## Heart Attack Fatal to East Tawas Mayor

Henry L. Klenow Had Been in Business Here Since Boyhood

Henry L. Klenow, well known East Tawas businessman and mayor of that city for the past 10 years, died last week Thursday night following a heart attack.

Mayor Klenow had been attending the Iosco County Board of Supervisors which were in session last week. He remained at home Thursday afternoon because he felt ill. His condition becoming worse, he was taken at 10 o'clock that evening to the Tawas Hospital, where death occurred at 11:40.

In addition to serving his city as mayor, Mr. Klenow had been a member of the city council for 15 years, and a member of the fire department. He had been chairman of the board of supervisors for three terms.

He was born April 22, 1901, at East Tawas. From boyhood he and his brothers were associated with their father, the late Loren J. Klenow, in his various business enterprises. Since the father's death in 1939, Henry Klenow had operated the Klenow Market. On June 21, 1919, he was married to Miss Bernice MacMurray of East Tawas.

He was a member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church, the Knights of Columbus, the East Tawas Club and the Elks.

## Bids to be Opened Wednesday on US-23 Widening

Bids will be opened Wednesday at Lansing on the project to widen US-23 from Pineconing to Standish, according to an announcement made by the State Highway Department. The date set for completion of the project is July 1, 1954.

Right-of-way difficulties caused much of the delay in this long awaited improvement to US-23. The first step in condemnation proceedings has been taken to acquire from reluctant owners the remaining portions of the 10 to 20 foot strip necessary for widening the highway. At the hearing, objection to the widening of the highway itself, price paid by state for right-of-way and question of roadside signs, were the principal reasons given by owners for not granting the right-of-way.

Dr. Stephen Nisbet, president of the State Board of Education, was the speaker at the morning session of the Iosco-Alcona Teachers Institute held Wednesday at the Oscoda School. About 160 teachers from the schools of the two counties were in attendance.

Place in Religion  
For Hate

A PLAUSIBLE philosophy of life has said, "Be good and you will be happy."

But if happiness consists in being free from danger and immune from pain, the sufferings of good men have revealed how false is that easy adage.

A deep mystery of life is that the innocent have suffered with the guilty. It is the mystery of the Cross and the suffering and sacrifice of Christ Himself.

The hostility that Jesus aroused in His prejudiced, fellow townsmen as He began His ministry in Nazareth continued on the part of many throughout His ministry.

Strange to say, it was the finest things that He did that aroused the most violent opposition. Religion ought to make men humane, kind, considerate, ready and eager to help one another. But, unfortunately, it has often made them bitter and full of hatred.

It was not unnatural that the claims of Jesus should be questioned by some, as they had been by His own brothers. But why should His pronouncement of the forgiveness of sins have aroused such hatred?

If He had no power to forgive sins, the sins would not be forgiven. To question His authority was one thing—to hate Him was another.

The opposition of certain Scribes and Pharisees and official religious authorities had some justification. They were the official representatives of religion. As Jesus Himself said, they "sat in Moses' seat."

The mistake that they made was in ignoring the actual words and deeds, in being blind to the authority of goodness, and in hating One whom the people heard gladly.

Are we wiser than those of old? Is religion our response to the goodness of God, or is it dominated by prejudice and bigotry?

To Celebrate Harvest Festival

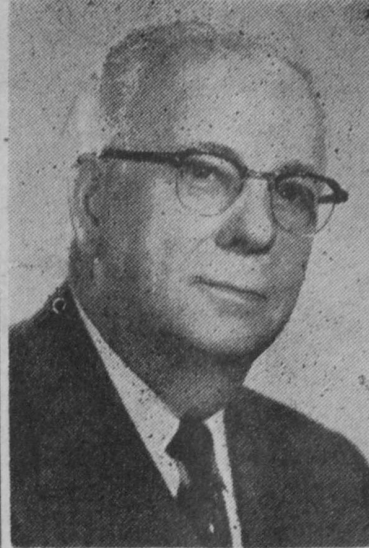

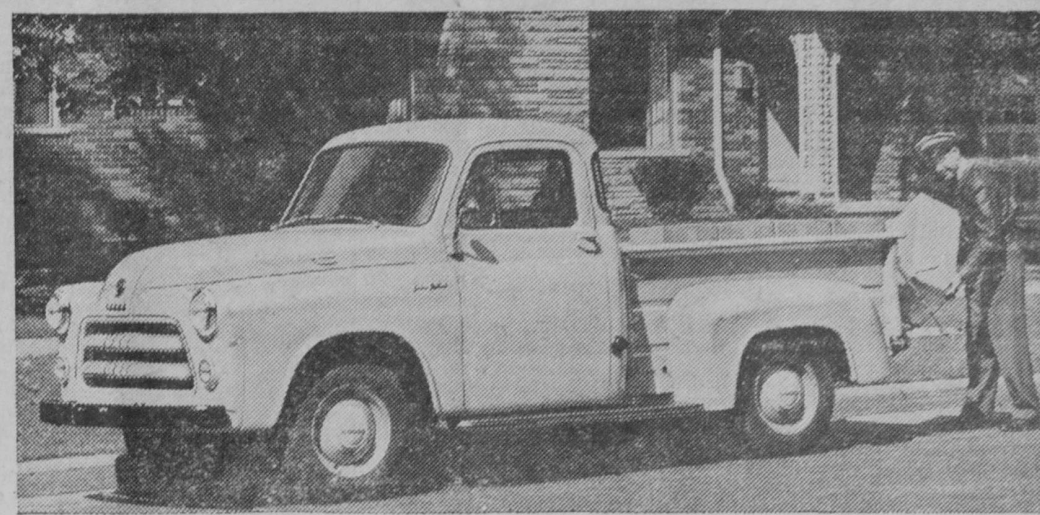
