## Rifle Shot Disrupts Consumer Service; Causes Break in \$20,000,000 Water Main

### Thought to be Result of Target Shot

#### State Police are Making Investigation This Week

A break in the Saginaw-Midland waterline and a temporary interruption of Consumers Power service during the week-end occurred when a high tension transmission line east of Mio was severed by a hunters bullet.

The temporary break in power and light service was over a wide area of Northern Michigan. The break was only for a short period except in the Gaylord territory.

The interruption in power at the Midland-Saginaw intake pumping station at Whitestone Point caused a quick influx of water into the line when the power was renewed. A wave in the huge pipeline caused a break at a weak point at Fisherville. The break affected residents in the Midland and Saginaw and along the Bay City road.

An acre or more of land at Fisherville was covered with six to eight inches of water from the break.

Target shooters were held responsible for the break in the high tension line at Mio. State Police are investigating.

Consumers Power said this was its third such experience since the deer season opened. In both the new week-end incidents overhead wires were shot up, apparently deliberately.

One hundred state long distance telephone lines were put out of action by a shotgun blast which severed a main cable near Kalamazoo. Another 50 interstate circuits were down, according to Michigan Bell.

All long lines out of Detroit to upstate Michigan went out of action. Twenty-four pairs of wires were damaged, the company said.

### Install New Boxes At Postoffice

#### Will Do Away with Old Style Call Boxes

The much needed mailboxes at the Tawas City Postoffice are expected to be installed this week-end according to an announcement made by Mrs. Lydia Bing, Postmaster.

The three sections of new boxes were delivered to the postoffice several weeks ago.

Postoffice Inspector Arthur Beyer of Saginaw was here Friday for the routine general inspection of the postoffice. While here he made arrangements with Mrs. Charles Moeller, owner of the postoffice building, for the installation of the boxes. Installation of the boxes will require a remodeling of the lobby and work space in the office.

The number of boxes in the office will be doubled by the arrangement, and should provide facilities for the city's growth for several years.

The three new sections give the office five sections with a total of 339 lock boxes. The call box service with 128 boxes will be discontinued.

There is a relationship in proper housing and quantity and quality milk production. The subjects will be pertinent and should help dairymen who are faced with the problem of expansion and improving their milk market.

### Hunters Have Fair Luck Only During First Two Days

"Hunters had fair luck during the first two days of the 1952 hunting season, but since that time few deer have been killed," stated Conservation Officer Arthur Lietz Wednesday. "This was partly due to rainy weather conditions, but as a matter of fact, there are fewer deer in the woods."

"Last winter was very severe on the deer herd," Lietz said. "Large numbers died from starvation. Swamps are drying up and cedar and other deer browse are disappearing. The large areas of oak, which furnished much food, are being replaced by dense growth of pines."

Only two permits to farmers to kill deer for the protection of the crops were issued during the past crop growing season. In previous years as many as 12

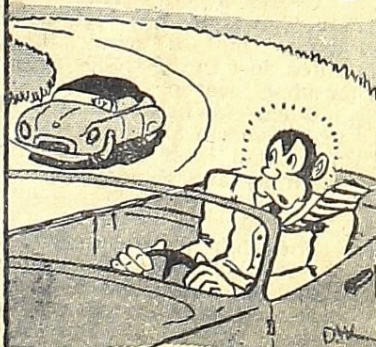

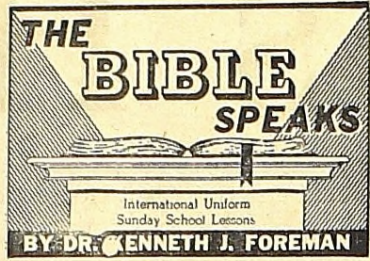

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 12. DEVOTIONAL READING: Ephesians 5:11-20.

**What Makes Right?**

Lesson for November 30, 1952

WHAT makes right, right? It cannot be determined by counting votes. The voice of the people is not necessarily the voice of God.

Even if everybody in the world did exactly what is right (which has never happened in this world yet) it still would not be right merely because they all did it. If "right" meant nothing more than what everybody does or what most people do, then right would change as often as popular opinion changed. It would change with the climate, with the calendar. But right is something more enduring than popular opinions, customs or enthusiasms.

**Does "Right" Mean "Legal"?**

Another notion of what it is that makes right, is Law. If it's legal it's right, if it's illegal it's wrong. But haven't we often heard the expression, "There ought to be a law...?"

The person who says that there is something which is right that isn't legal; he wants a law to match what is right. Or again, laws are sometimes repealed. But no one would ever vote to repeal a law if he didn't think the law was wrong. Good men sometimes repeal laws; but no good man ever wanted to repeal "right."

There is a variety of this idea which has more truth in it: namely, that right is the same thing as the law of God. But God does not make acts right or wrong simply by ordering them to be so.

Could God have said, Thou shalt kill, thou shalt bear false witness? Could he have said, Thou shalt hate thy God and hate thy neighbor? Of course not. He could not have made up such nonsense-laws, such wicked commandments, because he is not that kind of God, for one thing, and for another thing because if he did, it would have meant the destruction of the human race. Although right, and the will of God, are really the same thing, yet an act is not right because God wills or commands it because it is right.

**How Jesus Looked at It**

How did Jesus our Lord stand on this question? What made a thing right, for him? He got into trouble with the lawyers of his time, and he got into trouble with what we would call D.D.'s and prominent preachers and professors of theology (the Pharisees); they called him "bad" and had him executed accordingly.

So there was evidently a difference between his way of looking at "right" and their way. It was precisely on this point that they split. Jesus tried to make clear, though the Pharisees were too blind to see it, that the Sabbath law, any law of God or good rule of man, is right and good only in so far as it promotes the welfare of man. This is not setting up man above God, for God is man's Creator. Right is what develops God's children; wrong is what stunts, deforms, defeats and destroys them.

To put it in another way: The test of right and wrong is always this: Will this thing make people better and make better people? If so, it is right. All our laws, institutions and interests must be brought to the test of their effect on human welfare. And of course, in Jesus' view, the welfare of man includes social, spiritual and mental well-being and growth, not physical health and financial wealth alone.

**Liquor and Welfare**

This being Temperance Sunday, it is a good time to think about the liquor traffic in the light of all this. Think it out for yourself. Remember, alcohol is a habit-forming drug, and all talk about liquor cannot erase that very plain fact.

Now think about the whole business of making it, glamorizing it in advertising, selling it and using it. Look around you in your home community, and in our nation at large, and ask: Does it bring more benefit to people in your community than it brings harm? Is the purpose of the business human welfare?

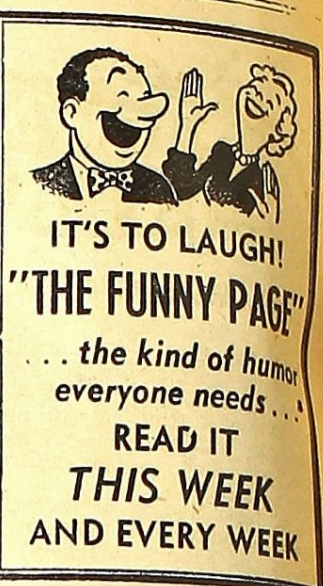
Ask the welfare agencies in your community—the Red Cross, the hospital, the agencies that look after the poor, the orphanage, and so on—ask these people: Does the liquor business make your work easier? Is the liquor trade the ally of the public school and the church? Does it make better citizens, better Christians? If it does, and only if it does, then as a Christian can you call it right.

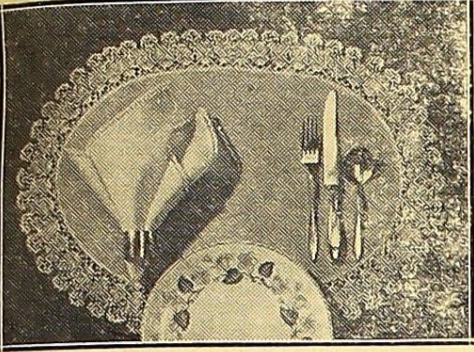

### DHIA REPORT

Clarence Carpenter, supervisor for the Iosco Dairy Herd Improvement Association reports that D. H. I. A. members did a good job in maintaining a high level of production during October while most dairymen were having a slump. The reason is improved management. The dry and cool weather has rendered pasture less productive so the alert dairymen have been feeding silage and hay to supplement the poor pasture.

The 198 cows in the 14 herds had an average production of 816 pounds of milk and 29.6 pounds of butterfat. The high herd for this month was the Charles and Raymond Kobs' herd of 21 Holsteins that average 1028 pounds of milk and 35.7 pounds of butterfat, per cow. The Arthur Povish herd of 22 registered Holsteins nearly tied the Kobs' herd with 1023 pounds of milk and 25.4 pounds of fat. Prescott and Campbell and Charles Timreck herds deserve honorable mention with their production of 34.7 and 31.7 pounds of fat respectively.

Beautsue, a registered Holstein owned by Arthur Povish, topped the association by producing 2360 pounds of milk containing 87.3 pounds of fat. Paul, a registered Holstein owned by Prescott and Campbell was also in the ton milk per month class. She produced 2050 pounds of milk and 71.8 pounds of butterfat.

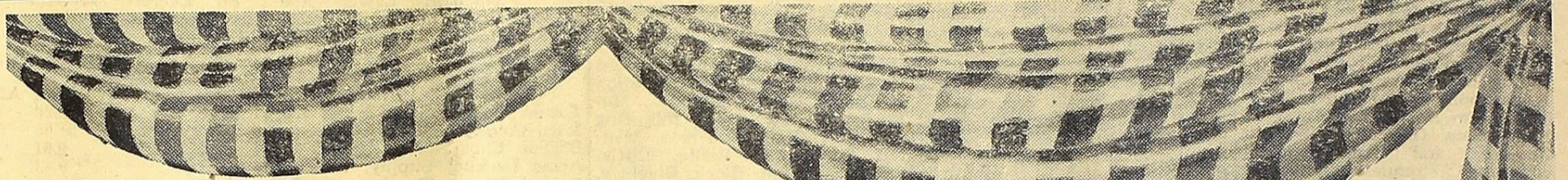

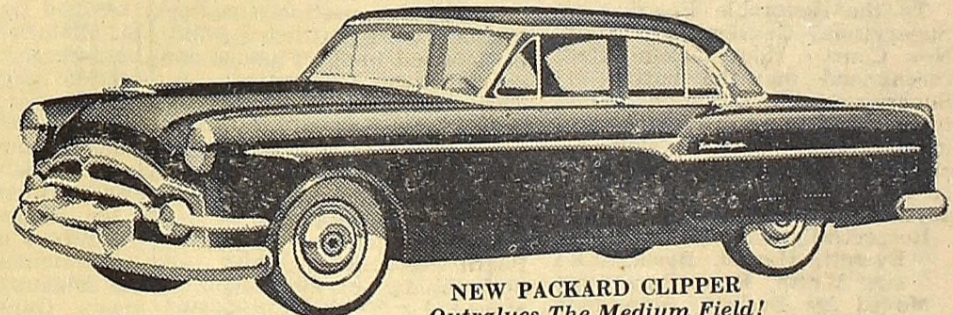

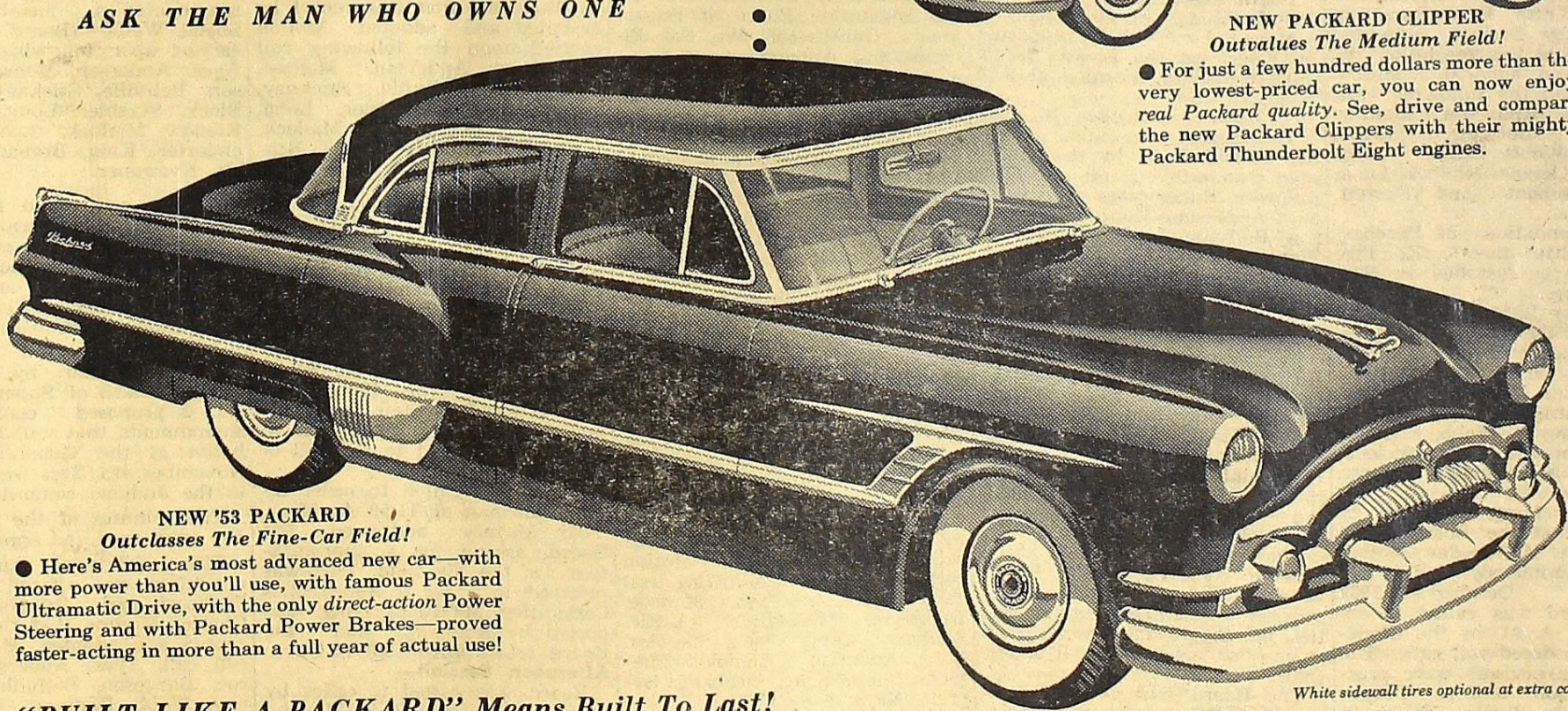

# Supervisors' Proceedings

October Session October 13, 1952

Reading of the minutes of the two special sessions viz: State Tax Commission hearing and opening of the bids for the new Courthouse, were waived by unanimous vote.

We consider this system of appointment very Undemocratic and not in keeping with the intent of the act creating the Administrative Board which has withstood the test for the past thirty years. And Further, we are aware of the many and varied conditions as the law stands, to which these candidates not receive their nominations at the State Convention, also realizing full well the power to nominate is the power to elect.

WE HEREBY RESOLVE, that the Michigan Legislature amend the present Primary Election law so we the people of the State nominate these four candidates at Primary Election, ur, Attorney General and Auditor General as we do the Governor. 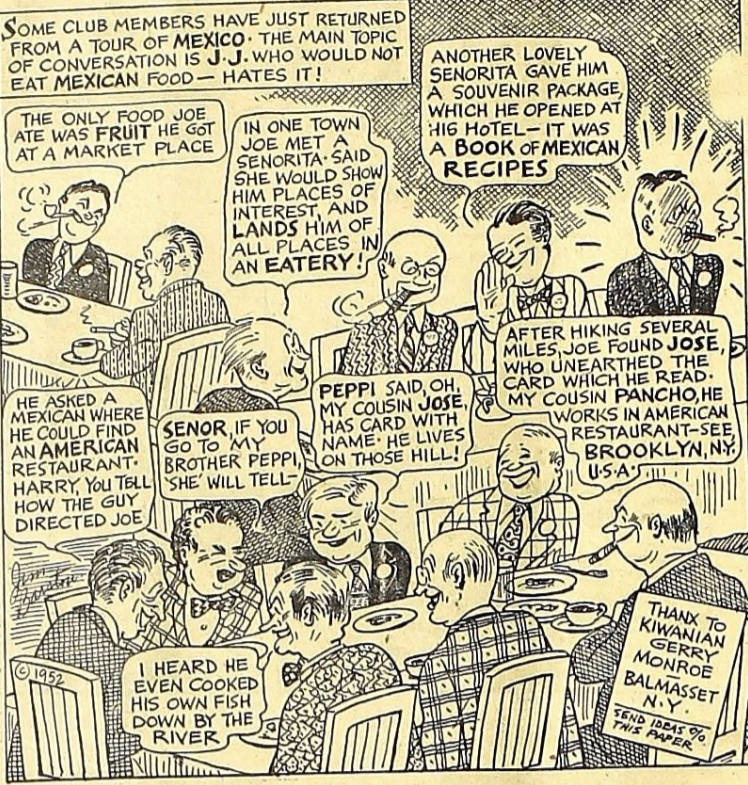
The purpose of the essay contest sponsored by the Michigan Tuberculosis Association is to make people aware of the dangers of tuberculosis.

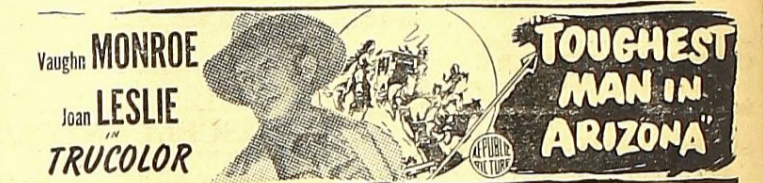

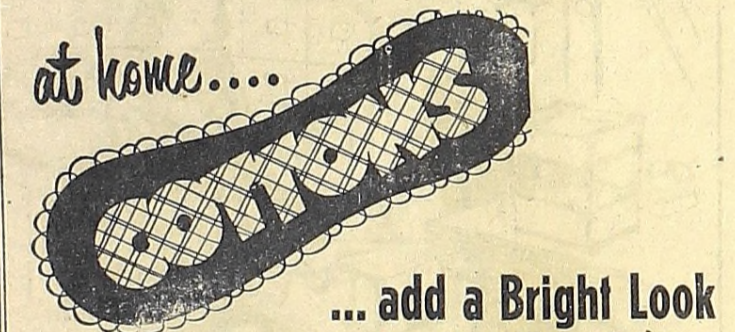

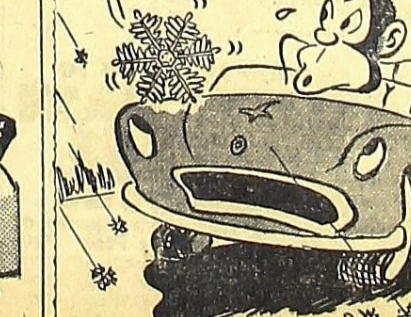
