New Commandment

Lesson for June 29, 1952

WHICH of all the commandments is the most important? They kept asking this question century after century, and no one ever quite answered it before Jesus. It can easily be a puzzling question so long as you think of the Laws of God, as if they were a set of municipal regulations or by-laws of a club. They are not like that. They are all of a piece. When your tire is flat it doesn't make much difference where it is flat. If it is flat in one place it might as well be flat in a dozen places. The Ten Commandments are all linked together, indeed one can say much more than that. All the laws of God, everything God desires and orders man to do,—it is all linked in one.



Thou Shalt Love—

JESUS' answer to the old, old question about the "great commandment" was not absolutely original. Shortly before his time, a smart-aleck young man, so the story goes, had come to a great Rabbi named Hillel, and said to him: "The law is much too long and complicated. Can you tell me the law while I stand on one foot?"

"Yes," said Hillel. "Lift one foot up. Now: Love the Lord thy God with all thy heart . . . Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself . . . Now, put your foot down. That is the law; all the rest is commentary."

So Jesus quoted the same two laws that Hillel did,—from Deuteronomy 6:5 and Leviticus 19:18.

The link of the law is love; this is what ties all the laws together.

Two Kinds of Love

THE WORD "love" in English has been dragged around till at times it is very hard to tell what it means if anything. Girls love ice cream and boys love basketball and a movie actress claims she loves her fifth husband, and the preacher tells us we should love God. How can we use the same word for so many different things?

Now a famous Swedish Christian thinker named Nygren has written a book to straighten us out on this. He calls the book "Agape and Eros," this being the two different Greek words for "love." It's the same word in English for two different things; the Greeks knew better, and used two words that don't even look alike.

"Eros" means the kind of love girls have for ice cream or the movie actress has for her fifth husband. It is definitely not the word used in the New Testament where Jesus commands us to love God and our neighbor. "Eros" means possessive love, the love that wants to control and keep, the kind of love some parents have for their children when they do not want them to grow up or to make choices of their own.

"Agape" (Agahpay) is a quite different thing. It means self-giving, self-sacrificing concern for another person. You might have "eros" for an ice-cream cone, but not "agape."

Yet the great and distinctive point about Agape is that it does not insist on something or anything in return. It is not bargaining love, it is not careful, cautious love, it is free outpouring of life for life.

If you really want to know what "agape" love is, you must look at the Cross and consider that "while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8).

Love Is the Answer

ST. PAUL, who could just as well be called the Apostle of Love as St. John could, understood these things very well. He says that "love is the fulfilling of the law" or as J. B. Phillips happily translates it, "Love is the answer to the Law's commands." (Rom. 13:10.)

We shall never even want to obey the will of our Father in heaven unless we first love him. And we shall never really desire to treat our neighbor as God wants us to treat him if we have no "agape" love for him in our hearts.

Love is not a substitute for law. Love is rather the atmosphere in which we begin to understand God and our neighbor. Eros-love will not do; the Bible never once commands it and never commends it. It is only the outgoing, self-forgetting devotion, that Jesus taught and demonstrated, that is like the love of the true God. Whatever we may do, if we have no love, we have still done nothing.

New Books

For relaxing summer reading the county library has among their new books, "Friday, Thank God" by Fern Rives. F. T. G. is a kind of unofficial sorority into which every teacher is automatically initiated during her first week in school. Fern Rives has built a delightfully readable tale, new and fresh in the way it deals with a teacher's life and problems. She sets the keynote for her story in this amazing bit of description early in the book, "At the edge of the lawn was a long bed of pansies all facing in one direction. . . they had different expressions, like teachers at a faculty meeting, worried, smiling or just plain cross."

If you enjoy Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings' writings you will want to read "Jacob's Ladder." It is the story of a young couple in Florida's piney woods and their struggle for survival in the barren Florida scrub pine and sour orange trees, of their love, simple yet deeply felt. Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings has probed beneath the poverty, ignorance and isolation and found qualities to excite pity and admiration.

Marianne Moore's "Collected Poems" won the prize for the best collection of poems for 1951. Miss Moore is a modernist and a born collector, and draws her facts, curious and otherwise, from natural history, museums and art galleries. This volume contains poems published previously and a few hitherto unpublished poems.

Korea Vet Dies in Oscoda Crash

Killed While Landing on Air Base Field

Home Made Strawberry Ice Cream—A Summer Treat

Delicious home-made strawberry ice cream is a treat reserved for June and July. Ice cream that will be plenty rich and not using a custard base may be made with coffee cream. A recipe follows: Mix together 1½ quarts coffee cream, two quarts of washed and crushed berries, 1½ cups of sugar and a tablespoonful of vanilla. This amount will make 18 generous servings. For a freezing mixture, use eight parts of ice to one part salt.

Frozen lemon juice cubes are time savers in summer. They may be used for iced tea, lemonade, pie and any recipe calling for lemon juice. After squeezing out the juice measure two tablespoonful into plastic ice-cube trays and freeze. When frozen, the cubes may be removed from the tray and dropped into a cellophane bag for storage.

Is it possible to over-wash clothing? It certainly is. When the dirt has been loosened from garments, in a reasonable length of time, only harm can result from continued motion in the soiled water. Over-bleaching and over-washing are two laundry sins which many homemakers confess they want to overcome.

Oscoda to Have Dial Phones

A new way of "telephone living" will come to Oscoda on July 22 when the Michigan Bell Telephone Company inaugurates dial operation in the exchange.

T. C. Maher, manager here for Michigan Bell, announced the cutover plans this week.

At the time dial service goes into operation, all customers in the community will have new telephone numbers. Directories listing the new numbers will be delivered prior to the change-over.

The new numbers will carry the prefix "Seneca," followed by five-digits. A typical Oscoda number, for example, would be shown thus, SENeca 2-7373.

Maher said the new numbering plan was "an integral part of a modern dial telephone system," and that it would eventually make it possible for customers to dial their own long-distance calls direct to points all over the country. The plan, he continued, is already underway on an experimental basis in one New Jersey exchange.

"The operating capacity of the present three-position switchboard is reaching its limits," Maher said. "And the growth in the community, and the increased demand for service resulting from the U. S. Air Force Base has required that a larger central office be maintained. The new dial equipment is housed in the new building on the south side of Adams Avenue east of Lake Street."

Michigan Bell has made an investment of \$60,000 to bring dial service to Oscoda. In announcing the cutover, Maher reported that a luncheon will precede the ceremonies at 1:00 p. m. and civic officials will attend. In the evening, a public celebration will take place for townspeople and summer visitors.



FOR OUTDOOR FILM FANS

Let's get on with our lesson in outdoor photography—or how to increase your batting average in those snapshots. Just to refresh your memory we mentioned the importance of natural action rather than posed shots in last week's column. And we pointed out the essentials of good lighting when using color film.

Now let's tackle a big word—"composition." How does it apply in outdoor photography? It concerns the light and shadow balance in your picture, and the artistic symmetry, or framing. For instance you may be taking a picture of a fisherman casting from a rowboat. How can you "compose" your setting to make it most effective?

Watch the Background
The background or horizon is very important. Unless it's a silhouette shot an all-sky background is too monotonous. Find a bit of the shoreline with pretty trees growing in an irregular pattern. "Frame" your fisherman in the viewfinder so that his head and shoulders may be outlined against the sky while the rest of the body contrasts against the trees or distant shore. Then release the shutter at a moment that captures the feeling you get from the scene. If it's action you

want you must get the angler in the process of casting or battling a fish. If it's the peaceful serenity of a lovely lake that impresses you, snap your fisherman while he's lazily reclining on a boat seat.

Foreground Atmosphere
To give depth to your picture it's often a good idea to frame part of it through a leafy bower, or over the shoulder of someone close to the camera. Don't let this foreground material dominate. It should merely give atmosphere and depth contrast. Professional photographers who go for those "salon" shots often use archways in the foreground to point up some distant scene. You can do the same thing in effect, shooting over the stern of a speeding boat to get the pattern of a swirling wake, climbing a hill and using the corner of a jagged rock in the foreground to shoot your campsite far below, standing on a straight wooded trail, catching your companion in the distance waving, while the trees meet overhead to form a natural arch in the foreground.

Shots like this are memorable keepsakes of wonderful trips, and while they often take a little more time in planning and preparation they're more than worth it in recapturing fun of another vacation in Michigan Outdoors.

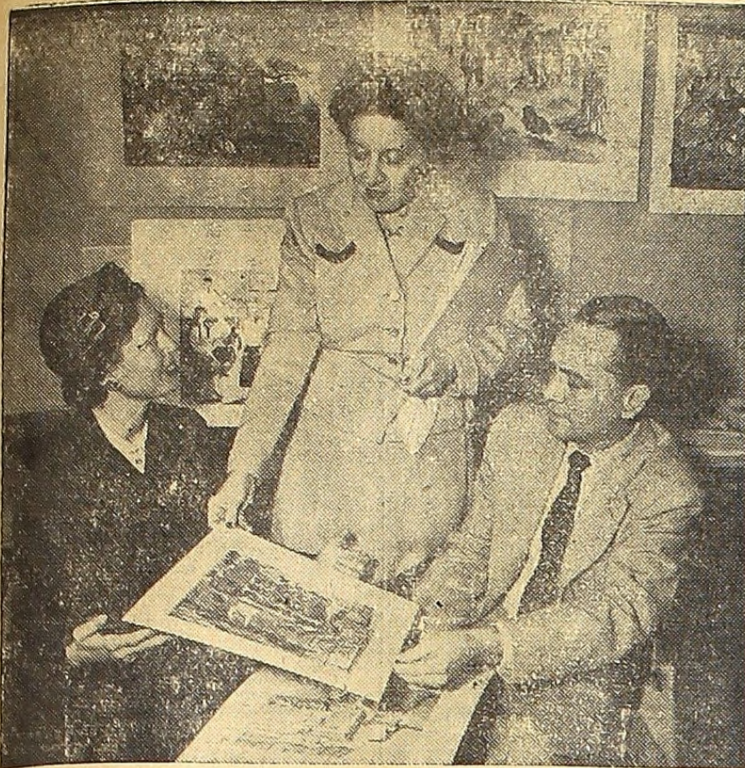

THE WASHINGTON Merry-Go-Round

Evita Peron

It isn't often that the illness of a nation's first lady can change the political life of a country, but that's what's likely to happen in Argentina.

Evita Peron, glamorous wife of the Argentine dictator, is dying. The lady who began life as a cabaret performer and rose to capture the love of the Argentine lower classes and the hate of the upper classes, has cancer. Doctors have warned that she cannot last the summer.

While it may not be pleasant, even for hard-bolled diplomats, to sit by and watch a woman die, nevertheless the capitalists of Latin America are coolly calculating what will be the effects of Evita's death on revolution and war.

Last fall she was operated on for a cancerous condition. In December her doctors came to the decision that she could not be permanently cured, put her on a careful schedule, advised that with rest and care she might live two years.

Evita obeyed the doctors' orders until the end of February. By then she was feeling so much better that she decided the doctors were wrong. Besides she got to worrying about her social aid foundation, her charities, and her work in the labor department.

On the night of May 24, however, following a small dinner at the presidential palace, Evita collapsed. The news was kept secret for 72 hours while extensive blood tests were taken. Then four physicians broke the news to President Peron that his wife had only weeks to live.

A meagre official announcement which referred only to the "recurrence of the first lady's previous complaint" was enough to set off a wave of demonstrations all over Argentina. Special masses were celebrated and pilgrimages to Buenos Aires were organized by Peronista workers.

But none of the loyal followers knew that their beautiful, sometimes ruthless patroness was on her deathbed at only 24. When they do, there will be upheaval in Argentina. And with her passing, part of the power of her husband will vanish.

Race for Connally's Seat

Congressman Lindley Beckworth of Gladwater, Texas, has been touring Texas in his car campaigning for the senate seat of the venerable Tom Connally. But Texas is a big state, Beckworth has had no money to speak of, and until last week the battle was uphill.

Beckworth's opponent, ambitious Texas Attorney General Price Daniel, got in the race early, seems to be well-heeled with campaign funds, and has talked learnedly of Chinese problems and Formosa that Texans are beginning to call him "the candidate from Formosa."

Last week, however, President Truman tossed a new angle into the Texas race, thereby inadvertently boosting the chances of congressman Beckworth.

The President, in explaining his veto of the Tidelands Oil bill, pointed out that, under the bill passed by congress, he had been given no chance to recognize the special rights of Texas, which came into the union under a special treaty following the Mexican War.

The President didn't say so, but what every Texan knew was that Texas Attorney General Daniel had made the decision to throw Texas' lot in with the other tidelands oil lobby, including Dr. Edward Rummely, once convicted as a paid German agent, and with Attorney General Walter Johnson of Nebraska, the paid representative of the tidelands lobby.

Had Daniel handled Texas' case separately, the President indicated, her treaty rights for off-shore oil would have received different treatment.

Since then, the sometimes discouraged horn on Congressman Beckworth's auto has seemed a little peppier as he tours the great plains of Texas.

Capital News Capsules

Koje Island Punishment—The senate armed services committee is not satisfied with the light punishment given to the Koje Island generals. At a closed-door meeting, committee members agreed that Generals Francis Dodd and Charles Colson got off too easy when they were busted to colonels. They also agreed to call all the principals in the Koje Island fiasco back to the states for stiff cross-examining.

What Next in Korea—British and American intelligence disagree on whether the Communists intend to launch a new offensive in Korea. American agents admit the Communists have reinforced their ground and air forces, but they don't look for any new attack. On the other hand, the British definitely believe this buildup is the prelude to a new gigantic offensive timed with a breakdown in the Korean truce talks.

CHERRIES ON THE MARKET LATER THIS SEASON

Michigan families who like cherries to eat fresh and to can or freeze will find them on the market a little later than usual, says Mary Bodwell, food economist for the agricultural economics department, Michigan State College. Usually we have plenty of cherries by the 4th of July. There will be some on the market then, but the peak of supply will probably come in the second week of July this year.

We'll have lots of cherries, though. From the estimates of growers—about 10 percent more red tart cherries and about 30 percent more sweet cherries than last year. That should make them reasonable in price for daily use during the season in fresh form or the ever-popular cherry pie.

Cherries should also be reasonable in price for canning and freezing. It is likely that you will be buying the Montmorency variety of tart cherries since the greatest percent of cherries grown in Michigan are that variety. Montmorency cherries are light colored and have nearly colorless juice. Another variety available is the Morello. The Morello is dark in color and has a dark red juice. The juice of the Morello cherry is more sour than the juice of the Montmorency and requires more sugar for canning.

Cherries may be bought by the pound, lug or 30-pound can. A lug or case weighs 25 pounds and makes about 30 pints for canning.

In many cases the 30-pound tin pack is more economical for canning and freezing than buying and pitting fresh cherries. This pack is already pitted and sweetened, Miss Bodwell says. Most frozen locker plants handle the 30-pound cans.

Plan to take advantage of the Michigan Cherry abundance this year to supply your family with an interesting variety of colorful fruit dishes that will be easy on the budget.

FHA MOVES OFFICE TO FIRE HALL AT WEST BRANCH

The Farmers Home Administration office of the United States Department of Agriculture serving Iosco County has moved their office from the Court House in West Branch, to the Fire Hall building in that city.

Russell N. Johnson, county supervisor for this FHA office, states this move will bring all agriculture agencies in that county under one roof, which should be of service to farmers.

Mr. Johnson also states that he hopes he can continue to spend at least a third of his time working with farm families in Iosco County. The supervisor reports that no drastic changes have been made in this agency's loan policies for the coming year. If adequate credit facilities are not available, this agency will loan to farmers for all farm operating needs from fertilizer, and seed to cows or tractors.

Long term credit loans needed to make farm building improvements or land purchase are also available.

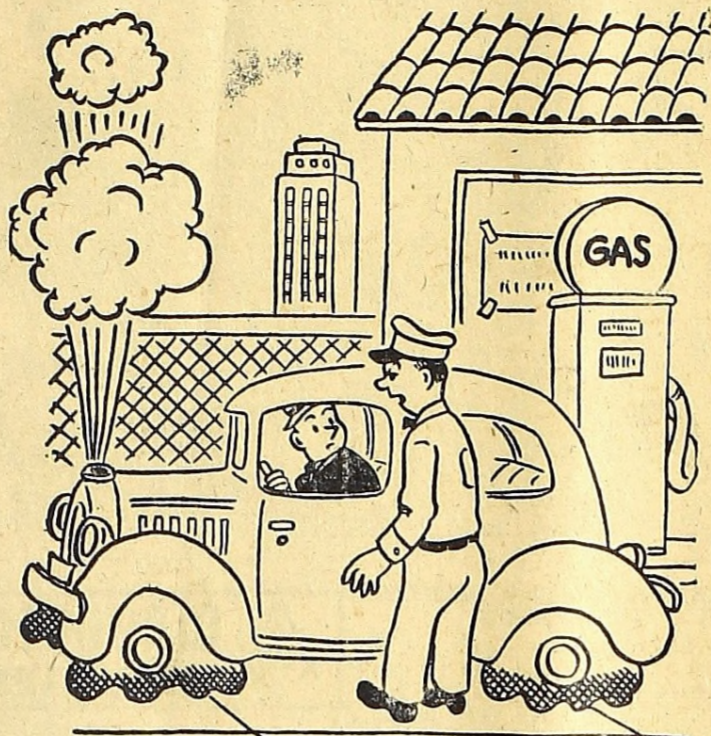

Time to Get Ready for State Fair

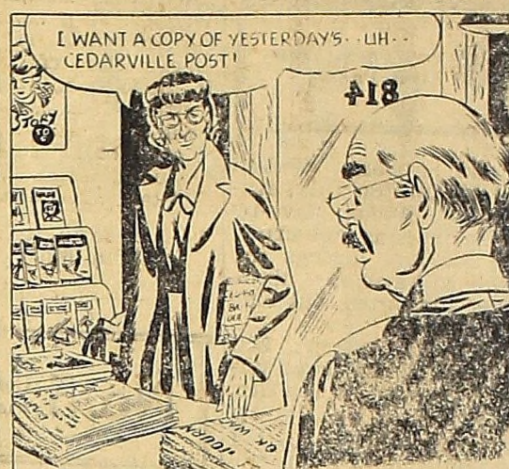
The \$1,000 agricultural display this year will feature Michigan certified seeds with all of the classes open to growers throughout the State.

One of the new classes opened this year will be devoted to raisers of Palominos and will feature breeding classes open to filifies and four year olds, and champions.

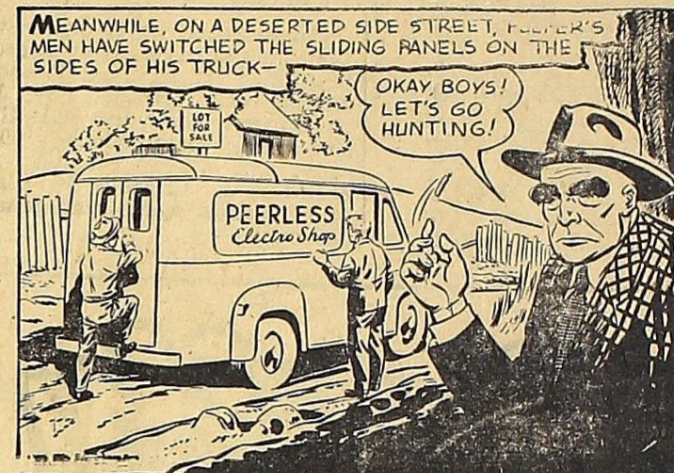

MICHIGAN VEGETABLES IN GOOD SUPPLY

Now is the season of the year when homemakers should make careful price comparisons between bulk and prepackaged fresh fruits and vegetables. During the homegrown season when Michigan fruits and vegetables are in good supply, the best buy is likely to be from a bulk display, says Ray Higgins, marketing specialist at Michigan State College.

The prepackaged produce is more likely to be a good buy during the winter and early spring months, according to Higgins. At that time prepackaging reduces freight costs and spoilage losses by more cents per pound than it stries for the same commodities from local sources during the summer.

Consumers like prepackaged produce because it saves time in shopping and often in preparation for cooking or serving. Grocers find that spoilage losses are reduced by a proper combination of refrigeration and packaging and their clerk's time is reduced per dollar of sales.

have been prepackaged for 20 years or more, but the rapid increase in the number of self-service stores since World War II has resulted in many more commodities being offered for sale in prepackaged form. Today a score or more of fresh fruits are usually available in this

manner. One of the newer developments along this line is the packaging of peeled potatoes cut into strips for French frying or into small pieces for quick boiling. The potatoes are treated with sulfur dioxide when packed to prevent them from turning dark for several days.

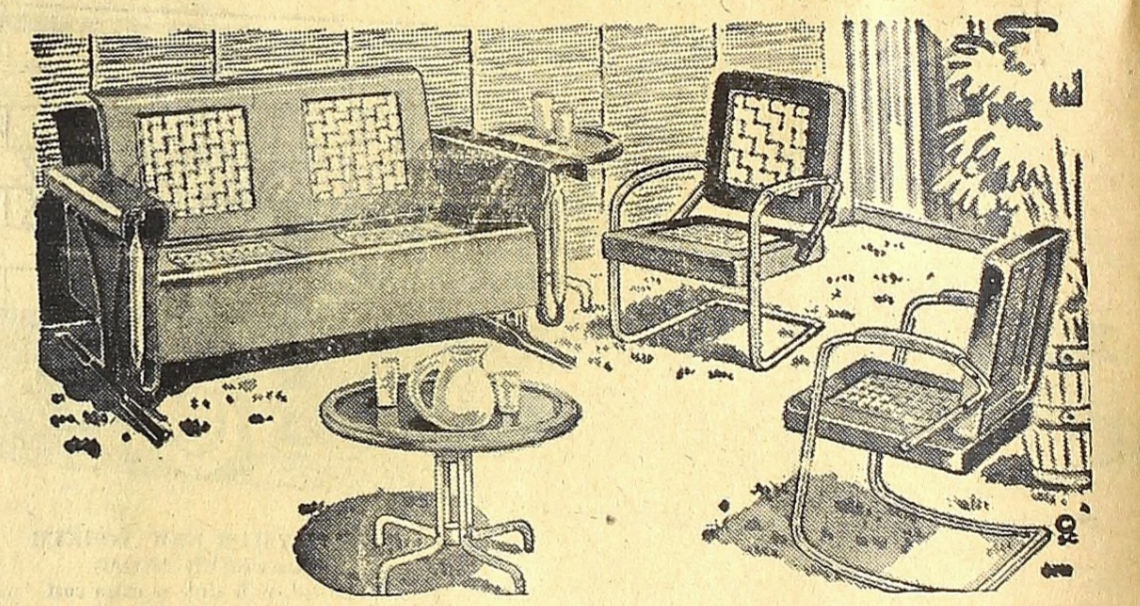

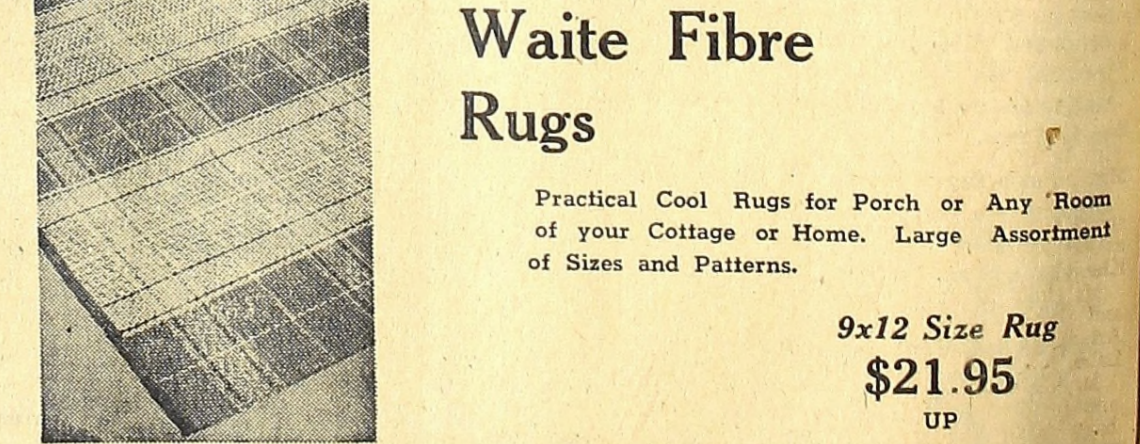
