Car Goes Out of Control on Icy Highway

Services for Shiela Mae Charters Held Yesterday Afternoon

Funeral services for Miss Shiela Mae Charters, 16-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Charters of Reno township were held yesterday afternoon (Thursday) at the Reno Baptist Church. Miss Charters was fatally injured Monday morning in an automobile accident. Miss Sandra Carleton of Whittemore, another passenger in the car, sustained head injuries. The accident occurred just outside of Standish.

The two young women, students at the Arenac County Normal, were riding from their homes to Standish with Miss Ida Bentley of Reno township, who was driving to Freeland. Miss Bentley is a teacher at Freeland.

Where the accident occurred, highway US-23 was covered with ice last Monday morning. The car, getting out of control, went onto the shoulder of the road hitting a mail box. The impact tore the right hand door open and the car skidded sideways down the road. Miss Charters and Miss Carleton were thrown from the car. Miss Bentley, although badly shaken up, remained in the car.

Both of her companions were injured in the fall to ground. Miss Charters died from a fractured skull shortly after being taken to the Standish Hospital. Miss Carleton, now at the hospital, is suffering from head injuries.

Miss Charters was born October 3, 1935, at East Tawas. She was a graduate of Whittemore High School.

Surviving are the parents; three brothers, Haldon, Byron and Norman; two sisters, Sharon and Wanda; her grandparents, Mrs. Thomas Mason of Whittemore and Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Pappie of Sterling.

Rev. Jack Richards officiated at the funeral services. Interment was in the Reno Cemetery.

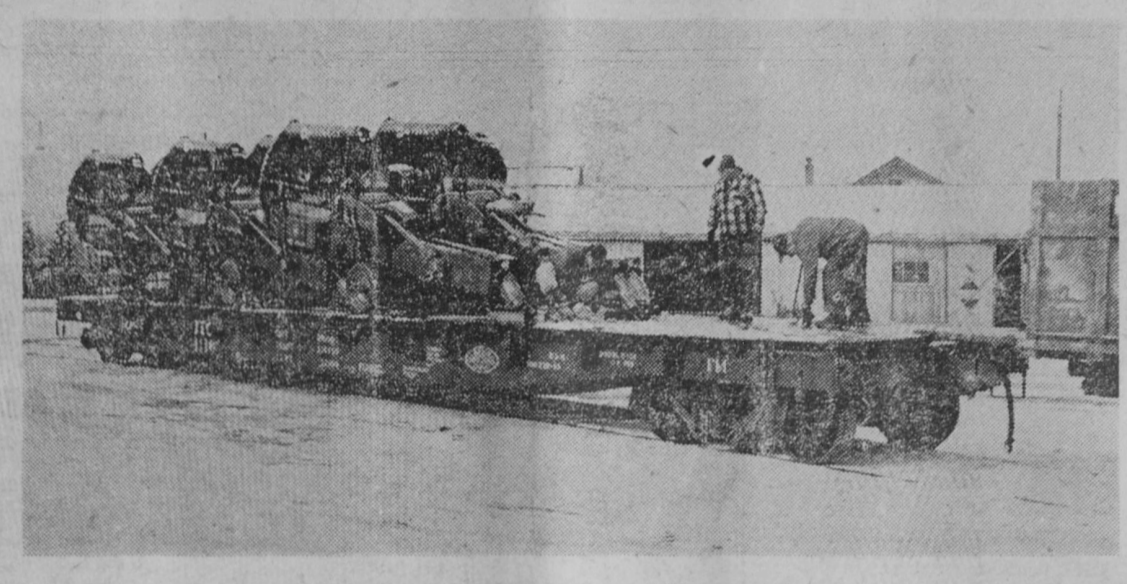
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Nine Tawas Churches Take Part in Christmas Pageant

Hunter's Bullet Kills Battle Creek Man

Accident Occurred Tuesday Afternoon In Alcona County

Dwight Akers, machine operator at the Sherman Manufacturing Company plant, Battle Creek, was fatally wounded by a rifle bullet Tuesday afternoon near Glennie. The injured man died while being brought to the Tawas Hospital.

The accident occurred at about 3 o'clock. Akers and his companion, William Freeman, were hunting in Curtis township, Alcona county. They were a short distance apart when Freeman heard the report of a rifle fired in their vicinity. He investigated and found that Akers had been shot through the body. State Police at East Tawas were called and the wounded man was rushed to the hospital.

An investigation of the accident was made by State Police, Coroner E. John Moffatt and the Sheriff's Department of Alcona county. Up to Thursday morning the person who fired the shot had not been located.

2 Young Men Face Larceny Charges

Kenneth Joseph Mexico of Highland Park and Robert Charles Mexico of Ecorse, brothers, were taken before Justice H. E. Friedman, charged with larceny from an automobile. Bond was set at \$2,000 and they are now in the county jail awaiting trial in circuit court.

The two young men were picked up by State Police working out of Mio, Saturday a 375 Magnum and a 500 Remington were taken from a car in the parking lot across from the Holland Hotel. The rifles were owned by R. J. Chamberlain of Kankakee, Illinois, and valued at \$500. An investigation in the Tawas area revealed that two men had been looking for ammunition for rifles of similar type at hardware stores. The descriptions of the men were put out by State Police radio broadcast, over the area and the men were picked up Tuesday night.

Bible Comment:

Understanding Book of Psalms Aids Appreciation

ISRAEL'S great songbook is, of course, the Book of Psalms. It is not the form or structure of the Psalms that is of chief importance; it is their contents and message. But it may help to add an appreciation and understanding of them and their rich beauty if the nature of Hebrew poetry is realized.

Many people associate poetry with the idea of rhyme. There is rhythm, often cadences, in the poetry of the Psalms, but no rhyme.

Instead, the structure of Hebrew poetry consists in some form of parallel statement, in similarity, contrast or in some extension or amplification of the thought.

Strict adherence to these forms is found everywhere throughout the Psalms. An appreciation of the form and structure of the poetry will dispel an impression of undue repetition that one might otherwise receive.

The apparent repetition is intended, and one may judge for himself how it not only gives a sense of rhythm, but adds to the emphasis of the thought.

In the Psalms is a strong sense of life and movement, typical of the history of Israel and its religious life.

Pilgrimage was of the very essence of that history—the pilgrimage of Abraham to Canaan, the descent into Egypt and the return through the wilderness, the Exile to Babylon and the return to the homeland.

And "going up" was of the very essence of worship—ascending to "the hill of the Lord," going to Jerusalem for the religious festivals.

The Psalms are poems of religion on the march.

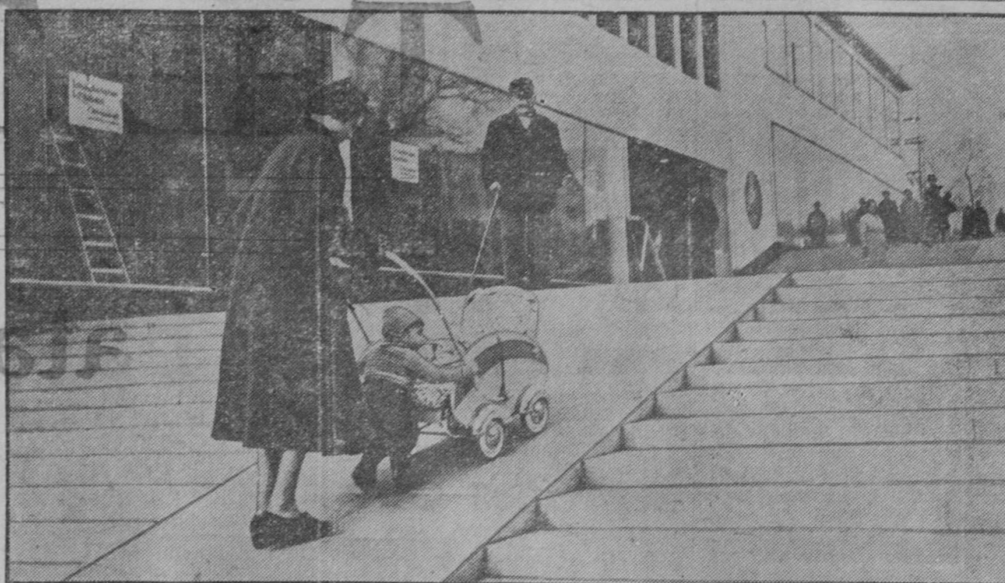

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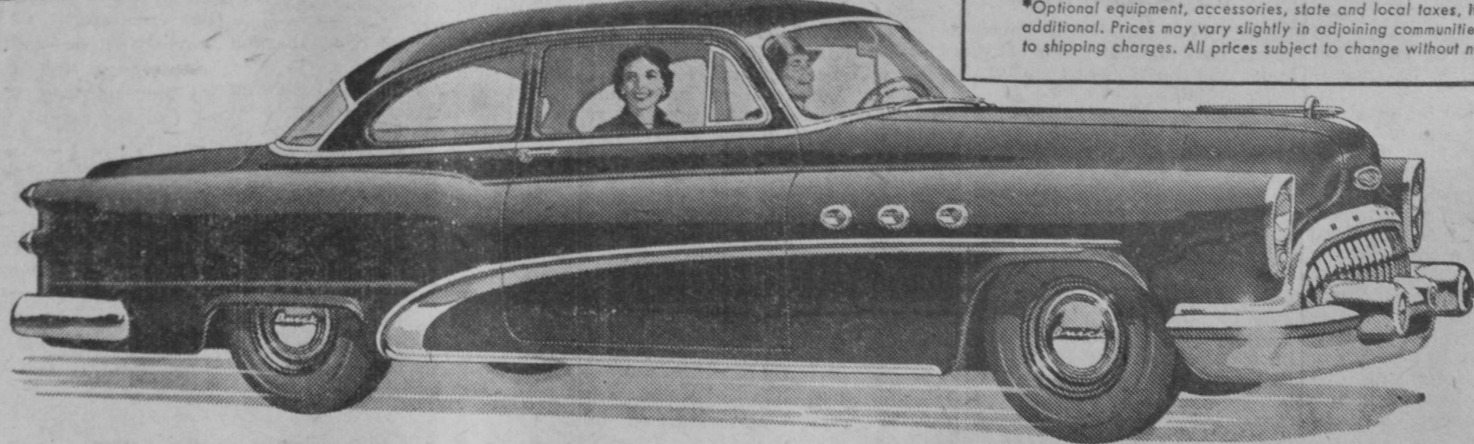

name for PMA (Production and Marketing Administration Committee), resulting as one part of the Department of Agriculture reorganization being effected by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson.
 The name change is but one of the items to note. Isoco farmers who have been participating in the 1953 ACP program, or may have plans to do so in 1954, need particularly to catch up now with the first different procedure to be used under the new ASC organization.
 No farmer committeeman will call at your farm, offering to sign you up for agricultural conservation practices you plan

 Within a few days all Isoco county farmers will be receiving a letter that provides information to help them be prepared to select the practices for which they wish to sign-up during this coming year.

There are several kinds of inventory. By now many of you have discovered we in the Extension Service office have one to do this year.....a mailing list inventory.

We maintain two kinds of mailing lists, general and special. It is aimed to have on the general mailing list names of all families who wish to receive information of interest to everyone, information about such subjects as community service, health, safety, income tax, etc. Currently this list numbers about 800 names.

As you can see, it is to both yours and our interest to develop special mailing lists that are shorter, yet put information about the right things in the right places (saves on reading for you and writing for us). Examples are: Crops, livestock, tourist and resort, fruit, home economics, etc.

The survey questionnaire coming to you now lists some 27 special interests of Isoco county people. By checking those that apply to your family, as well as your correct name and address, we will be better able to serve you.

If you do not receive a copy of the questionnaire, it means your name is not now on any list we have. We will be glad to add it, however, if you wish. Just drop us a postcard requesting a mailing list questionnaire to fill in.

State Police Give Report on October Activities

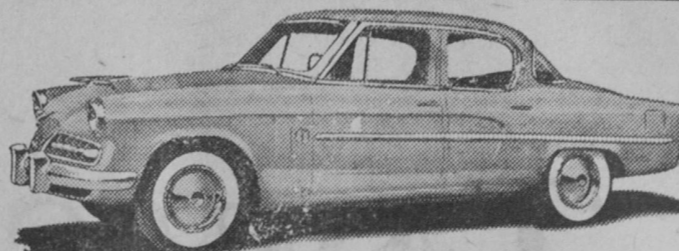
Michigan State Police made 6,759 arrests during October, of which 5,810 were for traffic offenses. In addition, there were 318 wayward and delinquent minors and juvenile traffic offenders.

Officers made 22,391 property inspections and 3,110 liquor inspections. Total miles traveled in all activities was 976,898.

The East Lansing headquarters received 5,132 sets of criminal fingerprints and 2,262 non-criminal fingerprints. Of 1,182 sets processed for licenses to carry concealed weapons, 122 of the applicants were found to have criminal records.

The bureau of identification also compiled 3,078 criminal records and furnishes 9,496 copies to police and sheriffs' departments throughout the state.

 What kind of a person is a State 4-H Club Contest winner? Have you ever wondered about that? This week we would like to let you know about one who has been selected as a representative of Northern Michigan 4-H Clubs to attend the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago November 27-December 4.

Her trip is being sponsored by the J. C. Penney Company stores in the north Michigan area.....the first time this particular opportunity has been available to our 4-H Club Junior Leaders, specifically.

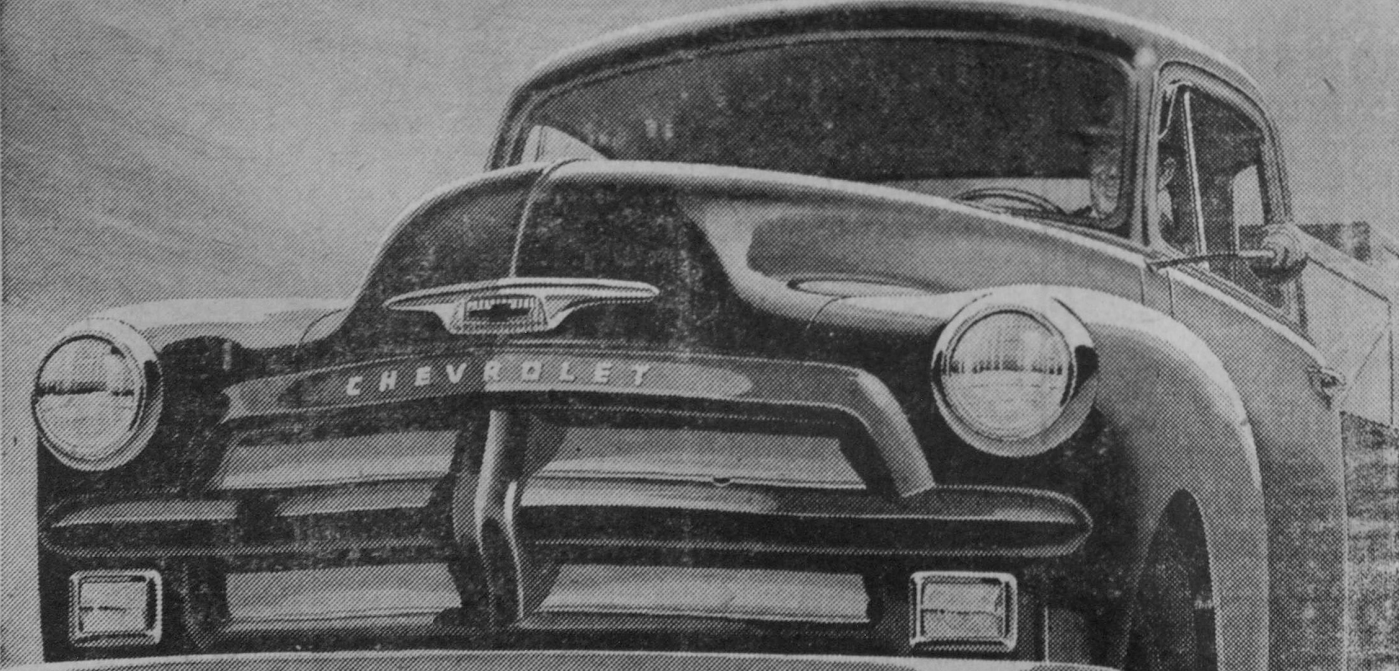
now I have a knitting club of my own. Through recreation I have kept a more balanced schedule, building toward better health.

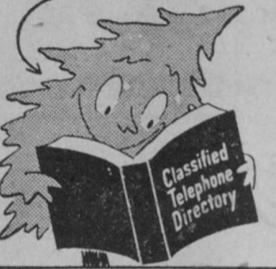
Postmaster Coyle Gives Some Yule Suggestions

DRUNK DRIVERS GO TO JAIL

Chief George Ruth today announced that the police department of Tawas City is cooperating with the Michigan Liquor Control Commission and the State Safety Commission on the December state-wide emphasis program aimed at reducing accidents due to drunk driving. According to Chief Ruth, the drunk driver is one of the worst menaces to traffic safety. Not only does he cause many accidents and injure and kill numerous people but his intoxicated condition places him beyond any public sympathy. The legislature felt so strongly about the motorist who gets drunk and drives that it passed a law providing for a mandatory suspension of the driver's license for 90 days. Many judges believe the crime of drunk driving so serious that they impose jail sentences. To acquaint the public with this program, 15,000 posters and 300,000 table tents will be used. The posters read, "Drunk Drivers Go To Jail" and the table tents read, "If you are driving TAKE IT EASY—Don't lose Your driver's License." The seriousness of the drunk driving problem is shown by the following figures from the National Safety Council: —in 23 out of 100 fatal accidents a driver or a pedestrian had been drinking. —among drivers involved in fatal accidents for whom condition was reported, 18 out of 100 had been drinking. —among pedestrians involved in fatal accidents, 26 out of 100 had been drinking." In conclusion Chief Ruth called

ed upon all motorists to cooperate on the December traffic safety program. "As the holiday season approaches it is a good time to remember that driving an automobile safely requires the best mental and physical resources of the driver."

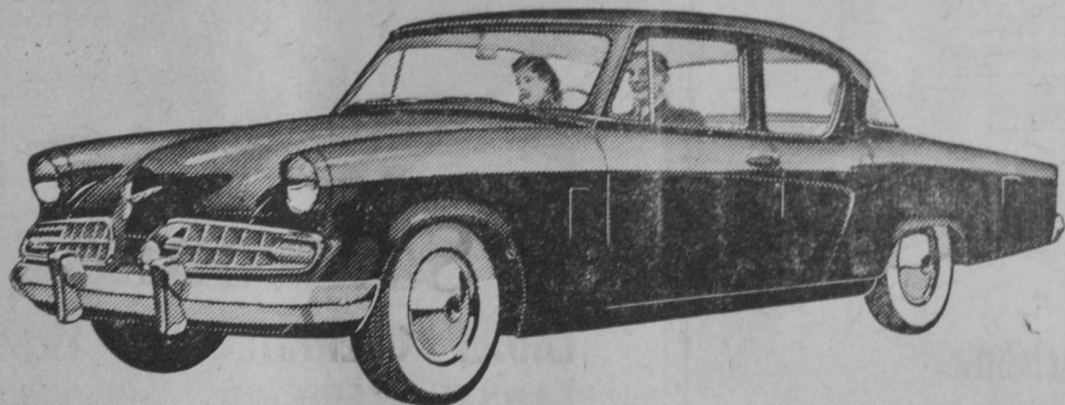

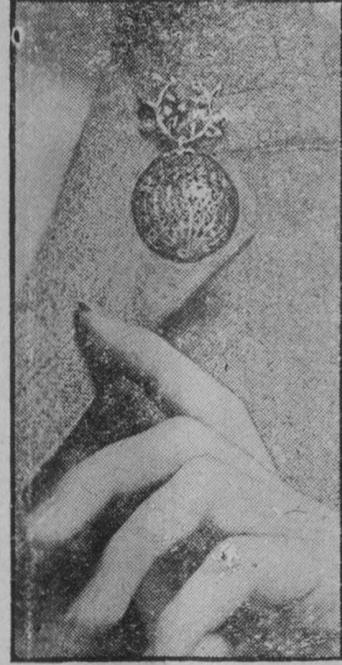

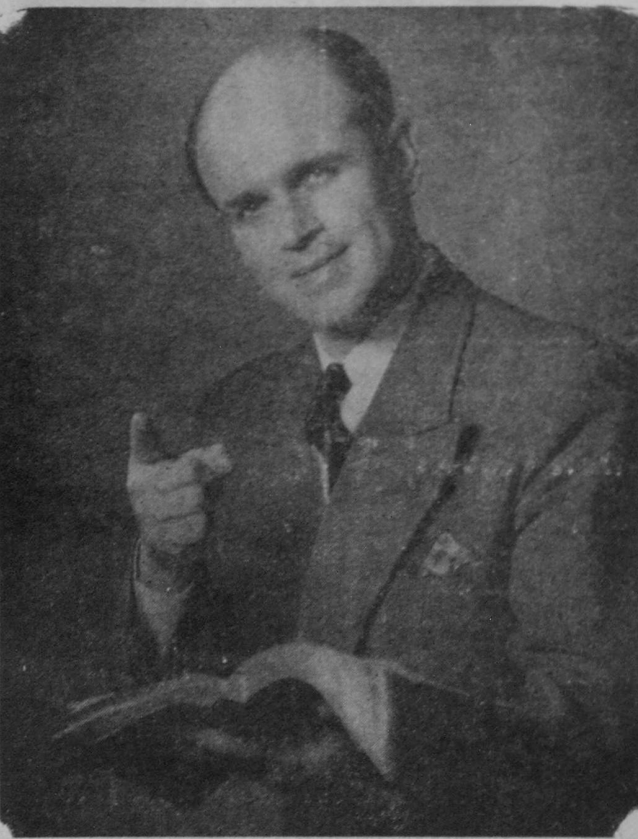
Mrs. George Rice Presents Paper to 20th Century Club

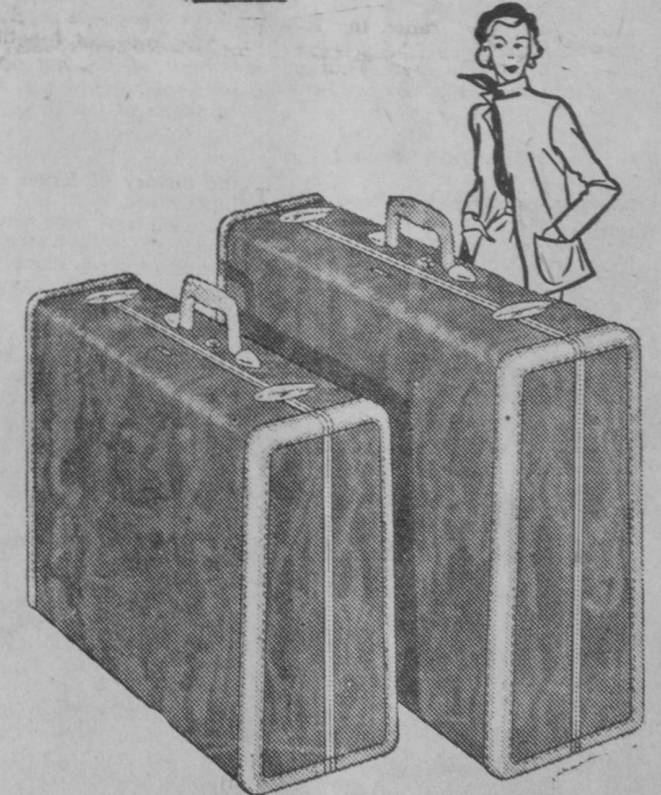
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
