He is Head when his ideas are known, followed and loved He is Head when every one has the habit of thinking. Is this what He would do? He is Head when said himself that he came not to be served but to serve; and the Christian home is one where every member of it carries out that purpose of Christ. When in a home there is prayer each day in His name—that is to say, when all the daily prayers of the family are not fust "Gimme" prayers but such as Christ Himself would endorse, when time is taken out every day for prayer and all togeth er at least once in the twenty-four hours think quietly about what it means to be Christian, then it is more and more likely that Christ will be truly the Head of that house.
