

### Hero, Artist, Saint

Lesson for July 20, 1952

THE GREAT TRAGEDY of life is that man has three incompatible ideals. So says a famous thinker of our time. These three are the hero, the artist, the saint. The hero's virtue is strength; the artist's is beauty, and the Saint's is holiness.

A hero, in the course of his heroic acts, does things which would stain the honor of a saint and which are too ugly for a sensitive artist even to think about. Saints on the other hand are often most unheroic; they "wax valiant" in

Dr. Foreman submission, not in fight; and they often care very little for beauty. Artists likewise may be personal cowards and live anything but saintly lives. Yet society needs all three, though the values one cherishes may be just the opposite of what the other prizes. Very rarely, the same man may show traces of artist, saint and

Hero Gideon

THE WORD "judge" in the Book usually means what we would call a hero, a military man with a successful record. Then, as now, if a man made good in the army he was after thought of as an army man. His title and his rank stuck to him his life long.

We think of General Grant as an army man, and of Lee as another; though one was President of the United States and the other one a distinguished college president.

So Gideon comes down in history as one of the "Judges" who delivered Israel from a powerful enemy. This time the enemy was the Midianites, a roaring nuisance if ever there was one. Midianites were nomads, they lived where they pleased, and they lived off the peaceful farmers wherever they were.

There were so many that their army looked like a swarm of locusts. They were seen only once a year, but that was enough. They

would wait out in the wilderness until the crops were ready for harvest; then they would dash into the country, raid every farm from border to border, and skip out again, leaving the Israelites on the edge of starvation for another year.

How Gideon, a small farmer and timid soul by nature, became the nero who nearly exterminated the Midianites and set his people free, is one of the most fascinating tales in the Old Testament. The people oved him and remembered him for hat one thing above all: he could

Gideon the Artist

THERE ARE MORE WAYS than one to be artistic. General Gideon painted no pictures, carved no statues, wrote no poems. But he was an artist all the same. There is something artistic about any good workmanship , and it is as true of military campaigns as of everything

Incidentally, generals have a temptation to overlook this. At the Battle of Fredericksburg in the American Civil War, when the northern army was marching into the grinding trap which Lee and his generals had prepared, Lee remarked that it's a good thing war is so terrible, otherwise we should become too fond of it. He was speaking from the general's viewpoint, of course. The private is seldom in danger of being too fond of war.

At all events Gideon's campaigns were just as "beautiful" in all details as anything Napoleen, Lee, Hitler or Hannibal ever invented.

Can a hero be an artist? In his way, yes; like any other craftsman, he can do a necessary, rough and dirty piece of work in a way that calls out the exclamation: Beauti-

Saint Gideon

CAN A SOLDIER be a saint? If you mean by "saint" the ideal of what a Christian should be, most would say No. General Lee said at the end of his life that if he had it to live over again he would not be a

And still, the writer of the letter to the Hebrews in the New Testament does not hesitate to list Gideon, and even that half-hero Barak, right along with the rest in his list of high saints, the men and women of Faith.

For fundamentally it is faith that makes the saint. And Gideon was a man of sturdy faith. To paraphrase Tennyson, his strength was as the strength of ten, because his faith was pure. So there have been countless men whose profession is arms who have also been men of faith.







LAMPREY PROGRESS REPORT

Bad days are ahead for the Sea Lamprey in the Great Lakes. This blood-sucking destroyer of our most highly prized sports and food fish is losing its battle with man—its sole enemy. Scientists from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service are waging war on a big scale, anticipating adequate financing following President Truman's recent signature to a bill appropriating \$464,000 to finance the project. Where will the war be fought? All along the shores of the Great Lakes, in streams and rivers identified as sea lamprey spawning grounds after seven years of careful observation.

1952 Spawning Run Ended July marks the end of the lam-

prey spawning period, and biologists say the run in Lake Huron is about the same as last yeara little higher in Lake Michigan and Lake Superior. Electric fences and traps have established the count on selected representa-tive streams used for spawning, of which more than 200 have been designated thruout the entire Great Lakes. Before control of the lamprey can be expected all the 200 streams must be blocked off to the spawning predator—and this is going to take time and money.

Canadian Streams Problem

Along the north shore of Lake Superior sea lamprey have dis- Lakes.

almost inaccessible to man. These must be reached. Camps must be established. Electric fences must be constructed and installed in time for the start of the spawning run in April. Generators and heavy equipment must be delivered to the spot a big job that requires plenty of cooperation from the Canadian Government.

Electric Fence Nears Perfection A simple electric fence consisting of pipe laid across the bot-tom of the stream and dangling metal electrodes suspended above creates a lethal field in the water thru which the lampreys cannot pass. Inasmuch as they can spawn only in a stream, and die after spawning or attempt-ing to spawn, the blocking of these streams is a perfect control method. The fence installation may cost around \$2,000 for each stream, according to recent estimates.

Lake Superior First Battle Line In an all-out effort to save all that remains of Michigan's lake trout population the Fish & Wildlife Service will concentrate on fencing off 22 streams empty-ing into Lake Superior on the Michigan shore. The work is expected to be finished by next spring in time to meet the spawning onslaught of countless thousands of sea lampreys—vicious vampire of the Great



### Airbase Snag

The State Department has struck a snag with Dictator Franco of Spain regarding the much-discussed naval and air bases he was supposed to give U.S. forces in return for the \$187,000,000 which congress voted him.

When Ambassador Stanton Griffis discussed bases with Franco, about a year ago, he was effusive in his anxiety to do anything the United States wanted. In fact, it was Franco who took the initiative in wanting American cash and there seemed to be nothing he

wouldn't do in return. Now, however, he is just the opposite. He wants American dollars to be spent in Spain only on his own terms.

Specifically, the difference with Franco boils down to the fact that the U.S. Navy and Air Force want bases in Spain, while Franco wants modern military equipment for the

ment goes first to Korea, second to U.S. forces in this country, third to NATO allies in West Europe. Defense officials argue that to give Franco modern army equipment before we send it to France, Italy, Belgium, and other non-fascist allies would cause a furore in Western Europe. We are already far behind in our promises to them.

Furthermore, defense officials point out that they aren't much interested in the Spanish army anyway. Located on the southern tip end of Europe, it would be of no help in stopping the onrush of the Red army over France and Belgium to the English Channel. What they are interested in instead is air and naval bases in Spain. And regarding these, Franco now seems much less enthusiastic.





### CORN SHOULD BE SIDE DRESSED SAYS ROOD

ness Tuesday.

Some Michigan corn start showing signs of nitrogen starvation any day now, ac-cording to Paul J. Rood, Mich-igan State College farm crops specialist.

This nitrogen starvation will be shown by firing, starting at the tip of lower leaves. After the tip turns yellow the brownish sympton of lack of nitrogen moves up the mid-rib of the leaf. Rood says that corn needs an

xtra shot of nitrogen right now, unless a green manure crop was plowed down before, or barnyard manure applied at the rate of 12 to 20 loads per acre before this crop of corn.

Experiments by college farm

crops researchers have shown that you should side- dress corn about 200 pounds per acre sulfate of ammonia or 125 pounds per acre of ammonium nitrate. Either of these rates of application cost about \$8 an acre and should increase corn yields by about 20 bushels per acre on

the average.

Nitrogen is the plant food which produces growth and to really grow, Rood says corn needs enough nitrogen immediately. The corn has been cultivated two of three times, weeds are under control and the warm weather makes corn really want to grow, he says, so nitrogen w.ll pay off in profits.
