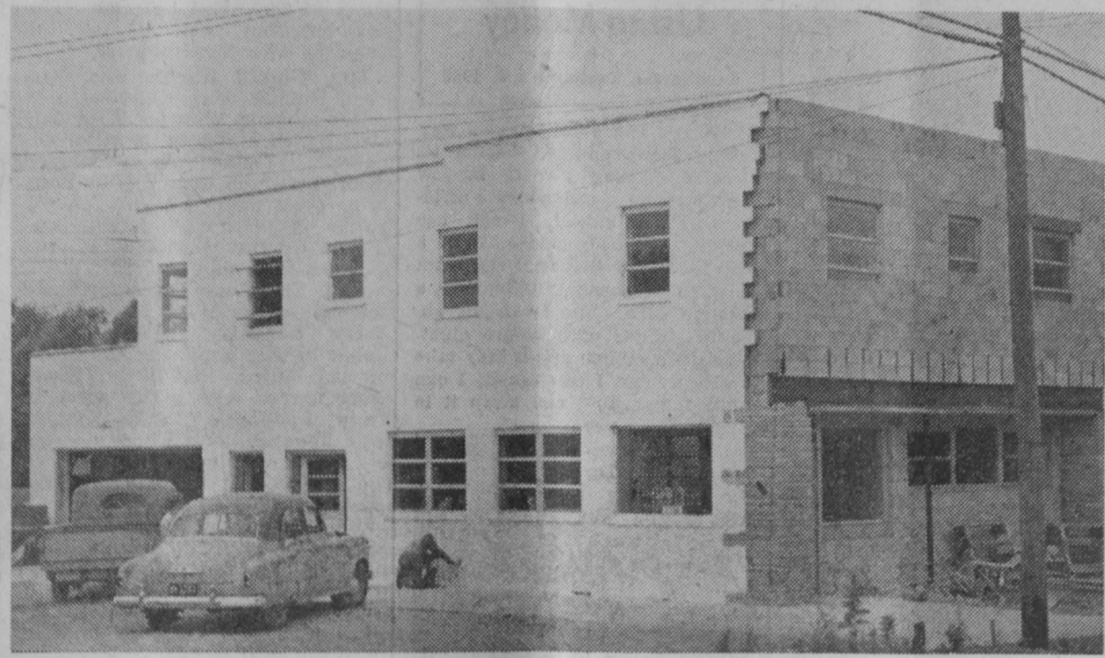

Art's Cleaners Move to Handsome New Building

Art's Cleaners, owned and operated by Arthur Wuggazer, has moved into his handsome new two-story building on Mathew Street.

The building was constructed by Vernon Eckstein and Company. Of concrete block and steel construction, it is 30 feet wide and 62 feet in length. The front is in Tennessee rubble and brick, the rubble work extending to the second story. The upper floor has been arranged as an apartment, into which Mr. and Mrs. Wuggazer will move within the next few weeks.

Wuggazer started his dry cleaning business here in 1946, shortly after returning from service in the United States Army. The business expanded, and sometime later he built a large plant on Seventh Avenue.

Contractors are still working on the new building. When completed, new equipment will be added and equipment from the Seventh Avenue plant will also be installed in the building.

When everything is properly arranged, Wuggazer states that he will hold open house.

To reduce danger of losses from internal parasites watch your flock closely. Drench with phenothiazine or the pheno-lead arsenate drench. Some sheepmen have used copper-sulfate-nicotine sulfate drench successfully.

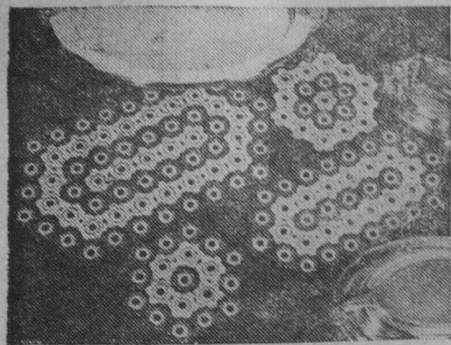

Needlecraft News

by Nancy Baxter

Daisies can be protective as well as pretty when they are crocheted of colorful, durable cotton. As hot plate and platter mats, chains of daisies with bone ring centers will prevent hot dishes from marring the dinner table. They are useful, too, under flower pots or vases which tend to leave moisture rings on a varnished surface.



FROM START TO FINISH
I can't be too emphatic about the attention that should be given to the finishing of a crocheted article. It is equally as important as the rest of your work, for an untidy finishing job can mar the beauty of fine stitches. To make the reverse side of each article look as neat as the front: Leave a piece of thread from four to eight inches

long beyond the last loop, and thread a needle with this length for darning through the solid part of the crochet to fasten securely. Cut off the remainder close to the work. The same procedure should be followed with starting threads. When you need to sew motifs together, instead of knotting the thread, catch in the loose end with several small over-and-over stitches, or darn the thread through the solid portion for a short distance.

CROCHETING DIRECTIONS

Little bone rings covered and edged with crochet to look like daisies are joined to make these cheery hot plate and platter mats. Three sizes are shown here, but other sizes and shapes can be formed. Dark yellow is used for the center of each flower, and white and green for the petals. In the fall and winter months, it is not so easy to supply the necessary vitamin C, unless tomatoes and citrus fruits are included regularly in the day's menus. Orange juice, sliced oranges, a dish of red raspberries or a serving of cantaloupe—this sounds like variety in breakfast doesn't it? Particularly with children, ages seven to 11, mothers report that they need ingenuity to tempt them with breakfast. If there is an element of surprise introduced into the breakfast meal, maybe Johnny will be more anxious to join the family around the table.

It is true that approximately 85 to 90 percent of them will clear, but you are insuring yourself the best way we know how today of preventing the spread of Bang's disease.
