Board of Education Makes Decision on New School Site

Select Reinke-Neumann Property

Selection Made Tuesday Evening at Regular Meeting of Board

After careful analysis of the data on the several proposed sites presented by the Citizens Site Committee, the Tawas Area Board of Education selected a site Tuesday night for the new school. The site selected is the so-called Reinke-Neumann property. The vote was unanimous.

Facing M-55 and located about half way between the Plank and Wilber Roads, the site was thought to most satisfactorily meet the requirements established by the Citizens' Advisory Council and fit the needs of the school district.

The board of education has worked with more than usual care. Soon after the board was organized, the School Facilities Survey and Area Studies Committee of the Michigan Department of Public Instruction was asked to assist in the starting of the development of the new district. Members of the above committee worked in the Tawas Area for a number of days and assisted to initiate a plan designed to secure results. Plans for the formation of a general citizens' committee, known as the Citizens' Advisory Committee, and several special committees were made. One of the special committees was the Site Committee.

At a general meeting of the latter committee, consisting of about 45 members an executive committee of seven was selected to do the intensive investigating. Its membership consisted of (Continued No. 2, Back Page)

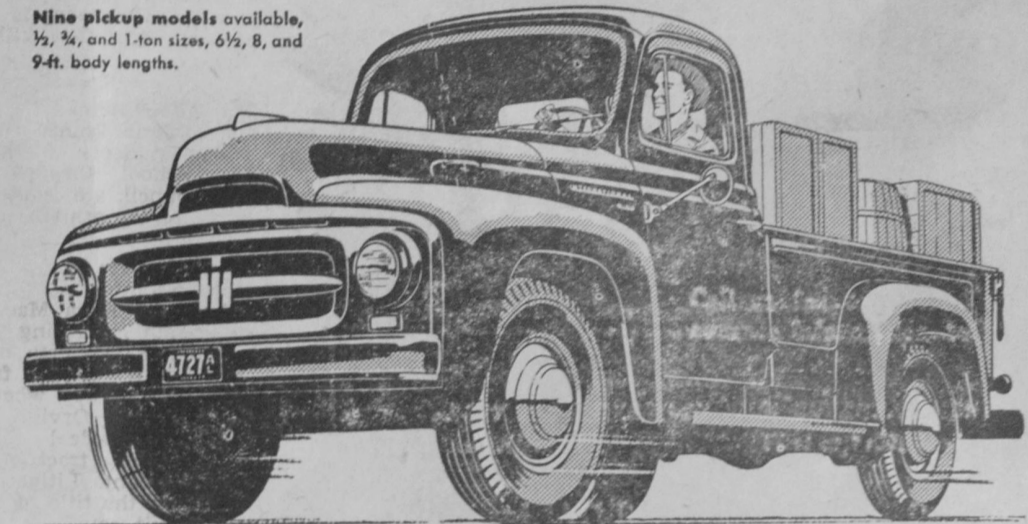
State Police Make 8,987 Arrests

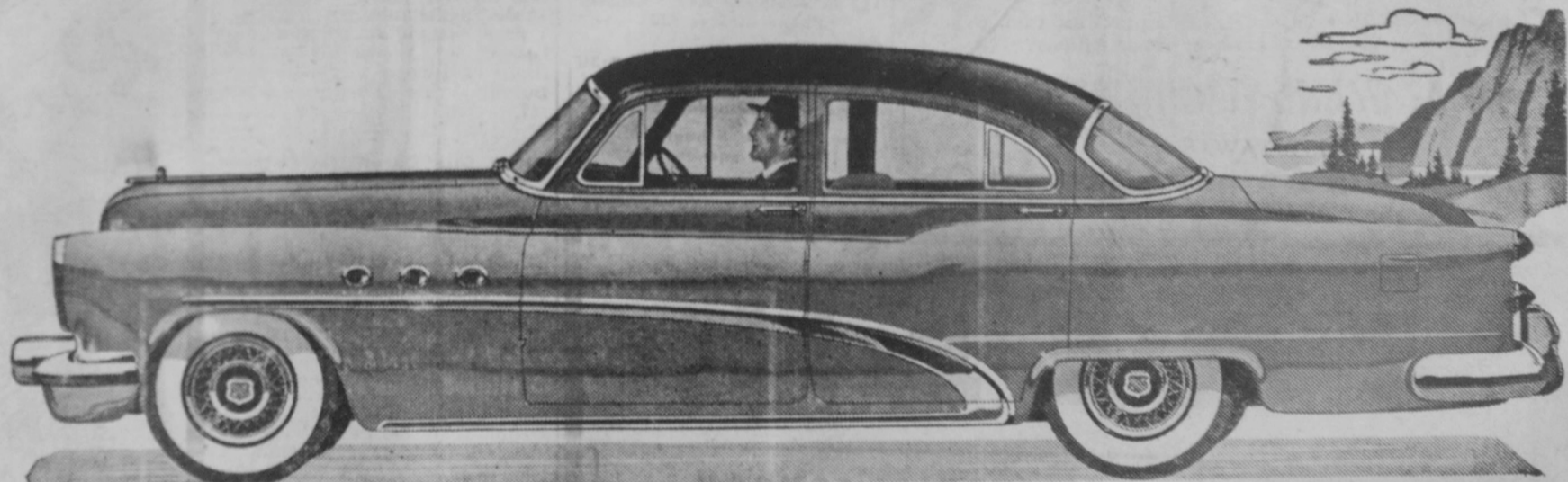

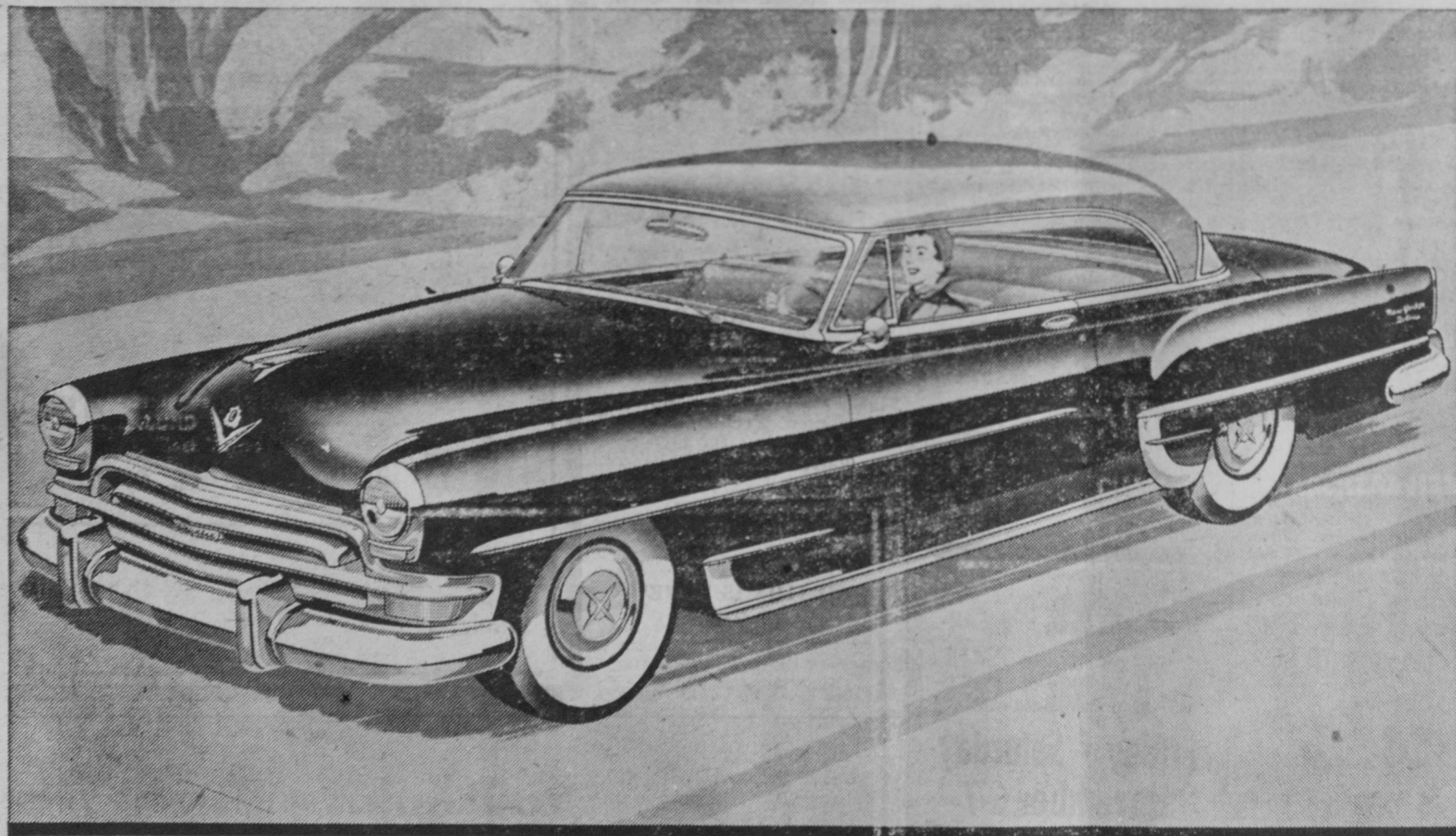
