## Iosco Schools Ready to Call Students Back

### Tawas Area Schools

Tawas Area Schools will open Tuesday, September 8, according to an announcement made this week by Superintendent R. E. Mick.

Tuesday there will be a teacher's meeting only—no students. Students will arrive Wednesday, September 9.

General assembly for all high school students of Tawas Area will be at 9:00 a. m. Wednesday at Tawas City Gymnasium. Instructions will be given as to class schedule and year's program.

### ARRANGEMENTS

Kindergarten—There will be separate morning and afternoon session in both cities. Kindergarten students in the former school districts of the area will enroll as follows:

Tawas City School: Upper Townline, Lower Townline, Anschuetz, Vine, Watts, Greenwood.

East Tawas School: Alabaster, Baldwin No. 2, Baldwin No. 3, Tawas No. 5, Whitney, Wilber No. 4.

This arrangement is tentative and will be revised if the number of students warrant a change from either school.

Parents bringing kindergarten pupils on Wednesday may take children home as soon as enrollment is completed.

When possible birth certificates should be presented when enrolling students.

Kindergarten students must be five years of age by December 1, 1953, to enroll.

Kindergarten students will be returned at noon each day to areas by bus.

Grade Schools—Tawas City kindergarten through sixth grade will register at Tawas City.

East Tawas kindergarten through sixth grade will register at East Tawas.

Alabaster and Whitney kindergarten through sixth grade will enroll at East Tawas.

All seventh and eighth grade students of the area will attend junior high school at Alabaster.

In the Watts, Vine and Townline areas: Grades one and two at Vine School, grades three and four at Lower Townline and grades five and six at Watts School. School will start Wednesday morning, September 8, at 9:00 to 9:20, as soon as students are distributed.

Hot lunch will be provided at Alabaster. It will be ready by September 14. Tentative price will be \$1.25 per week or 30 cents for a single day.

### Plainfield Agricultural School

Plainfield Township Rural Agricultural School opening plans are complete according to an announcement made this week by Supt. Gordon Helmbold.

School will begin on Tuesday, September 8, with a meeting of teachers scheduled for 8:00 a. m. Buses will make their morning runs an hour later than usual, arriving at school about 10:00.

Seventh through 12th grade students may register and get their locker assignments early, by calling in person, at the school office anytime during office hours the week of August 31 to September 4. Those not registering early will be enrolled and assigned lockers the morning of September 8, after a meeting of all junior high and high school students in the gymnasium at 10:00 a. m.

Following are a few of the changes and improvements which have taken place in the last two years, and which will give some indication of the ways in which the school is developing and providing for the education of boys and girls and adults of the community at large.

The school's service area is still expanding so that now one of our bus routes goes through Glennie to bring in students from that area. This has been due to numerous requests from parents in that area that transportation be provided for their children.

In order to provide educational opportunities for some of the students desiring courses which would be too expensive to offer locally, arrangements have been made with the University of Michigan for these students to take these desired courses by correspondence. Students satisfactorily completing these courses will receive high school credit accordingly.

To provide still more complete service to the veterans of the community the school has been approved to offer "On-the-Farm" Training course to the boys back from Korea.

The adult education program has been extended to include both commercial and hobby classes.

Buses will pick up their passengers at the regular time. Registration and assignment of classes will take place in the morning. School will be dismissed at noon. In recognition of his long service to the community, Dr. O. W. Mitton was unanimously selected president and chairman of the organization for the remainder of his stay in East Tawas.



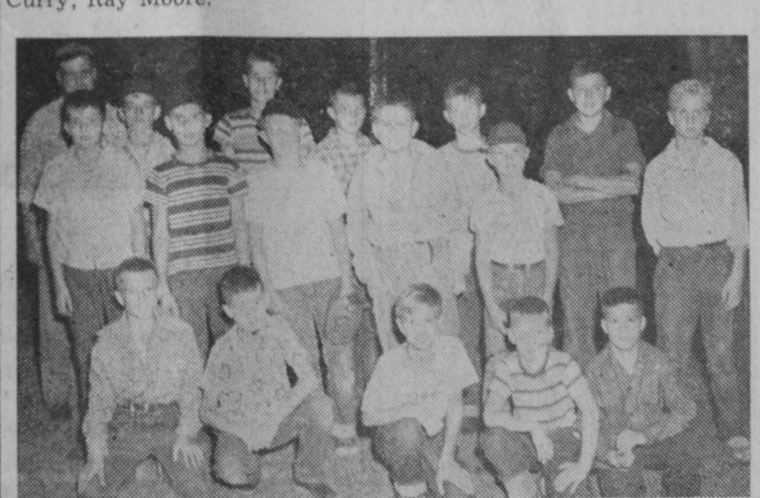

**Bible Comment:**

**The Last Supper Accents Fellowship Among All Faiths**

THE Last Supper of Jesus with His disciples stressed the communion as the symbol of fellowship in the Christian church. This is marked to such an extent that denominations, or sects, are called "communions," even in their very separateness which denies the unity that ought to be in Christ.

For that, of course, there are historic reasons, which to a large degree are being overcome by many who in mind, soul and heart accept as fellow Christians all who love the Lord, regardless of barriers of organization and formal creed.

But there ought to be even deeper implications of fellowship as we contemplate that Last Supper in the upper room.

That Last Supper was the celebration by Jesus and His disciples of the Passover, the most sacred rite in the Jewish religion, which was their heritage as Jews and which Jesus said He had not come to destroy, but to fulfill.

The fact ought to give the Last Supper a significance that it has never had, neither for Jews nor Christians, and a meeting place in fellowship that they have never found.

Surely the supreme task of all who believe in the Christ and the fellowship of the upper room is to bring to reality and fullness in the world the spirit and the practice of brotherhood.

We know that there was one present in that room with Jesus who renounced that spirit, who betrayed his Master. What we do not realize is that everyone who professes to share in the communion, but who does not live in its spirit of brotherhood, is more akin to Judas than to those who loved their Master.

To partake of holy communion "in remembrance of Jesus" is not merely an act of conformity, an expression of outward faith. Its reality is found only in a renewed commitment of the soul to the Christian way—the way of brotherhood.

And then there was the time when all drivers, if they were worthy of the name, wore gauntlets, goggles and a linen duster.

**HDA NOTES**

Next Thursday marks the beginning of our fall home demonstration meetings to train the group leaders who will teach the lessons for other members. In most instances this will happen within the month of September, and by that time the leaders will be ready for the second of this series of three, called "Modern Dress Finishes."  
 At this first training meeting leaders will study ways to make better looking, better wearing buttonholes, inconspicuous darts, collars and facings that will not permit the underneath section to "peek" out, collars that are truly round and really pointed with both halves just alike.

We have said it before, we say it again now, because this is the most ideal time of year to consider joining a home demonstration group, if you are interested in the opportunities to keep up-to-date with your homemaking methods and informed about current affairs, then membership in one of our home demonstration groups is for you.  
 To find out more about this program offered by the Michigan State College Extension Service, write, telephone or stop in at our local Extension Service office. The address is Federal Building, East Tawas. The telephone number is 641.

A bulb left burning in a damp clothes closet will combat mildew, but be careful! Mildewed clothes are not as serious as a burnt house.  
 Here are safety rules to observe. Do not use a swinging light cord in the closet. Be sure that any light used cannot touch clothing or other flammable materials. As a safety precaution, too, use a metal grill protector over the light bulb. Be very sure that the light is safely wired, extension cords running over or under doors are not safe. If you are planning a new house, place an outlet and wiring to allow placement of the bottom of the closet. Yes, it is more effective there because warm air rises and creates an air current to the closet.  
 One of the small electrical closet driers on the market may do the trick, depending upon conditions of temperature, humidity and air circulation in the closet. Their use requires the same safety observations as with the electric light.

What about lost liquid in canning? Should it be replaced? No, never open a jar and refill with liquid, this would let bacteria in and you would have to do the processing again. Remember that loss of liquid does not cause food to spoil. However, the food above the liquid may be darker.  
 What causes cloudy liquid in canned fruits and vegetables? Cloudy liquid may be a sign of spoilage. Or, it may be caused by the minerals in hard water. Another cause could be the starch from overripe vegetables. In corn this is often true.  
 How can one tell whether canned food with cloudy liquid is spoiled? Boil the food and note the odor. Do not taste or use any of the food having an off odor. If vegetables are spoiled, burn or dispose of them in such a way that they cannot be eaten by animals, birds or humans.

**Farmers Study Crop Rotation on Twilight Tour**

Forty-five farmers attended the twilight tour at the James Mielock farm last Tuesday evening. The tour, sponsored by the Iosco County Soil Conservation District, demonstrated the good use of forage crops on a large livestock farm and the part it played in good soil conservation practices. It showed the visitors how a rotation adapted to soil capabilities could conserve the soil and increase total yields.  
 Gordon Hatch, farm planner for the district, explained how Mielock's farm had been classified for its various capabilities, and how, on the basis of the classification, the uses and rotations were determined.  
 The best soils that are level or slightly sloping could stand row crops in the rotation while on the same kind of soil where erosion could be serious, row crops were omitted. Hatch recommended a rotation of row crop, grain, and three years of meadow on the level areas and two years of grain and three years of meadow on the sloping fields. He emphasized, however, that there is no poor soil. All lands have a real value if used according to their capabilities. It is the plan of the conservationist to put all land to its proper use.  
 On the "Hayride" Grass Day style, the guests visited the Grass Day variety plots and inspected Mr. Mielock's new grass waterway which had effectively checked the gully which was getting larger each year.  
 Much interest was shown in the trench silo which had been partially filled with grass silage. He expects to fill the remainder of the trench with corn. Discussions here pointed out the importance of forage preservation in the increasing livestock load on our lands.  
 The twilight event which started at 7 p. m. met with enthusiastic favor with the visitors, because it did not interfere with the summer harvest program. The district is planning to hold a grass silage tour on September 14.
