AUTUMN WELCOMED—

After the hot months of July and August, the arrival of autumn is welcomed by most Americans. This year autumn begins at 3:07 a. m. September 23. At that time the length of day and night is approximately the same in this part of the Northern Hemisphere. (The sun will rise at 5:49 a. m. for the southern portion of the United States on a line from Charleston, South Carolina to Southern California and below, while it rises officially at 5:48 above that line in the United States.)

Of all the seasons, autumn is the most nostalgic. The crisp days of fall, the bright turning leaves which begin to cover the ground, combined with new wool sweaters, football, the smell of burning leaves, the brown fields and bluish smoke from country chimneys, are all familiar impressions. The weather is perhaps the pleasantest of all the year.

Because the flowers and crops are dying or dead, however, fall is a melancholy time of year for nature's products. There is also the thought that soon after the beautiful days of October and early November will come the colder, harsher weather of winter.

The end of the year comes into view, and this tends to bring back memories and summations for the year, thus lending another emphasis to the nostalgic note. The days rapidly grow shorter and the nights longer, and the result is that the earth loses the heat stored up during the summer months. But, until the cold weather is actually upon us, and the days are at their shortest, the best days of the year and nature's greatest show should be enjoyed by all who are capable of appreciating the miracle of life and nature so evident around us.

HDA NOTES

By DOROTHY SCOTT

Rapid preparation is essential if you are going to obtain good looking frozen peaches. Peaches to be frozen should be harvested at the firm-ripe stage, usually a few days later than the stage when harvested for market, but before the fruit gets soft. Avoid

excessive handling which bruises fruit.

To help prevent browning peel the peaches, removing the pit and slicing each half directly into the freezer carton filled with a 50 percent sirup containing ascorbic acid.

To prepare a 50 percent sirup use equal amounts of sugar and water. Sirup may be made with either hot or cold water. However, the sirup must be cool when coming in contact with the fruit. To each quart of cool sirup, add 1/4 teaspoon ascorbic acid crystals or 1,000 milligrams in tablet form.

Sirup may be made ahead and cooled, but the ascorbic acid should not be mixed with the sirup until needed.

To aid in keeping the fruit below the sirup level place a piece of crumpled parchment or waxed paper under the lid of the container just before closing it.

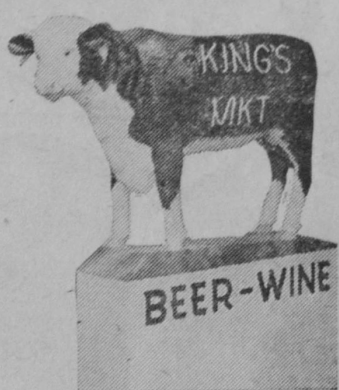

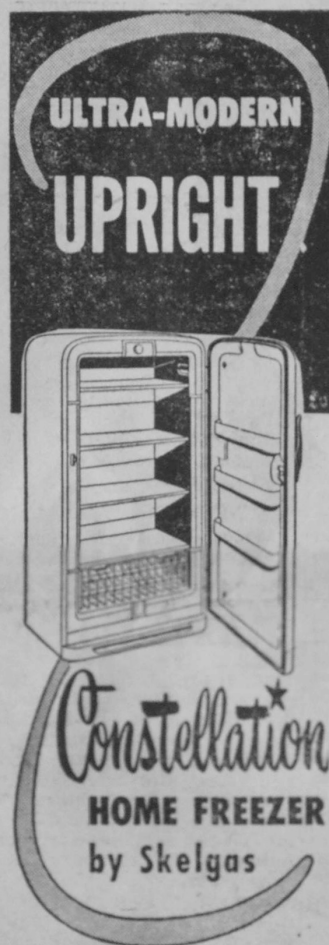

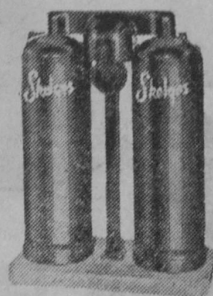

County Agent News

Now is the time to plant wheat. Planting after September 4 will assure you freedom from the dangers of the Hessian Fly. Michigan State College is recommending five varieties of

winter wheat for planting this fall. They are Yorkwin, Cornell 333 and Genesee for those wanting a white wheat; and Seneca and Vigo for those who want a red wheat.

Certified seed of these varieties can be bought for this season's plantings without leaving normal trade channels.

Farmers are having trouble locating winter barley to replace wheat seeding under the wheat quotas. Mr. Hildebrandt of the Crop Improvement Association is passing along any information on available barley seed through your Cooperative Extension Office. Wong and Kenbar are the recommended barley varieties.

Isosco county farmers are competing in wheat production with reduced acreage and good practices will help avoid any wastes. Farmers will want to use certified seed of recommended varieties for their locality. Most Isosco county farmers will find it pays to grow Yorkwin or Cornell 595, or maybe some red wheat such as Seneca or Vigo. To get the best yields, avoid loose smut and fit into the normal market need.

Many seed dealers will have on hand supplies of seed wheat certified by the Michigan Crop Improvement Association for high germination, plumpness being free of weeds and trash and being as near pure in variety as possible.

The recommended planting rate from Hubert Brown, Michigan State College wheat researcher is six to seven pecks per acre. He also recommends the general use of a 4-24-12 fertilizer at 250 pounds per acre or a 3-18-9 analysis at 333 pounds per acre. Obtain a copy of the revised Extension Bulletin 159, "Fertilizer Recommendations for Michigan Crops." Copies may be obtained by writing to our office in East Tawas.

Is your marketing system giving you the profits you should expect from livestock? How can you know what grades you are offering for sale?

These and many other questions will be answered during a series of livestock grading demonstrations by Michigan State College's Cooperative Extension Service and many livestock auctions throughout Michigan. A meeting, open to all farmers, is set for September 18 at Alpena. Others will be held in October. Donald L. Stark, extension livestock marketing specialist at Michigan State College, who will conduct the schools says the purposes of the demonstration is to help farmers determine what grades of livestock they are offering for sale at markets, to help them develop a sense of correlation between grades and prices, to help farmers know why the buyer pays

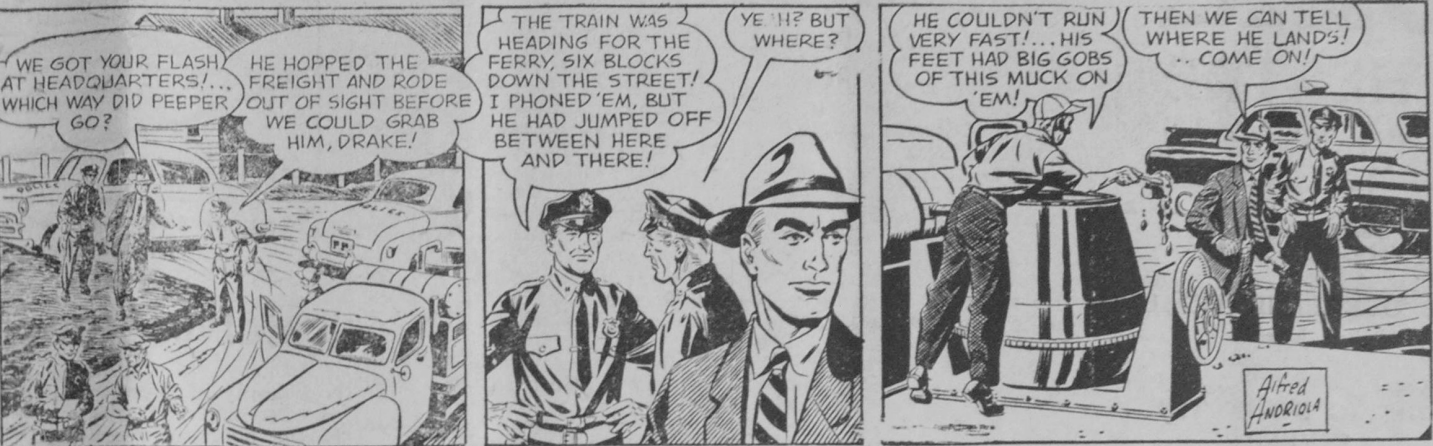

different prices for the same class of livestock that is a different grade and to familiarize farmers with the right interpretation of livestock market news.

Facilities, equipment and livestock will be provided at the auction places. The demonstrations will be held on auction day just prior to the sale. No

livestock is imported and typical grades will be selected from the offerings of the day. The committee on grades will select animals typical of each

grade. For cows, they will select animals representing the canner, cutter, utility, commercial and good grades. The same procedure will be used for the different grades of veal calves, heifers, steers, hogs and sheep.

There will be a guessing contest among spectators with prizes awarded for the guess on grade, weight and selling price for the day.

Discussions of each grade by market men, packer buyers and a market news reporter will point out the importance of grade in marketing.

The misunderstood question of what is commercial, good, choice and prime calf will be answered by demonstration. Other questions to be answered: Why do some calves sell lower than others of the same age and weight? What makes veal and at what weight can the farmer afford to market any part of his milk through veal calves?

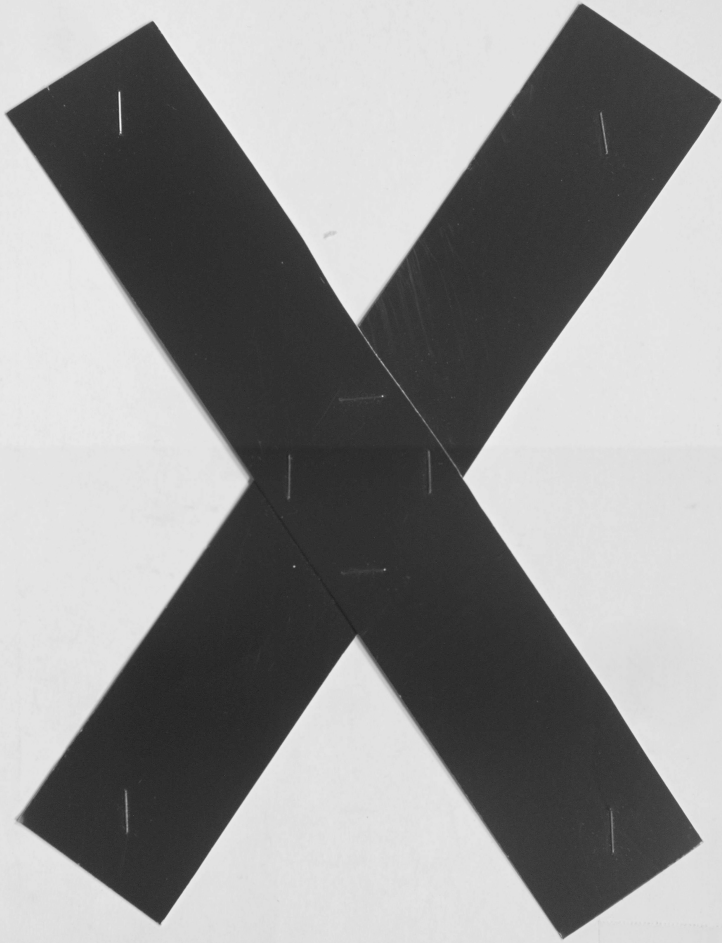
