Blood Bank Unit to be Here Next Monday

Department of Health Gives Rules for Prospective Donor

Blood plasma and fractions are modern medical miracles. Unlike suits drugs and penicillin, they cannot be manufactured. They must be fractionated from blood donated by healthy people.

The Red Cross Blood Bank will be at the Community Building, East Tawas, Monday, October 19, from 2:00 to 7:00 p. m. Make your appointment with Mrs. L. G. McKay, Jr., call 1024.

Persons wishing to donate blood will contact Mrs. John LeClair.

The Michigan Department of Health recommend that fats and fatty foods be restricted in the diet of prospective blood donors on the day of their donation. Such foods should be eliminated from the diet within four hours of the scheduled donation.

The main articles of food to be restricted or eliminated are whole milk, cream, butter, oleomargarine, gravy, fried foods, fat meats, mayonnaise, French or other oil salad dressings, cream soup, pie, cake, doughnuts, cream cheese, nuts and peanut butter and chocolate bars.

It is considered better for the prospective donor to eat his meals at the regular meal times. The elimination of the meal before a scheduled blood donation is not recommended.

A person who gives a pint of blood wants it to be used to save lives. Consequently the Michigan Department of Health urges that the above recommendations be followed carefully to insure such use of the blood so given.

Tawas Area Loses in Its First Game

Next Home Game Will Be with Sterling Friday, October 23

In its first start in football competition, Tawas Area lost a 13-0 decision to AuGres last Friday afternoon before approximately 400 people. The game was played at the East Tawas Athletic Field.

Coach Fred Hickman's griders fine appearance on the field showed how much time the players and coaches have spent on fundamentals.

The next home game will be Friday, October 23, when Sterling will play Tawas Area at the East Tawas Athletic Field. The game will start at 2:15 p. m. Sterling is also a first year team and should be an interesting game with both schools just starting a football program.

Tawas Area School football team won its first game last night, (Thursday) winning from the West Branch High Reserves, 13-0. Both Tawas touchdowns were scored in the last half. The game was played at West Branch.

AuGres scored in the first period with Hoffman starting a drive with a 22 yard pass to the end from the AuGres 46. They picked up more yardage on two line plays and a one yard line buck put AuGres ahead, 6-0. AuGres missed the extra point, but a Tawas player was off-side.

In the next play AuGres ran the ball for the extra point and a 7-0 lead.

Tawas threatened on the next series of plays when Harmon ran the ball from the Tawas 25 to the AuGres 15 yard line. AuGres stopped them cold when two line plays failed to gain any yardage and a 15 yard penalty put them back on the 30 yard line.

The second period was marred by penalties on both sides. Tawas had a drive started the last part of the period, but was stopped short on an AuGres pass interception.

AuGres scored a second touchdown in the third quarter by intercepting a Tawas pass and ran to the Tawas 15 yard line. The Tawas line could not hold the AuGres ground play and the Arena county team scored again. The extra point was missed and AuGres took a 13-0 lead.

In the fourth quarter, play slackened up with neither team doing much. Harmon got Tawas out of trouble with a 50 yard punt from their own goal line.

Supervisors May Complete Work Today

Apportioning Tax and Appropriations Principal Business

The finance and apportionment committee presented its report Thursday noon to the Isoco County Board of Supervisors now in session. The work of the committee is to apportion the various taxes to the townships and cities of the county. The report was placed on the table for inspection during the afternoon and its adoption to be voted on at the end of yesterday's session.

The principal business at the October meeting is the reconciliation of the county's expense budget with the county's portion of the 15 mill tax as set up by the Allocation Board in the spring. The tax allocated for county purposes amounts to \$121,800. The special courthouse tax amounts to \$33,600.

Forest reserve money amounting to \$2,747.89 was apportioned to county roads and three school districts: County roads, \$886.97; Tawas Area District, \$448.67; Oscoda District, \$1,063.64; Plainfield, \$548.61.

Property owners at Bass Lake and Cedar Lake presented a petition asking that the Circuit Court and Conservation Department establish permanent lake levels for the two named lakes. The board approved the petitions, but with the understanding that at no time shall there be any cost to the county to build or maintain dams for the purpose.

The board voted an appropriation of \$500 to the East Michigan Tourist Association.

It was expected yesterday that the board's work could be completed this afternoon (Friday).

**Bible Comment:**

**The Good That Came Out Of Nazareth**

It would be interesting to know how many of the world's great teachers and leaders, religious and otherwise, have come from small towns and lowly homes. Jesus came from both. He was a small-town boy, and the carpenter's home in Nazareth must have been quite lowly. But Jesus glorified both the small town and the lowly home.

The little town of Nazareth would never have been heard of but for the Boy who grew up there. It was an ordinary, unnotable Galilean village. It was not without warrant that Nathaniel said, "Can any good thing come out of Nazareth?" Yet the best of all came out of that hill village. The unknown town was destined to become among the world's most famous places. And, best of all, the town was strangely well fitted to be the environment of that wonderful Boy.

Here, remote from busy and troubled Jerusalem, the Boy could grow up in that normal development, which Luke sums up in the simple sentence, "And Jesus increased in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man." These words of Luke are all that we have concerning the preparatory years from 12 to 30.

Yet, to some extent, we can fill in the picture, and what we find further emphasizes the fitting nature of that home and environment in Nazareth. A mile away, from the brow of a hill, from which His enraged townsmen would later have thrown Him down, the boy Jesus could look out over a great part of the scenes of His later ministry.

The great caravans of trade, though they never touched the village, passed nearby in the valley. Here, too, though a town boy, He was near to the farms and fields, to husbandry and shepherds.

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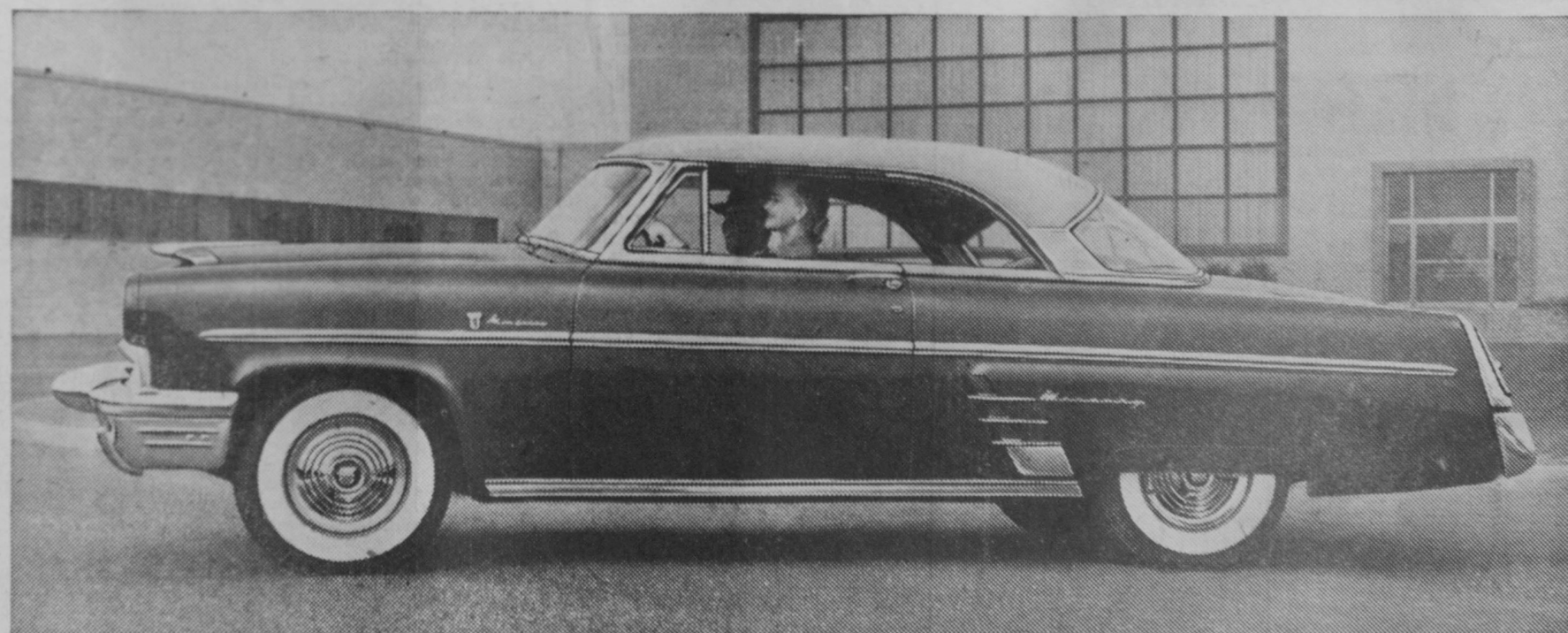

Many Iosco county families have servicemen overseas. The period from October 15 to November 15 has been designated by the postoffice department for the mailing of Christmas packages to overseas personnel. Air mail packages may be mailed until November 25. Here are the regulations to follow in preparing your packages:

Don't send foodstuffs, subject to spoilage or breakage. Air mail packages are limited in size to 30 inches in length and girth combined and to two pounds in weight.

Parcels destined for delivery in Japan, Korea and Pacific islands should be mailed preferably before November 1.

Boxes containing gifts must be of strong construction. Each should be securely tied with four separate pieces of cord, two lengthwise and two crosswise, knotted at crossings. Fibreboard boxes should be wrapped with heavy paper.

Sealed parcels should carry the inscription: "Contests, merchandise—Postmaster: This parcel may be opened for postal inspection if necessary."

Matches and lighter fluid may not be mailed overseas. Cigarettes, other forms of tobacco and coffee may not be sent to certain areas. The weight limit to certain APO's is 50 pounds rather than the regular 70 pound limit. The list is available at the local postoffice.

A customs declaration is required to certain APO destinations. Addresses must be legible and prepared in typewriting or ink.

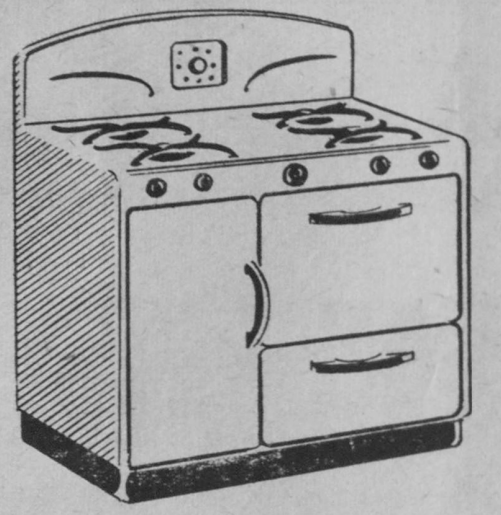

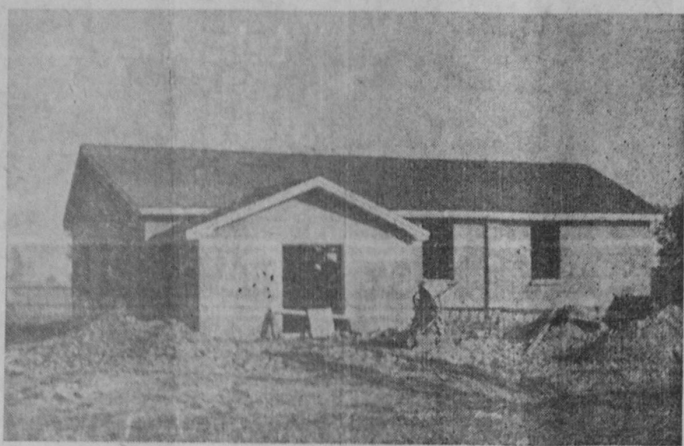

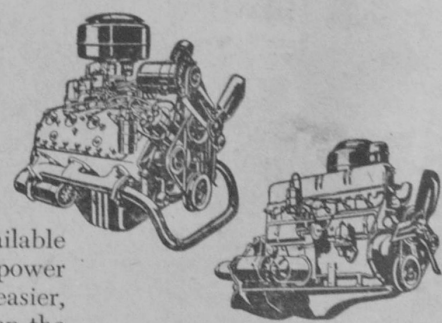

All adults are invited to attend this course which will meet about 15 evenings at the convenience of the class members, and will include 30 hours of instruction, mainly in business bookkeeping, but also enough personal bookkeeping for those who have need of such instruction. Ellis Lavrack will instruct this course.

This will be the first "exclusively bookkeeping" class offered to adults at the Plainfield Township Rural Agricultural School Adult Education Program.

The arts and crafts course will commence early in 1954 after the holiday season and will continue as long as interest warrants the holding of such classes. Indications are there will be about 20 members in this hobby class; at present it is planned to have the arts and crafts class meet on Monday evenings from 7:30 to 10:00. Mr. Nardizzi, the shop teacher, will be the instructor.

Fees for both the bookkeeping and arts and crafts courses will be established after the enrollment and length of the course are determined. Such fees in the past have been about 10 cents per student, per hour of instruction, plus materials, such as workbooks.

The invitation to adults includes adults in all adjoining communities who would be interested in such courses and who cannot get them locally. Whether or not such courses will be offered locally can probably be obtained from your local director of adult education.

When courses desired by local people are not available at Hale but are offered in other communities, the school will be glad to notify the people who have expressed interest in such courses of the time and place these courses will be available in other communities.

Should interest in typing increase as it has been doing, after the arts and crafts course is over a course in typing will probably be offered at the school.

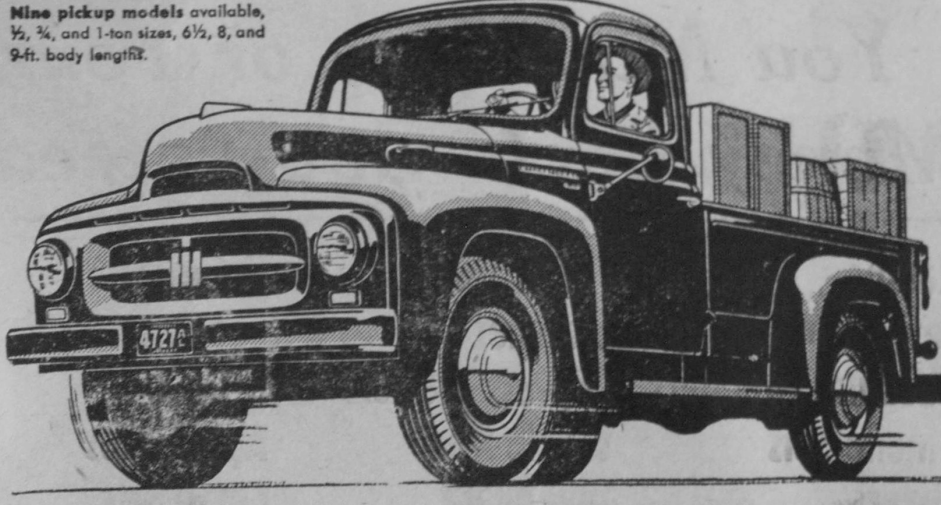

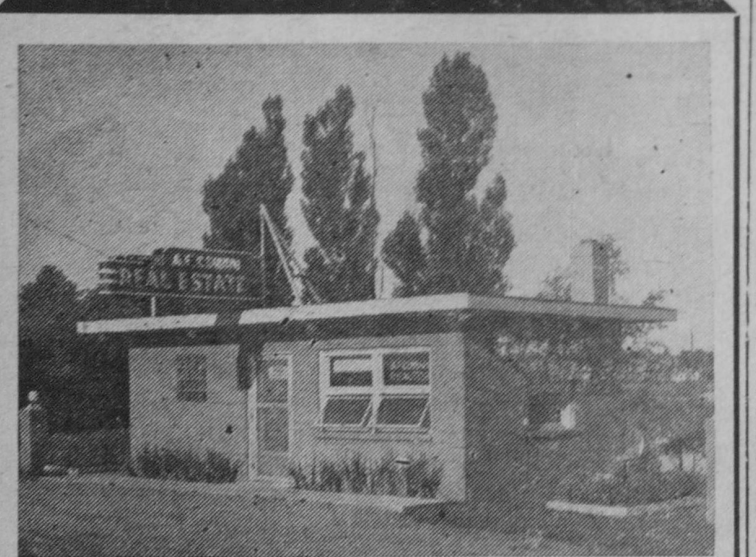

We certainly hit the bull's eye—picking the wrong day for an outdoor tour last Tuesday. Nevertheless, 18 persons in all were involved in the activities of the day.

At our first stop, Northwood Ranch, Eugene Woods told us that he has bought his last trees, from now on he will grow his own seedlings and as a good many coming along now. These last ones he has purchased from Michigan State College number 6,000.

Mr. Woods demonstrated how a tree planter works. It is one which he has designed and made himself, and does the job so much faster and easier than it be done by hand.

In the Watt woodlots we observed the effects of pasturing versus protection in the development of a new growth of trees. If livestock are kept out of our woodlots, new growth among the hardwoods takes place by itself and makes planting unnecessary. The trees that grow are less apt to have been injured by the tramping of many feet, the soil condition is better and covers tree roots. We learned how to estimate the board feet in trees ready for harvest as well as how to determine the age and rate of tree growth and tree identification.

The Fahselt's have 2,000 red pine trees in their 12 or 13 year old plantation which are doing very well. Here we really found out what a difference such cover can make when there is a cold wind. While among the trees in the plantation we were quite comfortable despite the wind and rain and could talk about the use of land for trees to protect soil, to provide wind-breaks, to help control the temperature and wind in areas surrounding the plantings. Have you realized that trees affect these conditions for a distance 15 times their height?

A question many people ask at this time of year is "What is the matter with our pine trees, the needles are turning brown, they must have a disease?"

We learned that evergreens lose their three year old needles about this time of year. They turn brown and drop off, a very normal circumstance.

At Laidlaw's we drove back into their 65 acre farm woodlot to see how they have used selective cutting to harvest mature trees for the lumber that is going into the erection of a new pen-type barn, beautiful white and red pine lumber. Everyone thinks it is too nice a quality to put in a barn, but we know the barn will be a big asset to the family's farming operation, and at a much less cost than if all the materials had been purchased.

Lester Bell, Michigan State College forester, told us so many interesting things about seedlings, wood and trees—we have been able to tell you but a small part of it here. Directions for growing your own seedbeds are available at the Extension Service Office, and other forestry information as well.
