Northern Telephone Co. Starts Improvement Program

E. S. Herzog of Hale, president of the Northern Telephone Company, said yesterday that approval by the Michigan Public Service Commission of the purchase of the Whittemore Telephone System would mean the beginning of an extensive program of improvements. "These improvements will include a dial system for the area," he said.
The combined telephone systems would have approximately 350 patrons and would serve the rural and town areas from South Branch into as far south as Burleigh township in this county. From \$150,000 to \$200,000 will be represented in the system with its improvements.
The Whittemore Telephone Company is owned by George H. and Verna Snyder.
In anticipation of the Public Service Commission's approval, Herzog has purchased a building at Whittemore which will be remodeled for an exchange.

1,098 Enrolled In Tawas Area Schools

Christian Progress Always Recognized Need to Prepare

"Be prepared" is a watchword written largely over our life today.

Its significance is largely in the area of security and military preparedness, but it is also an important watchword in the realm of religion.

"Preparation" is written over every aspect of the whole story of the founding of Christianity.

John the Baptist, whom Jesus called the greatest of all men born of women, prepared the way, and called for preparation: "Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make His paths straight."

We must never forget the long period of preparation in the life of Jesus himself.

Think of the boy Jesus in Nazareth, waiting patiently, preparing fully, listening obediently before He began that ministry which was to last so shortly in earthly years, but which was to be timeless and endless in its truth and blessing for mankind.

Nor should we forget Paul's silent years, his going into the desert and the long preparation before he launched out on his missionary journeys.

Nothing in God's providence is accomplished without discipline and preparation.

Education is a basic means of preparation today. It is not the only means, of course. The poet Tennyson prayed in "In Memoriam" that knowledge should grow from more to more, but along with more of reverence.

And Paul's prayer for the disciples was that their love should abound more and more in knowledge and discernment.

Without education we could not have had the English Bible or the church.

"Be prepared" is still the watchword of Christian progress.

With Iosco 4-H Clubs

We have had the help of a good many Iosco county 4-Hers to bring you project news from the State 4-H Club Show. The young people who made the overnight trip to that event September 3 and 4 looked up information which they hope will help others who could not be there. It will give you some idea about articles exhibited by boys and girls from other counties which we have not seen in Iosco county, maybe some of them will be tried in 1954 by Iosco 4-H members.

James Laidlaw and Kenneth Anschuetz spent considerable time assembling a list of handicraft articles which they believe club members here would find useful. Among them are: clothespin box, footstool, crates, coffee table, album, shelving, bookends, sawhorses, coat racks, shadow boxes, jar holder, night stand, bookcases, floor lamp, gun rack, cedar chest, bed, picnic table, boat, chair, card table, desk, tea cart and step ladder. They especially mentioned never having seen in our county exhibits such articles as a boat, picnic table, tea cart, pig feeder, chick brooder, jar holder, creeper and drying rack. They noted that articles ex-

hibited had been finished in various ways—with oil, penetrating seals, varnish, shellac and paint. They saw two demonstrations, one given by the Newwaygo county business meeting team, the other on electric fences by a boy from Shiawassee county. Iosco 4-H gardeners found a great many baskets on exhibit, packed so closely together it was difficult to pick out even their own. But they do tell us of vegetables shown in the baskets of other boys and girls which were not to be found in those from our county. Among these were cauliflower, eggplant, dill, spinach, kohlrabi, watermelon, gourds and squash.

In looking over exhibits in the auditorium these young people noted other projects which we have not had in Iosco county—field beans, family living, health and safety, home improvement and small grains.

Gardening reporters included Harold Provoast, Paul Edie, Richard Pfahl, Vernon Smith, Franklin Smith, Kenneth Davenport, Ernest Provoast, Carol Belten, Bernice Seigrist, Gloria Seigrist and Rosanne Seigrist. Carol, Bernice, Gloria, Rosanne and Mrs. Martin Seigrist saw at least two of the first place home economics demonstrations in the state. One was called "From a Shirt the Easy Way," given by a girl from Huron county, and "Dishwashing the Quick and Easy Way," presented by a Berrien county girl.

Still another group of girls examined carefully the clothing, canning, knitting and foods exhibits in the auditorium. They found red ribbons on the apron made by Judith Brown of Alabaster Rowers 4-H Club, and the scarf and cap knitted by Nicole Babcock of Tawas City 4-H Club. There were blue ribbons on knitting done by Charlotte Webb and Sandra Greve of Hale 4-H Club.

And it was a real search to find the food exhibits among the many on display—beautiful angel, sponge and chiffon cakes; quickbreads; coffee cakes; bread and rolls; pies; cookies; cupcakes and party cakes, and muffins. When they did locate Jean Schaa's cupcakes and Sherrill Scofield's cookies they found red ribbons, too. Lucille Smith's third year canning exhibit was among the white ribbon group. The girls want to mention several clothing exhibits on display which we do not often see here. There was a wedding gown, a number of elaborate formals, suits, coats and often hats and purses made as matching accessories, and a ski suit.

Projects noted by these girls not seen in our county this year are: personal accounts, flower arrangement, 4-H Club Girl, bread, cakes, rolls, Achievement Booths, family living crops,
