School Site Cauldron Boils at Board Meet

Two Factions Present Their Petitions

Each Asks for Early Election on Area School Bond Proposals

The Tawas Area School site cauldron continued to boil at Tuesday night's regular school board meeting as two factions in the controversy presented their recipes for serving the school package to the citizens on an election platter.

Spokesmen "Dewey" Durant, chairman, and newly elected East Tawas mayor, Elmer Werth, of the Citizens Committee for Better Schools confronted the board with a petition and letter urging the school body to place the bond issue and the Fairgrounds-Nursery site for the proposed new school before the area electorate. The petition contained approximately 700 names.

The Citizens Committee for Better Schools letter contended that only "part of the district" had been canvassed and pointed out that the remainder of the district, including this portion, there are voters who will object to new school building due to tax angles." The opinion was expressed in the letter, which was signed by Chairman Durant, that the Citizens Committee for Better Schools proposal would win majority approval.

Countering with a petition bearing approximately 620 signatures was Don Korthals representing School Boosters, a group supporting the school board's original plan for building on the Neumann-Reinke site. This petition asked the board to present its proposal to the people "again as soon as possible" to the voters.

Following assurance by Board President Harold Gould that both petitions would be given due consideration, two other important points evolved during the night's session. Several citizens called the board to hold an immediate election, presenting its original program again. Board Member Randall Fox asked decisive action and urged the board, "I feel we should go on record tonight, plan and begin a supporting campaign for our program and we can set the election date at a later meeting."

Board Members Waldo Curry, Walter Niles and Stuart White voiced comment that such matters as drainage and taxation should be considered further. It was moved by Curry, supported by Niles that a decision on the site matter and election be tabled until the next special meeting on April 20. White added that each member should give extended individual thought and consideration before that date.

The other development concerned the board's instructions to its attorney, Herbert Hertzler, to negotiate option extensions with the three owners of the Neumann-Reinke property. These options were set to expire within approximately two weeks. To extend options for another six months, owners Robert and Mary Allen, Chris and Augusta Reinke and Fred Neumann will be each be paid \$100 under terms of the agreements.

With the site question in the agenda spotlight, discussion flowed freely from the large number of citizens present representing both factions. After the Citizens Committee for Better Schools letter and petition were presented, Elmer Werth spoke for the group in declining President Gould's invitation for comment. Said Werth, "I feel the letter is self-explanatory. The board should be left alone to consider the letter. The board Board Member Fox remarked that he couldn't see where the Citizens Committee for Better Schools emphasis on school location within East Tawas and Tawas City was important. "What is best for the entire district is the most important thing for the board to consider," he stated.

Werth related that "laymen have approached me and expressed how they hoped each town would be able to have a high school." He felt that there would be a psychological advantage in promoting the bond issue under the Citizens Committee for Better Schools proposal. Pointing out that his

group "is not here for arguing," Werth continued, "I feel the school issue with the Fairgrounds-Nursery site could be settled. It is in your hands. After the board acts, the committee (C. C. B. S.) will know how it will act."

Board members and citizens alike pointed out to the Citizens Committee for Better Schools group that the board had waited about 60 days for facts the Citizens Committee for Better Schools was to compile. And still such data had not been received.

Korthals remarked, "The Citizens Committee for Better Schools group is just fooling the public. For all practical purposes the Fairgrounds-Nursery site is in East Tawas." He suggested that the school board (See School Site, back page.)

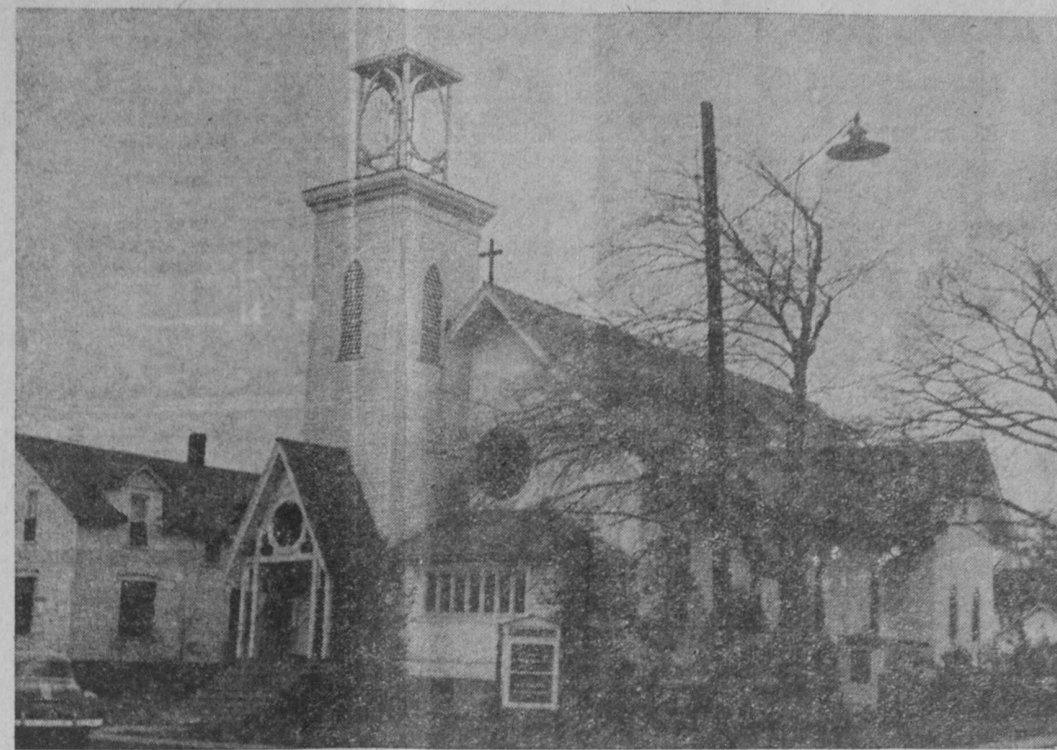

Bible Comment:

Jesus' Authority Was in His Words And Noble Deeds

JESUS, so far as we know, had no authority other than that inherent in His words and deeds. He was neither a priest, a Levite nor a scribe.

He had nothing corresponding to a modern diploma or credential, and His "school" must have been almost, if not completely, unique in the annals of education.

The great fact of this supreme but unofficial Teacher, depending only on the inherent authority of the truth He uttered, is impressive. The lesson, which it signifies should not be minimized.

In our complex world, standards are necessary. Our schools would suffer without some standard of qualification for teachers. We would be at the mercy of quacks if doctors did not need proper credentials.

All that is plain. But what is important, and sometimes forgotten, is that such authoritative and official credentials do not by any means imply what they are supposed to imply.

Incompetent doctors and untrustworthy lawyers are fairly common. So authority rests ultimately upon something more than official status. Sometimes a teacher, a bone-setter, a preacher comes along who, without any official standing, reveals a knowledge and competency beyond that of many who are outwardly qualified.

Such a one pre-eminently was Jesus. But He has not been alone among the great unofficial teachers of religion. Many unofficial prophets have proclaimed God's truth and won men to the truth they declared.

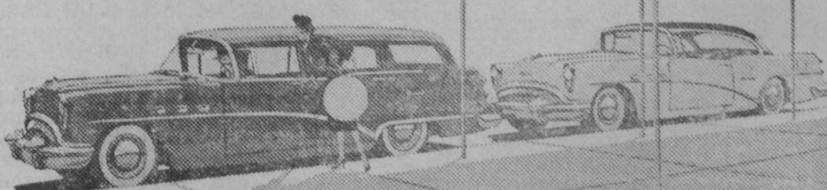

Davenport Will Soon Take Over Duties

This is probably the last week for agricultural news items prepared by your home demonstration agent, inasmuch as Marvin Davenport, county agricultural agent, has now almost, but not quite, completed his graduate work at Michigan State College. He will be commuting for a few weeks until all the "term papers, etc." are completed. However, he will be in the county most days.

Recently Mr. Davenport sent a folder on "Band Seeding Alfalfa, etc." to those farm folks on our crops mailing list. This practice of band seeding is a money saver! A farmer can realize 12 pounds of alfalfa saved per bushel or one free bushel for every five sown. If you are interested in receiving a copy of this folder telling the "how's and wherefo's" drop us a postcard, call 641 or stop in at the office at the Federal Building, East Tawas.

All it takes is a few hours time and five to 10 dollars for materials, and you can convert your old grain drill into a modern legume seeder that will place fertilizer in bands.

That's what a new extension folder from Michigan State College says. It tells you how to do the job with several kinds of drills.

Michigan State researchers have shown that band seeding gives stronger stands and takes less seed than with the broadcast method. Since all the seed is over the fertilizer row when legumes are band seeded, the small seedlings get a shot in the arm within two weeks after germination. That booster is mighty important and helps the legume to stand drought, insect attack and competition from weeds a lot better.

"Ways of saving money or keeping what we have" was the topic of the day when Graydon Blank, Michigan State College specialist, and John Harrington, manager of the St. Louis livestock cooperative, joined Mr. Davenport for a county sheep tour last Thursday. Mr. Davenport goes on to relate the following tour news:

They started at George Lake's farm and discussed flock management. Graydon Blank urged every grower to be sure to pasture but after the ewes have lambed.

A discussion of stiff lamb disease (brought on by lack of vitamin E) resulted in Martin Mroek explaining that he has been feeding each of his new lambs two vitamin E pills to prevent the disease. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Graydon Blank's recommendation to George Lake was that he drench his flock with phenothiazine in the spring before turning them out to pasture.

George's lambs will be getting the drench treatment for tapeworms between June 1 and 15. He will use the phenothiazine 1 e a d arsenate drench. Fall drench of the entire flock will be with copper sulfate-nicotine sulfate.

Phenothiazine is not a laxative to sheep. Mr. Blank urged that farmers start mixing phenothiazine at the rate of one pound of salt to every 12-14 pounds of salt and to keep it before the flock at all times. This is your one way to control stomach and nodular worms. Mr. Blank advises starting the lambs right so they will know no other source of salt. As James Sturtevant said, "no pie as long as you want 'em to eat bread."

At Edward Robinson's farm we got into further discussion on castrating and docking lambs. There were several ways offered, but as Graydon said, "As long as the job gets done." John Kobs offered a suggestion to help prevent bleeding after docking. He successfully uses an iodine-alcohol solution in a saucer dip the cut end in and has very little bleeding.

John Harrington of the Michigan Livestock Exchange explained the problem of marketing to all present. Andrew Mathews, Edward Robinson, John Kobs, Martin Mroek, James Sturtevant and George Lake want to have meetings to further discuss the possibility of cooperative marketing of their lamb crops. Mr. Harrington has agreed, so such a meeting will be scheduled within the next three or four weeks. Be on the watch for it.

To our city farmers—how's your lawn? Better seed it as early as possible this spring, because seedings made after the first of May are apt to be poor. That's the time when hot, dry weather and annual weeds usually cause trouble.

By all means use the recommended turf grass seed. This advice comes from Carter Harrison of Michigan State College crops department.

Kentucky blue grass grows best in soils that are high in organic matter and fertility, especially when the lawn is in a sunny area. But if you have sandy, or clay soil, low in organic matter, red fescues may be the best bet. Those recommended grasses may try your patience for the first couple of months but the end result is better than you will get from the so-called nurse grasses like redtop and ryegrass.

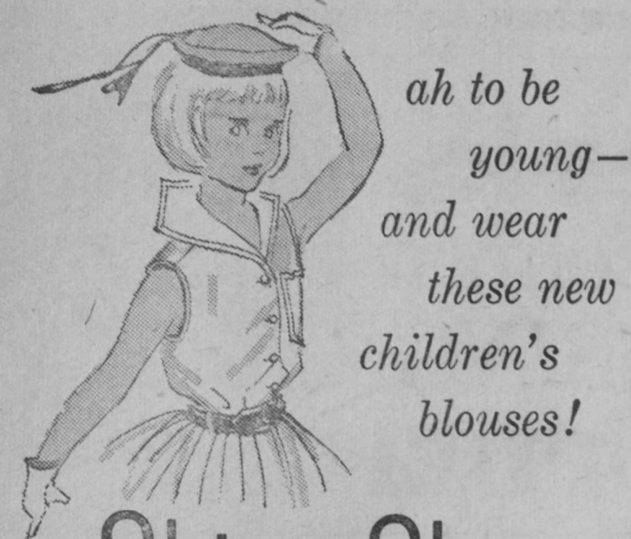

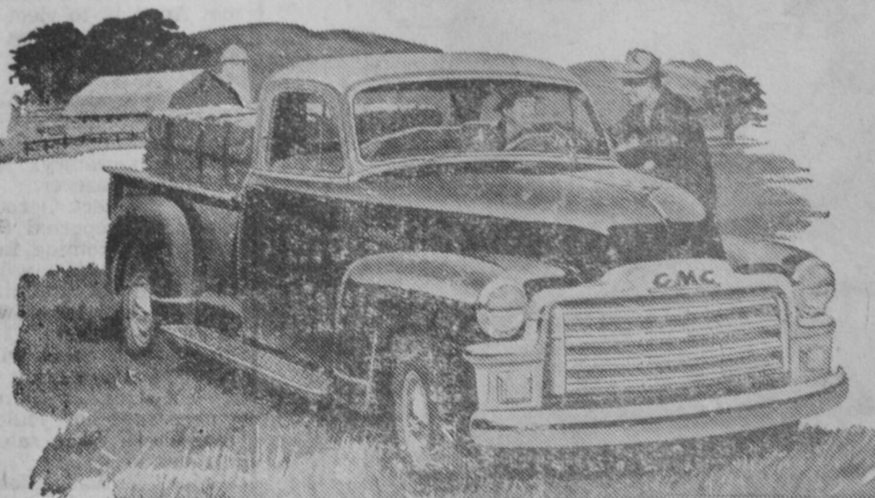

Approve Expansion Program for Air Defense Commands

Tuesday the House Armed Services Committee approved an extensive expansion program for 30 air defense commands, including the air force base at Oscoda.

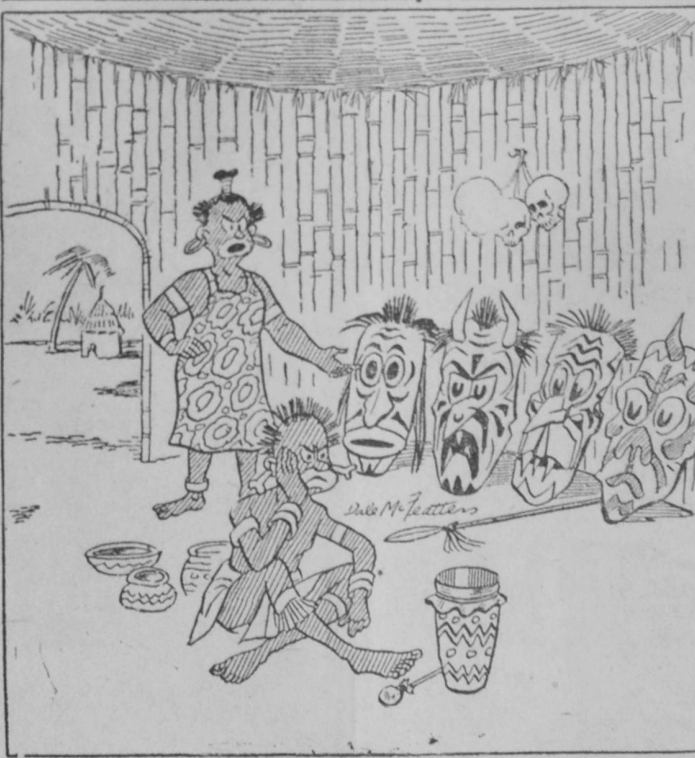

The rains this past week have everyone talking "Smelt." Reminds us about a small, colorful folder of smelt recipes which is available to you for the asking. In it are ways to pan-fry, deep-fat fry, broil, bake, pickle and make fancy canapes from smelt.

Do you know that smelt are not a native Great Lake fish? It is an ocean fish transplanted into the Great Lakes and some inland lakes.

Smelt are easily cleaned. Remove the head, open the abdominal cavity with a small knife, remove the entrails with the knife or thumb. Scaling is unnecessary unless they are unusually large smelt. In that case, scale before removing the head and entrails.

If improperly cooked, smelt tends to be dry. Because of their mild flavor smelt are best served with fish sauce or gravy—recipes are to be found in the folder mentioned earlier.

Broccoli, one of our most elegant greens, and quite available on our markets now, can be successfully cooked in a glass coffee pot. This suggestion from Roberta Hershey, foods specialist at Michigan State College, may surprise you.
Take a look at that glass coffee pot and you will see how the steam can come out of the two

"ears" (as Roberta Hershey calls them). By putting the broccoli upright, the top portion is nicely steamed and the stalks are cooked tender in the water. Another advantage is that you can watch the cooking. No overcooking needed for any green vegetable!

Too heavy a load in your washer makes it hard to get clothes clean because it prevents the clothes and water from moving freely. You also run the risk of damaging the motor.

Putting the right load in your washer is important whether or not your machine is automatic. To determine a full load, first look in your instruction book for the capacity of your machine. Capacity means the number of pounds that can be washed at one time. If you do not have a scale, you can estimate the pounds by knowing the weight of some common garments and household items.

For instance, one single sheet weighs about a pound, while a double sheet weighs from 1 1/4 to two pounds. Three pillow cases or bath towels weigh about a pound, as do four hand towels or eight wash cloths. Four tee shirts or eight undershirts weigh about one-half pound, a pair of overalls weigh from 2 1/2 to three pounds.

When you load your machine,

alternate large items with small items, putting no more than two large ones (such as sheets or towels) into your washer at one time. A typical eight-pound load might include two double sheets, two pillow cases, four bath towels, four wash cloths, four tee shirts and two men's shirts.

Of course, color influences the combination you can put in at the same time.

 gested that perhaps it should be arranged for elections to be held on all sites which were considered. Korthals later urged the board to print the site committee's evaluation of all the sites. The public could then see

each compared, point by point. Supt. R. E. Mick reported that voter registration lists had been received or are ready, covering Alabaster, Whitney, Tawas township, Baldwin, Wilber and Grand, East Tawas and Tawas City lists are still being compiled. Mick also presented a preliminary drainage sketch of the

Neumann-Reinke property prepared by H. E. Beyster and Associates, architects and engineers. The plan showed primary drainage is toward the county drain and Dead Creek. An estimate of \$7,577 was given to cover grading of the entire site. This work would involve moving approximately 13,500 cubic yards of earth and respreading of top soil. It was emphasized that the drainage plan and the cost estimate are not final and additional information must be developed before a working drawing covering this grading can be prepared. It was also pointed out that the low area bordering M-55 is not part of the proposed school site.

A comparative brochure on the proposed Tawas Area and the Farmington schools was discussed. The Tawas unit compares favorably with Farmington's at a much lower cost per square foot. Tawas' would be \$12.92 against \$18.83 for Farmington. Gyms were not compared.

The school board expects to have to replace some six teachers before the new school year. The treasurer reported a balance of \$68,780.11.

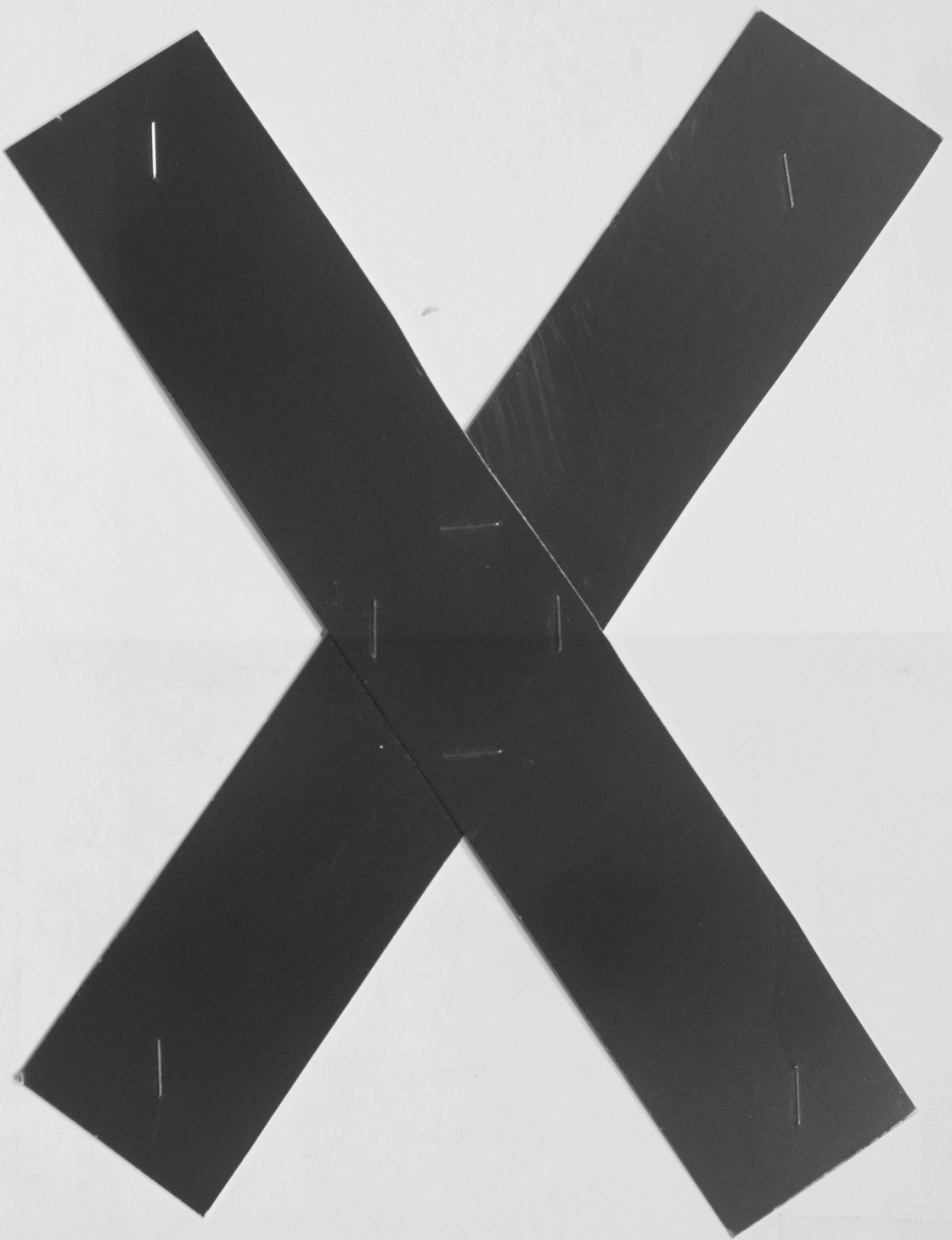
