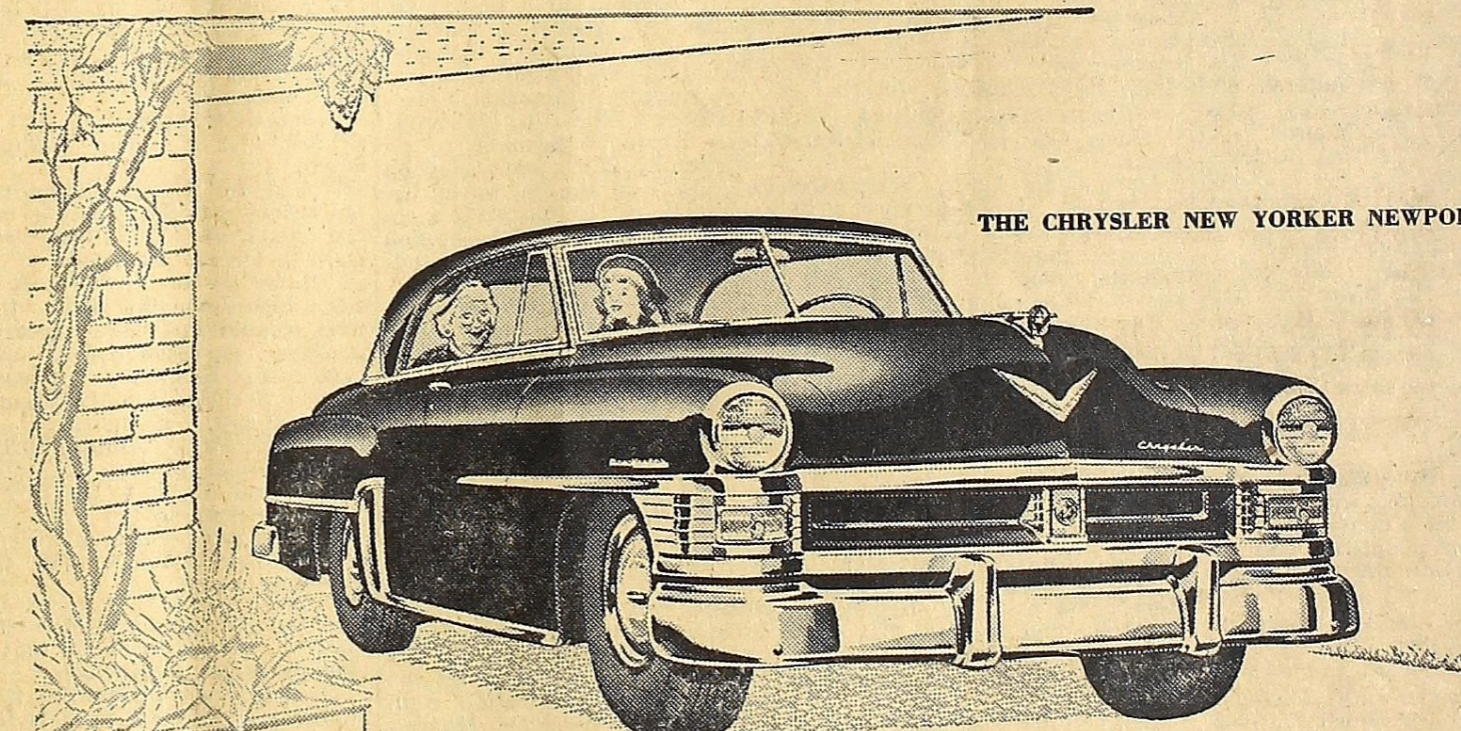

H. R. 565

In the House of Representatives January 3, 1951

Mr. Tackett introduced the following bill, which was referred to the Committee on Agriculture—

A Bill
Relating to the disposition of moneys received from the national forests.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the fourteenth paragraph under the heading "Forest Service" of the Act of March 4, 1913, as amended by Section 212 of the Department of Agriculture Organic Act of 1944 (U. S. C., 1946 edition, title 16, sec. 501) is hereby amended by adding at the end hereof the following new sentence: "Ten per centum of all moneys received from each national forest during each fiscal year shall be available at the end thereof to be expended by the Secretary of Agriculture for the development, maintenance, and operation of national forest recreational resources and areas, including wildlife resources."

Based on the national forest receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1951, the approximate amounts that the Tackett Bill (H. R. 565) if enacted, would make available for expenditure on the national forests in the north central states as follows:

The total exceeds the preceding year by about \$50,000. In most states the current receipts are running well ahead of last year's, and the amounts that would be available for the purposes covered by the Tackett Bill would be proportionately greater.

1951 Annual Report of the Iosco County Agricultural Agent, Home Agent and District 4-H Club Agent to the Iosco County Board of Supervisors.
The Cooperative Extension Service of Iosco County is a part of the United States Cooperative Extension Service which was created by the Smith-Lever Act of 1914. Subsequent acts of 1921, 1928, 1935, 1945 and 1946 have broadened the scope of extension work to include forestry, boys and girls club work, home economics, marketing, and consumer education, as well as that of agriculture. It is the greatest out-of-school educational program in the world. Its purpose is to bring the facts and the scientific knowledge from the research laboratory to the people of the land. Extension's most important contribution is that of helping the people help themselves. The approach is made through individual council, meetings, tours, demonstrations and organizations.

Nearly every county in the United States has the services of at least one agent and most of them now have the services of a County Agricultural Agent, a Home Demonstration Agent and 4-H Club Agent. The entire program is cooperatively financed by the Federal government, the State and the County.

The County Situation:
Harold R. Clark, the County Agricultural Agent is responsible for the extension service in the county and devotes the most of his time to work with adults in farming projects, tourist and resort improvement and community activities. Marvin Davenport, District 4-H Club Agent, divides his time between Iosco, Alcona, and Oscoda counties and devotes his entire time to youth activities. Miss Dorothy Scott, District Home Demonstration Agent who was assigned to this district of the same three counties May 1st devotes her time to home economics projects with both adults and youth. These three agents are employed by the Michigan State College.

Mrs. Herbert Wendt, office secretary, is the fourth member of the county Cooperative Extension Service staff. Her responsibilities are many. She receives all telephone calls, meets office callers, types all letters, news articles and reports, keeps all 4-H records, files letters and all reference materials. An important responsibility is that of receiving messages and giving out information when the agents are not in the office.

The salaries of the agents and travel expenses of the district agents are paid by the Michigan State College. The salary of the secretary, the travel expense of the County Agricultural Agent and the office expenses are paid out of the annual appropriations provided by the Iosco

Organized Iosco County Soil Conservation District. Acquired Home Demonstration Agent at no cost to county. Promoted 1st annual Farmer's Day. Promoted farm machinery clinic.

Assisted Northeast Michigan Hereford Calf Association in most successful sale in history. Conducted 3rd annual Tourist and Resort workshop. Continued expansion of telephone service.

Work in Home Economics: With the help of our "Iosco County Council of Women's Extension Groups," comprised of delegates from each of the six presently organized groups (119 members) the county program of activities has included:

Four Council meetings. Five training schools for leaders concerned with food preparation, using color in the home and life insurance topics.

Home Economics: With the help of our "Iosco County Council of Women's Extension Groups," comprised of delegates from each of the six presently organized groups (119 members) the county program of activities has included:

Observation is that few people other than organized woman's extension group members are aware that a home economics extension program for women exists or of what it consists.

4-H Club Work: What is 4-H Club work? Is it for little boys and girls? Yes from 10 to 90. Included in the 1951-4-H Club program were:

5 Community 4-H Clubs, 41 4-H Club leaders. 272 different young men and women members. 334 different projects. 478 project completions. 110 demonstrations and judging contests.

The Iosco County Department of Social Welfare submits herewith a report of its activities covering the fiscal year January 1, 1951 to December 31, 1951.

There has been no change in office personnel. In April, 1951, Mr. Cook, Area Representative of the State Department of Social Welfare audited our case records.

On several occasions I have been questioned by some of you regarding the financing plan in Public Assistance on a State and County level.

At the present time there are nine inmates at the Infirmary. All are persons who are homeless and require special care.

Due to the lack of facilities or personnel at our County Infirmary it is necessary that some of our clients be placed in Convalescent Homes. One new home has been added since our last report.

Hospitalization have failed and this program is still entirely a county responsibility. Due to rising living costs, irregular employment, etc., many families find it difficult to finance unanticipated hospital expenses.

Several months ago we placed in the hands of Mr. William Barber, Attorney, many hospital accounts due this Department which were long overdue.

Children under 21 years of age are hospitalized under the Crippled and Afflicted Children's Program, whenever possible.
