Movie Film Depicts Danger of Overweight

An animated color cartoon, "Cheers For Chubby," which tells how and why overweight people should reduce, will be shown on Friday and Saturday, July 3 and 4, at the Family Theatre. The eight minute cartoon has been highly recommended by Dr. A. E. Heustis, state health commissioner.

Dr. Heustis described the film as entertaining, and pointed out that it conveys an important message to the people of Michigan.

"Overweight is a major health problem with special significance for persons who have or may develop chronic diseases," Dr. Heustis said. "Control of weight can and will result in a substantial increase in length of life."

The cartoon was produced by Jerry Fairbanks, Inc., of Hollywood for the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, in cooperation with the United States Public Health Service and the American Medical Association. It is being shown in Michigan Theatres as a public service.

With the two were Mrs. Mathews two daughters, 11 and 12 years old.

The presence of Tompkins and Mrs. Mathews in the AuSable river cabin area Sunday morning aroused suspicions and Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell was notified. He, with Cpl. Frank Roti of the State Police, while searching the area, met Mrs. Mathews on her way to a gas station to have a tire repaired. The car had redeveloped a flat tire and had been concealed in the brush near the highway. Tompkins, who was lying on the ground near the car, fled to the woods when he saw the approaching officers. A road block was placed around the area, but Tompkins slipped through and walked to Hale the next morning where he was arrested by Deputy Herman Huber.

Tompkins, an employee at the Buick plant in Flint, is a parolee from Southern Michigan Prison. He has served time for previous cabin robberies along the AuSable river. He and an accomplice are also facing charges of stealing two automobiles from a Lansing used car lot.

On arraignment Wednesday before Justice H. E. Friedman, Mrs. Mathews waived examination and bond was set at \$1,000.

"Any individual who finds it difficult to obtain or hold a job because of some physical illness or defect is invited to see me there," Harvey said. "If that individual is unable to finance the surgical or medical care necessary to eliminate the employment handicap, our agency is able to provide the physical restoration required."

"If the handicap is not removable, vocational training may be provided to insure earning capacity despite the physical limitation."

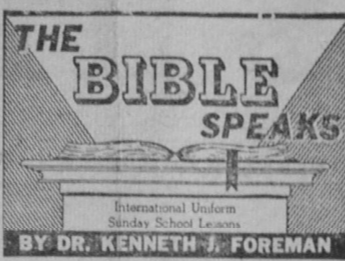

God Is Righteous

Lesson for July 5, 1953

MAYBE it is because righteous is not a singable word. (Is there any rhyme for it?) Maybe it is because the word has a hard ring to it in some ears. It seems to suggest something rigid and un-benign, like a poker or a fence-post. Anyway, for some reason or other, we do not hear much about God's being righteous. Words like "love" or "mercy" are used more often. We hear of the high and holy God, the almighty, or we hear of the loving Father of all. But we do not hear often enough of the God who first and last and always is the righteous God.

A Righteous God Or None

The Bible's God is a righteous God. But the writers of the Bible did not shiver when they wrote that word. They did not believe and tremble, they believed and were glad. In fact, nobody who gives the question the serious thought it deserves would be interested in God if he were not righteous. An un-righteous God would be no God at all but a kind of devil. Righteousness means being right, first of all. It means seeing things as they are, seeing past the surface to the heart of things. No one who sees men and character dimly or crookedly can be righteous.

But righteousness is more than being right. It means being right-in-action. It includes being just and fair, though it is more than that, too. Some one might be fair because the rules compelled him to be. He might be fair to others so that they in turn would be fair to him. Righteousness means not only justice in act, but justice in desire. It means the love of justice and not only the practice of it. Righteousness—the Bible word—in addition means dependability. The original meaning of the word was "imply 'straight'."

Justice For All

God is like man in one respect. His actions speak louder than his words. The writers of the Bible, Old Testament and New, more often speak of God's righteous acts than of his righteous words. It remained for the Apostle Paul to sum up the case for God's righteousness. It is shown, he says—demonstrated, that is to say—in two ways. These two ways are enlarged in the early chapters of Romans as well as elsewhere in Paul's writings.

First of all, the justice of God expresses His righteousness. God is no " respecter of persons;" in other words, He plays no favorites. Paul's own people, the Jews, had misunderstood what it meant to be the "chosen" people. They had supposed it meant they were God's favorites, though the prophets had long tried to explain that "chosen" meant chosen for service, appointed. Some people today think that "Nordics" or Americans or some other group is God's chosen people, His favorites. His pets so to speak. No, the Bible teaching is that in God's sight all men stand on an equal footing.

Redemption For All

If this were all that could be said, we of the human race would be in a hopeless hole. As Paul shows, the fact that God treats all men alike in the long run, is no comfort at all; it only means that the verdict "GUILTY" must be pronounced on us all. Comparing what we are with what we ought to be, not even we ourselves can honestly say much for ourselves. If God's righteousness were nothing but an even-handed justice, it would be a searing flame. But it is more. The other way God shows His righteousness is in His mercy. In His coming to us in Christ, He has made salvation—that is, the setting-free from the deadly whirling wheeling of sin and destruction—He made this free to all. He forces mercy on no one. But if He offered mercy and forgiveness only to a selected few—or for that matter, only to a selected many—then while He might be called merciful He could hardly be called righteous. If God saved everyone, regardless of how they still not be righteous. He saves those who have faith, that is, those who humbly accept what they realize they can never earn—the transforming love of God. For one of the glorious things about God is that He is not only righteous—He shares His righteousness.

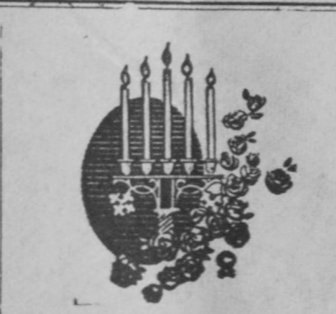

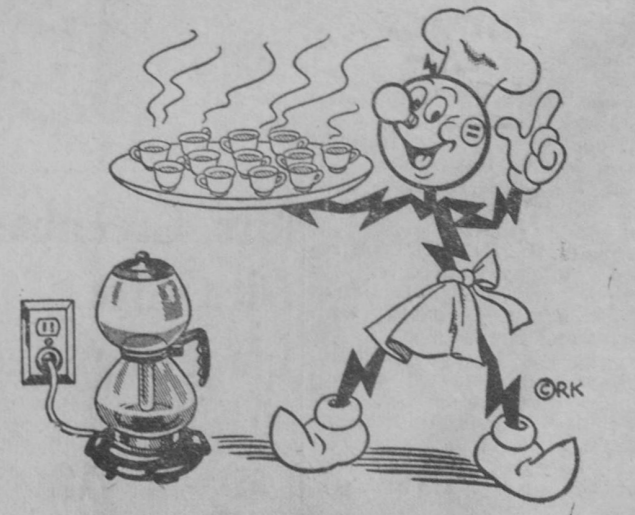

Attic Is Often The Answer To Home Space Problems

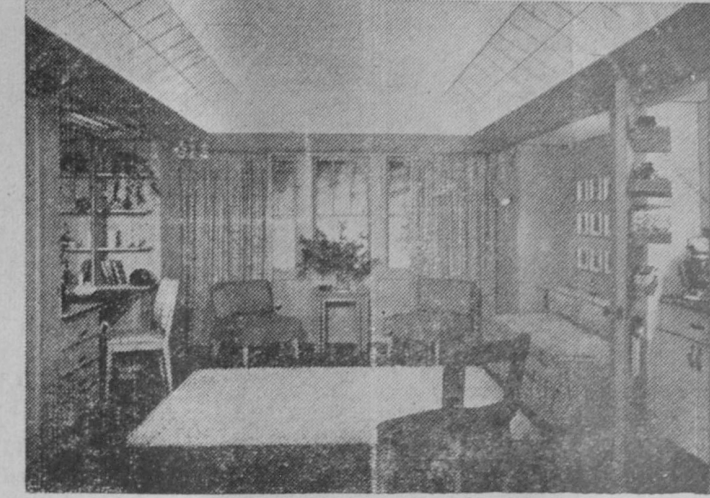

MICHIGAN OUTDOORS
 with MORT NEFF

BASS RIVERS IN MICHIGAN
 On a recent "Michigan Outdoors" television program Professor Karl Lagler of the School of Natural Resources, University of Michigan, came up with an idea that bears careful consideration on behalf of Michigan anglers—particularly those with a love for black bass. Professor Lagler says we're overlooking a good bet by failing to establish and encourage small-mouth bass in many Michigan rivers.

While a good deal of the sportsmen's money goes toward the rearing and planting of trout in northern streams, our "warm water" hatchery activities are almost at a standstill. Professor Lagler calls this unfair to a very large group of fishermen confined to the lakes and rivers of southern Michigan.

Plenty of Bass Lakes
 Thousands of our inland lakes all over Michigan contain large small-mouth black bass. A few rivers have a fair supply, and those who know where those rivers are, and what sections offer good bass fishing just don't talk about it. The sport's too good and the fish plentiful enough to support a mass attack!

If you've never floated or waded a good bass river in search of the

SCORES OF RIVERS SUITABLE

Illinois is traversed by dozens of streams suitable to small-mouth bass according to Lagler. While pollution sometimes a problem, headwaters are generally clean, and bass don't need exceptionally deep water.

Typical of these waters now is the Taron River near Milford, the Thornapple, the Shiawassee and several others.

Professor Lagler, a long-time expert on warm water species of fish, says that a little money and effort on the part of the Conservation Department's Fish Division would open up miles of fine bass fishing in rivers close to the populous southern sections of the State.

A minority faction—the trout fishermen—is getting close to a half-million dollar break to keep his sport going. If Lagler's right maybe it's time to distribute the budget a little differently for the promotion of better fishing in southern Michigan.

County Agent News

It was Mrs. Harold Black and Juvenile Grangers that set the growth of 1,000 Fir trees in motion. This group made a seed bed four feet by ten and one-half feet near Arthur Aulerich's Implement Shop on M-55, sifted the necessary soil, obtained the seed through our office and planted them last week. It really is a little late to do the planting but with proper care by Ronnie Aulerich, Sharon, Grace, Roy, Ray and Faye Pangel, Ila Shortt, Larry Emers and Charles Mielock, they should do well.

While we are in Burleigh township we should mention some of the changes that have taken place in their Community 4-H Club. Gerald Bellen resigned as community leader and Harold Black was named to replace him. Gerald will continue on with the corn project work for the rest of this year. Kathleen Provoast was elevated to the presidency of her club. Thomas St. James became the vice-president as reported by Marie Chipps, the club's secretary.

Phenothiazine and salt still are the basis of a sound worm control program in the sheep flock. Graydon Blank, extension sheep specialist at Michigan State College, states that a mixture of one pound of phenothiazine and 12 to 14 pounds of trace mineralized salt should be kept before the flock at all times during the pasture season.

In order to make this worm control program work effectively there should be a salt box which will protect the mixture from the weather. (There's an idea for a handicraft member). Plans for the box can be obtained from our office in East Tawas.

I'm always pleased to look over the calendar book for those folks requesting assistance from the Cooperative Extension Service. Mrs. Ivan Alexander and Mrs. Emil Cholger each have problems with weeds and insects. To others of you may we ask that you stop in and pick up one of our folders about your particular problem? They're free and are based on facts.

Delbert Albertson's request on control of mosquitoes brings the recommendation of using lindane in buildings and surrounding yard area for such control. Go to your local druggist, hardware or feed store for the manufacturer's directions. Again we have some bulletin material that can be a help to all of you. I know our tourist and resort folks will be interested in this type of control, too.

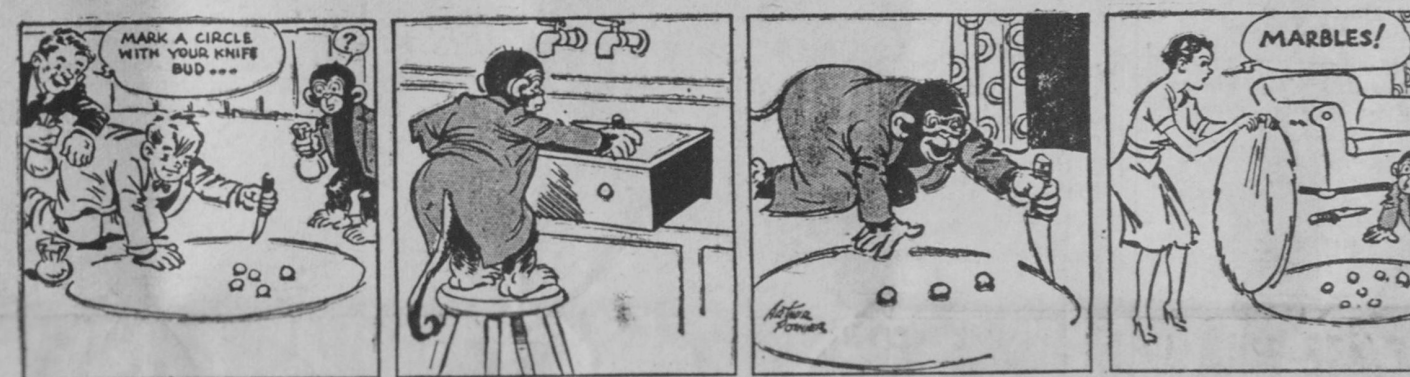

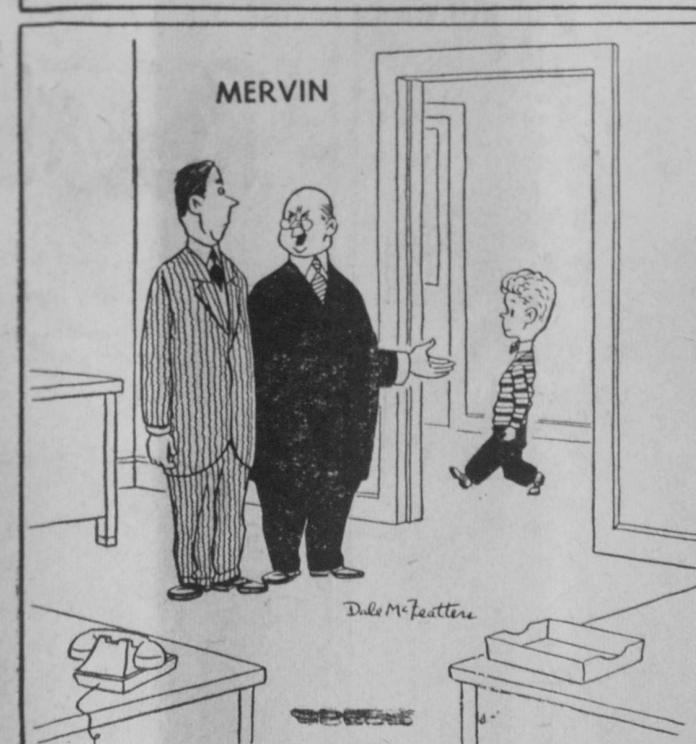
