THE Last Supper of Jesus with His disciples stressed the communion as the symbol of fellowship in the Christian church. This is marked to such an extent that denominations, or sects, are called "communions," even in their very separateness which denies the unity that ought to be

in Christ.

For that, of course, there are historic reasons, which to a large degree are being overcome by many who in mind, soul and heart accept as fellow Christians all who love the Lord, regardless of barriers of organization and
