State Would Force Action on County Jail

June Session of Supervisors Ends Tuesday Afternoon

The county jail, which has been continuously under criticism by the Michigan Department of Corrections for a number of years, was emphatically brought to the attention of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors at the two-day June meeting which ended Tuesday afternoon.

The Department of Corrections threatened to close the jail within 90 days if some concrete action was not taken. The department pointed out the following defects and gave the jail a zero rating: Serious fire hazard, electric wiring poor and unsafe, no segregation among male prisoners, poor physical structure of the building, overcrowded condition.

The board authorized the securing of the services of Joseph Goddoyne, architect, to prepare rough plans of a jail for consideration by the board. The preliminary sketch to be made with the cooperation of the jail inspector of the Michigan Department of Corrections.

In addition to the routine business which appears at each session, the board authorized that a public auction be held to dispose of the furniture and surplus old equipment when the several county department offices are moved into the new county building. There have been many inquiries regarding this material and this was thought to be an equitable way to dispose of it.

Bids are being asked for wrecking and salvaging the old courthouse.

The board approved the appointment of Arthur Davenport to fill the vacancy of county agricultural agent made by the resignation of Harold Clark.

An appropriation of \$100.00 was made to be used in checking the hearing of school children in the county. This action was a result of a recommendation made by County School Superintendent Russell Rollin.

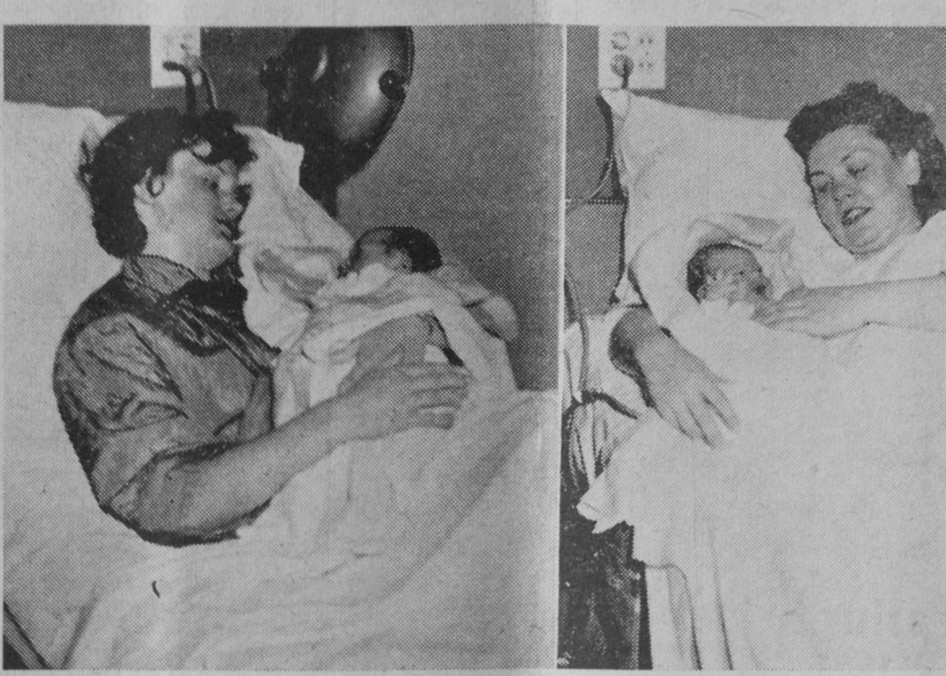
The resolution was made after considering the results of the special election recently held in the Baldwin district. A majority of the voters indicated that they were not in favor of joining the Tawas Area District.

"It is our feeling that the electors of the Tawas Area School would be glad to welcome Baldwin District No. 3 as a part of our school district, but that they would be unwilling to accept the students from that district under any other arrangements," Reynolds Mick, superintendent of the Tawas schools, said today. "This decision of the board includes high school students as well as grade students."

"Tawas Area School District cannot be forced by any laws now existing to accept students outside this district."

Diet Advice Given Iosco Blood Donors

"A number of people appear at the blood bank unit whose blood donation cannot be used because they had eaten the wrong food during donation day," state members of the county blood bank committee.

The blood bank unit will be at the Community Building at East Tawas next Monday and Tuesday.

Your much needed blood donation will be effective if the following suggestions as to diet are followed:

Fats and fatty foods be restricted in the diet of prospective blood donors on the day of their donation. Such foods should be eliminated from the diet within four hours of the scheduled donation.

The main articles of food to be restricted or eliminated are whole milk, cream, butter, oleomargarine, gravy, fried foods, fat meats, mayonnaise, French or other oil salad dressings, cream soups, pie, cake, doughnuts, cream cheese, nuts and peanut butter and chocolate candy bars.

It is considered better for the prospective blood donor to eat meals at the regular meal times. The elimination of the meal before a scheduled blood donation is not recommended.

A person who gives a pint of blood wants it to be used to save lives. Consequently the Michigan Department of Health urges that the above recommendations be followed carefully to insure such use of the blood so given.

Red Cross and Federal Aid Made Available

Grants of \$1,518.86 were approved by the Iosco disaster advisory committee of the American Red Cross at a meeting held Tuesday evening. The gifts represented clothing to disaster victims and in one instance material for replacement of a small home for one of the unfortunate.

Miss Mae Jordan, field representative of the relief operation of the American Red Cross, is here receiving applications, and making investigations of the cases.

Necessary steps by the field representative to verify statements as to ownership of property, income, liabilities, losses, and other factors involved in determining need, and will then help the family plan for its recovery.

When the plan is completed, it is carefully considered by the director of the relief operation and the local advisory committee; if it is approved, the amount of the award is determined. The family is then asked to come to the Red Cross disaster office to talk over plans for acquiring the goods or services specified in the award. Orders on merchants will then be issued and contracts entered into for rebuilding and repair of homes.

Federal Aid Available

In a telegram Tuesday Congressman Elford A. Cederberg stated that the Secretary of Agriculture had placed Iosco county in the tornado disaster district along with five other Michigan counties.

The counties are Oakland, Macomb, Genesee, Lapeer, Sanilac, St. Clair and Iosco.

Loans will be granted to assist in the rehabilitation of farms which have been damaged in the recent tornado. Applications for such loans should be made with Russell Johnson, farm home administrator, West Branch, Cederberg said.

Alabaster Wins Third Victory

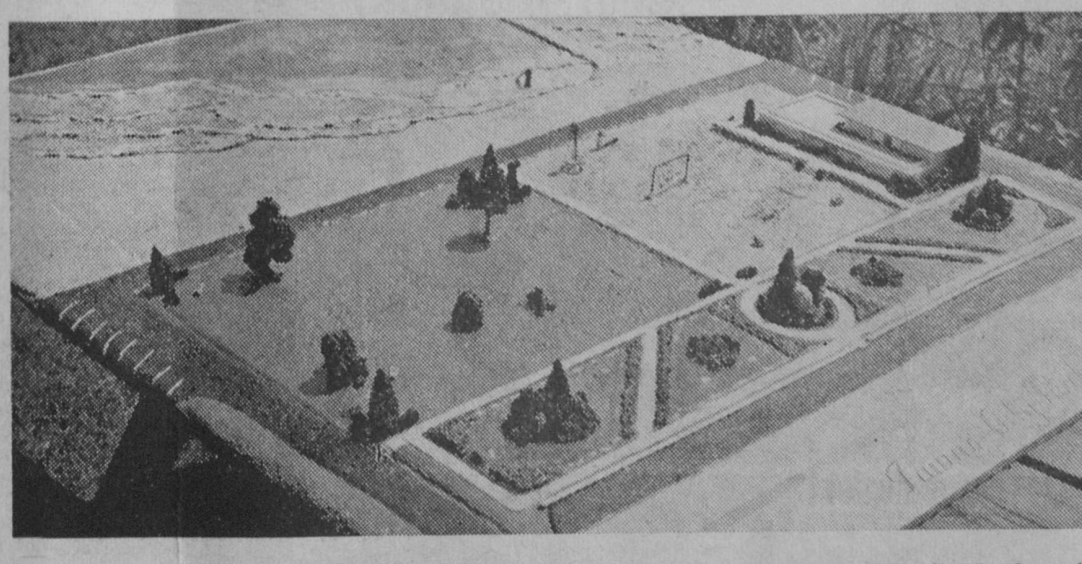

THE BIBLE SPEAKS

International Bible Sunday School Lessons

Scripture: Galatians 5-6.
Devotional Reading: Galatians 6:1-10.

Free—Then What?

Lesson for June 21, 1953

TWO kinds of people pay little attention to law. One kind is made of very bad citizens, so bad that sometimes they lose their citizenship. The other kind is made up of those who are the best citizens. Sometimes they even receive medals or other honors from their communities or from the state. How can this be?

The answer is that the first kind live far below the law; the second kind live far above it. Criminals and crooks are lawless because they are anti-social, they are enemies of society and do not want to be a part of the community. But the other kind of people go far beyond the law, as we saw last week. The best husbands probably do not know what the laws are which govern husbands' treatment of their wives. The best fathers may not know what the statutes are which prescribe the duties of parents. These husbands and fathers are far better than any law could make them.

Law In One Word
All this is true of the law of God, too. His laws are not a precise number of statutes and ordinances. His laws are not a code like a federal code or a municipal code. The entire law of God is summed up, Paul says, in one word, that is: Love. Now Paul would not for a moment deny that we ought to love God supremely. But here he is thinking about loving one's neighbor as oneself. No law, no shelf-full of statute books, no encyclopedia of decisions by the Supreme Court, can cover all cases. But love does cover all cases. You cannot always tell what the law says in a given case. Maybe the law says nothing at all. But love always has an answer.

We Know Love
Even if you do not know what the law is, you always know what love is. Because we do know, naturally and always, what it is to love ourselves. Loving yourself means keeping your own interests at heart, giving yourself the benefit of the doubt.

The divine law of love is: Be just as much interested in others as you are in yourself. Be willing to take trouble for them, watch out for them, give them the benefit of the doubt, think ahead for them. When St. Paul talks about Christians being free, he does not mean being free from love, but for love. What is it that ties us down and keeps us from loving our neighbor? Isn't it our love for ourselves? The Christian way of life is to be free from our own demands so as to be free to serve others.

When The Bible Does Not Speak

Some people think of the Bible as a kind of rule-book. Well, there are rules in it, and some of them are applicable to our modern problems. But we have some problems in modern living that the Bible says nothing about. For instance: Shall a Christian use tobacco? Is it a sin for the Christian to bear arms? These and many other questions are not dealt with in the Bible as flatly and sharply as "Thou shalt not steal." For this reason, many Christians think that if the Bible does not mention some problem in so many words, they are free to do as they please about it. By no means. The Christian is free from the law as a curse, as a condition of God's favor, or as a cage; but he is never free from the law of love. And since God is love, and since love is the law of our life as Christians, then the Bible always does have something to say about every situation. It has at least this to say: What does love—God's kind of love—suggest?

Freedom And The Spirit
Some Christians have made the mistake of thinking that if a person is spiritual enough, he will be set free from all human obligations. They have supposed that the law of love, in the sense of love to one's neighbor, is on a lower plane somehow than love of God; and that if a man once gets up to the stratosphere of the divine love, then he can simply forget the world outright. No one who takes his New Testament seriously can make that mistake. Read in Gal. 3:22-25 Paul's list of the fruits of the Spirit. These are not ripened in solitude, but in company with others and in their service.

A "look see" at Amos Hendrickson's chicks reminds us that it would be well to check your starter feeds for sources of vitamin "E." This vitamin has several sources with wheat germ oil being one of the sources. We often mistake the symptoms of this deficiency for paralysis. The sure way to find out is to contact your veterinarian.

Be on the look-out for sheep

scab. It has again made its appearance in Michigan. It has been discovered in four flocks numbering about 2,000 head. Each of these flocks have been thoroughly dipped under the supervision of Dr. Lee Davison, state veterinarian. In each case the scab has been eradicated. Until the recent cases were discovered, Michigan had been free of scab since 1946. All were traced to sheep shipped into the state. The state law requires that all sheep entering the state must be accompanied by a clean health certificate. The buyer should insist that this certificate accompany the sheep.

Work Permit Must Be Secured

First: Every boy and girl under the age of 18 years must secure a work permit to be legally employed.

Second: The total responsibility for securing such work permits rests with the employer.

Third: Employers must have approval from the Labor Commission to hire minors.

Fourth: Employers, after receiving approval, must fill out a form, "Offer of Employment," available at the County Superintendent of Schools Office, and present this form to the County Superintendent.

Fifth: Permits will be issued by the County Superintendent of Schools for each boy and girl under 18 years of age when employed and on the presentation of the form, "Offer of Employment." These permits are on file in the place of employment.

Sixth: All permits must be returned to the County Superintendent of Schools: 1. If the minor quits working; 2. If the minor is fired; 3. Or becomes 18 years of age.

The office of the County Superintendent of Schools is open daily, Monday through Friday, from 9:00 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. in the courthouse. He will assist any employer with any child labor problems which may occur.

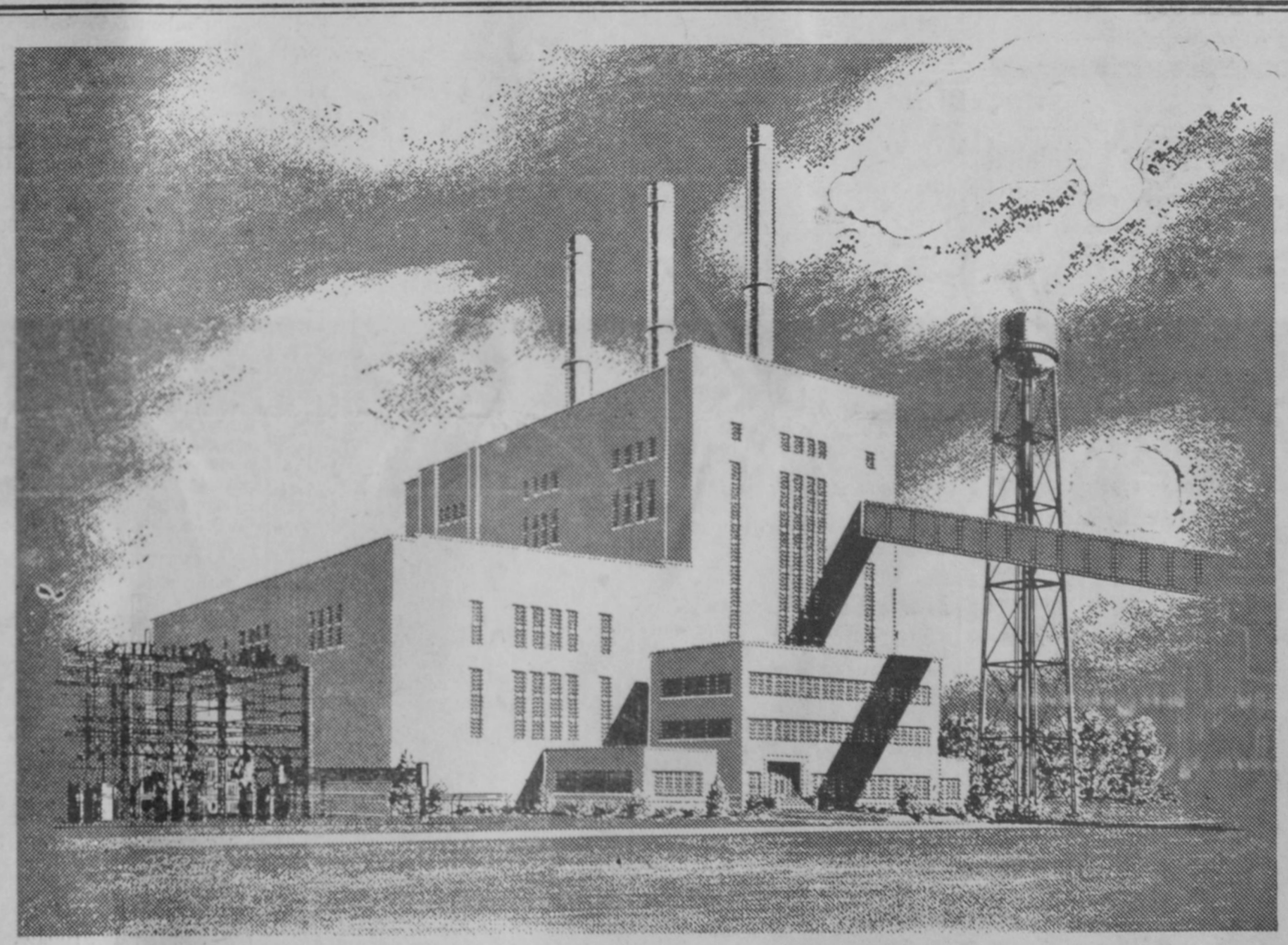

Michigan's new boat-safety regulations are attracting nation-wide attention. Henceforth every one of the many thousands of boats rented to the public must measure up to rigid specifications set up by the Michigan Waterways Commission.

Specifications Detailed

The capacity of any given boat is determined by a well defined formula in which the length, width and depth of the craft are deciding factors.

Each boat will carry a stenciled emblem on the side marking the waterline. If this stencil is submerged the boat is overloaded.

Oarlocks must be attached to oars, and oars must be fastened to the boat proper by a length of line or chain—a regulation which will prevent the loss of an oar when such a loss might mean the difference between life and death.

Planking through the craft must be sound. The inspector will check this with the sharp point of a knife to detect any possible weakness. Life preservers must be supplied for every passenger.

Costly Law

On the surface our new safety regulations look costly—both from an enforcement standpoint, and from the viewpoint of the boat livery operator. Many rickety old boats once rented by irresponsible liveries must be junked. But, in the long run all concerned should welcome the new set of rules.

Livery operators will be required to pay 50c per boat for the tag of approval following inspection, and as a result slightly higher rental prices can be expected throughout the state.

Furthermore the regulations will make good ammunition for tourist advertising in Michigan, where the importance of the tourist dollar cannot be over-estimated—an "industry" second only to the automobile business in cash value.

More safety afloat is sure to reflect favorably on the future of Michigan Outdoors.
