2,500 Visit Our New Tawas Hospital

The new \$650,000.00 Tawas Hospital received the approval and admiration of more than 2,500 Iosco county residents and visitors from all sections of the county last Saturday and Sunday. The occasion was an "open house" which preceded the opening of the hospital which is to occur within a few days.

People in groups, guided by members of the hospital board, toured through the various departments of the hospital. Hundreds of others made their own way through the building, spending as much time as they wish inspecting the department or equipment that was of particular interest to them. All were pleased with what they saw and felt that a miracle had been performed in building such a fine hospital here.

The hundreds who coursed through the building during the two afternoons, were greeted by the administrative staff, headed by Sister Rita Louise; the staff of nurses and nurses aids; members of the Tawas Hospital Auxiliary, and Dr. John LeClair, president of the Tawas Hospital Association, and the 25 members of the board of directors.

In each department a member of the administrative staff, a nurse or other member of the hospital personnel was there to give information about the equipment in that particular department. While all were interested in the hospital's medical and surgical departments, many lingered in the stainless steel equipped kitchen, or in the boiler room studying the heating plant and auxiliary power plant. The auxiliary power plant is a "standby" in case of an emergency such as a storm damaging the power company's transmission lines.

The hospital is now completely staffed with nurses, nurses aids, dietitians, hospital attendants and maintenance employees. Sister Rita Louise, hospital administrator, said Saturday, "We are ready to open the minute that all our equipment is here, which we hope will be within the next two or three weeks."

Pitching to only 24 batters, and striking our 14 batters, Revord of Tawas City hurled a 14-0, no hit game against East Tawas Tuesday afternoon. This game marks the last school game between these two teams, as next year they will have a combined athletic program under the Tawas Area School system.

Revord was exceptionally tough, with no East Tawas batters getting one out of the infield. He walked one and hit two opposing batters.

Tuesday, May 26, Tawas City downed East Tawas, 6 to 1. Revord was again on the mound and gave up four hits. Humphrey hit safely twice for the Elks, both doubles, and Darwood Leppard homered in the fourth.

The Tawas City Elks had a good season, winning seven and losing three, under Coach Mark Defibaugh.

Surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Alice Mapiet of East Tawas, Mrs. L. J. Hawkinson of San Francisco, California, Mrs. J. P. Quinn of Detroit; two nieces, and two nephews.

Former Tawas City Mayor Dies Sunday

Funeral Services for John Coyle, Sr., Held Wednesday Morning

John Coyle, Sr., highly esteemed resident of this city, died Sunday at Mercy Hospital, Bay City. Funeral services were held Wednesday morning from the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church.

A commercial fisherman for many years, Mr. Coyle came to Tawas City from Bay City as a partner in the Trudell Fisheries Company and an extensive fishing enterprise was established here. He continued as a commercial fisherman until his retirement several years ago. Previous to his entering the fishing industry, he had been a conductor on the Bay City street railways.

Mr. Coyle had a keen interest in the business progress of his city and had been active in civic affairs. He was a member of the city council for six years and had served the city as mayor for three terms.

He had been in poor health for a number of years. During the past week he was a patient at Mercy Hospital.

Born at Bay City on August 12, 1878, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Coyle. In 1905 he married Elizabeth Trudell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Trudell of Bay City.

Surviving are the widow; three sons, Michael T. Coyle of Bay City, John Coyle, Jr., and Edward Coyle, both of this city; a daughter, Mrs. Arthur Harmon of LaHabra, California; a sister, Mrs. Carrie Grant of Laguna Beach, California; and seven grandchildren.

Rev. Fr. Joseph Castaner officiated at the funeral services. Interment was in the Immaculate Heart of Mary Cemetery.

Accepts \$7,500 Settlement in Injury Suit

Originally given a \$25,000.00 jury verdict in Federal Court at Bay City last October, Miss Doris Tomlinson agreed to accept \$7,500.00 last Monday.

The suit had been against the Consumers Power Company. Miss Tomlinson was burned while trying to aid her father at the time he was electrocuted near the Tawas City limits in 1949. While preparing to drill a well, Mr. Tomlinson's drilling rig contacted a high tension wire.

Following the trial in October, the Consumers Power Company filed a motion for a new trial, holding that the \$25,000 verdict was excessive. An order was made May 12 by Judge Frank Picard granting a new trial if Miss Tomlinson did not agree to a compromise reduction. She filed her agreement and Judge Picard issued a new judgement in the amount of \$7,500.00 plus \$273.00 in attorney fees.

Baldwin District Votes Against Consolidation

The proposed annexation of School District No. 3, Baldwin township to the Tawas Area District was turned down by a vote of 19 to 23 in an election held in the Baldwin district last Monday evening.

When the consolidation proposal was being prepared for election last year, Baldwin District, No. 3, failed to secure enough petition signers to enter the project.

THE BIBLE SPEAKS
BY DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN
Scripture: II Corinthians 8, 9.
Devotional Reading: Luke 6:27-38.

Serve By Sharing
Lesson for June 7, 1953

A FIELD of soy beans in North Carolina; 87 head of steers in Colorado; a calf and egg s in Blosson, Texas; 1500 boxes of apples in Washington; hogs in North Dakota and chickens in Wisconsin. What ties all these together? These and hundreds of other products grown on farms were "Lord's Acre" and "Lord's Livestock" projects last year. Thousands of people in every part of the nation have been joining in such plans for more than 22 years now. The idea is to dedicate to the Lord's service a field, some head of cattle, whatever the farmer or housewife owns or can grow. The projects are varied; they are generally successful; but the greatest success has been in the happiness and satisfaction of those who have worked on these things.

Themselves First
The innumerable people who shared in dedicating their work in this way to God and his cause, have simply turned into action and experience what St. Paul laid down long ago to the church at Corinth. The Corinthian Christians were city people, not country people; but they were poor, not rich. Paul is urging them to give what they could, as they could; and in doing so brings out at least four principles of right giving.

First and foremost is that the best givers had first of all given their own selves to the Lord. The church has learned long ago that St. Paul was right. You can't expect big contributions or hard work from those who are still essentially selfish. You have to convert a man's heart before you can convert his money. And even if you gave God everything but yourself, you would not yet have given the very thing He wants most of all.

Sharing the honor

"They simply begged us to accept their gifts and so let them share the honor of supporting their brothers in Christ." So Phillips translates II Cor. 8:4. Paul is describing the way in which the churches up in Macedonia had contributed to what we would call the benevolent fund. Christian giving is all in the way the giver looks at it. If it is thought of as a burden, if it is thought of as something only the wealthy can rightly do, if it is thought of as something the preacher keeps begging for, a kind of chore at best, then of course the giving won't be much. It will be only enough to keep from giving nothing at all. But giving in the cause of Christ, for the use and help of God's people, is an opportunity, not a chore. There is all the difference in the world between the giver who says (in effect), "Well, if you must have something . . ." and the one who says, "Do let me get in on this."

The Lord Loves

The Bible does not encourage any one to fancy that he can buy his way into God's favor. God's smile is not for sale. God loves a cheerful giver, even though He sends turns away givers of any sort. A sour and selfish man might be high-pressure into gloomily squeezing a few dollars into the church budget, and those dollars will do some good; but the Bible does not suggest that God cares much for that sort of giving. Giving till it hurts may be good; but giving till it doesn't hurt is better! We remember Jesus' comment on the offering of the wealthy Pharisees and the poor widow. Is there any one who can thank God loved her and them alike?

Carrying Through

So there are three principles of Christian giving: personal dedication, a sense of privilege in sharing God's work, and enthusiasm. As Paul puts it (again Phillip's translation): "Show that you can complete what you set out to do with as much efficiency as you showed readiness to begin." (II Cor. 8:11). A good Lord's Acre project calls for more than enthusiasm in the springtime. It has to have hard work most of the summer. The work of the church, and indeed every undertaking for the welfare of mankind, is best carried on not by those who blow all their steam at once, but by those who save up some steam for the long steady pull. Long mileage is worth more than a flashy start.

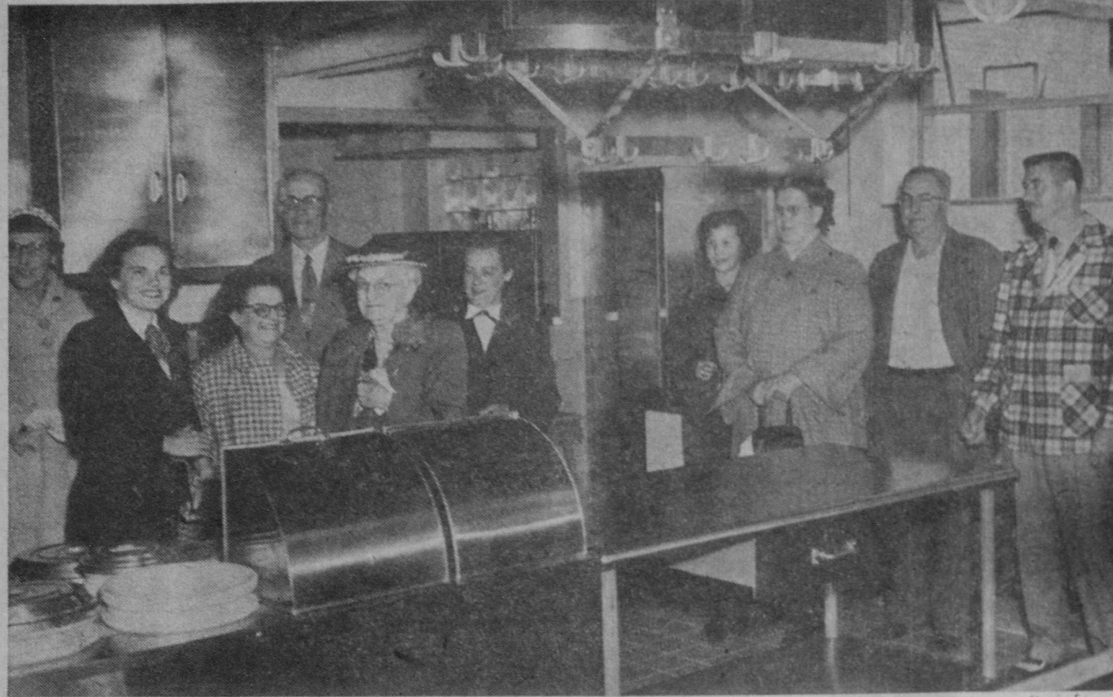

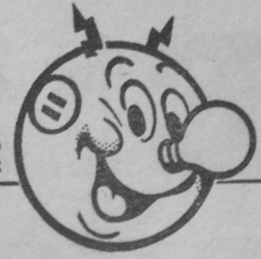

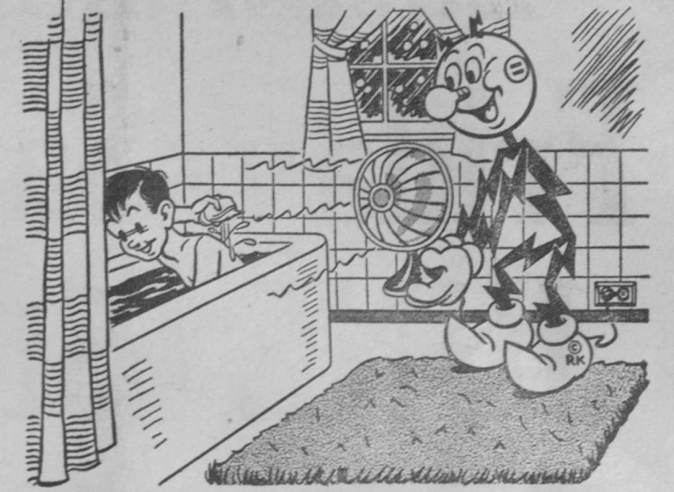

GREAT LAKES BASS
Sometimes it takes the non-resident sportsman to find out where the best fishing in Michigan is available. Such is the case with Great Lakes bass—both small and large mouth. During the first two weeks of the season which opens June 20th you'll find Ohio anglers galore along certain shore lines of certain Great Lakes, wading and floating in what usually amounts to a most successful search for black bass. To be sure you'll meet Michigan fishermen there, too, but they'll be outnumbered!

Choice Spots
There are rocky reefs for those who can find them in Lake Erie between Monroe and Toledo. Water lies no more than 3 to 4 feet deep over these shoals this year, and with warmer water temperatures in this shallower lake bass will have completed spawning, and will be "on the feed."

But better fishing is to the north. From Harbor Beach around to Caseville the shoreline of the Thumb is home sweet home to herds of big bass—almost all small-mouth in that area. To be specific about "where to go," there's a rock and shale formation just off Port Hope which always attracts the fish during the early part of the season. Crawfish scampers along to hide beneath the crumbling shale. During the scampering a goodly number are gobbled up by bass, moving into

water no more than 10 inches deep in frenzied early morning hunts. With an offshore breeze or calm water, the wading fisherman can spin-cast small plugs and wobblers, or spinner and nightcrawlers, with a good chance to bring home five nice bass. Casting close to submerged rocks which may run as much as 5 feet in diameter usually produces best action.

Boats Available
While there are a few boat liveries scattered along the shore it's best to carry your own or plan to wade. "Whisky Harbor" east of the coast guard light at Port Hope has one livery, with cabin accommodations, too. And there are others near Port Austin.

May Use Fly Rods
Spinning tackle is most deadly because of its distance casting possibilities, but fly rod fishermen, using any spinners or plugs take their limits, too. Moving west of Port Austin down the Bay shoreline to Caseville one finds bass fishing reefs in somewhat deeper water, requiring boat fishing.

In the Sebawaing area, around the huge bullrush islands, prime bass waters await you. Here you'll find the large-mouth variety close to shore. Boat liveries are much easier to find in this section, too.

In any event, you bass fishermen will do well to explore Great Lakes waters this season in your quest for battling bass! It's another fishing thrill for you in Michigan Outdoors.

HDA NOTES

By DOROTHY SCOTT

Do you feel like you are flying blind when it comes to helping select a suit for a man or a boy?

Probably two-thirds of the cost of a suit is in the construction of the jacket, we are told, and wader that the women who have recently been tailoring one for themselves will readily agree that this is so.

That is because they know, now, a good deal about the hidden workmanship that cannot even be seen. Interlinings and interfacings are very important in holding the suit jacket in shape. Hair canvas or hyma (a fabric made of goat hair spun with wool) is used for high-grade suits. This hair-cloth interlining and interfacing is used through the shoulders, in the lapels and down the front because it is very resistant to creasing and has great elasticity. Lower quality suits may use cheaper hair canvas which is filled with a glue-like sizing to make it feel crisp. After wear and cleaning, this sizing comes out leaving the jacket limp and droopy.

There are two quality tests for materials in men's suits. Crush the material in your hands, then release it. If it springs back into shape it will hold a press.

A second test is to bend the corner of the collar or coat lapel. In a good quality suit the lapel will snap right back into place after being folded.

"Trichinosis" is a term heard rather often, but not entirely understood. Trichinosis is an infection caused by eating improperly cooked or processed food. It is caused by a tiny worm, invisible to the naked eye. This worm is found in pork and when it gets into our bodies bores through the muscles. Then what? Rheumatic pains result, sometimes even death. This infection can be prevented quite easily. Just be sure to thoroughly cook all pork products before serving or eating.

(7) "Cut-In" vehicle stops too quickly and is hit in rear.

(8) Overtaking vehicle hits vehicle coming from cross-road.

(9) One of the vehicles hits a parked car.

When dangerous passing is combined with exceeding the speed limit or "driving too fast for conditions" and someone is "endangered," this is likely to result in a charge of "reckless driving" if a motorist is found guilty of that offense.
