Alger Stops State Wide Vote Recount

Recount in Iosco Gives Williams 32 Additional Votes

"I do not believe now that a continuation of the recount is warranted," said Fred M. Alger in a statement calling off the recount Tuesday night. His admission was made after 1,668 Michigan precincts had been recounted with a continuously increasing lead being shown for Governor Williams.

The recount was demanded by Alger when the official returns of the election held six weeks ago gave Williams a majority of only 8,618 votes. Tuesday at the end of nine days of recounting, Williams had gained 2,112 votes. Alger had resolutely refused to concede the election to Williams until the recount pattern in the precincts showed a definite and continuous trend in favor of Williams.

The recount of Iosco county's vote for governor started Monday and was completed Tuesday afternoon. The county gave Williams 32 more votes. The recount was made by the board of county canvassers, with Attorney Herbert Hertzler, a legal adviser. He was also representative of the state board of canvassers. James Mielock, chairman; Will MacGillivray and P. N. Thornton were the board members. Ray Ewing and Ed Vaughan of Oscoda were Democratic challengers.

The voters of Iosco county will be satisfied with the work of all the election boards in the several cities and townships of the county. The election tabulations were free from error and all ballot boxes were sealed and in proper order. Considering the number of ballots cast there were few ballots spoiled by the voters. Every one seemed to know how to vote and for whom they were voting.

Everett Gives City Pump Station Site

Ninth Avenue Main Completed to Junctions Of Lake St. and US-23

At the last meeting of the Tawas City common council, Gordon Everett presented the city with a site for the new Third Ward sewage pumping station.

The site is a triangular parcel of land situated at the junction of Lake Street and US-23, south of the Tawas river bridge. This gift will save the city considerable money.

Under the supervision of Martin Kasichke, superintendent of public works, the sewer main leading from the disposal plant along Ninth Avenue has been completed as far as US-23. From there to the pumping station a force main will be constructed. The fine late fall and early winter, and lack of water in the soil has allowed the project to go along rapidly with costs being held to a minimum.

At the council meeting it was voted to give each department of public works employee a turkey for Christmas in recognition of faithful work performed during the past year.

McDonald, Moore & Co. of Detroit purchased the \$30,000 Tawas City sewer bonds recently issued by the city. The bid was based on an interest rate of three and one-quarter per cent. Being short term bonds and considering the small amount of the issue, the interest rate was thought to be low.

Holidays Happy But Hazardous Says MacDonald

Sergeant James MacDonald, commander of the East Tawas State Police Post, is reminding motorists and pedestrians that December is not only a happy, but also an extremely hazardous holiday month.

Because of this police agencies throughout the state are taking part in a special safety campaign emphasizing the importance of extra caution.

"A deadly combination of traffic hazards," Sergeant MacDonald said, "makes walking and driving especially dangerous. In fact, with the unfavorable weather, longer periods of darkness and the general holiday rush and celebrating, December is regarded as one of the deadliest months of the year. On the basis of miles traveled, it is definitely the deadliest."

"During the past five years nearly 82,000 December traffic accidents have occurred in Michigan. They resulted in 752 deaths and 18,973 injuries. "While there is nothing anyone can do to prevent unfavorable weather or darkness, everyone can avoid being careless if they really try. When walking or driving, allowances should be made for prevailing conditions. Alertness can prevent many tragedies."

"The fact that December should be the happiest, not the deadliest month of the year should cause everyone to work hard at making the holiday reason safer for all."

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
International Uniform Sunday School Lessons

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 11:2-7.
DEVOTIONAL READING: Isaiah 9:2-7.

God With Us

Lesson for December 21, 1952

WHAT does Christmas mean? It is all wrapped up in one of the words describing Jesus, one of the less familiar names: Emmanuel. (Or Immanuel; the Bible spells it both ways.) It means GOD WITH US. The Christian religion is not the only religion that believes in God. Many authorities believe that without belief in some kind of god, there is no religion. But a man can wonder about God, or believe that there must be a god of some kind, all his life long, and be no better man for all that. Cruel, lying men have worshipped cruel, lying gods and they grew all the worse for it.

To Live Where We Live

However, some of the higher religions have had sublime ideas about God, indeed many ideas which a Christian will agree are true. The Romans understood there is a justice on high; their gods would see and reward the just. But few Romans ever loved their gods. The more lofty their ideas of God were, the less they loved and the more they were afraid. A holy god (they supposed) must be the enemy of all sinners. In many religions, not the Roman alone, there have been stories of gods who (like the Canadian police) would always "get their man." "Your sin will find you out" is a verse in the Old Testament which many another religion could have echoed.

In contrast to all this, the coming of Christ means that God is with us, not against us. He has come to live where we live, to be on our side.

The bare belief, "God is," brings little comfort. Mount Everest is, and so is the South Pole. But the mountain and the pole are cold and far away. Most men who seek them perish. Only the Christian religion knows of a God who came to earth and still comes to make his home in the hearts of men of good-will.

Spelling God Out

When we say "God is a person" we can be misunderstood, and we can quickly get into thought-tangles. But if we ask the question, If God were a human being, what sort of person would he be, we have not only asked a very important question, but we can understand the answer: it is Jesus. He is the translation of God into human language.

We needed that translation, too. Jesus was not born into a world of atheists; far from it. There were "gods" everywhere. There were little mean gods and little nasty gods, and they did no one any good. There were vast gods of wrath, and there were high serene gods who went their ways in the sky like great airliners, casting fleecy shadows on the farms beneath but not knowing nor caring who might live down there.

He Shall Save His People

Emmanuel means more than that God has visited his people. Your old aunt may come for a visit and stay for two weeks, and all that time never offer a word of complaint or criticism. She lets you do as you please, she gives the children candy and she helps your wife with the cooking and she knits you a muffler.

Some people think God is like that, a sort of handy deity around the house, a god who will hand out anything we care to ask for. "God with us," to such people, means that God is on our side no matter what we may do.

But that is a long way from the truth. For another name of Emmanuel is Jesus, and that means Saviour. We are not told that Jesus will save his people from hell, or from trouble; he will save his people from their sins. When God comes to visit us in Christ, it is not a visit of curiosity. It was no sentimental journey God took to Bethlehem. God is with us; but not to bolster up our self-conceit, not to back us up in anything and everything we may take a notion to do.

He is with us to do what we can never do by ourselves or for ourselves: namely to save us from ourselves. What the best of imaginary gods could never do, what the little gods (even if they had been real) would never do, the true God has done. Could he have done it in heaven? We do not know. What we do know is that our God had something to do for us on earth; and that is why Christ came to Bethlehem.

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Cederberg Announces Staff Organization

Congressman-elect Elford A. Cederberg of Bay City has announced the organization of his staff to assist him in Washington.

THE WASHINGTON Merry-Go-Round BY DREW PEARSON

Though Senator Taft got credit for appointing his distant cousin, Ezra Taft Benson, as secretary of agriculture, actually it was another senator, Watkins of Utah, who worked backstage to put his fellow Mormon across.

Taft had first recommended Sen. Frank Carlson of Kansas to be secretary of agriculture—some said because he didn't want a man so close to Ike in the Senate where he, rather than Taft, would be viewed as presidential spokesman.

Ike in turn told Carlson he could have the agriculture department if he wanted it, though he preferred having him operate from the vantage of the Senate.

So Carlson, who has never pushed himself forward, began pushing Congressman Clifford Hope of Kansas, chairman of the House agriculture committee, for the cabinet post instead.

However, Allan Kline of the farm bureau was opposed to Congressman Hope because of Hope's views on parity, while Brother Milton Eisenhower had rowed with Hope when Milton was president of Kansas State college.

Meanwhile, with Carlson deciding to remain in the Senate, Senator Watkins of Utah persuaded Taft to get behind Benson, also of Utah.

Taft cleared Benson with Milton Eisenhower, and the president-elect, figuring he couldn't go wrong with both his brother and Taft behind a man, appointed Benson.

The appointment, however, has already stirred up a lot of controversy among soil conservationists.

Note—By Pushing Benson, Senator Watkins may have partly blocked Marriner Eccles, former New Dealer, now a staunch republican, who ran against Watkins in the Utah primary, from getting any important job under Eisenhower.

Eccles, former chairman of the Federal Reserve board who won the undying enmity of Harry Truman, has been under consideration for an Eisenhower appointment; but no president can favor too many men from one state.

Millionaire Credit Risk? Congressman Thurmond Chatham, North Carolina Democrat whose family manufactures the famous Chatham blankets, tried to insert an ad, "for sale—by Democrat," in two well-known New York publications.

Chatham wanted to sell his Georgetown house, figured he could interest incoming Republicans by advertising in The Wall Street Journal and The New Yorker.

Replied Melville Price, advertising manager of The New Yorker. "We acknowledge with thanks your check for \$155.40. Both Jack Cogswell and I wish there was some way we could whack up the agency commission between us, what with the approach of Christmas and all. Of course, next year we won't need it when we have no more taxes to pay and pie in the sky."

But the staid Wall Street Journal regarded the "for sale by Democrat" as a credit risk.

"Your ad as it now stands measures 14 agate lines (the minimum for the real estate corner) and at the rate of \$1.10 per line will cost \$15.40 for one insertion," it wrote.

Then, to the sction of a family which operates one of the biggest textile plants in the south, The Wall Street Journal suspiciously concluded:

"If you are a subscriber, listed in Dun and Bradstreet, or have previously established credit with our firm, we shall be glad to open an account in your name. Otherwise, may we have payment with order?"

Note—Congressman Chatham was not defeated in the last election. He is merely moving from a smaller house into a bigger one, having bought the beautiful mansion once owned by the late James Forrestal for \$187,000.

GOP Patronage General Eisenhower had a significant meeting the other day with early Ike-Booster Wes Roberts, who helped win various GOP primaries and who is now under consideration as new GOP national chairman.

With the County Agent

The staff of your county extension service wish you a very Merry Christmas.

Nearly every home, school room and church will have a Christmas tree. The presence of a lighted and beautifully decorated tree always provides a great thrill to the kiddies and adults, too.

But let me warn that all this could be suddenly turned into a deep gloom if the highly inflammable tree should catch fire.

To have a safer Christmas there are several precautions about a Christmas tree we all should take:

- 1. Use a fresh tree. 2. Cut base of tree on oblique angle and place in water. Keep water in container. 3. Do not smoke near tree. 4. Do not use worn out electrical equipment. 5. Light bulbs should not touch leaves or tinsel. 6. Do not place near fireplace that is in use. 7. Do not run electric train under the tree. 8. Turn out lights when leaving house or going to bed. 9. Have fire extinguisher on hand.

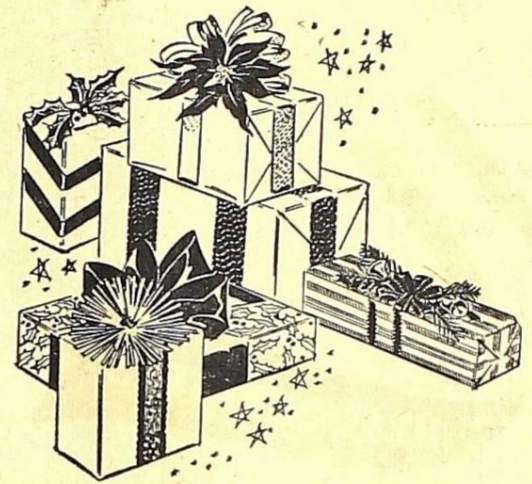

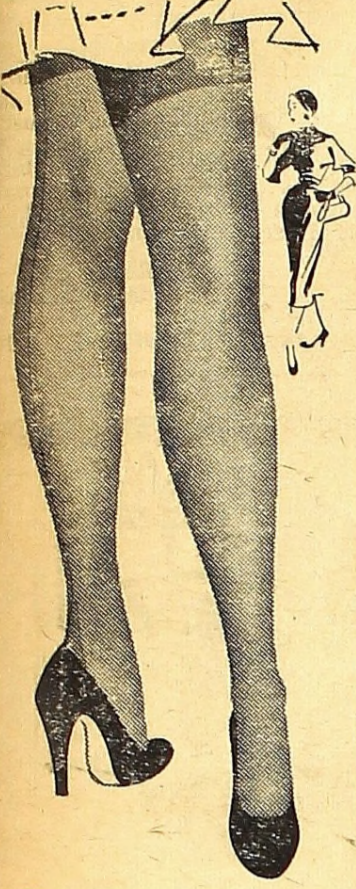

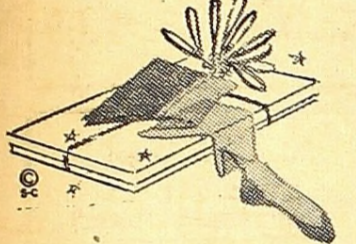

COMMERCIAL FISHING OUTLOOK

Commercial fishing in Michigan has changed a lot in the last decade—and may be due for even more drastic changes in the future. Few individuals outside the industry itself realize the significance of that day back in the late 20's when sea lamprey first appeared in Great Lakes waters after their long migration from salt water.

Slowly at first, and then with unbelievable speed, lake trout began to disappear from all waters in the lower lakes. From a commercial catch of better than five million pounds a year, the trout take fell to a mere few thousand pounds back in 1949, and today this highly prized food fish has become all but extinct in both Lake Huron and Lake Michigan. The lamprey—vampire of our inland seas—is held responsible.

Herring Becomes King

Now fisheries along the lower lakes have turned to the herring to make up, at least partially, for the severe loss suffered with the passing of the lake trout. Until winter ice makes their work impossible the fishing fleets put out daily from home bases along the shores of Lake Huron and Lake Michigan. There is a rugged life, ranging three and four miles out into the wind-swept rough waters of the big lakes, tossed about like corks

in the tiny craft that are one-tenth cabin and engine, and nine-tenths cargo space for up to 5 tons of slithery herring. And day after day, unless a whopping gale is blowing, you'll find them easing into the anchor buoy that marks their nets, making fast, and hauling away at the enormous nets that stretch for 800 feet along the lake bottom.

Icy Job

Often the net lines are coated with ice as soon as the air strikes them. Light rubber gloves don't take the sting from the job. Soon, with spray blown across the deck, a slick coating of ice forms underfoot, and in the pitching seas disaster could strike at the man who isn't fast to a line or rail.

The voyage begins before dawn, and if luck is good and nets are full the fleet may be back by noon. Then the three-man crew unloads their catch, and move indoors to help pack and ship the fish. Underrated on too many menus today, the lowly herring must soon come into its own as another valued resource to be found in Michigan Outdoors.
