Their home was aglow with many beautiful yellow and gold flowers. The large dinner table covered with a beautiful lace cloth, and centered with a floral arrangement.

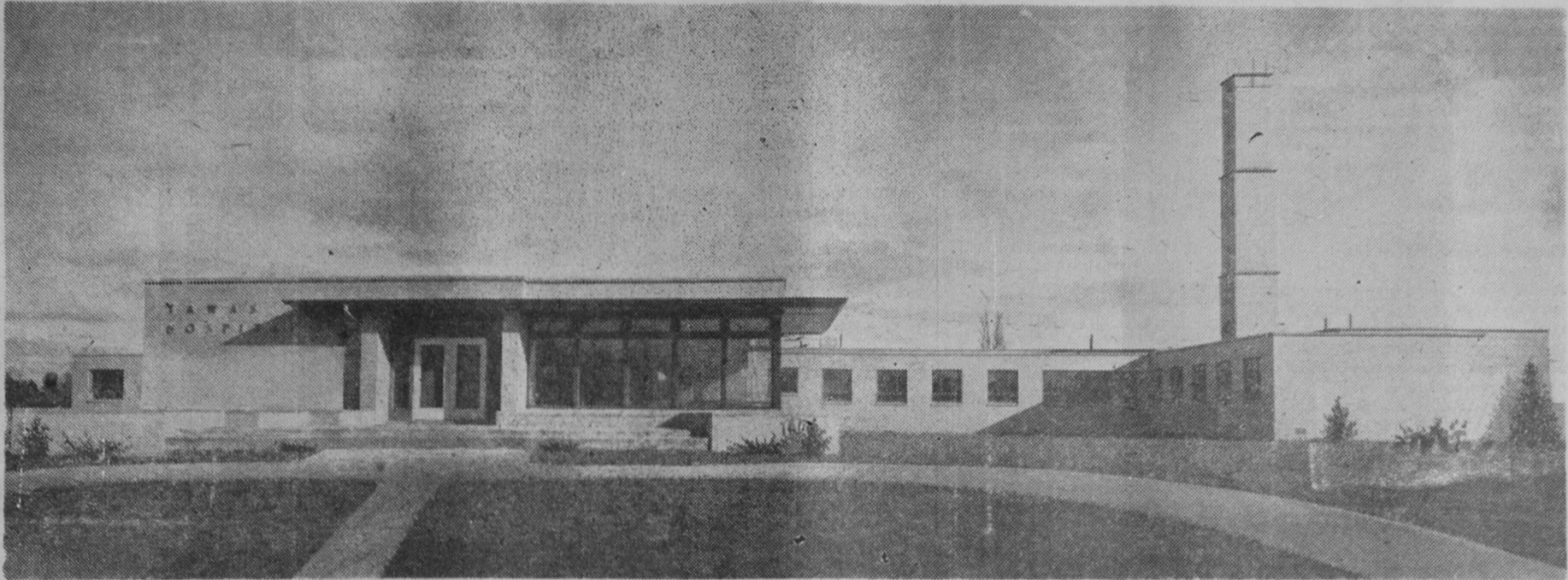

To Hold 'Open House' at New Hospital



Inspection by Public Invited This Saturday and Sunday

This Saturday and Sunday will provide a good opportunity to inspect Iosco county's beautiful, new hospital, stated members of the board of directors of the Tawas Hospital Association at Tuesday evening's meeting of that board.

"After Saturday and Sunday the only way you can make as thorough an inspection will be as a hospital patient," state the directors, as it is expected that the hospital will be in operation a short time after the "open house."

Everyone is invited to attend the "open house" the hours will be from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. each day. Directors of the hospital association and personnel of the administration staff of the hospital will be there to greet you, show you through the handsome building and explain the modern equipment with which all of its departments are provided. The ladies of the Tawas Hospital Auxiliary will assist.

The administrative staff includes: Sister Rita Louise, administrator; Sister Anselm, laboratory and x-ray technician, and Sister Assumpta, dietitian.

Built at a cost of \$655,000.00, the kitchen and equipment, alone, cost \$25,000.00. In addition to providing rooms and facilities for 40 patients, with additional equipment for more in emergencies, the hospital has two modern surgical departments, finely equipped x-ray department, obstetric department, nursery, laboratory, examination rooms, dining room, kitchen and laundry. The hospital is equipped with an efficiently arranged administrative office. Two large oil-fired boilers, each adequate to heat the buildings, are in the boiler room. Here is equipment for heating the large quantity of water used in the laundry, kitchen and various outlets throughout the building.

Summer Rules City Water Given

City Zoned for Lawn Sprinkling Service

The summer season is again upon us and the Water Board of the City of Tawas City is again faced with the problem of supplying its users with water for their daily use and for the protection of their family and homes.

To do this, steps have been taken to avoid disastrously low water pressure as has happened in past years. The cause for this was the sprinkling of lawns and gardens throughout the city making the demand greater than the supply. To avoid this, the Water Board has zoned the city into three zones and have limited each zone to three hours, 6:00 p. m. to 9:00 p. m., for sprinkling of lawns and gardens one evening each week. The zones and days are as follows:

Sunday, Zone 1—North of First Street.

Tuesday, Zone 2—North of Matthews and Fourth Streets to First Street.

Thursday, Zone 3—South of Matthews and Fourth Streets.

MEMORIAL DAY

Most of the states of the Union observe May 30, as Memorial Day and the observance has long since come to be one of solidarity between the states.

The passing years have softened the differences between the states and it has gradually become the custom to pay a memorial tribute to the dead of all the wars on May 30. Annually, flowers are placed on the graves of those sons and daughters of the nation who gave their lives that it might remain free and victorious over its enemies.

The boys who died in the Revolutionary War, winning this country's freedom from England, and those who have died in the Asian hills of Korea, and all those who have given their lives in wars of this country in the intervening years, will be remembered on the thirtieth of this month.

Many thoughts are appropriate on Memorial Day, but one seems to predominate over all others, except those which are personal in nature. That is the thought that the nation's best men are consumed by war. It is the patriotic, courageous flower of the nation which is removed by wars. Those who would not serve, or who are too busy accumulating financial rewards, or who would shirk their duty for any reason, are frequently spared the supreme price some of us must pay for our freedom.

The finest Americans are those who have given their lives for their country. The nation should not forget their sacrifice, nor should the people fail to remember that sacrifice every Memorial Day. Those who lost their lives defending this country are our greatest heroes, and without their sacrifice, no American would today be free. That is something worth remembering, and to be thankful for.

International Uniform Sunday School Lesson

Scripture: 1 Corinthians 12-13
Devotional Reading: 1 Corinthians 13

What Never Fails

Lesson for May 31, 1953

WHAT do you wish for, most of all? What do you pray for, most of all? You wish and pray for many things, and this is right; but what is above all? If you take your New Testament seriously, there can be no question about that. You will want above all the thing that is worth more than everything else; you will not be content to ask for less than the greatest thing in the world. You will ask God for love.

Better Than Miracles

Remember, when St. Paul or Jesus talked about love they were not thinking about the thing you hear about from the jukebox at the corner drugstore. They were not thinking about the sort of thing that comes and goes and leaves headaches and heartaches behind. The love that wants to get, but of the love that wants to give. They meant the kind of love God has and is: the kind of love that transforms the persons to whom it is given. The kind of love that Jesus lived out there in Galilee, the kind that can be lived on any street in the world. The kind of love the Cross stands for. This kind of love, Paul said, is better than miracles. Indeed, miracles are no account without it. When Paul talks of "speaking with the tongues of men and of angels" he is not meaning eloquence, oratory. He means (as you can see from 1 Cor. Chap. 12) the miraculous "gift" of tongues which the Corinthian church knew. Some of the members there could speak with tongues, some couldn't. Those that could, despised those that couldn't. That's not the point, Paul means to say. The measure of a Christian is not miracles, but love.

Mightier Than the Mind
Love is also better than something else we all admire and would like to have as much of as possible. It is better and mightier than mental genius. The world around us is full of mysteries. A child can ask questions the wise cannot answer. If I only knew! is a thought that has occurred to every one. Each of us thinks he would be happier if he knew all the answers. We feel sure we could do more and be more if our minds were even just a little sharper than they are. But Paul reminds us that even if our prayers for insight and wisdom were all answered, even if we had such wisdom that not a single question would be left unanswered (not that any such thing is likely to happen soon!), we should still amount to precisely nothing, if we did not have love. Paul does not say that mental power is a bad thing; he did not say that miracles are no good. What he does say is that miracles minus love, or mind minus love, will not fulfill God's dreams, nor ours.

Nobler Than Martyrdom
The Christian church has always honored her martyrs, the men and women and children too who have died rather than give up their faith. We are inclined to put martyrs up in the highest bracket of the saints, partly because most of us are sadly aware that we are not the stuff of which martyrs are made. But Paul pulls us up short. Even to be burned at the stake for a righteous cause is still nothing at all, if there is no love behind and in the action.

Speed—No. 1 Killer on Michigan Highways

With the arrival of the summer months, speed, the Number 1 public enemy on the highways, is increasing its harvest and wise motorists anxious to save their lives will keep this in mind by driving with the utmost safety, according to Sergeant James MacDonald, commanding officer of the East Tawas post of the Michigan State Police.

"Figures just revealed show that last year 48 percent of the traffic violations reported in

fatal accidents were for driving too fast, the highest percentage in the history of the state," Sergeant MacDonald said. "Driving too fast doesn't just mean getting everything out of the car that you can, but going too fast for conditions such as traffic, weather and visibility."

"Safety appeals are not just idle talk," Sergeant MacDonald stated. "The record shows just how foolish it is to drive faster than you should. During 1952, for example, there were 160,829 accidents as compared to 176,587 in 1951, a reduction of 15,758. But even with fewer accidents, more people were killed or injured last year than during the year previously, or 50,837 casualties in 1952 and 50,058 in 1951. The answer was that cars were being driven too fast and hit with greater impact with more serious results.

"The law does not set a specific maximum speed limit, but it does require that cars be driven at a speed that is safe according to conditions. Sometimes this is higher and sometimes lower. But a driver who is anxious to save his life will not only drive cautiously, but watch out for the other fellow who isn't. And this is the season of the year for more accidents."

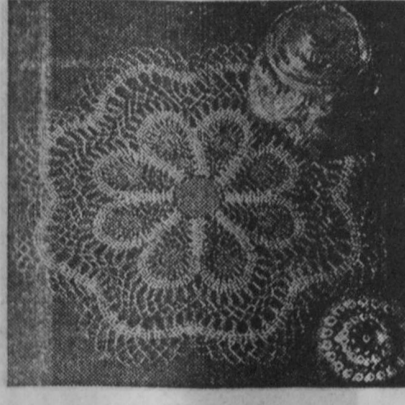


TABLE TOPICS

A Purple Rosette will be awarded to the "Best Specimen in the Show."

A Purple Rosette will be awarded to the "Artistic Sweepstakes."

Flowers must be entered at the Mio Community Building between 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. on the day of the show. No entries will be admitted after 11:00 a.m.

The Mio Community Building will be open on Saturday evening between 5:00 and 7:00 p.m. for the convenience of exhibitors who may wish to bring their irises in bud to leave for entry the following morning.

All artistic arrangements must be the work of the exhibitor. No entries may be removed until the close of the show.

Seedlings must be numbered and shall not receive an award or prize of any kind. All seedlings will be considered for the "Exhibition Certificate."

Only the judges will be allowed in the aisles at the time of judging.

The winners of all classes will be awarded an iris rhizome, a gift certificate or a hemerocallis.

HDA NOTES

We are in the midst of the season for greens—watercress, leaf lettuce, kale, endive, Swiss chard, mustard greens, tender beet and turnip tops. Kinds available vary in different localities, but are "good buys" in the leafy green group of vegetables.

Look for those greens that are bright and crisp with few coarse stems or wilted leaves when you shop. Greens are sold prepacked in plastic bags and from bulk display. Prepackaged greens are usually a little more expensive, but there is a saving in waste and added convenience.

Greens store in the refrigerator should be in air-tight containers, and are best when washed just before using rather than before storing.

And, if you are interested in freezing greens you may wish to

have a copy of this bulletin, "Freezing Foods for Michigan Homes." Request a copy from your Extension Service Office.

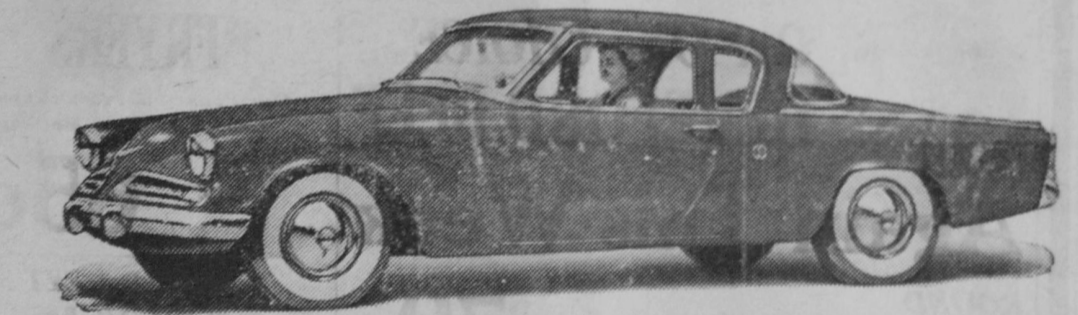

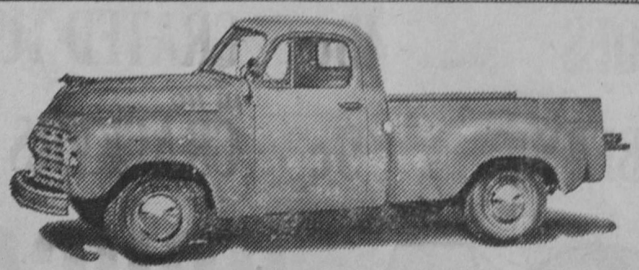



SEA LAMPREY CRISIS

The Congress of the United States is apparently working in the interests of conservation with a reverse twist. Those mystifying legislators may actually, "the unconsciously, help the perpetuation of the dreaded sea lamprey in the Great Lakes. They have just cut the operating budget for the control project from a needed \$614,000 to \$104,000, leaving barely enough to keep a skeleton organization going, and nothing at all for the construction of some needed new lamprey control devices.

Spawning Run Now On

In hundreds of clear, cold streams emptying into the Great Lakes—most of them in Michigan—the blood-sucking sea lamprey is now making its annual spawning run. The adult male and female, having fed and fattened on our finest Great Lakes fish for the past single year of their mature life, move far upstream to a carefully selected gravel-bottomed section of the river where they will spawn and die, their life cycle completed. Thousands of tiny lamprey will hatch, squirm deep into the mud along the river banks remaining buried there for four years of immature life as larvae. They'll grow about 5" in that time, and will then drift down into the Great Lakes for a one-year feeding spree, attaching themselves to fish, grinding thru scales and skin, and sucking away the blood of life.

Trout Extirminated

The sea lamprey is held responsible for the disappearance of the lake trout in Lake Huron and Lake Michigan—an economic loss placed at more than three million dollars annually. Whitefish, too, are disappearing. What to mention the one-prevalent walleye pike, steelhead trout, and other species. Despite the positive evidence that the blame for the rapid decline of our commercial fisheries can be placed on the sea lamprey, those in control of our national budget refuse to allocate funds desperately needed to help exterminate this predator.

Write Your Congressman!

You and I may be able to help in this crisis affecting every kind of fishing in Michigan. Sit down and write your Congressman. If you don't know his name write Senator Ferruson or Potter. Ask for emergency funds to beat the Sea Lamprey in the Great Lakes before our inland waters, destroying sports fishing in the Michigan Outdoors we love so well.

ABOUT YOUR HOME

By Frances Dell


The tuberous begonia is a beautiful and all-around useful flower to have in your garden. Tuberous begonias are not hard to grow. You can start with tiny seed sown on top of loose, peaty soil. It will take about three months to get a small tuber. It will be much quicker to buy top quality tubers though somewhat expensive in some sections of the country.

In three to five weeks the tubers will have sprouted and the leaves opened. Then, it will be time to lift the tubers, disturbing the roots as little as possible, and plant each one half an inch deep in a three or four inch clay pot.

Correct potting soil is most necessary. It should be light, loose and absorbent, but well drained. A good mixture would be two-thirds sandy loam and one-third peat moss.

When potting tubers, cover the hole in the pot with half an inch of gravel; fill two-thirds full with soil. Set the tuber in place and cover half inch deep. Firm soil with thumbs.

Progress Made in Cancer Research
New evidence of research progress against cancer is seen in a report of an 8,000-mile tour of western and southern research centers in the current issue of Newsweek. Dr. Earl I. Carr, medical chairman of the Michigan Division of the American Cancer Society, announced today.

The first of two articles written by Marguerite Clark, medical editor of Newsweek, appeared in the May 25th issue, takes an optimistic view of current research. The second article will appear in the next issue.

She writes, "This year, doctors can say with confidence that a great many more cancer patients will survive than ever before." Dr. Carr said that Mrs. Clark was the only woman among ten science writers who made the complete American Cancer Society tour of 17 hospitals, universities and laboratories.

"This summary of the ACS research tour is one of the most complete reports of its kind to appear in print in recent years," Dr. Carr said. "Many new developments with real hope for the future are accurately described in the series and should prove of vital interest to everyone concerned with the cancer problem."
