Bible Comment:

Christianity Built  
By Men United  
In Brotherly Love

UPON the foundation of Jesus  
Christ the early Christian  
church was built by two things  
—conversion and fellowship.  
The first great in-gathering  
was on the Day of Pentecost, 50  
days after the Passover, when  
Peter preached with such power  
and boldness that about three  
thousand were then converted  
and baptized.

This company of believers was  
soon increased.  
But someone has said that no  
one goes to heaven alone, and the  
first immediate manifestation of  
this new life in conversion was  
an intense clinging of Christians  
to one another in a fellowship so  
deep and strong that at first they  
held all things in common.

The early Christian commu-  
nism did not last long, just as  
most schemes of Christian commu-  
nism have failed since.

If the Christians had all been  
as noble as Barnabas, it might  
have been successful, but a liar  
and self-seeker like Ananias can  
make havoc of a noble experi-  
ment.

In any case, Christianity places  
a strong value upon the individ-  
ual soul, and upon the rightful  
independence of each life.

Paul understood this well.  
When he urged that Christians  
should bear one another's bur-  
den, and so fulfill the law of  
Christ, he also said that every  
man should bear his own burden.

That was good, sound democ-  
racy. The strength of democracy,  
of a church, of a Christian fel-  
lowship, is built upon the integ-  
rity and strength of the individ-  
ual units.

But the strength of the early  
Christian church was in the way  
the individual Christians loved  
one another. It became a byword,  
marking them from the world in  
which they lived: "See how these  
Christians love one another."

One speaks thus of the early  
Christian church. Can one say  
as much for the Christian church  
of today?

When one looks at the great  
number of sincere Christians to-  
day, the answer to that question  
must be "yes." But one cannot  
help wishing there were more in  
that company of true Christians.

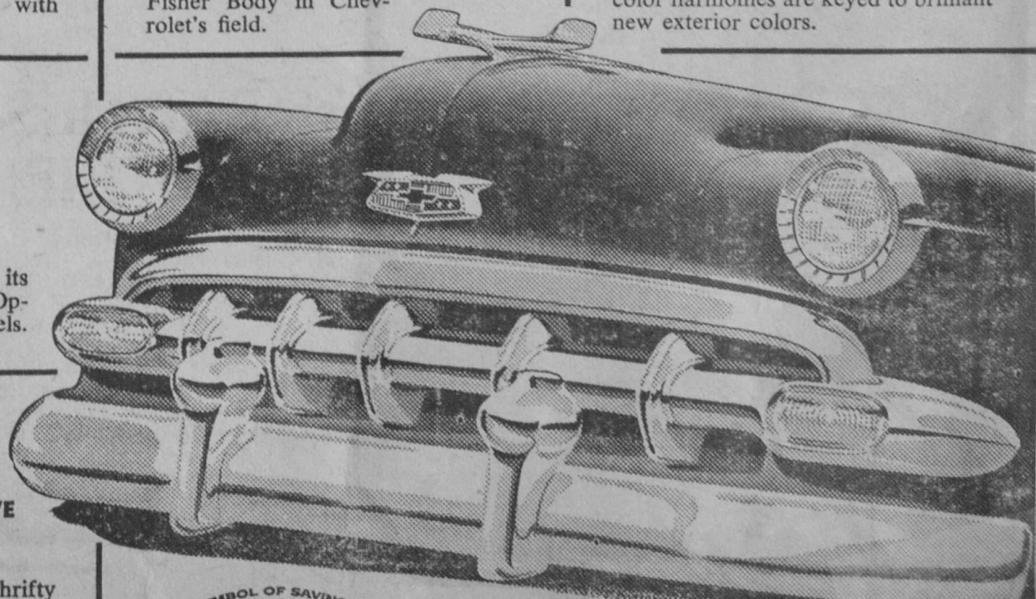

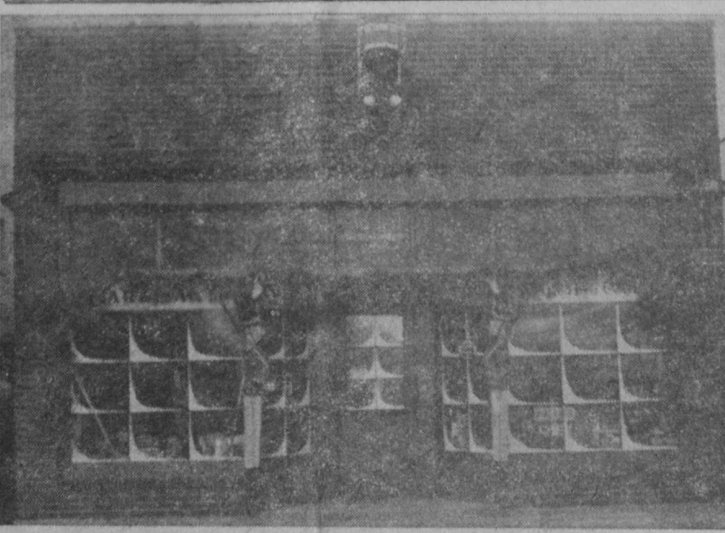

## News About Hale

### Mrs. Grace Hanna Outlines Work to Hale Health Council

The Hale Health Council met December 3 at the Community Building with Mrs. Sarah Graves president, presiding. Only seven groups were represented.

Mrs. Grace Hanna of the Health Department and Mrs. Nyda Bronson of the Welfare Department were guests. Mrs. Hanna gave a very interesting description of the work of her department. It really does not seem possible that one nurse can take care of so many people. She has 11,000 people in Isosco county compared to 8,500 approximately 10 years ago. She credits this increase to the air base at Oscoda, people who previously had summer cabins and now make their homes here, and many small businesses which have developed to hold the young people here.

Included in her work is the Pre-School Clinic, which prepares the children for their first year of school, giving them shots and vaccinations and a check-up. Athletic examinations are also among her activities. She gives information on raw born babies where needed and helps with any problem whenever possible.

The department figures with each tuberculosis carrier found through chest x-ray survey, the state and county are saved \$10,000. Through these chest x-rays different heart ailments are caught in addition to lung diseases. The council is going to try to get the x-ray machine back in this area for a week, if possible, as it has been three years since it was here.

Mrs. Hanna stated the Children's Fund would expire in January or April unless a sponsor can be found for the fund. Physical therapy in Bay City for crippled children, glasses for children and other help is provided by this fund.

When help is needed from Mrs. Hanna, she can be contacted at her office in the courthouse between 9:30 and 10:00 a. m. or after 5:00 p. m. at her home.

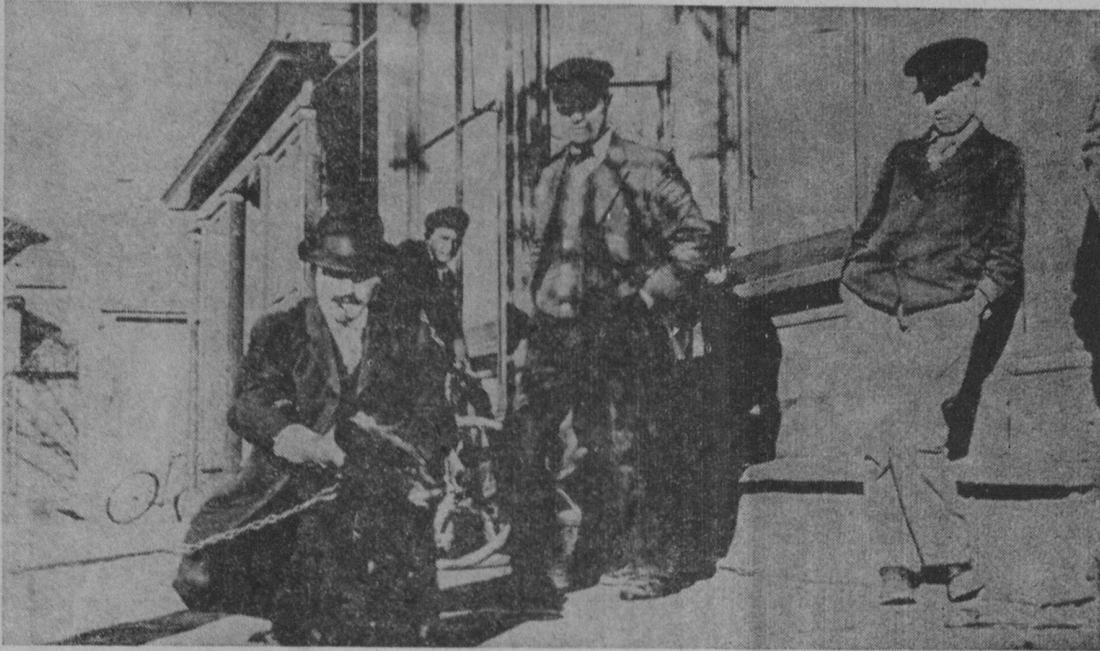
Wurtsmith AFB To Receive \$162,000 For Base Construction

Doublets you have some new 1954 calendars. Choose one that you can mark on easily and make note of the above dates for meetings of importance to Losco county farmers as the New Year gets under way.

Farm Bureau and Grange members are reminded to be sure the name of their representative for the Bang's Control meeting on January 4 reaches our office soon so that we can send them further information about it.

Farmers, generally, are not very happy these days. Falling farm prices and high farm costs are plenty of cause for worry.

To tackle this problem and to bring out practical ways of solving it we have arranged for one of the Michigan State College series of meetings entitled "Barnyard Economics—1954 Model." A team of farm economists from Michigan State College, Lauren Brown and Karl Wright, will help lead the discussion. A number of "down-to-earth" guides to maintaining farm profits during economic conditions such as the present will be presented. Much of the information presented will be based directly on the experiences of farmers who have been successful in making good farm incomes in both good times and bad. Part of the key to success in times of falling farm prices can be described simply as "good farm management."

Some of the things farmers can do to ease the squeeze in the immediate future will depend on the farm outlook for 1954. This subject will be discussed rather briefly to provide a background for the broader discussion of the profit squeeze.

Also included in the meeting will be an outline of the latest changes in federal farm income tax regulations, and an explanation of the new state business receipts tax as it affects farmers.

Losco county folks will remember last year's bang-up "Barnyard Economics" meeting which featured the subject of dairy farm management. This year's meeting on another timely and important subject will be just as happy and stimulating. Everyone in the county is invited to attend.

The date is Thursday, January 7, and the place is Grant Township Hall at 8:00 p. m.

Phillip Watts stopped in the other day to see about phenothiazine for his sheep. He confesses to learning the hard way, by experience, that it does not pay to neglect this item. His lambs have not brought the prices they did when he provided phenothiazine regularly in the salt ration. Last summer he was pretty busy and let the lambs go without treatment. He plans to get started again with preventative treatments.

Michigan State College animal husbandry men tell us that one way to prevent a lot of trouble with next year's lamb crop is to worm your bred ewes while they are in early pregnancy. Research shows that ewes may safely be treated with phenothiazine if it is done before the last month of pregnancy.

Then it is recommended that sheep be drenched for stomach and nodular worms before being turned out to pasture next spring. This reduces the number of parasites the lambs may pick up while grazing. A drench containing lead arsenate with phenothiazine is recommended when worms are present. It is also advised that feeder lambs be wormed as soon as possible. Worms make lambs waste feed and the animals may die from anemia if not treated.

After being wormed, parasites are kept down with phenothiazine and salt, one pound to every 12-14 fed.

Good farm records can save you tax money.

For one thing, good records can eliminate the frustrating work of going through a mass of receipts in order to list your tax deductions, asserts Everett M. Elwood, extension agricultural economist at Michigan State College.

Elwood points out that mis-

laying or forgetting a receipt can be costly. If you've had a machinery repair job, for example, that cost you \$15 and you forget to enter it on the tax form, you pay about four dollars extra in taxes.

This means that for about every dollar you fail to enter on your tax report it costs you an extra 25 to 30 cents in taxes.

Why not plan, right now, to start the New Year with a Farm Account Book, available at the office of the County Extension Service. If you request your book right away, we can arrange for you to have a conference with Lauren Brown or Karl Wright on January 7. They can help you off to a good start in learning to use it, if you've never kept one before, that is (and if you have, you may know more questions than beginners).

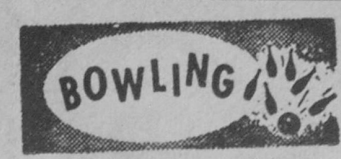

## Enjoy Red Cherry Relish With Baked Fresh Ham

THIS is the season for bright red. That's why this delicious red cherry relish may be particularly welcome. It goes perfectly with baked fresh ham—also with turkey, chicken, tongue, veal and duck.

#### Red Cherry Relish (Makes about 1 1/2 cups)

One tablespoon quick-cooking tapioca, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon cloves, 1 1/2 cups (No. 2 can) drained, canned, pitted, red sour cherries (syrup packed), 3/4 cup cherry juice, 1 teaspoon vinegar.

Combine tapioca, sugar, salt and spices in saucepan, mixing well. Add cherries, cherry juice and vinegar. Bring slowly to a boil over low heat and simmer 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Cool. Stir once after 15 minutes. Chill thoroughly (4 to 5 hours or overnight). Serve with meat or poultry.

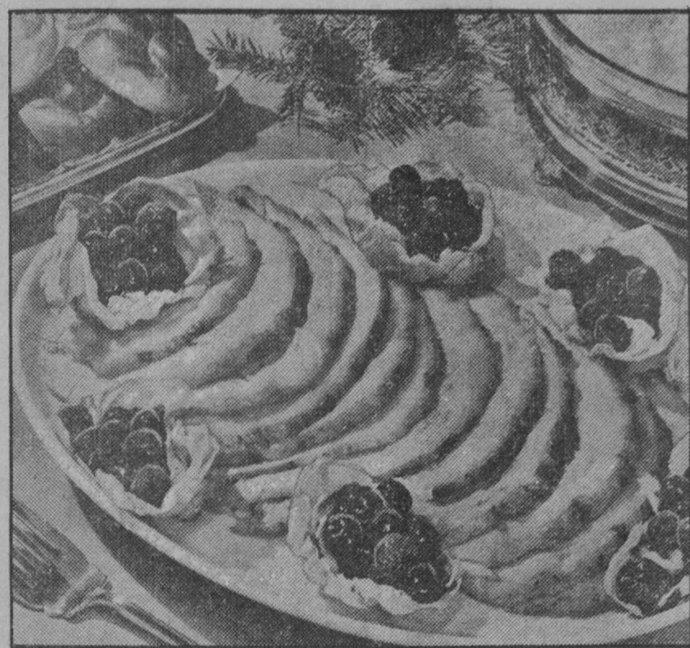
For a festive holiday buffet or dinner, here's a menu suggestion: Tomato juice, hot or cold, fresh baked ham with red cherry relish, casserole of creamed cauliflower, grated cheese topping, tossed green salad, rolls and butter, fruitcake or plum pudding, coffee.

Here's another bright red dish, created by John N. Letsch, pastry chef of St. George Hotel, Brooklyn, N. Y. He won a prize for it.

#### Cranberry Sherbet (Serves 6 to 8)

Two pounds or 8 cups fresh cranberries, 1 1/2 pounds or 4 cups sugar, 1 1/4 quarts water (5 cups) juice of 6 lemons, 2 teaspoons (level) gelatin dissolved in cold water.

Cook cranberries until they all stop popping. Strain. Add sugar, dissolved gelatin and strained lemon juice. Pour into hand freezer and freeze with ice and salt.

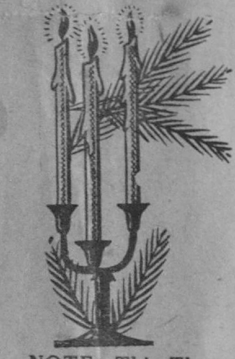

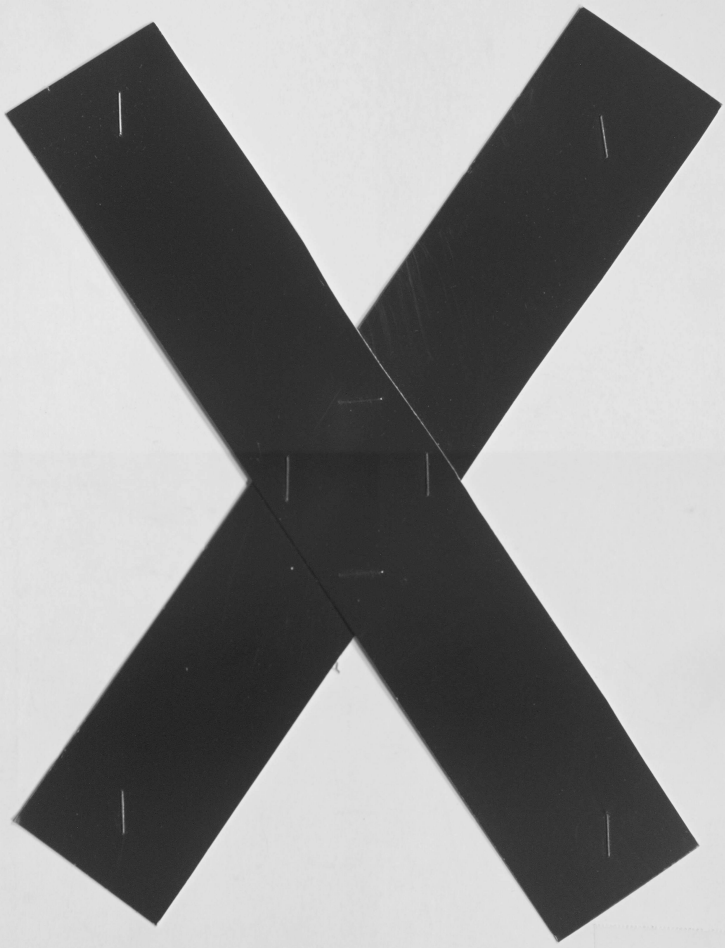
