ARCHITECT PREPARES TENTATIVE PLANS FOR ELECTORS MEETINGS

The architect for Tawas Area School, H. E. Beyster and Associates, are transferring community desires into preliminary drawings to present to the board of education for their consideration. These preliminary plans should be nearly completed at this time.

When preliminary plans are completed the architects will be able to assemble cost data on the proposed plan. This cost data will be determined on the basis of bids let for similar construction in the state. This drawing is also necessary to help the electorate visualize the proposed building.

The citizen's committee and the board of education propose to provide enough community meetings to enable all voters to have an opportunity to see preliminary plans and examine es-

timated cost data before the election is held. It is planned to place this material in the hands of the electorate in bulletin form prior to the community meetings, so that they may come to these meetings with questions which the bulletins bring to their attention.

R. J. Cooke is making a topographical survey of the site and borings will also be made to determine the sub-surface suitability for building.

Tentative plans call for community meetings immediately after January 1, with the bonding election as soon after these meetings as it can be arranged. A tentative time schedule would place the voting date near February 1.

The community will be notified by the bulletin and the local papers as to the time and place of community meetings.

Bible Comment: Conception of God Was Enlarged by Later Prophets

TWO conceptions, or attitudes, in conflict now were also in conflict in ancient Israel, where the Hebrew prophets spoke and wrote.

One is of a religious isolationism and of a limited conception of God, providence and duty. In this conception God is little more than a tribal or national deity, whose special favoritism is for one race or nation, called and chosen to the exclusion or neglect of all others.

This is not unrelated to the political isolationism which has broken down somewhat before the stern facts that in matters of war and peace, welfare and danger, the world, even though its divisions are sharp and its conflicts intense, is one in a way in which it has never been before.

Over against this religious isolationism is the conception of monotheism. Especially among the later prophets of Israel were the nobler souls who saw the law of God and His righteousness as being for every place and time, embracing all men and demanding the obedience and devotion of all.

In this conception the call of God was not a matter of arbitrary preference. It was a call to duty and responsibility, as well as to privilege. Israel was a spiritual nation, through which all the nations of the earth should be blessed.

This large and noble conception of God found expression in many prophetic passages and in the rich and illuminating later chapters of Isaiah.

The great invitation of Isaiah 55, marvelous in its conception of a God offering Himself and His salvation to all men everywhere, still stands today as a living word of God, undated, for every time and place. It reflects in its glorifying of God the glory of the prophet who wrote it.

And these noble prophets of Israel challenge our modern world with their world-wide outlook and their message concerning the God of all, with the only adequate way of peace and welfare for humanity.

Rings tests—blood tests—test and slaughter area, these have become familiar phrases to Isosco county livestock men. All of them are concerned with detection and control of Bang's disease.

To help us learn more about methods for detection, clean-up and control, Dr. Glen Reed, Michigan State College extension specialist in animal pathology has been invited to meet with our raisers of livestock. He will be here for two meetings which have been arranged to make it possible for those who can best attend an afternoon meeting to do so; if an evening session is more convenient, that is also possible.

Thomas Nelkie, president of the agricultural council; Orville Strauer; Warren Britt; Harold Black, and Harold Hammond, members of the council, have been helping make the plans and arrangements for these two meetings. 4-H Club livestock members are making posters, too, that will remind you of the day, time and place, which is December 2, Wednesday, the afternoon meeting being in the Wilber Township Hall and the evening one in the Reno Township Hall.

The Isosco county dairyman who does not weigh milk and feed most always overfeeds poor cows and underfeeds good animals. This means a loss of money by not getting all the milk it is possible for that herd to produce.

If he follows the rule that grain must be fed according to the amount of milk being given by a cow, it's wise that the measuring of both feed and milk be accurate.

And do not overlook the grain present in corn silage. It is possible to waste feed if the amount of grain mixture is not cut when corn silage is fed. In the case of Holstein eating, 58 pounds of corn silage, the grain mixture should be cut four or five pounds a day. Jerseys and Guernseys eating 30 to 35 pounds of corn silage need a grain mixture cut of about three pounds.

You can be sure to feed the correct grain mix with various roughages. Just get a copy of a blue sheet from the Extension Service office called, "Feeding the Dairy Cow in the Non-Pasture Season."
