Daisies can be protective as well as pretty when they are crocheted of colorful, durable cotton. As hot plate and platter mats, chains of daisies with bone ring centers will prevent hot dishes from marring the dinner table. They are useful, too, under flower pots or vases which tend to leave moisture rings on a varnished surface.





I can't be too emphatic about the attention that should be given to the finishing of a crocheted ticle. 


