Auto Crash Fatal to One; Six Injured

Accident Occurred Saturday at M-55 and Wilber Road

Morris W. Hyland of Roseville is dead and six other persons injured as a result of an automobile collision Saturday at the junction of M-55 and Wilber Road, north of this city. The accident occurred while Hyland and his family were driving north on the Wilber Road. At the junction of the roads his car collided with a car driven by Joseph Balous of Highland Park. He and his family were driving eastward on M-55. The Hylands were on their way to the Lumberman's Monument. The Balous family was here to spend the week-end in the Tawas Area.

The injured were taken to the Tawas Hospital where Hyland died about three hours after admittance. Others injured were Mrs. Bertha Hyland and two children, Morris, Jr., and Catherine; Joseph Balous; Mrs. Dorothy Balous; and little Michael Balous. Both cars were almost totally wrecked.

Dock Extension Project Scheduled

Contemplate Opening Bids in September

The existing schedule contemplates the opening of bids in September for the \$75,000 State Park dock expansion program project, according to an announcement received yesterday (Thursday) by Carl Babcock, chairman of the Tawas Harbor Commission. The contract would call for completion of work not later than June, 1954.

Babcock states that Charles Latimore of the Michigan Waterways Commission will be here within a few days to make a final check-up on the plans for improvements contemplated. The project includes a 250 foot extension to the present dock, slips for transient boats and a building on shore for the harbor master.

Proposed facilities for boat owners would be water and gasoline service, lights and garbage disposal.

Hold Training Clinic at Ottawa Equipment Plant

Sixteen area automobile technicians participated August 12 in the first evening training session held in this region of the state under the newly inaugurated International Harvester program for providing dealer service personnel with the latest techniques of truck maintenance with the aid of mobile laboratories. The specialized service clinic was conducted by Gus Kuruda, IHC district service supervisor, and Don Easton, IHC zone manager. Manager Gordon Everett of the Ottawa Equipment Company was host.

The training unit which visited Tawas City is one of seven metro panel trucks recently commissioned by International for mobile specialized service instruction. One unit specializes in transmissions and axles, three in liquid propane gas and electrical systems and three in valves, carburetion and latest methods of repair and adjustment. The valve carburetion unit was in Tawas City.

Ten of the 16 men attending the session were from the Tawas. Included were: Eino and Carlton Haglund of the Isoco County Road Commission; Gordon Everett, Roy DePotty, Earl Crown, Rollie Gackstetter, Bill Biggs, Andrew Holmes, Wayne Biggs and Rollie J. Gackstetter, all of the Ottawa Equipment Company; other dealers and county road commission men from Roscommon, Standish and West Branch.

To date, about 3,000 International service employees and dealers have attended these clinics. Considered a milestone in IHC truck service history, the full-scale automobile training program is designed to teach servicemen latest developments in truck servicing, to make servicemen more efficient and to give the customer the absolute top value for every service dollar he spends.

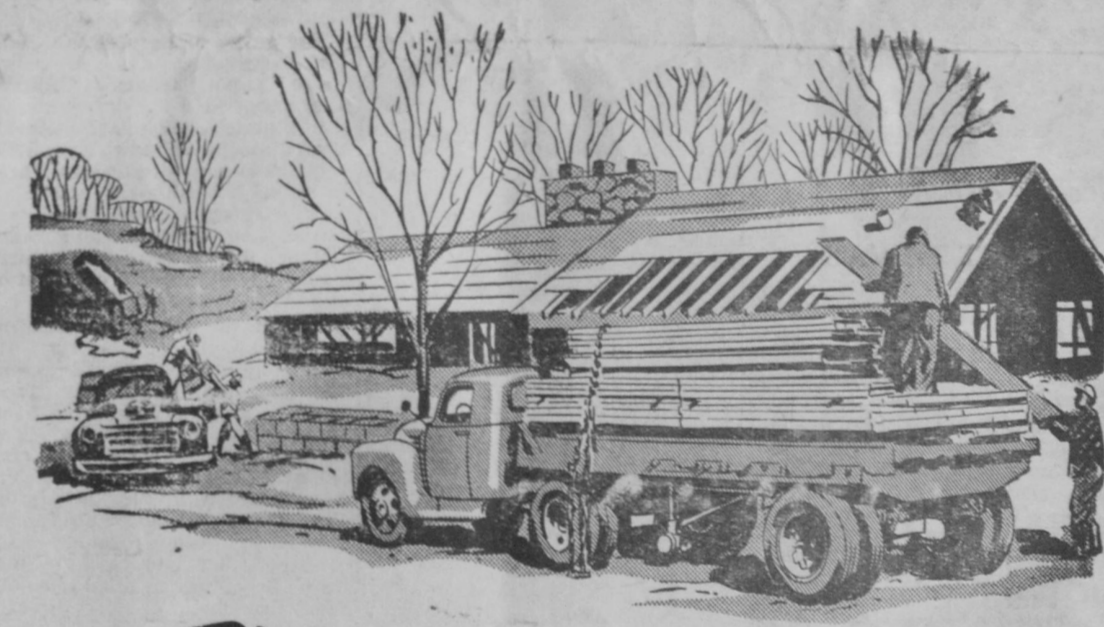

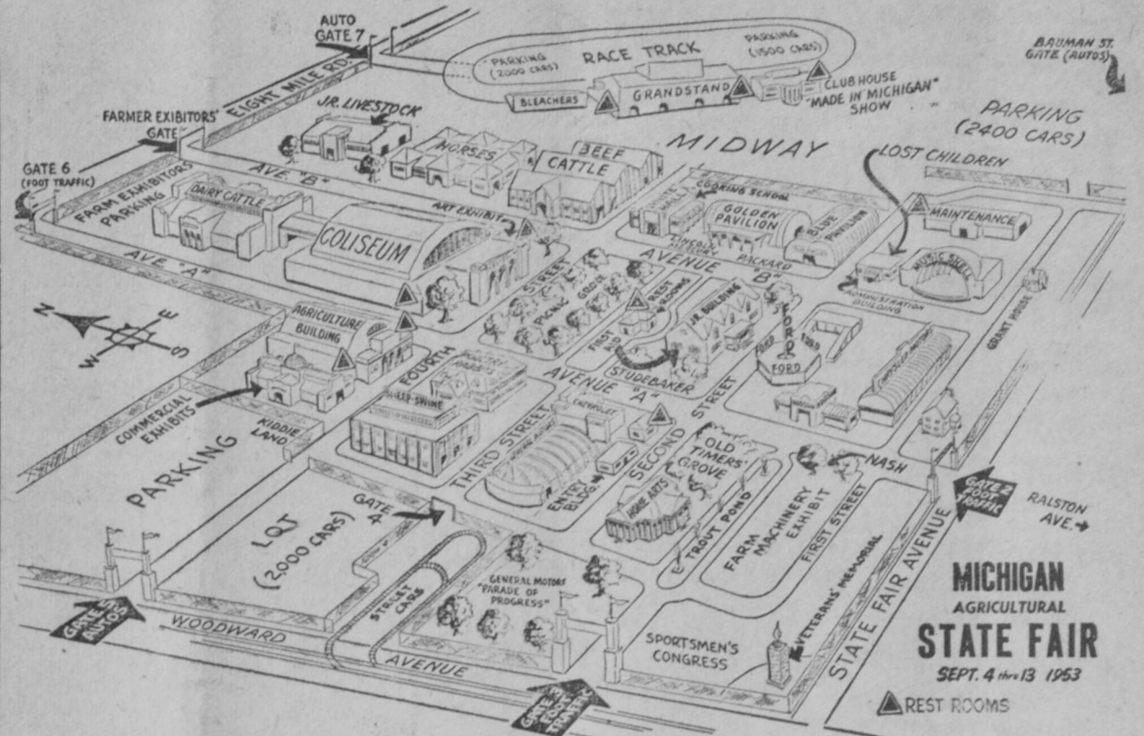

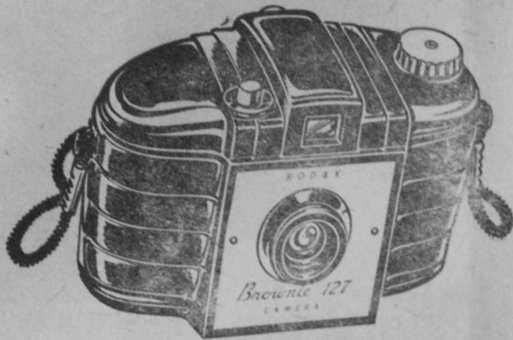

An important rule for the vegetable freezing season is that all vegetables must be blanched before they are frozen. Boiling water is the surest method to accomplish blanching, and there needs to be an ample supply, at least four quarts of water to do one pound of vegetables. That is

so the temperature of the water is not much lowered by the addition of the cold vegetable. Blanching time varies with the vegetable, so a guide is needed, a reliable one is in the bulletin entitled "Freezing Foods for Michigan Homes," which may be obtained from your extension service office.
