County Farm Auction Totals Nearly \$20,000

Farm Land Leased to Arthur Povish

Dairy Herd and Farm Implements Sold at Saturday Sale

The Iosco County Farm auction sale held last Saturday totaled nearly \$20,000, according to a statement made by members of the Iosco County Welfare Board. This was one of the largest farm auctions ever held in Iosco county. A large crowd and lively bidders, who were interested in the fine dairy herd, made this sale very successful.

The auction sale Saturday marks a revolutionary change in the operation of the county's infirmary. Heretofore, the infirmary has always been operated with a farm in connection.

The farm was recently leased for one year to Arthur Povish. The infirmary is being operated by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Simons.

This radical change in policy of operation of the county farm was forced on the welfare board, stated one of its members yesterday. Inability to get a superintendent for the farm and the necessary help for its operation was the reason given.

The problem of how to operate the infirmary and the disposition of the farm will be placed before the Iosco County Board of Supervisors at the January session.

Iosco county had one of the fine dairy herds of the state at the county farm. The herd sold for \$10,324.50. The selling prices for cows ranged around the \$465 to \$480 figures. Calves and young cattle sold as high as \$135 per head.

Farm implements, grain, hay and other feed completed the inventory sold.

Auctioneers were John P. Harris of Hale and Walter E. Bell of Sterling. The Peoples State Bank acted as clerk.

Girl Asphyxiated When Home Burns

A five-year old girl died from asphyxiation when her home burned last Friday morning.

The little girl was the daughter of Sgt. and Mrs. Zane Soulliere. They resided in a small cabin between Osceola and Greenbush on Old US-23. Sgt. Soulliere is stationed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

That morning Mrs. Soulliere had gone to the home of nearby neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Conklyn. Two small children, Nora and David, were at home. A few minutes after Mrs. Soulliere left the house was discovered in flames. David ran for his mother.

On account of flames and smoke several attempts were made before Mrs. Soulliere and Mr. Conklyn could reach little Nora and carry her out of the burning building. She was taken to the office of Dr. A. Constantine at Harrisville, but she was dead. Coroner Duran Smith pronounced death due to asphyxiation.

The cause of the fire is unknown. An aluminum cooking utensil on the gas range had melted and the metal had fallen into the burner. High flames were coming from the range when the fire was in progress.

Michigan State Police from the East Tawas Post and the Alcona Sheriff's Department investigated the accident.

Study Industrial Problems of North Michigan District

Commission Met Friday at Detroit

Appoint Two Members To Work with Industrial Advisory Board

The problem this part of the state faces in getting new industry and expanding its present industry occupied much of the state Economic Development Commission meeting in Detroit Friday.

The chairman of the commission's northern Lower Peninsula advisory board, Charles A. Pinkerton, Jr., pointed out the need for additional financing for small industry in the northern counties. Several hours were spent in discussing the problems of the area.

The commission appointed two of its members at the meeting to work with the advisory board on the problem brought up at the meeting. They are Wesley Parker, head of the Post Products Division of General Foods, Battle Creek, and Paul Lodge, president of Farmers Chemical Company, Kalamazoo.

Mr. Pinkerton told the commission that an economic study should be made of the northern half of the Lower Peninsula along the lines of the study of the Upper Peninsula which Ebasco Service of New York completed for the Economic Development Commission last summer.

Two farm economists from Michigan State College, Karl Wright and Lauren Brown, will help lead the discussion, which will start at 8:00. Everyone in the county is urged to attend and participate.

During the past year prices received by farmers for things they sell have dropped about 16 percent, while prices they have to pay for things they buy have dropped only four percent. The result has been to put farmers in a real pinch, with profits taking a beating on many farms.

The farm economist have information and suggestions about things farmers can do to help ease the squeeze. Several ways to understand balances which farmers can use to check up on their own farming set ups will be explained. It is those farmers who are operating well-balanced businesses that get hurt by the cost-price squeeze.

In connection with the discussion of the profit squeeze, the farm outlook picture for 1954 will be presented. There will be a discussion of the latest changes in federal income tax as they affect farmers along with a list of legitimate "tax savers" (we are all interested in these). Farmers will also be interested in learning how the new Michigan business receipts tax affects them.

With new highs reported for the month of October, traffic injuries and accidents in Michigan during 1953 probably will exceed all previous records.

The State Police monthly statistical report shows 184 persons killed during the month, an increase of 22 percent over 151 in October last year. The death toll was 36 higher than the October average for the years of 1946 to 1952.

There were 14,938 accidents and 4,980 injuries. This was a gain of 13 percent in accidents and 19 percent in injuries over the same month a year ago.



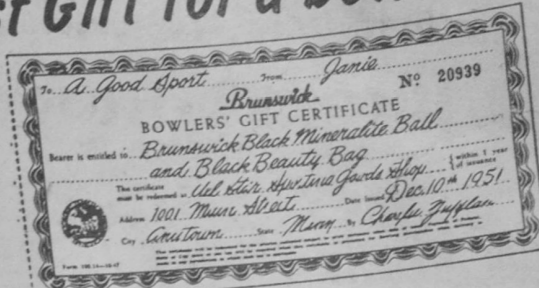

A few more words about poultry stuffing and results of research. To be safest mix together the ingredients for stuffing just before it is time to roast the bird. These advance preparations may be made, prepare and measure dry ingredients and store them in the refrigerator. In this way the last minute combination is not a long job.

Tests made with poultry stuffings which had been frozen in turkeys proved that the transfer of heat is too slow to provide a high enough temperature rise in the center of the stuffing by the time the high temperature indicates the meat is done.

This is the reason for recommending that poultry be stuffed just before roasting time. Better be safe than sorry if someone became ill after the holiday meal.

Fluffy, light-textured stuffed with the highest flavor result when the cavity is filled lightly. Stuffing expands as juices are absorbed during the roasting

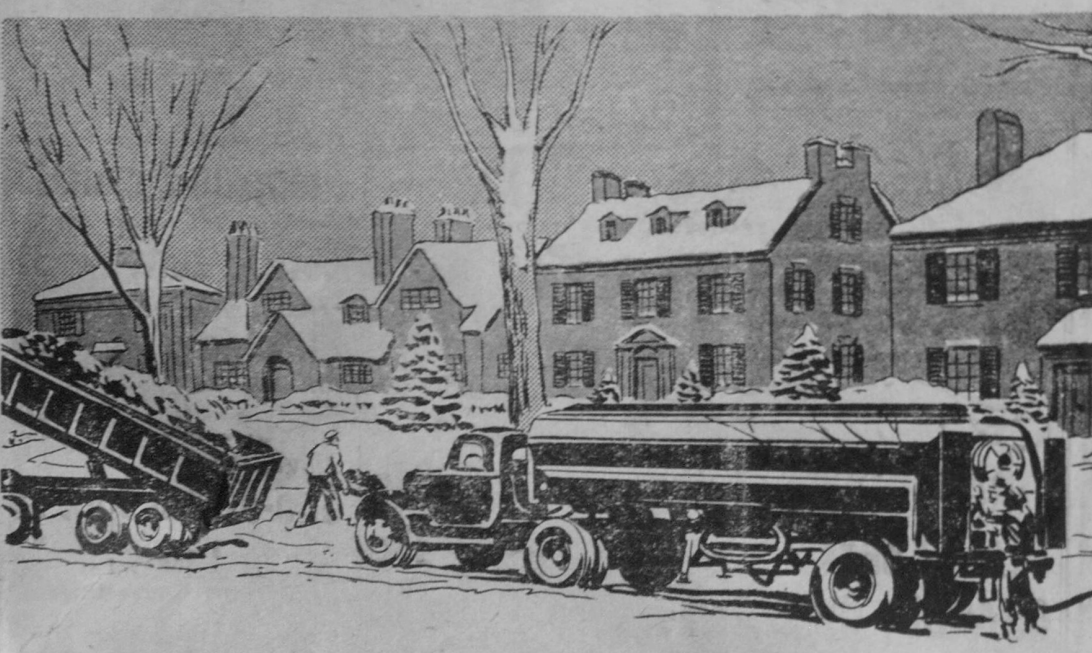

Gives Tips on Winter Driving

Winter driving can be safe by being sensible about it. That's the statement made by Sergeant James MacDonald, commander of the East Tawas post of the Michigan State Police, in calling attention to the fact that December is one of the deadliest months of the year.

"Don't spoil your holidays with an avoidable accident," Sergeant MacDonald said. "By following a half dozen winter driving suggestions you can greatly increase your safety. The trouble is, too many drivers don't do these things and that is a big reason for the startling record that during December of the last five years nearly 800 persons have been killed and another 20,000 injured on Michigan highways.

Here are the tips:

1. Be prepared to meet any situation on the road.
2. Get the "feel" of the road. Try brakes occasionally while driving slowly and away from traffic. Find out just how slippery the road is and adjust speed to road and weather conditions.
3. Keep the windshield clear of ice and snow, fog and frost. Be sure headlights, windshield wiper blades and defrosters are in top condition.
4. Use tire chains on ice and snow. Chains will cut stopping distances about half and give four to seven times more starting and climbing traction.
5. Pump the car's brakes to slow down or stop. Jamming on the brakes will lock wheels and throw the vehicle into a skid.
6. Follow other cars at a safe distance. It takes three to 12 times as far to stop on snow and ice as on dry pavement.
