She Led Men

Lesson for July 13, 1952

WOMEN complain that this is a man's world. Well, it's half a man's world anyhow, because about half the grown people in it are men. But that's not the point. Women complain because men are the boss-

es, men get the big salaries, men run the government. Women are teachers but men run the schoolboard, and so forth. As a matter of fact, it can be doubted whether women actually would like it the other way. Women

like men who are leaders, men with minds of their own, who can take hold of troublesome situations and straighten them out.

Wife, Mother, Judge

A NYHOW, Deborah was a woman like that. Her name means "Bee" and she was the sort of women who would somehow sting lazy or timid people into doing their duty. She is the only one of the "Judges" of Israel who was a woman,

Now some female heroines are a bit odd, to say the least of it. Take Joan of Arc, who was a kind of bee herself, and who took over when the rightful leader hung back. Joan was the kind of girl who could hear voices no one else heard. She was not exactly the kind of girl any man would feel quite comfortable with. And naturally she never marrie i. But this Deborah was a wife and

a mother. She made some man happy, she was a home-maker, children cuddled up in her lap.

When later she became a "judge" she had all the wisdom of common-sense and of normal experience as the basis of her other wisdom. She knew how mothers and home-makers feel. When it says that she "judged Is-

rael" it does not mean that she ran for office like modern judges, or that any king had appointed her, for there was no king to do it. It means simply that everybody respected her judgment so much that when there were problems more tangled and twisted than common, they would go ask Deborah what she thought.

She Didn't Like a Sissy

ON one famous occasion Deborah did not wait for the man to come; she sent for him. He lived far from her home, and his name was Barak. She put an idea into his head, only it was not her idea, she imed for it the authority of God.

Barak was to be a general, he was to recruit an army. She to'd him, there under the palm tree, where he was to get his army, where he was to take it and what to do with it when he got there.

Space does not permit the details that would show that Deborah's ideas were absolutely sound from a military point of view. She was a whole General Staff by herself. But Barak backed off from his

great opportunity. He would go, he said, provided she would go along. Now Deborah didn't like that. She liked a man who would go out on his own without having to have a lady at hand to tell him what to do. So she went: but she told him the journey would not be for his honor That, however, is another story. The point is that this Deborah was a woman so wise that the ablest man in the country at the time was not willing to do anything important without her advice.

Deborah's Daughters

DEBORAH was not the last woman whose wisdom and whose decisions have led men to success.

There are today in the United States women in congress, both in the senate and in the house; a woman is in charge of manpower; at least one woman is a U.S. circuit judge, the next highest in rank below the Supreme Court. There was a woman governor of Wyoming as far back as 1924.

But for every woman who make. the headlines and Who's Who, for every woman who has some official position, there are hundreds of others, un-nominated and unsung, who are known in their homes and in their home towns for their

unfailing good advice.
"Ask Mrs. ——" is the first thing the neighbors think when something comes up. And sometimes a wise woman's reputation doesn't even get around to the neighbors. Sometimes it is only her family that know how wise she is.



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Safeguarding Acheson

A S A result of the shooting down of two Swedish airplanes over the Baltic, the U.S. Air Force planned extra precautions when Secretary of State Acheson flew over trigger-happy Russian gunners into Berlin.

Acheson's Berlin visit was scheduled for the end of June, and, remembering how a French passenger plane was shot down by a Russian

fighter six weeks before, plus the wanton shooting down of two Swedish planes, the Air Force urged Acheson to let a dozen American jets accompany his plane through the precarious Berlin air corridor.

Meanwhile, intelligence sources say the Baltic Sea area, now the scene of Russian maneuvers, is one of the most strategic and heavily guarded in the world. This is where the Russians stage their most secret experiments with new rockets and Vbombs. Here also the Russians have taken over the important East German laboratories and factories at Peenemuende and Warnemuende where Hitler manufactured many of his most secret weapons.

In addition, Russia is reported to have more naval officers and men on full time today than the U.S., which supposedly has the biggest navy in the world. The Soviet now has about four times as many submarines as the United States and one more cruiser.

During Russian maneuvers in this 'hot' area, scores of fishing boats are seized, frequently without any excuse whatsoever, but on the suspicion that the fishermen are spies. Most of the fishermen, usually Swedish and Danish are subsequently released

Merry-Go-Round

Les Claypool, Los Angeles Daily News columnist, suggests that the Kefauver slogan should be "I Fancy Nancy"-a tribute to the Tennessee senator's lovely wife . . . Averell Harriman forces are also toying with a new slogan. It's "I Crave Oklahoma's Congressman Victor Wickersham is sending out so much campaign literature at the taxpayers' expense that some of his constituents are complaining. One man got 10 identical pieces of Wickersham literature in one mail delivery . . . Congresswoman Bolton of Ohio has introduced a bill providing for five million dollars to train nurses. The nursing shortage is getting acute.

Under the Dome

Congressman Barden of North Carolina, a Democrat, has been promised Republican support for his amendment which would wipe out all controls, even on strategic materials. With the Dixiecrat-Republican coalition firmly in the saddle, his amendment will probably pass. Administration forces in the house appear whipped and disorganized. This is partly due to absenteeism, partly due to the low prestige of the Truman administration. Even St. Paul himself, were he running the house of representatives, couldn't keep the Democrats in congress on week ends-without handcuffs and a shotgun. The congressmen promise the leaders they will be present to vote, but then take off Democrats have a numerical advantage of 32 members over the Republicans in the house, but there were more Republicans than Democrats on the floor when the house voted to kill price control . . While congress spends thousands of the taxpayers' dollars to pay for its own junkets to various parts of the world, congressional appropriations committees have just vetoed \$30,000 to pay for a Gold Star Mothers' pilgrimage to dedicate a war memorial in France. This represents 18 cents for every soldier killed on foreign soil in World War II, but congress thinks it's too much to spend in their memory.

Defending Formosa

Speaking behind closed doors in the senate armed services committee, General Cmar Bradley flatly refuted the loose talk that Chiang Kai-shek's forces could invade the Chinese mainland. He claimed that the Chinese Nationalists are in no shape to defend Formosa, let alone invade the mainland, without American ships and troops to back them

Chiang's navy, Bradley said, couldn't land more than a thousand roops on the China coast.

Senator Knowland of California demanded to know why Nationalist troops have not been used in Korea Bradley replied bluntly that Chiang's soldiers are barefooted. bedraggled, and demoralized, If we can ever spare enough supplies from our own army to renabilitate Chiang's army, Bradley said, it ought to be kept in Formosa any way. He argued that Formosa is more strategic even than Korea, and hat Chiang needs every soldier he can get to defend Formosa.
