## WHY THE DELAY?—

### The Job is at Hand--Let's Face It

Residents of the Tawas Area Rural Agricultural School District who are concerned about the delay in providing adequate school facilities for their children were anxiously awaiting the outcome of Tuesday evening's special session of the board of education. It was hoped that from this meeting would come the announcement that the board of education would re-submit its original proposal for the building of the proposed Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School on the Neumann-Reinke site.

All of us are familiar with the months of careful planning, the work of the various committees, consultation with architects and engineers and the faithful service of the members of the board of education which preceded the selection of the Neumann-Reinke site.

With the announcement of the board's approval of the site committee's choice of site, based on a careful analysis of 11 proposed sites, came the opposition to the Neumann-Reinke site and the formation of a small group known as the Citizens Committee for Better Schools, which favors the Fairgrounds-Nursery site. The board of education met with this group, answered its questions with authoritative facts and made every effort to clear up any misinformation and clarify the facts before the proposal was submitted to the electorate on February 8.

The outcome of the election on February 8 registered a setback for the youth of the area.

Since the election, the board of education has repeatedly asked the Citizens Committee for Better Schools for factual information which would substantiate its claims that the proposed school should be located on the Fairgrounds-Nursery site. Now, two months later NO such information has been presented.

Is it any wonder that the thinking people of the district are anxious to get on with their original task? Why then was it not possible for the board of education to reach an agreement at Tuesday evening's meeting? The members are the same men who unanimously approved the selection of the site. Their approval had the backing of qualified in-

dividuals, architects and engineers. It would be hard to believe that the Citizens Committee for Better Schools, a group which HAS FAILED to support its contention with fact, could influence any thinking individual.

The idea of going over the various sites seems a waste of time since none of us are qualified to judge. Had we been, just think of the thousands of dollars that could have been saved.

It might be well to remember that such an action might produce other small groups of opposition to whatever site was selected.

Poetic Talents Revealed at Dorcas Meeting

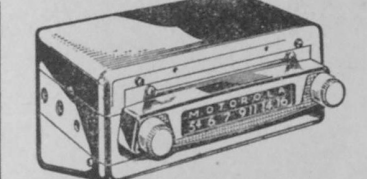

# FARM NOTES

By MARVIN DAVENPORT

It's me behind that stack of unanswered letters. Here's one from Bill Baker of Tawas City, requesting some help on strawberries. It's a good time to be thinking about it. We will promise to answer our strawberry growers requests with our new bulletin number 297, entitled, "Strawberry Growing Michigan." We sent one to Mr. Baker to help him with his problem.

Speaking of requests for assistance bulletins, reminds that there are people in Isoco county who might like to receive free bulletins on the subjects of their choosing. If any of our readers are interested in crops, livestock, sheep, goats, dairy, cattle, beef cattle, swine, tourist and resort plans and aids, forestry soil conservation, vegetable gardening, etc., let us know. We will supply you with one of our pink sheets in order that you can get on the mailing list. Just recently we sent to those, whose names we had, seasonal and timely bulletins. Spray calendars, ways of controlling insects around the home and in the garden as well as recommended crop garden varieties, were included.

Recently Lyle Bielby, Gene Kaiser, Clayton Johnson, Lawrence Travis, Earl Herriman, Clarence Herriman, Lawrence Ball and William Herriman wanted to look at suggested plans for pen-type and pole-type barns. We have in our files such plans and blueprints available just for the asking.

Clarence Jordan of McIvor was in last week talking about his livestock problems. He has experienced something of many have experienced recently. He is going to control this menace of Bang's disease with a vaccination program. That is the dairyman's insurance against cattle losses.

I attended a Farm Bureau meeting at the Lawrence Ball farm last week. Lyle Long, the chairman, was leading a discussion on the farmer and social security, the use of diverted acres (those taken out of wheat production for market), and the problem of marketing farm produce.

The Herrimans, Clare, Earl, Clarence and William, joined Lloyd Little, Lawrence Ball and Philip Watts in what was a lively discussion. Their spouses joined in periodically to give this agent a farmer's viewpoint of some up-to-date topics. This kind of discussion group does much to help in understanding the other fellows point of view.

We learned that no surplus of milk would exist if every member of the 1,500,000 farm families in the United States had one more glass of milk each day! We also learned that every person in the United States ate 152 pounds of various kinds of meat last year. Had that figure been 156 pounds, no surplus of meat would be evident either. In 1953 there was 25,000,000,000 (billion) this is pounds of meat produced by United States farmers.

When Lyle Long asked for a motion to adjourn, we had all pretty well agreed that advertising farm commodities such as milk and meat could help our cause a lot.

I visited with Orville Lyke of Hale about sheep marketing. He is interested in attending our meeting with John Harrington on the possibilities of cooperatively selling our lambs this fall. If any of our readers are interested in getting information about sheep management and marketing, let's have your name. We can keep you posted.

Alfred Guano built himself a nice 12 feet by 13 feet brooder house last week. When I went by on Tuesday, it was just well started. When I stopped in on Thursday, he had it practically completed. He has it constructed on skids so he can move it about the farm with the tractor. That's an excellent idea when you're interested in raising healthy pullets for the farm flock, moving it from place to place is necessary. We have blueprints for those too, just for the asking.

Arthur Aulerich stopped in the office and I wager when I see him at his implement shop on M-55, he will have the wheels a-rolling on a new idea. I'll give him about 10 days to two weeks before something will come off his production line, or isn't that enough time, Art?

I attended the recent Soil Conservation District meeting with Gordon Hatch and his board or directors. Those fellows are interested in seeing a soil testing program get under way in Isoco county. And they are 100 percent right—many a pound of fertilizer can be put in the right place at the right time when a farmer knows what his soil needs. A soil sample sent to our office by a farmer can be the source of many dollars saved. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (A. S. C.) cooperators can have their samples tested free of charge. For others such a sample will cost 50 cents for laboratory fees. If you're interested in testing the soil on your farm, why not call or write the A. S. C. office or your Cooperative Extension Service Office, in the Federal Building, East Tawas? We will be glad to talk to you about it.

If you offered something for nothing, refuse the offer.

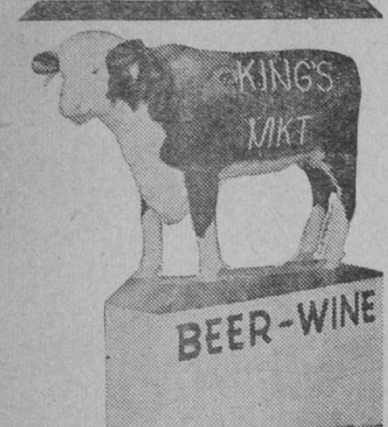

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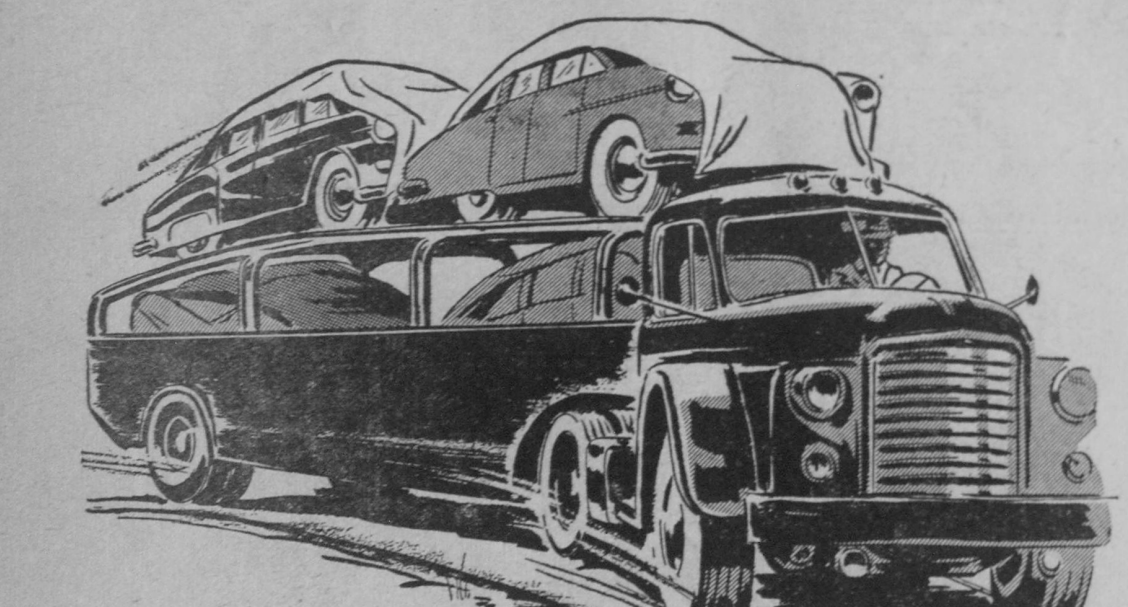

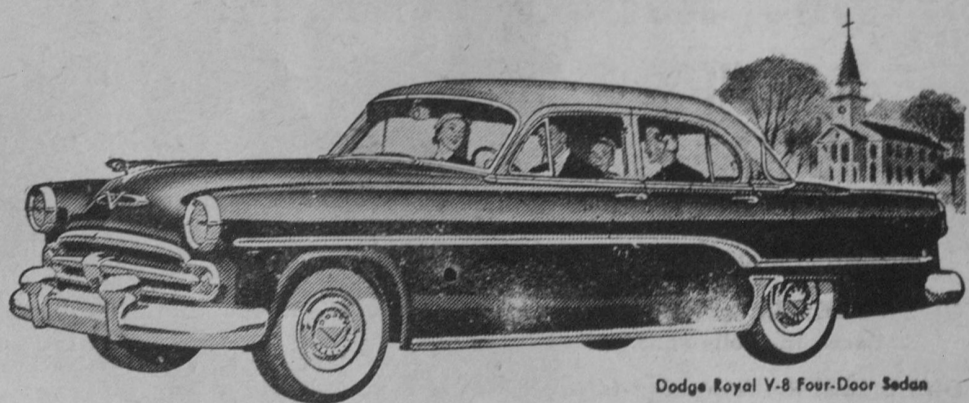

Mrs. James Mielock and Mrs. Clarence Brindley are on the Reno hospitality committee. Who are members of this committee in other groups?

Mrs. Reuben Edie and her committee are Mrs. A. W. Miller and Mrs. Sterling Cataline will be contacting each group within a few days about plans for "still" and "live" exhibits.

Decorations will be arranged by County Line groups. Remember what nice ones they planned last year? And, the Hale group will be in charge of arrangements.

The program committee is working. We will have news of the plans for you next week. Meantime, right now is the right time to mark May 5 on your calendar as the day to attend Home Demonstration Guest Day at the Community Building in Hale. You do not need to be a group member to come—everyone is invited to come, see and hear about the activities of women who do participate in this Extension Service program by joining.

Do you know that more than half the home demonstration groups in Michigan are urban or non-farm rural?

During our visit about the recent Reno Home Demonstration Group meeting, Mrs. Harold Black told me that members have ordered 12 cake decorating sets. All the children in this community will have "special fixins'" on their birthday cakes! We hear that the Drengberg boys are looking forward to pretty cakes now that their mother is learning how at meetings of the Hale group.

Members of the Hale group are finding time for a little textile painting again. They had five visitors at one workshop meeting, Mesdames Richard Mathews, Stanley Durham, Leo Kocher, Roy Shedenhelm and Glen Shedenhelm. Another time additional visitors were Mrs. Melvin Dorsey and Mrs. Irvin Shellenberger.

Another frosting recipe liked by the women in Hale is used by Mrs. Forrest Holmes. Scald five tablespoons of top milk and melt in it three tablespoons of hydrogenated fat and one tablespoon of butter. Pour hot liquid over three cups of sifted powdered sugar. Stir until sugar is dissolved, add one teaspoon vanilla, ¼ teaspoon salt. Beat until smooth and thick enough to spread.

The Hale group members will complete their community project of boxing yarn, crochet cotton and the like to be sent to the Gaylord TB Sanatorium. Each member will bring yarn, crochet or embroidery materials for the box.

What is this National Home Demonstration Week that was mentioned in the calendar above?

It is a time designated to review past accomplishments and set new goals. More than 40,000 Michigan homemakers will be joining nationwide observance May 2-8. WKAR and WJR radio stations will carry special programs that tell some of the kinds of accomplishments being made through home demonstration groups and members.

The home demonstration program came into being in 1914, when the Smith-Lever Act came law and the Extension Service was established. The United States Department of Agriculture, the state land-grant colleges and the local governments cooperate in the extension education program.

Our Michigan home demonstration program is carried on through-out the state as part of the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service.  
Through this program women receive up-to-date information on food and nutrition, parent education and child development, home furnishings, home management, housing, clothing and other phases of home economics.

In 1953 there were 2,519 organized home demonstration groups in Michigan helping members to get the most from this educational program.

Home demonstration agents, supported by specialists at Michigan State College and the United States Department of Agriculture, help these women make use of all available resources.

In Iosco county, the home demonstration program is offered through a home demonstration agent, Dorothy Scott, Bay writer of this column.

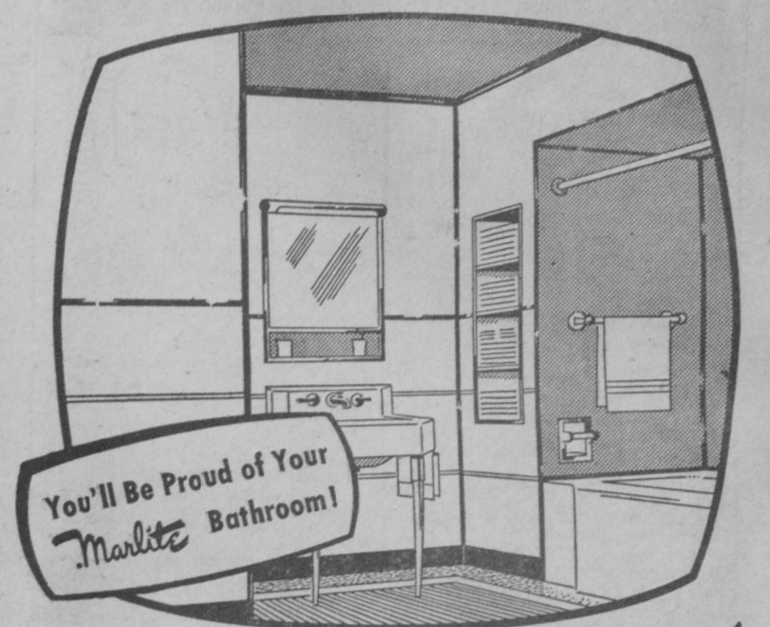
