Methodists Would Build Addition to Tawas City Church

Board Names Committee On Plans

Project Would Provide Sunday School Room, Dining Facilities

For several months the Tawas City Methodist Church has been discussing a project to build an addition to the present church building. The official board recently approved the appointment of a committee on plans consisting of Wilbur Roach, H. Read Smith and Fred Marsh. As soon as their work is finished the plans will be put into the hands of a down state designer. The congregation will be called to review plans and then to take the next steps in additional committee work. A district committee will be sent in to review the plans before construction begins.

For many years the church program has been hampered by lack of needed facilities. The several Sunday School classes have all met in one room. Social times, fellowship dinners and group parties have been held in the sanctuary after the moving of pews and other furniture. Many activities have been impossible.

The addition, to be attached to the south side of the present building, will include rest rooms, Sunday School space, kitchen and dining area. It will be adaptable to social and recreational needs.

1953 will be the 80th year the congregation has worshiped in the present building. The new project will be part of the anniversary celebration.

Construction will begin as soon as practical in the spring.

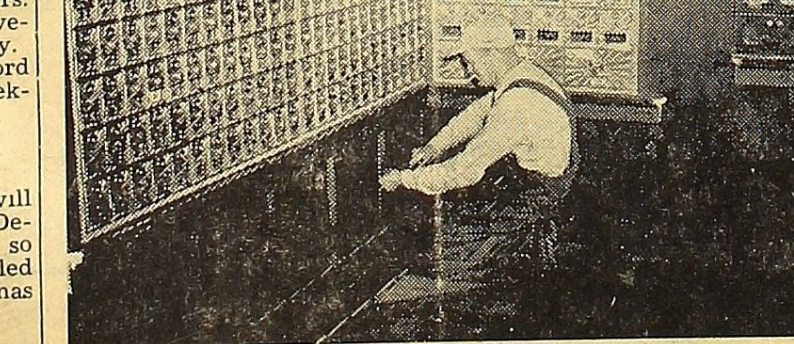
Supreme Court Affirms Net Seizure Decision

The state supreme court, in a decision handed down Tuesday, affirmed the seizure of illegally used fish nets in the case of the state conservation department against Norman, Melvin and Ernest Brown, doing business as the J. L. Brown Fish Company of Tawas City, which was heard by Circuit Court Judge Herman Dehnke of Harrisville.

The nets in question were seized August 14, 1949, by Conservation Officer John LaFear. It was maintained that the nets had been set in more than 80 feet of water.

Veteran Legislator Succumbs Tuesday

Hon. Alexander M. McKay, veteran member of the state legislature and well-known here, died Tuesday night at the Tolfree Memorial Hospital at West Branch. At one time Iosco county was part of his legislative district.

Born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, January 13, 1881, he went to the West Branch area when he was a boy of 13. He entered the jewelry business in 1900 at West Branch. This business he conducted for over 50 years. Before being elected representative in the state legislature he had served 14 years as postmaster at West Branch. He served eight consecutive terms in the legislature.

He was a devoted public servant and had taken a keen interest in conservation and matters pertaining to the welfare of Northern Michigan.

Mr. McKay was stricken during the last session of the legislature, but had regained some of his former vigor. Last week he was taken to the hospital where he steadily grew worse until he lapsed into a coma.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon (Friday) at Trinity Church, West Branch. Rev. Samuel Outter will officiate.

Last rites at the Brookside Cemetery will be under the auspices of the West Branch Masonic Lodge.

Ex-Iosco Man Writes NBC's "Big Story"

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 14.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Psalm 27:1-6.

Fear or Faith

Lesson for December 14, 1952

"FEAR was the first creator of Gods," wrote a long-ago Roman poet. This was more or less true of all religions he could have known about. It is also true of most religions around the world.

An ex-Buddhist who had once trained for the priesthood in his own religion, said of his childhood, "All I knew was that there were 800 gods and I was afraid of them all."

The characteristic feature of most religions is the appeasement of angry, capricious or vengeful gods. Sometimes the terror is without rhyme or reason, as in the case of the Buddhist boy just quoted. Sometimes the terror has a moral base and reason, as the great Greek poet Aeschylus portrays in his plays—the terrors of a man of guilty conscience fleeing from the gods who do not forget nor forgive.

What Makes Men Afraid?

In Matthew's story we have illustrations of what men fear. Herod, for example, was a superstitious man. He was afraid of John the Baptist, and later afraid of Jesus because he thought he might be John again, risen from the grave. Herod was an example of the man who fears whatever he does not understand. A horse will shy at a piece of paper more than at more dangerous things. Horses now

adapts pass cars (or rather, cars pass them!) and the horse does not so much as prick an ear; but in the days when cars were rare, horses would go wild at the very sight or sound of one.

People are like that; grown men are often no more than grown-up children, still afraid of the dark. Then Herod also is an illustration that men are as it were afraid of their own shadows. That is to say, as Shakespeare puts it, "Conscience doth make cowards of us all." Or as the Psalmist said long before Shakespeare: "The wicked flee when no man pursueth."

Many of our fears would never exist if we had lived as we ought to have lived. Men live in fear of exposure, fear of blackmail, fear of failure and defeat, often through no one's fault but their own. Then the disciples too were afraid. They were not superstitious, they were not haunted by their sins, but they were afraid in the storm, they feared the wind and waves.

Why Christians Are Brave

Students of the Bible have discovered that the word "fear" is usually tied there to another word: Not, Fear not, is one key-note of both Old and New Testaments. The reason for this is plain. Christianity is the religion of love: love to God, love to one's neighbor. Not mere good will or kindly feeling, but active, self-forgetful love. "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casteth out fear," as St. John said.

Old writers, commenting on the story of Peter's sinking in the sea, have said that if he had kept his mind on Jesus instead of on himself and on the storm-tossed waves, he would not have cried out, "I perish." Certain it is that when we are self-centered we are sure to be tormented with fear, for we are always thinking what may happen to us—and of course plenty can.

If we keep our minds on our work and on the fact that God is our Father, if we remember morning, noon and night that the God who "so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son" is the same God who created this universe and controls it, then we shall not be scourged with fears.

Courageous Christians

It is a tremendous mistake to think that Christianity is only for rabbit people, for mice and not men. Christ does something for even such persons, it is true; he takes them clear out of themselves. Remember the long roll of the early Christian martyrs, very humble people most of them, who died horrible deaths rather than deny their Master; remember such saints as the missionaries who converted our own savage ancestors, at great peril to their own lives; remember the missionaries of our own time, some of them suffering torture and all of them distress, yet not giving up. The ordinary Christian missionary has more to be afraid of than most of the rest of us have; yet he has less fear. He knows God too well.

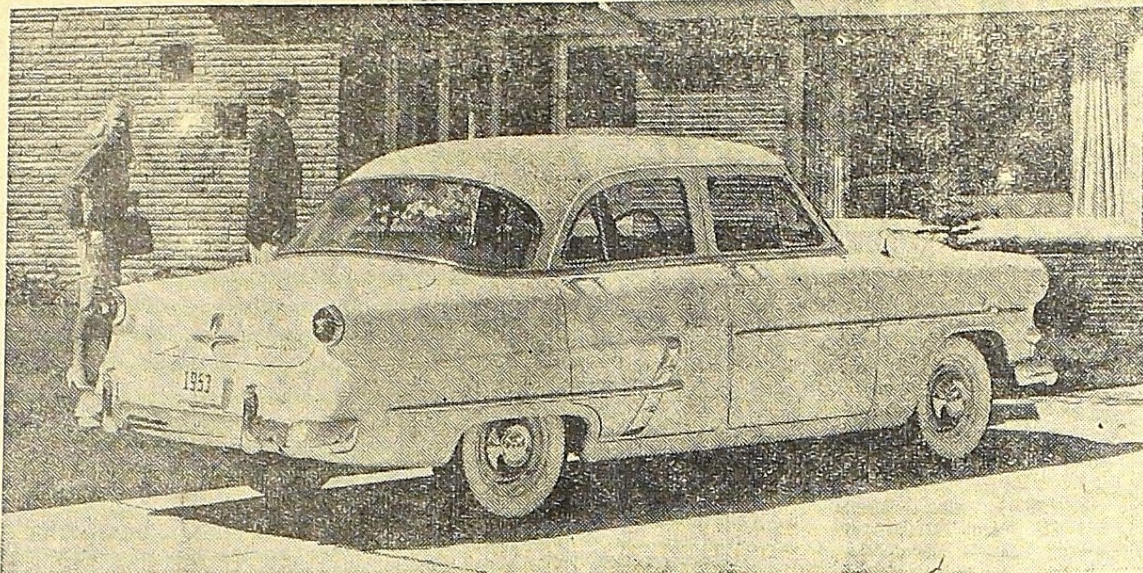
Plan Cherry Pie Contest

If it is apple pie you want, then between the crusts put Northern Spy, Rhode Island Greening and Stayman Winesap. Other varieties make good pies, but we are speaking of the excellent apple pie.

Munching an apple is a pleasant and relaxing work, a relaxing habit, and a nice addition to the diet. So eat Jonathans, Golden Grimes, McIntosh Red, Cortland, Red Delicious, Snows and Steel's Reds.

Baked apple, that queen of desserts, calls for Jonathans, Stayman Winesaps or Wolf River apples.

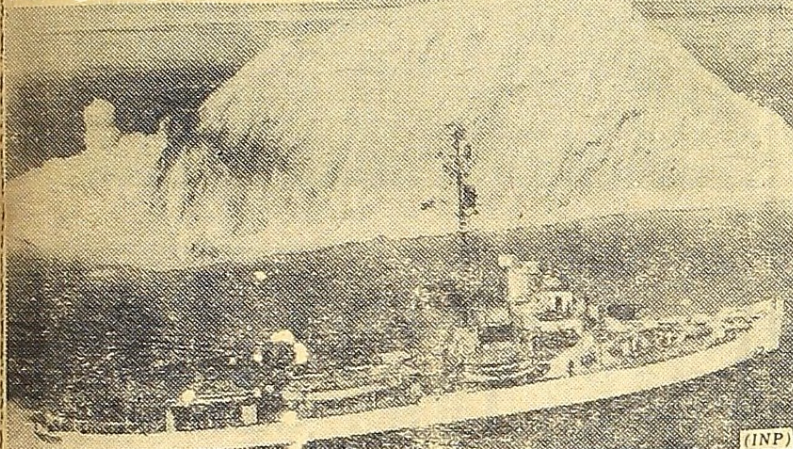

Christmas Tidbits

... FOR GIVING and FEASTING!

Tuutti-Fruitti Candy
1 pound raisins
¼ pound walnut meats
1 pound dates
1 pound figs
1 pound prunes
Confectioners' sugar

Soak prunes ever night. Steam until they are soft and remove stone. Wash the figs, steam them 20 minutes. Wash the dates and remove the stones. Put the fruit and nuts through food chopper. Put the confectioners' sugar on board and with the hands work the fruit and nuts until well blended. Roll to about one-quarter inch thick using sugar to dredge the board and rolling pin. Cut in any desired shape, roll in sugar, pack in layers in a tin box.

Steamed Date Pudding
1 pound dates
½ pound suet
3 cups bread crumbs
¾ cup sugar
1 egg, beaten
½ cup milk
4 tablespoons flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
Grind dates and suet very fine. Mix with bread crumbs and add sugar. Add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Fill greased pudding mold two-thirds full, cover tightly and steam 2½ to 3 hours. Serve hot with Caramel, Custard, Orange or Vanilla Sauce.

Prune Chiffon Pie
1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
¼ cup cold water
1 cup chopped cooked prunes
¾ cup prune juice
½ cup sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
2 egg whites stiffly beaten
1 baked pastry shell
Soften gelatin in water 5 minutes. Combine prunes, juice, sugar, salt, lemon juice and rind, and heat to boiling. Remove from heat, add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool. When slightly thickened, fold in egg whites. Pour into pastry shell and chill. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

Baked Stuffed Apples
6 large tart red apples
1 cup chopped bananas
1 cup cranberries
1 cup brown or maple sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Chopped nut meats
Whipped Cream
Cut off the stem end of apples, but do not peel them. Remove all the core and part of the pulp, leaving the walls of the cup about ¼ inch thick. Mix bananas, cranberries, sugar and cinnamon. Fill the cavities in the apples with this mixture, cover with chopped nut meats, and bake in the oven (350-375 degrees F.) until tender. Serve cold with a spoonful of whipped cream on top of each apple.

NEW SANATORIUM AT GAYLORD
"When the new 50 bed addition is opened at the Northern Michigan State Sanatorium at Gaylord, we should be able to promptly hospitalize Northern Michigan tuberculosis patients," Dr. Joseph L. Egle, medical director, declared this week.
In a progress report on the new construction, the doctor said added hospital quarters for the north will increase the likelihood of recovery for more patients. Tax money used in building the addition and Christmas Seal contributions used in

studying and reporting on the need will be "dollars spent wisely and humanely," he declared.
Commenting on the current Christmas Seal Sale, the north's well-known tuberculosis specialist reported that proceeds "will help press the search for still better tuberculosis treatment methods." Intensive medical study, he said, "is another of the services Michigan people help buy when they buy Christmas Seals."

fluence as a trading area. We have been negligent of our farm people who are citizens of the area.

"Today's farmers are not only citizens of the community they are businessmen. Many of them with a larger investment in their business than some of our merchants in town. A Farmers' Day is not enough. They should be members of our chamber with a voice in what they want their future community to be."

Wood spoke of the several manufacturing industries of Tawas and pointed out the need of increase in the phase of the business life of the area. He said, "As the tourist business became one of the big industries of Michigan, Tawas was a natural and we find today that Iosco county ranks third in the state in vacation business. We must never discount the importance of the tourist business to us. A quick glance at our sales tax returns for the summer months is evidence enough. We have, however, learned that our summer business is not enough on which to base a sound economy. We can not hope to do in nine weeks what California and Florida have found it impossible to do in a nine months season. Even the heavy tourist cities in those two states have found they must have year around industry to balance their economy."

THE WASHINGTON Merry-Go-Round

BY...DREW PEARSON

THE DAY the hydrogen bomb explosion was announced, I happened to go to church. I say "happened" because a television program and a radio broadcast both coming on a Sunday ordinarily make it hard for me to go to church.

But the telecast is being switched to Wednesday, so I surprised Mrs. P by taking her to church, where I listened to Rev. John R. Anschutz preach a sermon on prayer. Knowing that the hydrogen bomb announcement was due to be made later that day or the next morning, I did quite a bit of thinking about prayer, and the fact that maybe if we had relied more on prayer and the things that go with prayer, we wouldn't be in the predicament of building bomb shelters and going underground for fear of explosions that could burn up our civilization.

Over at the Alexandria, Va., church where George Washington used to worship, Rev. O. V. T. Chamberlain chose as his closing hymn: "The day thou gavest, Lord, is ended."

That expressed some thoughts of mine, too.

For the day the Lord gave us could very well be ended if we and the Russians ever get to trading hydrogen bomb blows across the Arctic.

Bombs vs. Ideas

On the other hand, I also figured that bombs never killed an idea, and our greatest natural resource is not plutonium or tritium, but our moral and spiritual strength. Religion and communism cannot survive together. But one trouble is that religion has got to mean more than a refuge from ruthless force. It must be a pattern for life, not a ritual for one hour on Sunday.

Another trouble is that men of all faiths and of little faith have been seeking ideas to defeat communism, when right around the corner the best idea of all is being neglected — The Sermon On The Mount, given us 2,000 years ago as a daily guide for living with each other.

The big trouble, of course, is to get that daily guide adopted not only here, but also behind an iron curtain where religion is barred and where we can't even mail a package.

Breaking Iron Curtain

I have tried, in what feeble ways I could, to show that the iron curtain was not as impenetrable as it's supposed to be. I once traveled along it from Turkey to Berlin showing up its loopholes; and in cooperation with the Crusade for Freedom I helped float 11,000,000 leaflets via balloons into Czechoslovakia and Poland.

These at best were puny efforts, though they showed, from the reaction on the other side of the iron curtain, how eagerly its people welcome contact with us.

Today, however, we have two opportunities which need not be puny. First we have a new and powerful hydrogen bomb, thereby giving us tremendous bargaining power to break down the artificial barriers preventing peace.

Second, we have a new president. He is a man of great prestige, known throughout the world and in Russia. And he has what Franklin Roosevelt had, a flair for dramatics, the ability to win people, to capture their imagination. Whether you agree with him politically or not, Eisenhower is and can be an international salesman. And that's what's needed today in selling the world new instruments for peace.

It is always possible at the beginning of a new administration to form important, new and dynamic policies.

That's because outgoing leaders become jaded and get in a rut. Our present outgoing leaders have put across some milestones against communism for which historians will give them great credit.

But the sheen is off these policies now. They are shopworn and lack luster. They still form a firm foundation on which to build for prosperity and peace. And on them a new administration can build bigger things—if it has courage and imagination.

Seldom in history has a new president come into office when the peoples of the world has reached a lower ebb of despondency, when the danger of total war was potentially greater, and when there was placed in the new president's hands greater bargaining power—the hydrogen bomb.

In another year that bargaining power may be gone. The Kremlin by then may have the H-bomb. But until then a new leader with courage, imagination, conviction has a heaven-sent opportunity to reopen the Baruch plan for the control of atomic energy, and simultaneously open up the iron curtain to American truth, culture, and the American people.

If the latter can be done, the Korean war and all kindred problems will automatically solve themselves.

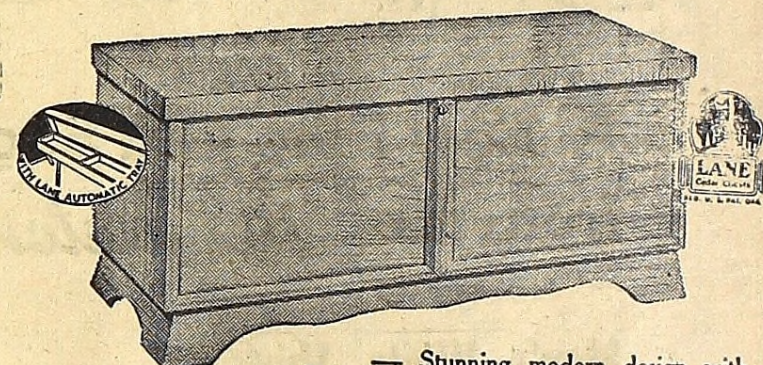

Soil Conservation in Iosco on Increase

A record-breaking increase in soil conservation on farms in Iosco county this past year was reported this week by James Mielock, chairman of the Iosco Soil Conservation District's board of supervisors.

A total of 52 farmers became cooperators with the district during the past 11 months, he said. Although the year is not yet over, the number already exceeds other districts in the area. Considering the fact that the district has only the services of a part time farm planner, it is an outstanding accomplishment.

The local gain reflects a national increase reported by Soil Conservation Service, with 80 percent more new soil conservation district cooperation assisted in 1952 than in 1951. More than a quarter-million farmers in the Nation became district cooperators for the first time last year, the report said. They raise the total to 1,120,000 farmers who are receiving S. C. S. assistance through districts and who operate one-fourth of the Nation's farm land.

Locally, the new cooperators bring to 10,479 the number of acres requested mapped and on which technical assistance will be given by Gordon Hatch, U. S. Soil Conservation Service farm planner for the district, and other S. C. S. technicians whose services are available to the farmer.

Harold Clark, county agricultural agent added, "This demand indicates that our districts, established only 1 1/2 years ago, is a going concern of real value to the farmer, and he is learning that soil conservation pays off."

Mielock also pointed out that, in addition to its regular work, the Soil Conservation Service has furnished technical assistance on permanent-type practices, such as contouring, drainage and grass waterway, to 170 farmers referred to it by the county Production and Marketing Administration committee. Of these, some were already cooperators and some became cooperators.

This additional responsibility for checking lay-out and installation of these practices, for which the P. M. A. provides fi-

financial assistance, was assigned to S. C. S. in 1951 by the U. S. Department of Agricultural.

By the end of the year, Mielock predicts, the number of permanent practices applied on local farms will show a good beginning for the new district.

"The accomplishments in prospect this year is due largely to our procedure of progressive planning," Gordon Hatch explained. "The system allows farmers to become cooperators immediately and get help from us with practices that will eventually become part of their basic farm plan."

"This way," he said, "a farmer need not wait for a complete, rounded farm plan. He can start gradually and move progressively into conservation farming."

Chairman Mielock also said a still greater increase in conservation farming is expected as a consequence of the recent realignment of S. C. S. field forces, which will place more technical help in direct assistance to the farmer.

Nationally, more permanent type measures were applied to the country's farms and ranches during the 1952 fiscal year than in any other year in the history of S. C. S., according to Dr. Robert M. Salter, chief of the service.

One out of every five farmers in the United States is now an active cooperator in one of the 2,400 districts which cover more than four-fifths of the Nation's agricultural land, Dr. Salter pointed out. He added that accomplishments resulting from S. C. S. assistance to farmers were greater in every major line of activity in 1952.

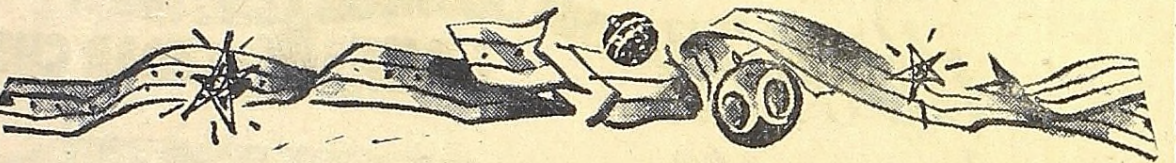
